Boy needs kidney

Transplant blocked

- Fifteen-year-old Anne Little wants to give her 14-year-old brother the new kidney he needs to stay alive. Doctors say Anne is the only person with an acceptable kidney for Steve.

But Anne is mentally retarded. And the law - or a lack of it - is standing in the way of the life-saving transplant.

In what attorneys said is the first appeal of its kind in Texas, the 4th Court of Civil Appeals was asked here Wednesday to decide whether Steve Little could receive the life-saving kidney from his retarded sister.

A Guadalupe County probate court order last Nov. 17 allowed Anne's parents to consent to the operation.

An attorney appointed to represent Anne's interests, however, reluctantly appealed the order because he believes the

Soviets installing missiles

AP Military Writer WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Harold Brown told Congress today the Soviet Union is installing new missiles with more warheads and im- whelming military power.' proving their accuracy "more which he said the United States rapidly than we had expected a

The Russians, Brown said. added about 1,000 strategic nuclear warheads in 1978 - twice the increase he had forecast last vear

The growth in the Soviet military effort is potentially very dangerous to us." Brown said in surveying the U.S.-Soviet balance in nuclear and conventional strength.

But he stressed that, "despite their increased efforts, the Soviets have not achieved anything that resembles overis acting to prevent.

Meanwhile, the chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, Gen. David Jones, said adverse trends cited by U.S. military leaders for at least a decade 'have edged us another year closer to a potentially unstable and acutely dangerous imba-

There was an undercurrent of

deepening concern - as well as an acknowledgement of an intelligence underestimate - in reports Brown and Jones prepared for the opening of Senate Arms Services Committee hearings on the Carter administration's record \$122.7 billion defense budget for fiscal 1980. which starts Oct. 1.

Brown said the Soviets' faster-than-expected deployment of new and more accurate versions of big SS-18 and SS-19 missiles may be speeding up the time in the early 1980s when U.S. Minuteman intercontinental ballistic missiles. poised in underground launch bases, could be destroyed in a surprise attack.

For this reason, he said, the United States must move ahead with development of a new mobile ICBM and a new "survivable basing system." He implied the leading candidate is a missile that could be launched from cargo-type planes able to use short landing strips.

The Carter administration is asking Congress for \$935 million this year and next to accelerate mobile missile development, although final technical decisions have not yet been made on the project, which ultimately could (ost \$30 billion.

Associated Press Writer HOUSTON (AP) — The state district judge who presided over the 13-week Cullen Davis murder-conspiracy trial believes the jury was "completely misinformed on at least one point that was vital to the

Wallace "Pete" Moore, in an interview Wednesday, said the jury also may have been led astray on another point. He refused to elaborate but said. "If you give wrong information. then, just like a computer, you'll get out wrong information in the future."

Moore said the trial was "the biggest strain on me since I've been a judge. It was the worst experience I have ever had.' Asked if he was sensitive to

comments from the public as to his handling of the case. Moore said. "Yes. I live in a glass house and I don't throw rocks. Moore, tired and still some-

what angry, said he wanted to get away from it all now. "It was an abuse of the system and I am not over it yet. I don't think the attorneys are over it and I am sure the ju-

rors aren't over it. You just can't throw a switch and say it is off," he said. Moore, 55, had sat on the bench for 13 weeks of one of the most expensive and sensa-

tional trials in Texas history. It ended in a hung jury -

Airport Sunday night Three men were questioned and released in connection with the case, and the marijuana and plane were confiscated by U.S. customs agents. The pilot remains at large.

Congress sows seeds of agency growth

The lead paragraph in a story out of Washington read, "In a move to save taxpayers \$3 billion a year, President Carter announced a plan to simplify eligibility requirements for welfare recipients."

Nothing in the story revealed that any programs were to be cut, but the indication was that three billion dollars could be saved through cutting red tape, reducing inefficiencies and obvious fraud.

If there is that much waste and fraud in the single area of welfare, just what might be found in the entire bureaucracy? Granted, the welfare agencies account for a lion's share of funds dispensed by the federal government; but \$3 billion going down the drain for no purpose boggles

We doubt that fraud is the major source of the loss. We would guess that waste and the attempts to prevent fraud take up most of the loss to

Carter told a Health, Education and Welfare conference on fraud, abuse and error in federal programs that cutting red tape will make it easier for needy Americans to receive welfare and easier for government watchdogs to control waste. He ordered those concerned to "head a major effort to streamline the hundreds of complex eligibility requirements.'

