The Rochester Legion Musical will be Saturday, beginning at 6:30 p.m. at the American Legion post 584 in Rochester.

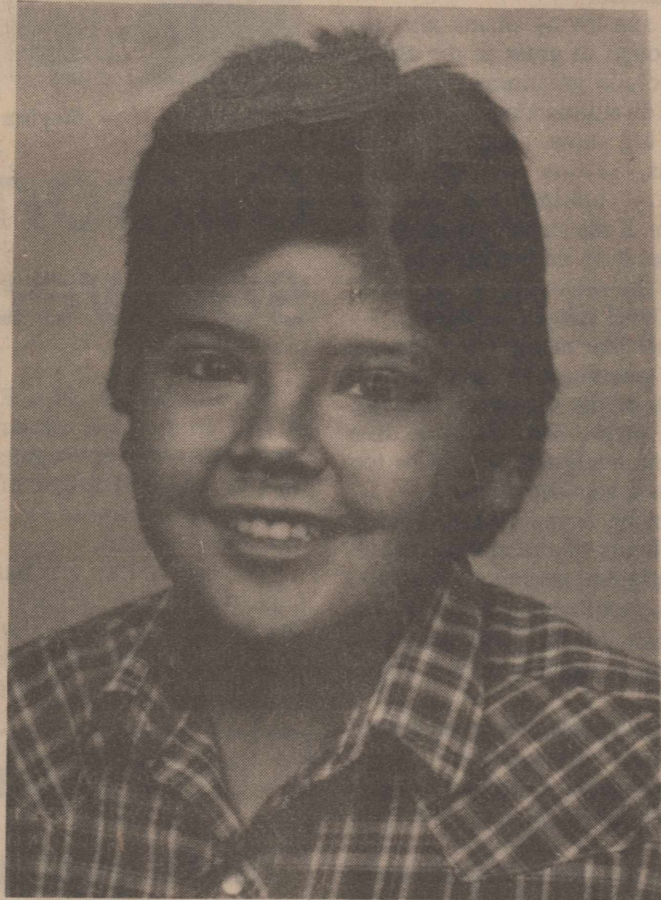

## Injuries prove fatal to 11-year-old boy

Injuries sustained in a bicycle-pickup collision March 10 took the life last Wednesday of an 11-year-old Haskell boy.

Chris Villareal died at 6:45 p.m. in Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene six days after he suffered severe head injuries in the accident.

His bicycle was struck near his home at Avenue I and North 2nd Street as he was returning from a store.

Chris, who had made his home here with his aunt and her husband, Frances and Roy Alvarez, since November 1985, was a fourth-grade student.

Funeral services were held Monday in Fort Worth at the Little Church on the Rock. Burial was in Mount Olive Cemetery in Fort Worth. Memorial services were to be held Wednesday evening in Haskell at the Calvary Baptist Church.

Christ was born in Fort Worth on Dec. 30, 1976. He is survived by a two-year-old brother, Matthew, who lives in Fort Worth, his parents and his grandfather.

The Alvarez family expressed their appreciation for the thoughtfulness of numerous individuals and organizations who assisted and comforted them during the tragedy. Special thanks went to Haskell Elementary School, to the hospital and to Robert Gonzales who made it possible for the family to go to Fort Worth.

## Blakley resigns as elementary school principal

### Jimmy Lisle named successor

Bill Blakley resigned last week as principal of Haskell Elementary School.

The School Board last Tuesday accepted with regret the resignation of the veteran Haskell educator.

He will become a high school math teacher on a part time basis.

The Board immediately named Jimmy Lisle as Blakley's successor as elementary principal. Lisle is a social studies teacher and coach in the high school, and this past year became a part time assistant principal.

Blakley has spent his entire 31-year school career in the Haskell system. He was a teacher and coach for 14 years and was high school principal 10 years before becoming elementary principal seven years ago.

A native of Fairfield, in East Texas, he recalls that he came to Haskell in 1957 with the intention of staying only one year.

Blakley also serves as director of the Western Texas College extension campus in Haskell, a position he has held for the past 15 years. He said this week that he hopes to continue in that capacity.

