

The Haskell City Council last Thursday voted to close a portion of North 9th Street at the request of the school district. In exchange, the Haskell Track Association will pay for the paving on North 11th and the school will deed a piece of property to the city for an alley.

The transactions will give the school the property it needs for the proposed new track.

Also at Tuesday's meeting, the council voted to keep the city employees' insurance with Time Insurance Co. until the policy expires in October, at which time new bids will be solicited.

Ken Martin, engineer, and Randy Randolph, consultant, of Abilene discussed the proposed street paving project for which the state has approved a \$300,000 grant. It is expected that the contract with the state will be ready in three or four weeks. The city will then select an engineer.

City Administrator Robert Baker reported that the new water lines in the northeast part of the city have been tested and are now open. He also reported that the Beautify Haskell Council has submitted the completed forms and supporting documents to Keep Texas Beautiful Inc.

School studies field house

Specifications are being prepared for a new field house at Haskell Secondary School.

The School Board, at its April 19 meeting, authorized the superintendent to secure the plans and specifications in preparation of asking for construction bids.

City and school elections are

scheduled in Haskell Saturday. City of Haskell voters will cast their ballots between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m. at City Hall for two councilmen and a mayor.

Mayor Greg Melton is unopposed, while there are three candidates for the two seats up for grabs on the City Council.

Council candidates include Claude Payne, seeking re-election, and Larry McMillin and Nathan K. Patterson. The two top vote-getters will be elected.

Melton is seeking his first elective term as mayor. He was appointed last summer to fill the vacancy created by the resignation of Abe Turner.

Councilman Kenny Watson, whose term is expiring, did not file for re-election.

Hold-over city councilmen are Jerry Stocks, Darrell Smith and Robert Kramp.

Eight candidates are seeking the three positions to be decided on the Board of Trustees of the Haskell Independent School District.

Candidates include incumbent Brian Burgess and Randy Phemister, Leesa Toliver, Rex Pitman, Bill Perry, Anita Perry, Terry Blanks and Ervin Unger.

Two incumbent board members whose terms are expiring, Bill Thomas and Wayne Cadenhead, did not file for re-election.

Hold-over board members are Hollis Callaway, Mike Guess, Pat Henry and Roger Moeller. **Elsewhere in Haskell County:**

Paint Creek: Incumbent Ronnie Reel, Charles Wells and Burl Medford are candidates for the two School Board positions to be decided.



"The application is in, but the beautification has only begun," says the steering committee of the Beautify Haskell Council.

Day by day, week by week, new evidence of caring will emerge as Haskell transforms to its most beautiful ever.

Through an organized effort, 1,613 adults have spent 21,378 hours on this program---equivalent to 2,667 8hour working days, or over 7 years.

This does not include the work of the youth nor of the individuals at their residences and places of business.

It involved the steering committee, the two sponsoring groups (City of Haskell and Haskell Chamber of Commerce), the Retail Merchants Association, 13 churches, the media, Girl Scouts, Boy Scouts, Haskell Garden Club, American Legion, Haskell Rotary Club, Haskell Lions Club, Haskell Kiwanis Club.

Haskell Volunteer Fire Department, Progressive Study Club, Experienced Citizens Center, Haskell Memorial Hospital, Haskell Clinic, Hospital Clinic, Fields Museum, Haskell Horse Club, Haskell Bass Club, Brazos West Art Association.

Teenage Baseball Association, Haskell Softball Association, Haskell County Fair Association, Haskell Memorial Civic Center Association, Dr. Ray Dental Clinic, Dr. Kemp Dental Clinic, Alcoholics Anonymous.

Haskell reported the cleanup of all public areas, churches, hospitals, clinics, downtown businesses, etc. The city re-painted the trash receptacles and provided a "trash wagon" available to all citizens at no cost and then hauled trash free of charge to the dump grounds. The fire department and City of Haskell burned vacant lots and abandoned shacks.

An estimated 6,000 man hours is given for the city's part in the cleanup, with 8,400 cubic yards of trash and debris removed from the

Leach, Adams wed in double ring ceremony



Though there is no monetary, compensation, there is great satisfaction with the feeling that we as a board have accomplished our goals. Certainly, at times we have zigged when we should have zagged, but the conditions of our school system---the facilities, the spirit, the work place morale---are vastly improved.

The Texas Education Code requires that all board members elected before Jan. 1, 1987, complete 20 hours of certified training standards by the



Temperatures during April ranged from a frigid 38 degrees on April 2 to a sweltering 96 degrees two days later on April 4.