We will move to simplify these procedures where it really counts; at the state and local level," Carter said. "Today, the welfare system of one state eats up three billion pieces of paper each year and a thousand different forms. A woman seeking aid in another state had to spend 300 hours in one year filling out paperwork documenting her need."

Georgia Gov. George Busbee said that the basic problem in government aid is not so much thievery by poor benefactors and white collar administrators of federal programs. "The great problem lies in layer upon layer of bureaucracy," he said.

The governor termed the federally supported student loan program as the worst of all complexities, saying, "The federal government now provides some form of financial support to seven different loan programs." He asked for more leeway for states in administering such

Busbee's stand is well taken but it is not in the best interest of careerists in federal agencies. They thrive on duplication between agencies and ovelapping activities within an agency. This is where the potential for growth in bureaucracy resides. The Congress sows the seeds for much of this overlapping by tacking amendments on bills for more functions. These amendments become law with little or no real support from the members of Congress.

In fact, most of these "minor" amendments go through without debate and little or no notice. But here is the seedbed for future growth and expansion of federal agencies. Many of the most costly and useless measures today were planted years ago in these "minor" amendments which went through Congress without notice.

We cannot put all the blame for a bumper crop on the harvesters, if the seeds of unneeded legislation have been planted by our so - called rep-

Given the seed and the climate to nurture agency growth, the resultant proliferation can only be expected.

Even as we write of this, we can be assured that the every - ready pressure groups are grinding out much more of the same sort of seed for future bureaucratic expansion.

WASHINGTON (NEA) - President Carter is moving into the final two years of his term determined to avoid the procedural and political bungles that dogged his dealings with Congress throughout most of 1977-78.

Carter has learned, the hard way, that he cannot expect to reap political credit for good ideas alone, no matter how carefully prepared or cogently argued. What counts is his won - lost record on Capitol Hill.

Other presidents - John F. Kennedy comes to mind - have occasionally been able to sustain their own popularity despite setbacks on Capitol Hill through personal charisma and inspirational leadership.

But Carter has all the charisma of a corner lamppost. He couldn't inspire a drowning man to grab a life preserver: more likely the poor fellow would simply sink from the sedative effects of a Carter

Therefore, the president must produce results - or the appearance of same, at any rate - if he wants to persuade the electorate to grant him a second term in

Administration sources readily concede that Carter and his green White House staff overloaded the 95th Congress with program initiatives, many of which had not even been completely thought out before going to Capitol Hill

"We'll have a much more modest package this time, and we're trying to pace things better," one key White House adviser said. "Most of what we send up will have a realistic chance of being passed in

Numbers one and two, obviously, are the Carter anti - inflation package and a new Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty (SALT II). Everything else gets second billing behind these objectives.

Almost as important will be legislation to implement the multi - national trade agreements now being wrapped up in Geneva after five years of hard bargaining: a renewed drive for hospital cost containment; and - perhaps surprisingly - some form of national health insurance, assuming internal administration fights about its shape and scope can be resolved.

There are about a dozen other proposals in the mill, many of them left over from the last Congress - such as Alaska lands legislation, creation of a Department of Education, establishment of a National Urban Development Bank and a scaled down welfare reform plan.

The first big trouble looms with Carter's real wage insurance proposal, the heart of his anti - inflation package, which has received a decidedly cool welcome in the House Ways and Means Committee, which must approve it. Treasury Department lobbyists are already quietly trying to sell the plan to key committee members, but are making little headway

Carter may do better pressing his proposed budget cuts, even though they are politically painful. White House lobbyists plan to ride herd on appropriations decisions at every stage of the legislative process instead of waiting, as they did previously, until bills hit the House and Senate floors.

A SULT II treaty faces rough going in the Senate, bu the White House is applyinv the same full - court press it used for the Panama Canal pacts - and it is starting

White House lobbyists and those for the Cabinet departments have learned a good deal over the last two years about the care and feeding of congressional egos. They still make mistakes on occasion, but nothing like as often as they used to.