Lisle is a 10-year veteran of the Haskell school system. A native of Rule, he earned his bachelor's degree from West Texas State University and his master's from Abilene Christian University. He taught at Hamlin two years before coming to Haskell.

Greg Melton, who has shared

assistant principal duties with Lisle during the past year, will assume the role of assistant principal, but will continue as a history teacher.

Blakley's resignation is effective June 30. Lisle will move to his new position June 1 and work with his predecessor in making the transition.

## -Green Thumb-

Some of you may be getting ready to plant in window boxes, baskets and pots. You will want pretty colors that will be in harmony with your house and yard. If your house is white, you're in luck, any color will be pretty, but if you have a brick or colored stucco, try to select colors that will be "showy" for you.

Be creative. Plant pots and planters with a crazy-quilt mixture of annual flowers and use them to brighten dull, hard-to-plant areas of your landscape.

There is a large and colorful assortment of flowers that grow in the shade. These are annual bedding plants you might want: tuberous begonia, impatiens, caladiums, coleus, pansies.

Some sun-loving plants also are hardy enough to grow in the shade. These include geraniums, alyssum, pinks and dwarf snapdragons.

For a big show, cluster different size pots, setting tall pots like strawberry behind the smaller containers. If the strawberry jar looks hidden, set it up on bricks or stones. To break the monotony at eye level, use multilevel hanging baskets.

Annuals like marigolds, petunias, alyssum, geraniums and dianthus are just a few of the sun-loving annuals you can grow. Tall flowers, like zinnias and marigolds, will grow too tall for most pots and planters.

Sun-loving annuals which need at least six hours of sunlight a day are: dwarf marigolds, geraniums, alyssum, ageratum, dwarf zinnia, celosia, dwarf dahlia, pinks, lobelia, petunia, annual phlox, dwarf snapdragon and dwarf salvia.

For you who have used containers outside, I have four care tips:

1. Water your containers every day, especially during hot dry weather.
2. Feed the plants twice a month with a diluted solution of fish emulsion, or liquid houseplant fertilizer. Or use a granular time-release fertilizer. Schultz and Fertiloam fertilizer may be bought in Haskell.
3. Remove faded blooms as they appear, to encourage the development of new buds.
4. Plants like petunias and impatiens have a tendency to get "leggy." Pinch them back to encourage bushiness.

Let's plant to beautify Haskell!

## Economy better, but all is not rosy

AUSTIN—Good news for Texas came last week when Comptroller Bob Bullock said the Texas economy has bottomed out and will rise steadily, barring a national recession. But all is not rosy yet. On the down side, state government faces a \$1 billion shortfall

\$120 million in royalties he says are owed the state since 1934 on the Yates oil field in West Texas.

Under Texas law, state oil and gas rights are leased by the owner of the surface land, and the surface owner splits royalties with the state.

A lawsuit filed last week by the Texas attorney general names 27 defendants—including heirs, corporations and executors of estates—who have interests in the almost four acres of Pecos County land.

The lawsuit contends the original surface owner, Fred Turner, leased the land for drilling to a friend, who in turn assigned it to a corporation in which Turner was a major stockholder.

In that way, Turner and the other defendants escaped paying the state its share for 54 years, the suit alleges.

### Idiot on Ballot

Texas Democratic Party chairman Bob Slagle and his state executive committee backed Harris County Democrats trying to politically annihilate their newly-elected chair, a disciple of right-winger Lyndon LaRouche, who peddles pamphlets at Houston airports.