Texan in Vienna draws attention

AUSTIN-A Texan in Vienna last week drew national and world news coverage and likely has turned the usually obscure race for Texas railroad commissioner into a household discussion.

Meanwhile, a second Texas '88 election issue was forged



when Comptroller Bob Bullock stepped forth with his plan to overhaul the Legislature's formula for financing public education.

Bullock isn't up for office this November, but his plan will likely affect every legislative candidate race in the state.

The credibility of his plan was immediately enhanced by an endorsement from Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby. Certainly, it is being considered by Gov. Bill Clements, who might call a special session of the Legislature to consider it and other plans.

At issue is whether the Legislature should reform its method for distributing revenue among rich and poor school districts, either voluntarily or by a state district judge's court order which is now in appeal trial.

Haves vs. Have Nots

Attorney General Jim Mattox thinks the state will win the appeal and thus avoid having to comply with a super-expensive courtordered plan to reform public

properties as much as 90 percent. "If you go down there, you

The Texan in Vienna talking to world news reporters last week was Kent Hance, our railroad commissioner whose mission to a meeting of OPEC ministers has everyone talking.

But what is everyone saying? His Democrat opponent, Houston state Rep. Clint Hackney, called him a loose cannon and ripped his credibility. Other Democrats called him a grandstander.

The feds at the U.S. Department of Energy said he was playing with fire by suggesting Texas cut oil production in line with OPEC.

His fellow railroad commissioners are split: Jim Nugent, also up for reelection, said he thinks up-to-date knowledge of the world oil market will help Texas; John Sharp said it's dangerous to give the impression Texas will go it alone to side with OPEC.

And Hance? He's supposed to report in to Gov. Clements this week, but he said the OPEC ministers were receptive to his request that Texas be allowed to send observers to OPEC meetings.

That request was basically his mission, but his detractors, perhaps for lack of anything of substance, have built it into far more than it is.

They say he is grabbing headlines for his election, which he is. But their talk here is what has made it a daily issue.

Hance must feel as Tom Sawyer did watching others paint the fence for him. Let others do the work for you.



Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington

The four National Forests in East Texas offer some spectacularly beautiful, unspoiled and undisturbed wilderness areas in our national parks.

A visit to one of them is immensely satisfying. You get that special feeling of timelessness that is associated with great natural beauty and with knowing that our children's children will be able to stand in that same spot and savor the same beauty that we enjoy.

In East Texas, 34,000 acres are designated as part of the National Wilderness Preservation System. These lands encompass a broad spectrum of ecosystems, from hardwood bottomland to upland pine forests, from a permanent spring pool where pioneer wagon trains once watered to the largest longleaf pine tree in the nation.

These wilderness areas-officially designated and thereby protected by a 1984 law-provide a stunning panorama of color and sound.

Indian Mounds in the Sabine National Forest along the Toledo Bend Reservoir is the largest of these wilderness areas. It features a number of unique ecological groupings of plants, a permanent spring pool where pioneer wagons once watered, fossil beds and petrified rock.

Upland Island, in the Angelina National Forest, is the most diverse of these wilderness areas. It contains a bald cypress-the largest tree in the national forests of East Texas-and the largest longleaf pine in the nation, as well as rock columns and a river suitable for canoeing. Turkey Hill Wilderness, also in the Angelina National Forest, contains clear creeks fed by deep springs, with upland pine areas and hardwoods such as beech and magnolia, as well as oak and hickory trees.

The Big Slough Wilderness Area is in Davy Crockett National Forest, west of Lufkin. There, we find an outstanding example of hardwood bottomland, as well as the Texas champion water elm and a wide variety of other plants and animals.

In the Sam Houston National Forest near Conroe and Huntsville, the Little Lake Creek Wilderness Area encompasses both upland pine forests and more hardwood bottomlands.

Each area is a relatively easy drive from the large metropolitan centers of Dallas/Fort Worth and Houston. By preserving these unspoiled areas, we can help meet the growing demand for recreational areas and at the same time protect these areas for future generations.

Legislation that I sponsored and helped pass in 1984 established these wilderness areas. But we need to make boundary adjustments to some of these lands, evening out jagged boundaries and making it easier to recognize boundaries.

This will have two main payoffs. First, privately owned peninsulas adjacent to these areas make it more difficult to enforce wilderness regulations. In addition, private lands are subject to development at some point-development that could greatly degrade the qualify of the feel and the beauty of these areas.