Carter will never be a Lyndon Johnson. anymore than he is another JFK. But if he and his team can get results from Congress in their own rather methodical fashion, no one will carp about the style. For this president, it's the bottom line that counts.

The bid by President Carter to repeal or curb the Bacon - Davis Act will need all the clout of his office as well as the urgency of the anti-inflation fight to be successful.

The 1931 legislation, requiring contractors on federal construction jobs to pay their employees wages prevailing in the area where the work was performed, has been the center of controversy ever

since it was signed by President Hoover. Critics questioned the authority and the capability of the secretary of labor to make the determination of the prevailing wage which has in practice over the years been accepted as the highest union scale.

And Congress periodically has expanded the law to apply to all projects in which the federal government is even remotely involved through funding insurance or other aid programs. In 1964, the act was amended to include fringe benefits in the prevailing wage determinations

The effect has been virtually to eliminate real cost competition in construction contracts, leading to a steady spiral in construction costs.

The General Accounting Office, in a report to the White House, has called the Davis - Bacon Act outdated, unnecessary and inflationary.

We don't know what the president will propose. But the Carter effort probably will have reform rather than repeal as its goal. That is too bad. This ill - conceived law is a bread - and - butter issue that takes money from every American consumer.

EMTs try to save lives

Technicians (EMTs) have completed a comprehensive study on how to handle many emergency situations:

Local training will continue when Dr. Adolf Orina addresses the Top O' Texas branch of the Emergency Medical Technicians Association at the next meeting on Feb. 2 at 7:30 p.m.

Dr. Orina, an area physician, will discuss emergency medicine and information that a doctor needs to know about patients who arrive at hospitals.

EMTs are trained to analyze and treat emergency patients while en route to hospitals. They take 90 hours of class training and 40 hours of hospital instruction with two practice

emergency runs An EMT is state certified after completing 130 hours of training, taking a 100 page written test and showing practical knowledge in the five specifically taught areas

cardiopulmonary resuscitation, vital signs. bandaging and splinting. traction splinting and mechanical aids to breathing.

The association's local charter began in August 1978, according to its president. Tom Leggins. He is now giving the EMT course at Clarendon College Pampa Center

people," said Leggins.

EMT has set up emergency stations at carnivals and rodeos held in Pampa, said Leggins, and will continue to do so.

The local chapter, under the direction of Stephen Dewey, is combining with Civil Defense, headed by Charles Buzzard, to adopt some procedures for disaster situations.

Leggins said that he was pleased with the results of a simulated disaster, which checked the speed of area EMTs. He said that about 11 technicians arrived in 15 minutes.





Texas forecasts By The Associated Press

Texas weather was windy, warmer and wet today The wind was not expected to approach the velocity recorded earlier in the week when a cold front roared through the state. 

The second major snowstorm in less than two weeks left 7 inches of new snow Wednesday on Chicago, still trying to recover from the 20 inches that fell there, 12 days ago.

"It's bad news." moaned John Burke, a spokesman for the Illinois Department of Transportation, who called travel in the northern half of the state impossible The storm closed many roads, schools and factories

in Illinois and Wisconsin. Chicago public school officials said today's closings would permit inspection of snow-laden roofs on school buildings



WEATHER FORECAST by the National Weather Service calls for snow flurries and snow for the Great Lakes and Northeast. Pope goes to Mexico

Associated Press Writer VATICAN CITY (AP) Pope John Paul II left today for the Dominican Republic and Mexico on a "pilgrimage of faith" to Latin America's 330 million Roman Catholics and

their bishops. Making his first trip outside Haly since his election Oct. 16. the first non-Italian pope in 455 years told a crowd that cheered him at Rome's Leonardo da Vinci Airport that he was a

'messenger of the Gospels.' The pope was seen off by Italian Premier Giulio Andreotti. Latin America's ambassadors to the Vatican and a crowd of several hundred in the airport terminal.

John Paul traveled aboard a crucifix-emblazoned Alitalia jumbo jet on the 5,064-mile nonstop flight to Santo Domingo. the Dominican capital. He will be the first pope to set foot on the Caribbean island where the first Mass in the New World was celebrated by Christopher Columbus in 1493.