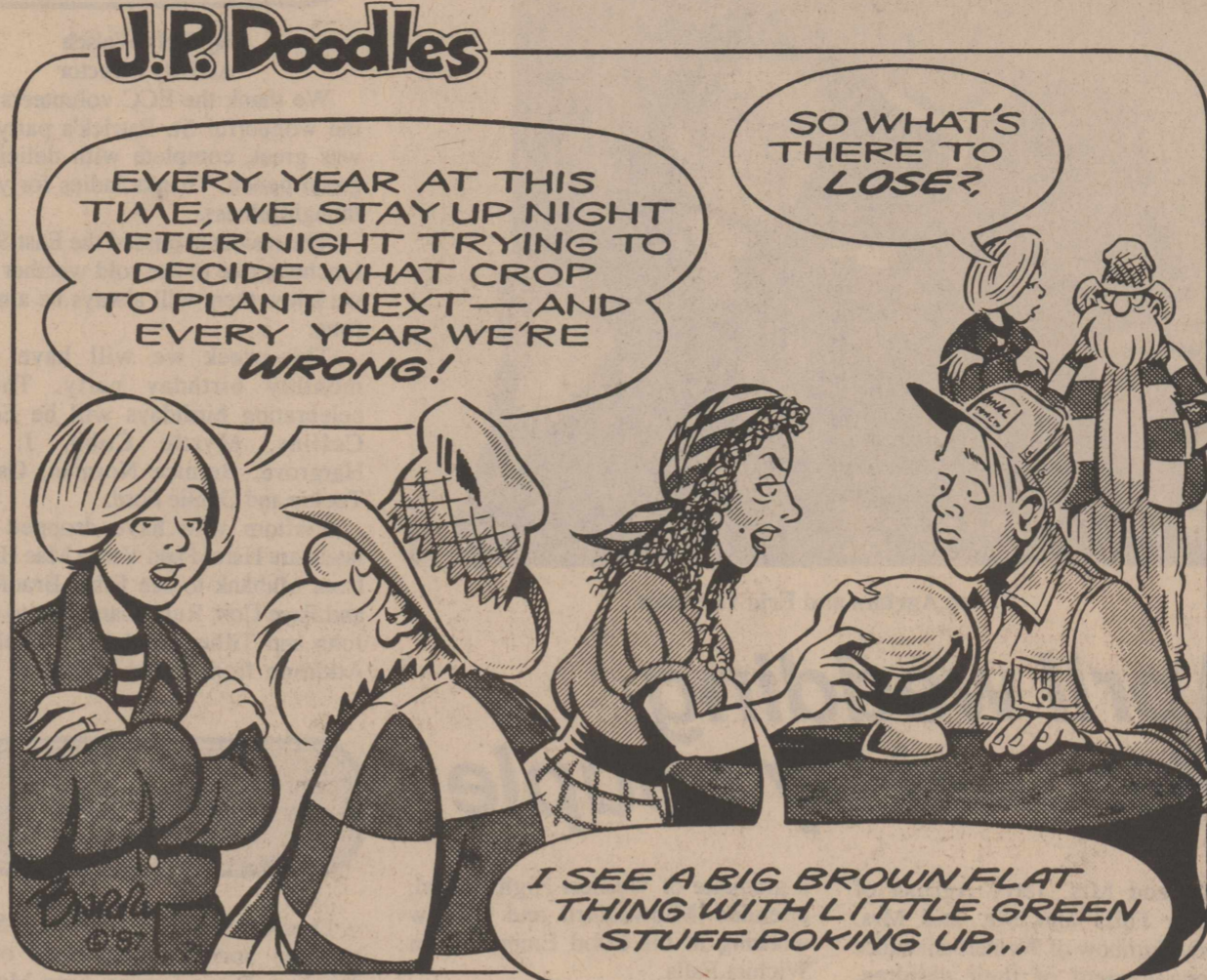

And with federal aid still poised to rescue Texas banking, the economy will probably look gloomier even as it begins to improve.

Experienced observers predict economic forces will drive up the price of oil which, coupled with business diversification efforts here, could produce a good recovery.

Bullock said retail sales in Texas are at an all-time high of \$9 billion per month, but the finance, real estate and insurance industries are still suffering.

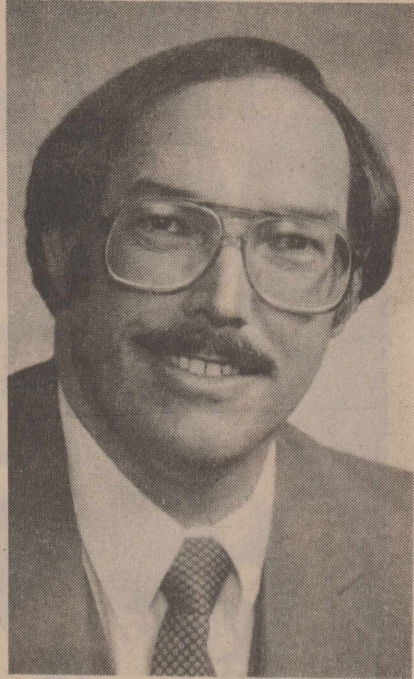

## Crisis hotline established

The beginning of a 24-hour mental health crisis hotline service linking area residents to mental health professionals has been announced by the Headstream Memorial Outreach Center in Haskell.

