"The Death of An Old Friend—Common Sense"

Today we mourn the passing of an old friend —Common Sense.

Common Sense lived a long life but died in the United States from heart failure on the brink of the new millennium. No one really knows how old he was, since his birth records long ago were lost in bureaucratic red tape.

He selflessly devoted his life to service in schools, hospitals, homes and factories, helping folks get jobs done without fanfare and foolishness.

For decades, petty rules, silly laws and frivolous lawsuits held no power over Common Sense. He was credited with cultivating such valued lessons as knowing when to come out of the rain, why the early bird gets the worm and that life isn't always fair.

Common Sense lived by simple, sound financial policies (don't spend more than you earn), reliable parenting strategies (the adults are in charge, not the kids)

and it's OK to come in second. A veteran of the Industrial Revolution, the Great Depression and the Technological Revolution, Common Sense survived trends including body piercing, whole language and "new math". But his health declined when he became infected with the "If-itonly-helps-one-person-it's-

worth-it" virus. strength proved no match for the ravages of well-intentioned but overbearing regulations. He watched in pain as good people became ruled by self-seeking lawyers. His health rapidly deteriorated when school endlessly Coleman. implemented zero-tolerance

His health declined even further when schools had to get parental consent to administer Aspirin to a student but could not inform the parent when a female student was pregnant or wanted an abortion.

Finally, Common Sense lost his will to live as the Ten Commandments became contraband, churches became businesses, criminals received better treatment than victims and federal judges stuck their noses in everything from the Boy Scouts to professional sports.

Finally, when a woman, too stupid to realize that a steaming cup of coffee purchased at a restaurant was hot, was awarded a huge settlement, Common Sense threw in the towel.

As the end neared, Common Sense drifted in and out of logic but was kept informed of developments regarding questionable regulations such as those for lowflow toilets, rocking chairs and stepladders.



2 cats turn up negative for rabies in County

Two cats were diagnosed negative for rabies in Callahan County during the month of October 2002 according to the Texas Department of Health.

The TDH Zoonosis Control Division tests two cats in the county during the month of October and both came up negative for

A total of 81 positive cases for rabies was reported during October in Texas. The majority of cases of rabies involved skunks with 45 positive results. There were 28 bats positive for rabies, three dogs, one cat, one equine and three fox positive for the disease in October.

So far in 2002, 916 (9%) positive cases of rabies has been reported and 9,257 (89%) animals tested negative for rabies throughout the state.



SBA Economic Injury Disaster Loan Deadline Approaching

nesses in some Texas counties have until January 2, 2003 to file applications for low-interest disaster loans from the U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA). The SBA's Economic Injury Disaster Loans are available for businesses dependent Rangers and pursue a family who on farmers and ranchers sustaining crop losses due to drought, high winds, and high temperatures (excessive heat) that occurred from January 1, 2001, and continuing. Farmers and ranchers are not eligible for these SBA loans. However, nurseries that are victims of drought disasters can apply. Businesses gible to apply:

holiday season than any other period. Careless packaging can cause some to arrive in poor condition. The U.S. Postal Service offers the following packaging tips to help holiday parcels arrive on time and in one

Choose a container with care. Whether it's a box, tube or padded envelope, make sure the container is sturdy enough to handle its contents. If a container is reused, make sure it hasn't already made one too many trips to go the distance. If you don't have a container you can trust, check the local post office for packaging products designed for safe delivery.

Package parcels properly. Make sure to cushion the contents well. Using polystyrene "peanuts" or bubble wrap will prevent damage to the package's contents. Shredded or rolled newspaper or unbuttered popped corn also can be used as cushioning material. Once a parcel is packaged,

seal it tightly with reinforced tape. Masking and transparent tapes are not sturdy enough to do the job. Check your Post Office. office supply or discount department store for tape that will do the trick. Do not use twine or cord to seal your package, and don't wrap your packages in

Each year, more packages are brown paper. These items tend sent through the mail during the to catch and bind in mail processing equipment.

Pay attention to addressing. Write the complete address clearly on the outside of the package. What constitutes a complete address? The recipient's name, street address (including apartment number), city, state and correct ZIP Code are all needed to ensure a problem-free delivery. Carefully print the address, and don't use a pen with water-soluble ink, just in case the package runs into wet weather somewhere along the way. If the package is fragile, mark it so. Make sure to include a return address. And, just to be on the safe side, include a slip of paper on the inside of the parcel with the delivery and return ad-

dress as well. Mail the package on time. No matter how well it's wrapped, it's just not the same if a gift is late. Be sure to mail packages as early in the season as possible. When mailing, consider using Priority Mail, which provides 2-3 day service. And if time is really getting tight, consider using the Postal Service's fastest service. Express Mail offers next-day delivery by noon to many destinations, and is delivered 365 days a year with no extra charge for Saturday, Sunday or holiday delivery (in most areas).