The pontiff will celebrate Mass in the oldest Catholic cathedral in the hemisphere. tour the capital and spend the night, then fly Friday to Mexico City

The pope will attempt to balance differing viewpoints that emerged from the 1968 gathering. It produced a document criticizing "institutionalized violence" and "present structures that violate human rights.

DEAR DR. LAMB - Recently my doctor gave me Lanoxin to take daily and Nitrostat to carry when my chest aches. I had a heart tracing before he prescribed these drugs. I was having an ache in my chest and it was very hard to breathe after slight exertion. I still have this problem when I overdo. I also take Enduron for high blood pressure which is un-

der control My question is, how serious is my condition? My doctor didn't tell me much and didn't restrict my activities so I feel that I am not as ill as my family keeps telling me. I am a 54-year-old woman. I am 5 feet 2 and weigh

125 pounds.
DEAR READER — Any time a person has sufficient heart trouble to require medicine, he has an important medical problem. I would not like to say exactly how severe your case is since I don't know all the

You are taking Lanoxin because your doctor thinks you had heart failure. The difficulty you have in breathing is undoubtedly associated with the accumulation of fluid in your lungs secondary to failure of the left side of the heart. That is what breathlessness often is in a patient who has heart

The left side of your heart has probably been overworked from high blood pressure. Some of the other medicines you are taking control your pressure level. The chest pain that you develop when you overdo is related to insufficient blood flow to your left heart mus-

In all it sounds like your doctor is taking a vigorous and interested approach to your problem for which you should be thankful.

Your doctor probably in't think you would be doing a lot of physical activity in view of the difficulties you have experienced. Under the present circumstances, it would probably be unwise to overdo physical activity.

If you read my column often, you know I'm an advocate of good, sensible exercise. I like to put the emphasis on sensible. When individuals have heart disease severe enough to have pain with exertion or shortness of breath that limits his ability, that's not the time to be pushing physical activity.

You would be wise to limit the salt in your diet, if you are not already doing so. You might want to know more about salt and your body so I am sending you The Health Letter number 10-12, Salt: Your Vital Sodium and Potassium Balance. Others who want this issue can send 50 cents with a long, stamped, self-addressed envelope for it.

I notice that you weigh 125 pounds and for your height that suggests to me that you might benefit from losing some weight. This would help your heart problem in two ways.

First, it's important to lose all the excess body fat that you might have because it will help to decrease your high blood pressure. That, in turn, will decrease the work the heart has to do.

Second, if you weigh less, your physical activity such as ordinary walking will be easier for you to do. To put it plainly, there would be fewer pounds to move around. That also will ease the workload on your heart. In addition, I suspect there are changes that occur in the circulation and possibly some improvement in opening of the arteries that can be achieved in people who really make a total effort to eliminate excess body fat. Token efforts don't do so

much. Meanwhile, I would recommend that you follow your doctor's advice very carefully because you have a serious medical problem that demands careful atten-

Women urged to take time just for themselves

By CAROL DEEGAN NEW YORK (AP) - Shirley Conran says too many women today are trying to live up to 'idiotically unrealistic' standards set by television commercials, magazines, mothersin-law and "lying friends."

Every woman should set her own standards, Mrs. Conran says, because no woman can be perfect and do everything just right and, therefore, she shouldn't even try.

"Interwoman competition can be as cruel, as grueling, and as unnecessary as any of the competition in the traditional male rat race," she said

Mrs. Conran also believes that women should devote more time to themselves.

"It took me years to acquire the discipline, control and iron will that was necessary in order to stop doing things for other people and start doing things for myself. At first I told myself that I didn't have the time. But then I figured even if you work a regulation 40-hour week and sleep eight hours a day, you still have 72 hours a week left over in which to do something stimulating and rewarding, or at least just something," she said.

Mrs. Conran was 23 years old when she married Terence Conran, the British designer. When her marriage collapsed eight years later, she was left with two young children and a parttime job with a newspaper in London, England.

Since her divorce, Mrs. Conran has held various journalistic positions with several London publications. Her book, 'Superwoman," a how-to and how-not-to book on housework, was on the London best seller list for 44 weeks, and has recently been published in this country.

Mrs. Conran says the title of her book is ironic because no one woman can accomplish all the work that a traditional housewife is supposed to do.