Sarah Meinzer, director of the center, said the service is designed to provide emergency mental health services 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Persons in need may access the service by calling 1-800-621-8504 toll free. If the call is during normal working hours, the caller will be referred to the local outreach center. After hours, callers will be connected through Wichita Falls State Hospital with mental health professionals in Wichita Falls who will provide telephone crisis counseling and referral services, if necessary.

Back-up mental health face-to-face services are available for emergencies deemed potentially life threatening by the phone professional. These services are available only at Wichita Falls State Hospital and involve a crisis intervention team. Psychiatric consultation services serve as back-up throughout the process.

Mrs. Meinzer explained that crisis hotline services have been in existence for a number of years, but have typically been available only in metropolitan areas of the state. She believes the development of the hotline service is an important step in the development of a comprehensive rural mental health care system. The new service will benefit existing outreach clients as well as persons who experience crises that are a part of everyday life, she said.

In the event of a serious emotional crisis, local citizens should contact the outreach center in Haskell (864-3472) during the day, or contact the crisis hotline after hours or any time the outreach center cannot be reached.

## Plano, Austin lead state population growth

Several areas of the state gained population while a few cities and counties experienced decreases during the period 1980-86, according to estimates released by the Texas Department of Commerce's State Data Center.

The estimates are based on growth percentages and represent population totals for the state and its counties and municipalities as of July 1, 1986.

Plano and Austin led in population growth among Texas cities having populations greater than 100,000. Plano's gain of 34,997 people translated into a growth rate of 48.4 percent. Austin was second with a growth of 45.9 percent from its 1980 population of 345,493 to 504,202. Arlington picked up 62,854 new residents during that period for a 39.3 percent increase.

Other cities having more than 100,000 population which enjoyed the most growth were Laredo (29.6 percent), Garland (25.5 percent), San Antonio (23.4 percent), Fort Worth (22.1 percent), Houston (18.7 percent), El Paso (17.1 percent) and Dallas (17 percent).

The state's smaller cities and towns which posted the highest growth rates were Corinth (138.2 percent), Heath (123.9 percent), Sugar Land (120.2 percent), Kyle (109.5 percent), Sachse (105.2), Sanger (95.4 percent), Flower Mound (91.5 percent) and Hays (90.2 percent).

Six of these 10 cities are located in the Dallas-Fort Worth area, helping that area to surpass Houston as the nation's eighth largest metro area. Of the remaining cities in this group, three are in the Austin metro area and one is in the Houston area.

Denton also topped all counties in numerical growth, adding 83,844 residents. Collin County was next with in terms of numerical growth, gaining 63,388 people (43.8 percent), while Hood, Williamson and Bastrop counties grew by larger overall percentages (52, 50.3 and 47.1 percent respectively).

Rounding out the 10 fastest-growing counties were Brazos (40.2 percent), Irion (39.1 percent) and Fort Bend (37.4 percent).

Not all Texas cities and counties increased population during the

period. The Panhandle and Southeast Texas experienced the greatest cumulative population decreases. With the exception of Loving (West Texas), Glasscock (Permian Basin), and Jefferson (Southeast Texas) counties, most of the counties posting the 10 largest decreases are in the Panhandle or South Plains regions. Most of the 10 small cities and towns showing the largest population decreases also are in these two regions.

In the Southeast, Beaumont, Port Arthur and Orange are included among cities with the largest decreases. While the estimates show Beaumont as having the greatest numerical loss (1,954), this represents only 1.7 percent of the city's population and Jefferson County remains on of the 10 most populous in the state.