So I have introduced a bill that provides for the acquisition of some small parcels of land. Private land owners will be compensated through the exchange of U.S. Forest Service land of comparable value, so we won't be adding to the federal budget deficit.

These wilderness areas are Texas treasures. The additions in my bill will help enhance them and further guarantee that they will remain unspoiled for future generations.

Comments wanted on wheat

The U.S. Department of agriculture is asking for public comments on the percentage of reduction, if any, for an acreage reduction program (ARP) for the 1989 crop of wheat.

The Commodity Credit Corporation will announce a decision on any 1989 wheat ARP no later than June 1. If the 1988 ending stocks for wheat are estimated to be below lone billion bushels, the ARP may not exceed 20 percent for the 1989 crop of wheat.

CCC also requests comments on other provisions of the 1989 wheat program and the program provisions that are common to the 1989 crops of wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice.

Comments will be considered along with information concerning the outlook for domestic and foreign supply and demand before final program decisions are made.

CCC seeks comments on these additional 1989 wheat program provisions:

-- The percentage reduction for any paid land diversion (PLD). CCC proposes not to implement a PLD for the 1989 crop of wheat.

--Whether a marketing loan and related provisions should be implemented. CCC proposes not to implement a marketing loan for the 1989 crop of wheat.

CCC also seeks comments on the common program provisions for the 1989 crops of wheat, feed grains, cotton and rice.

PUBLIC AWARENESS

The Haskell Free Press ran 482 column inches in pictures and stories in weekly publicity while radio KVRP averaged four public service announcements daily, which along with the local beautification song amounted to 600 minutes of air time, in addition to presenting weekly 30minute programs highlighting the beautification effort.

The Chamber of Commerce distributed 987 pledge cards, a special tabloid was distributed to all subscribers of the Free Press, and an 80-slide presentation with narration was given at the chamber banquet. There was an essay contest, a slogan contest and a poster contest.

LAW ENFORCEMENT

A new City ordinance was adopted by the City Council Jan. 14 and all city employees were instructed to enforce it. Ten citations have been issued for littering, 30 written warnings given out and 10 court convictions as a result of violations. Average fines have been \$50.

RECYCLING A large recycling container for

aluminum cans was installed downtown for the convenience of the public. The city has contracted with an individual to salvage materials at

the land field. More than 12 tons of materials have been recycled. Leaders in this program were 25 Boy Scouts and 80 students in the third grade.

To determine whether cattle producers want to continue a nationally legislated beef promotion program, the Agricultural Marketing Service will conduct a beef referendum in cooperation with the Extension Service and the Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service.

Locally, the referendum will be held Tuesday (May 10) in the county extension office. All states except West Virginia will vote on that day.

All cattle producers or those who imported cattle, beef or beef products between Oct. 1, 1986, and March 31, 1988, will be entitled to vote in the referendum. USDA officials say a simple majority vote will determine if the beef promotion program will stay in effect.

The program is funded by a \$1 per head assessment on domestic and imported cattle and by an equal assessment on imported beef and beef



There are advantages and disadvantages to all joint ventures. If you want your business partnership or closely-held corporation to be successful, take time at the outset to learn something about the individuals who will be your partners.

Patners don't have to be the best of friends, but they do have to get along well enough to communicate properly. There should also be mutual trust and a respect for the contributions each will make to the business.

Drawing up a partnership agreement will force all partners to consider the bad as well as the good before the partnership is actually formed. As your attorney assists you with your agreement, you will be considering such areas as the division of responsibilities, profit-splitting, debt-sharing, and the amount of time each individual will devote to the partnership. Of particular importance is deciding what will happen in the event of the disability or death of one of the partners and what will happen if one partner simply wants out. Since almost all joint ventures terminate for one reason or another, these contingencies need to be addressed.

A common mistake in family partnerships is the failure to have a written agreement. There is as much room, if not more, for disagreements in family partnerships as in partnerships of unrelated parties.

If the business relationship gets into trouble, there are those who may be able to help. Perhaps some objective third party for whom the partners have mutual respect (accountant, attorney, broker, banker, etc.) may be of assistance. An open line of communication between the partners and some good pre-planning will help keep the relationship and the business on track.



Sandra Thornhill, a former HHS senior, won a second-place award for her entertainment column.


The award-winning column encouraged students to attend ACU's homecoming drama production,

As part of that commitment, Brown was instructed in predelivery, which involves using a checklist to thoroughly check over the tractor at the dealership before delivery to the customer. The service technician signs this sheet and the customer receives a copy to confirm that the checks have been made.