"A Superwoman isn't a woman who can do anything, but a woman who avoids doing too much," she said. "She knows her limitations and sticks happily with them. She realizes that life is untidy and so are the children in it.

Mrs. Conran's motto is: "Life is too short to stuff a mushroom." She also believes that a home is one never-ending cleaning job that nobody no-tices unless you don't do it.

After harvest losses major problem

WASHINGTON (AP) - Huge losses of grain and other commodities after they are harvested is a major reason for hunger in much of the world, says a Cornell University expert.

Malcolm C. Bourne, professor of food science and technology at the Geneva. N.Y., university, told a presidential panel Tuesday that the losses are most acute in the poor, developing countries where the lack of food is most acute.

Citing National Academy of Sciences figures, Bourne said overall losses in world cereal grain production are estimated in the range of 10 percent to 20 percent annually, for example.

The losses stem primarily from molds. insects and rodents that destroy or contaminate the grain.

Bourne said a projection of the present trends points to further increases in postharvest losses unless the system is greatly strengthened.

"The increased production of food that most developing countries are trying to obtain will be fed into a weak and inadequate post-harvest system, causing greater losses than occur at present," he

Bourne's remarks were made at a meeting of a subcommittee of the Presidential Commission on World Hunger. The commission was established by President Carter last year and told to have a report on the situation by this June 30.

The United Nations General Assembly in September 1975 called for a 50 percent reduction in post-harvest food losses by 1985. Bourne said he believed this to be "a reasonable and achievable objective."

This would have a number of benefits, he said.

"On an individual basis, there will be a saving in nutrients for people who are malnourished, an economic benefit to people who are poor, and an incentive for farmers to increase production when they know that the increased production can be marketed instead of rotting away," Bourne said.

Nationally, a country will benefit from reduced food waste by having a"healthier, more energetic population, a decrease in the quantity of imported food - with a favorable effect on overseas currency reserves - less strain on the environment and less need for expensive agricultural inputs such as fertilizer and pesticides," he said.

However. Bourne said that more money will have to be spent if the goal of cutting food waste in half by 1985 is to be

WASHINGTON (AP) - Outbreaks of cattle scabies, a skin disease caused by tiny mites, have increased with the advent of winter but so far are running below year-ago levels, says the Agriculture Department.

Officials said Tuesday that 42 outbreaks were reported in 12 states in December, raising the total since Oct. 1 to 67. A year earlier, 83 outbreaks of scabies had been reported.

The December outbreaks occurred in California, Colorado, Idaho, Illinois,

Oklahoma, Oregon, South Dakota and Texas, the department's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service said.

Infestations of the mites that cause the disease can be eliminated by dipping cattle in solutions of pesticide approved for the purpose.

WASHINGTON (AP) - Farm commodity shipments to eligible foreign countries under Food for Peace assistance are expected to remain about the same next fiscal year, according to Agriculture Department budget experts.

Total spending is expected to be down about \$61.7 million in the fiscal year that will begin Oct. 1, but that reflects net cash outlays for the program, not the amount of grain and other commodities planned for shipment.

ROXBORO, N.C. (AP) - Enos "Country" Slaughter, still leather-tough and active at age 62, hauls himsef in from a hard day's work on his 200-acre tobacco farm, settles in a soft chair and thumbs through the baseball record book.

Then he'll turn to his wife or another member of his family and read off some

'Look." he'll say. "My record is better than any of these. What have they got against me? I wish I knew.

The Slaughter's modest household was funereal when word came out of New York Tuesday that Willie Mays alone had been elected to baseball's Hall of Fame and the name of Enos Slaughter - as had been the case year after year in recent balloting had again fallen short of election.