The population estimates were developed by the staff at the Agriculture Experiment Station, Texas A&M University, under contract with the State Data Center and a consortium of state agencies. The report is expected to be the first in an annual series of estimates for Texas counties and municipalities.

Fewer persons died on Texas streets and highways during 1987 than in any year since 1976.

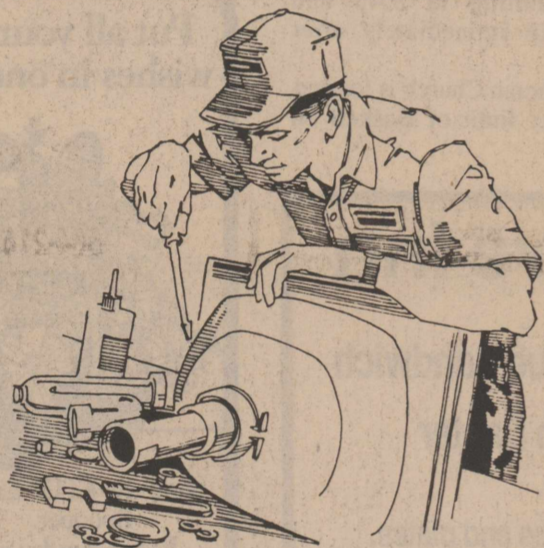
The Texas traffic death total for 1987 was 3,261, a decrease of 8.6 percent from the 3,568 deaths recorded in the state during 1986.

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## Students receive books

Students in the fourth grade at Haskell Elementary School have received the gift book entitled "Feeling Good About Me." It is a handsomely bound book of stories about learning traditional values and self-esteem.

"Feeling Good About Me" contains eight stories about realistic problems young people might encounter and how, using traditional values, they are resolved.

Each story has a full-color illustration and teaches such lessons as right and wrong, appreciation of family, what it means to be a good citizen, living up to one's full potential, and why (and how) to stay away from drugs.

In the first story, "A Day With Granddaddy," young Wendy is mad. The most popular girl in school has invited her to a slumber party but she has to go to her grandparents' house on the lake, a visit she usually enjoys.

During a conversation that takes place as Wendy fishes with Granddad, she learns the relative importance of the party and the visit (her values are put into perspective) and she feels good about herself and visiting her grandparents.

Other stories involve the meaning of friendship, family relationships, respect for others, loyalty and the importance of being your own unique self, lessons not always covered in school curriculums. They reflect positive influences that build a child's self-esteem.

Each story is accompanied by a teacher's guide, which covers lesson objectives, discussion starters and follow-up applications. The purpose of the lessons is to teach young people good values and encourage discussion of values between children, their parents and other family members in a home setting.

In "Real Heroes," a war game among a dozen boys and girls results in several broken windows at school. At the principal's office, the youngsters learn from an Army veteran that being an American hero isn't something that must happen on a battlefield, but also occurs by being a good citizen, doing whatever they can for their country.

In another story that takes place in a video arcade, Brian and Darrick must weigh the chance to get free games dishonestly against the effects of such action. With the help of a lesson learned from Darrick's dad, honesty wins out.

The Food Security Act of 1985 (farm bill) consists of provisions known as swampbuster, sodbuster and conservation compliance. Each of these provisions must be carried out to remain eligible for USDA farm programs such as:

Price and income supports, disaster payments, crop insurance, Farmers Home Administration loans, Commodity Credit Corporation storage payments, farm storage facility loans and other programs under which USDA makes commodity-related payments, and payments made under the Conservation Reserve program.

Under the swampbuster provision, crops must not be produced on

wetlands converted to cropland since Dec. 23, 1985.

Under the sodbuster provision, crops must not be planted on highly erodible fields that were not used for crops during 1981-85, unless an approved conservation plan is being carried out.

Under conservation compliance, all cropland fields with 33 percent or 50 acres of highly erodible soil must be actively applying a conservation plan by Jan. 1, 1990. The plan must be fully implemented by Jan. 1, 1995.

Treasurer Sue Miller reported that funds had been given for gasoline and meals for a child to be carried to a doctor in Dallas. Two members were reimbursed for money spent on the Christmas float and picture taking.