Now the rugged, strong-hitting oufielder of the St. Louis Cardinals in the period before and after World War II, has passed the milepost of eligibility by the baseball writers and he must wait five years for special consideration by the Veterans

Committee Slaughter feels he has been done an injustice - and he has. He deserved a better fate

"I think I may still get in someday, but it's not the same," he said bitterly. "It takes the cream off the coffee now to be picked by the writers. Now maybe I will be dead when I am picked. That's not much consolation for my family In a vote of 432 members of the Baseball

Writers Association of America. Slaughter failed to gain the 75 percent required for election, missing by only 27 votes. Last year, he missed by 24. "I gave my lifeblood for baseball - 19

years of it. My record is better than a lot of the guys who got in. Nobody played the game harder than I did. Few had a better all-around record. The hurt is deep. Slaughter said he believed the Hall of

Fame is dominated by writers in the East, who put more emphasis on home runs and glamor than on ability

hitting home runs." he said. "Ask anybody who remembers. I could run and throw. hit 148 triples, 413 doubles, 169 home runs. I batted 300 and knocked in 1.304 runs. I picked them up when they counted

"I think my record is better than that of Ralph Kiner, Roy Campanella, Eddie Mathews and some of the others. Take Kiner. He played only 10 years. He had just 39 triples and 216 doubles. He hit 369 homers, but batted only .279. The woods are full of people like him.

"I think one reason I didn't make it is that I never played on the West Coast. The writers out there don't know me. I played before expansion.

Slaughter, who joined the Cardinals in 1938, and finished with the Milwaukee Braves in 1959 with three years in military service, said he considered the 1942. Cardinals the greatest team he ever saw. even superior to the Yankees of that period. He said he doesn't regret having played before the current era of million dollar



New tax forms must be filed

Beginning with the tax year 1978, employers are to file W-2 forms with the Social Security Administration. These, 1978 reports are due by the last day of February.

Annual reporting will eliminate the need for filing of quarterly detailed reports with the Internal Revenue Service by employers. However, employers will still have to file quarterly summary reports with the IRS. People who employ domestic workers will still have to file Form 942 on a quarterly basis.

The requirements for these people have not changed.

Most employers will have to send their Forms W-2 to the Social Security Administration on paper forms. The form that will be used, will be the revised Form W-2 or W-2P Copy A. This copy of the Form W-2 will be

sent to the Federal Government for screening and scanning operations prior to each individual's work record being credited with the reported amount of wages. AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Linda Lowenthal had a direct hand in the licensing of more than 4,000 lawyers, dentists, dental hygienists and psychologists last year.

"The only art course I've ever had was in the ninth grade, mixed media," Mrs. Lowenthal ssaid. "After it, I still couldn't draw or paint, but I could letter."

After obtaining a bachelor's degree in English from
Pomona College, she spent a summer on a Colorado
ranch.

"Then I read an article in Time magazine that said Austin had the lowest cost-of-living and the university had a graduate school," she said.

Moving to Austin proved a good decision, she said, but graduate school was terrible

She quit the University of Texas and started working at a downtown art supply store. When business was slow, she doodled stylized lettering on a note pad. Customers soon noticed.

"I made up a portfolio and went to state offices, advertising agencies, department stores, university offices," the artist said "and then just waited for businesss."

A friend told her the Texas Supreme Court was

sensitivity reaction that can irritate already tender tissue. There is no medication available that can truly cure hemorrhodis and some brands may cause more harm than good.

So what should the sufferer do? Perhaps the single most important consideration should be directed toward proper bathroom habits. Using the john as a library a la Archie Bunker can do nothing but aggravate the condition. Huffers and pushers get themselves into trouble because straining to defecate increases pressure within blood vessels and causes congestion.

Hard stools may also be a major, contributor to the problem. Our highly processed low - fiber food may lead to constipation and hard bowel movements. A diet that is high in roughage and bran will go a long way toward preventing hemorrhoids in the first place. New steel shot zones proposed for shotguns

The Interior Department's U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service proposed zones where waterfowl hunters would be required to use nontoxic steel shot during the 1979 fall hunting season and invited the public to comment on the proposals.

At the same time, the Service also published a final regulation which requires that steel shot be used in all gauges of guns in steel shot zones beginning in the fall of 1980. Waterfowl hunters will be required to use steel shot only in 12 - gauge guns when hunting in the zones during the 1979 fall hunting season.

The purpose of requiring waterfowl hunters to use steel shot is to reduce the incidence of lead poisoning in water fowl. About 2 million waterfowl die of lead poisoning in the United States annually after eating spent lead shot, which the birds mistake for seeds or grit. Steel shot is not toxic to waterfowl.

In Texas, the proposed steel shot zone is the J.D. Murphree Management Area and the Sea Rim State Park in Jefferson