Mary Martin, secretary, represented the board at the Region 04 Child Welfare Advisory Council at the Abilene regional office Feb. 23. Ideas for child abuse prevention were presented.

A report on the Independent Living project, to which the Haskell board contributed, was given by Jeannette Davis. Sixteen young people are being helped. The help given to a child ends at age 18, but it has been found that it is necessary to extend help in selecting an apartment and a job which lead to independent living. The Taylor County board is matching the funds given by the other boards.

Steve Joyce of Wichita Falls presented Parents Anonymous, which was founded in 1970 by an abusive mother, Jolly K., and her therapist, Leonard Lieber. Three other abusive mothers joined to work on their common problem. Today there are over 1,500 chapters in the United States and four foreign countries.

The meeting closed with the election of officers to serve until March 1989. They will be: Brian Burgess, chairman; Merry Harvey, vice chairman; Mary Martin, secretary; and Sue Miller, treasurer.

**Area young people eligible for tour**

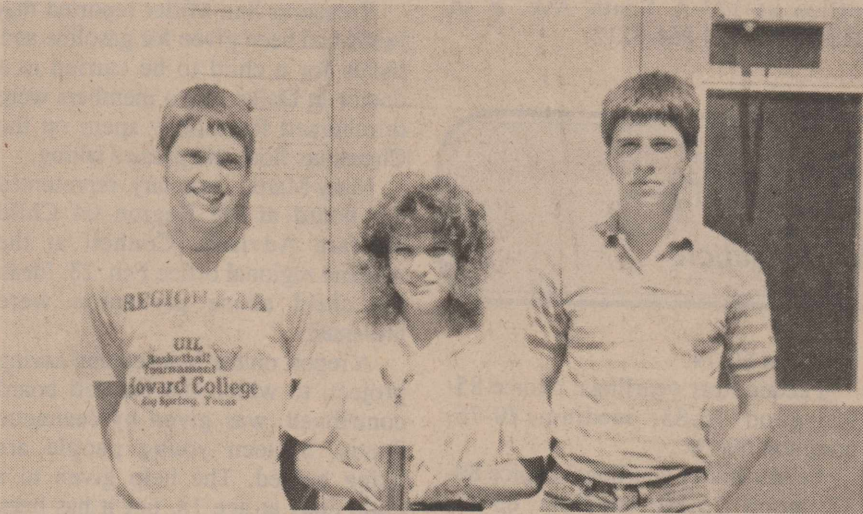

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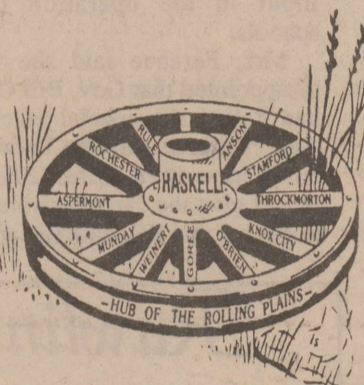

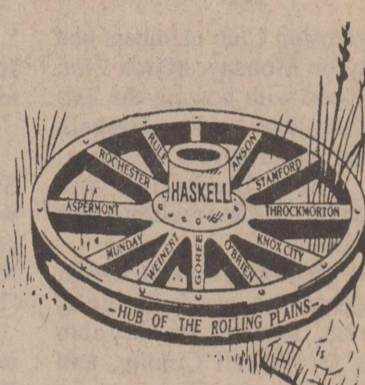

# Senate candidate focuses on economy

Helen Farabee of Wichita Falls, Democratic candidate for State Senate of the 30th district, campaigned in Haskell Friday, stressing that the economy and jobs are the main concerns of the small communities of the sprawling district.

Mrs. Farabee is one of three announced Democratic candidates in the upcoming special election to choose a successor to her husband, Ray Farabee, who resigned his Senate seat to become vice chancellor with the University of Texas in Austin.

"Many communities are losing jobs and small businesses are feeling a lot of pressure," said the candidate.

She said, if elected, she will spend full time on the job. "I will work with the people in the communities, which I think is just as important as working in the Legislature," Mrs. Farabee said. "I don't think we should have government doing anything for us that we can do ourselves. That's why I've spent most of my life as a volunteer."

The candidate also said she is deeply concerned with health care,

particularly rural health care. She has long been associated with a number of volunteer health organizations.

Still another concern she addressed while visiting in Haskell was education. She pointed out the need for local communities to have more input in the operation of their schools.

Mrs. Farabee said she was not disappointed that Gov. Bill Clements had called the special election for Aug. 9, three months later than it could have been called. She said it would give the candidates more time to get out and talk with the voters.

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
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# Cowboy player to address banquet

"He's a hustler, works hard and does everything you want him to do," said Cowboy Coach Tom Landry of Banks.

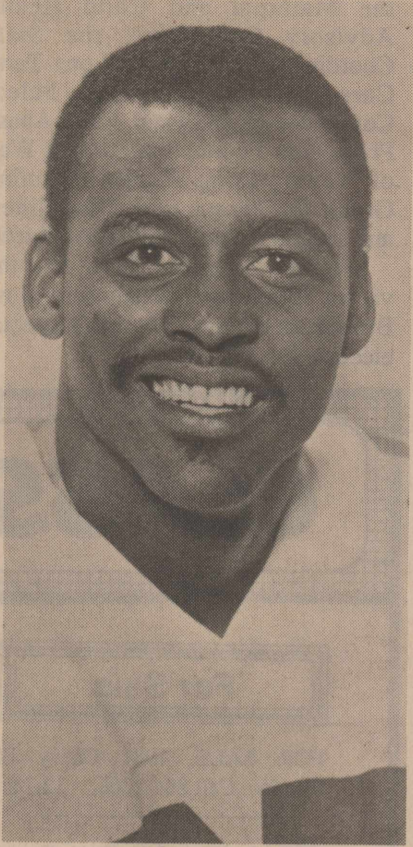
An eight-year pro, Banks spent his college years at Stanford where he lettered in both track and football. He graduated with a degree in political science, earning a 3.5 grade average.

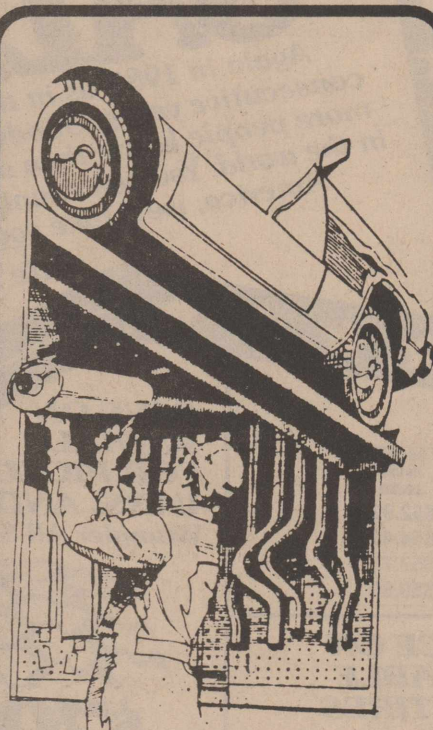

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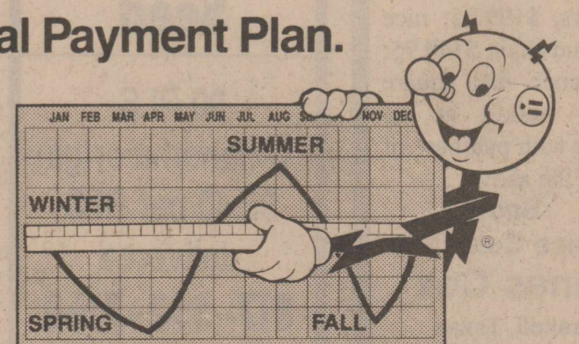


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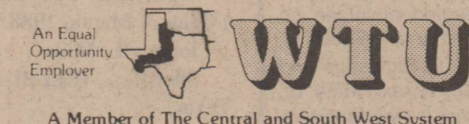
Electric bills peak in the Summer and Winter when demand is up and are lower in the Spring and Fall. With the **Equal Payment Plan**, you can level out your electric bill because the monthly payments are averaged and adjusted over a year.
