Pecan tree spraying dates given

The pecan nut casebearer is the most dmaging pest of pecans in Haskell County.

The first generation pecan nut casebearers cause most of the damage. One larve can often destroy all the nutlets in a cluster. Timing of control measures for the pecan nut casebearer is important. The insecticidal application should be made to control the larvae after they hatch and before they have entered the small nutlets.

For best control of this insect, pecan trees should be sprayed from May 28 to June 3.

A second spray application will be needed when new casebearer nutlet damage is observed six to seven days after the first spray application.



Junior groomsman was Chad Teichelman of Sagerton, nephew of the groom.



Ousted school head charges 'politics'

AUSTIN-Southwest Texas State University President Robert Hardesty was fired late last week by a 5-4 vote of the Texas State University System regents.

Regents named Michael Abbott, 43, SWTSU executive vice president, as interim president.

Hardesty claims his allegiance and relationship with former Gov. Mark White caused the dismissal, effective June 30. Hardesty said he was accused by regents last



November of writing political speeches for White.

A one-paragraph statement was issued quoting board chairman Ruben Escobedo of San Antonio of saying only that Hardesty was fired due to "philosophical differences" with regents.

Of the five regents who voted to dismiss Hardesty, three were appointed by Gov. Bill Clements and two, including Escobedo, were named by White. The terms of the latter two expire next year.

Among White's campaign financial supporters were Hardesty and his wife, Mary, who had been White's press secretary when he was attorney general and was on his staff when he was governor.

Clements Seeks S&L Aid

Gov. Bill Clements went to Washington last week in seek of aid for Texas lenders. While he was there, the feds merged five Texas savings and loan associations in the largest such transaction thus far.

Federal officials also told Texas it ranked second behind Illinois in the site selection process for the lucrative supercollider.

Texas plans to spend \$6.7 million to convince the feds to build the \$5.3 billion project near Waxahachie.

Mayerick Bank Account

State Treasurer Ann Richards said the Texas Department of Commerce has deposited more than \$50,000 in a private bank account instead of with the state treasury.

She says it violates a 1987 state law mandating that private donations raised by the agency must be deposited in the treasury.

The agency contends no law is being broken because the donations are to a non-profit foundation, which was established for tax purposes. The funds are used for travel, entertainment and

He picked up several endorsements for his plan to remedy school funding inequities, and his active campaign to win the 1990 lieutenant governorship is gaining popular support.

After Bullock's recent speech to a crowd of 1,600 in Midland, one man commented he saw Democrats conversing there who hadn't spoken to one another for years.

Bobby Albert predicts victory

Bobby Albert, Redpublican candidate for State Senate, visited The Free Press last Tuesday and predicted he would emerge the winner of the Aug. 13 special election because he is a conservative who can gain the support of conservative Democrats and Independents.

The 35-year-old Wichita Falls businessman said the conservative Democrats "have been shut out of the process" by the selection of Steve Carriker as their standard bearer.

'The Democratic county chairmen have chosen the most liberal of the three candidates," said Albert. "Steve Carriker is part of the problem of more government, more spending and more taxes. We've been ready to run against anybody, but now the voters have a clear choice between a liberal, Carriker, and a conservative, myself."

He continued: "Steve Carriker has voted for every increase in spending, every increase in taxes and against every attempt to cut the budget."

Albert pledged to sponsor a constitutional amendment to ban a state income tax and legislation that would limit the size of the state

The candidate voiced his strong support for local control of schools, tougher penalties for drug pushers and proposed establishing an innovative working partnership with all elected state and local officials in the 30th district to be called "Team 30" to ensure that North and West Texas get their fair share from Austin.

Albert is a candidate in the Aug. 13 special election which will determine a replacement for the resigned Ray Farabee. The winner of that election will serve out the remainder of Farabee's unexpired term, which runs through this year. He also will be the Republican candidate for a full term in the November election.

Democratic county chairmen of the 30-county district recently selected Carriker as their choice for the party's nominee for the general election. Their decision apparently eliminated the campaigns of two other Democrats, Charles Finnell and Helen Farabee, both of whom had announced they would run in the special election.

Since the winner of the special election will be elected only for the remainder of Farabee's term, Finnell and Mrs. Farabee are not expected to file for election. If Carriker files for the special election, he will face Albert in the non-partisan August voting, and again in the November general election.

Drunk driving still big problem

Drunk driving remains the No. 1 killer on our roads, striking with a frequency and ferocity that would be national news if its victims were reported in total each day instead of individually in obituaries in thousands of cities and towns wherethe tragedies occur.

Its victims are a cross-section of America: the rich, the poor, the young, the old, the safety-conscious and the not-so-safety-conscious.

But they share a common demise that is always unexpected, always needless and often grudgingly tolerated because our social norms won't quite permit them to be characterized as other than accidental

For many years in this country we talked about drunk driving in statistical terms only; lives lost and public expenditures. The higher the numbers, the more the public would pay attention, or so we thought. But the opposite was true. The numbers were largely ignored because they were, after all, just numbers. There were no faces or shattered lives attached to tug at the heart strings.

But something changed all that in the early 1980s. Citizen activist groups, like Mothers Against Drunk Driving, moved drunk driving off the bar graphs and brought it up close and personal, laying its dire consequences squarely on the doorsteps of virtually every American community.

Suddenly the blinders came off, the outrage swelled and things began to change---and change dramatically.

Thanks to the awakening, the United States, to its credit, has made remarkable progress in just a handful of years. Forty-one percent of the total traffic deaths in 1986 involved at lease one driver or pedestrian who was intoxicated, a shocking figure but one that represents a significant decline from the 46 percent that was tallied in 1982. The percentage of intoxicated teenage drivers involved in fatal crashes also dropped, from 28 percent in 1982 to 21 percent in 1986, the largest decrease among all age groups.

As promising as the improved statistics are, they are not much comfort to the families and friends of the 19,000 people who were killed last year in alcohol-related crashes. We are holding our own---keeping things from getting worse---but we are still a long way from the point where we can drive our roads,

reasonably assured that the approaching car or truck is not driven by someone who has had too much to

Alcohol has played and probably will continue to play a major role in how we socialize in this country. The challenge is to convince people to use alcohol in moderation and to avoid driving after drinking. This is especially true during the Christmas/New Year's holiday season when travel increases, office parties abound and it's common to get together with family, friends and neighbors for "a little holiday cheer."

Tougher laws, more enforcement and increased public and media attention over the past few years helped reduce alcohol-related crashes by nearly 30 percent in some parts of the nation. Many responsible people have gotten the message and have modified their drinking habits for the

better. But the problem is far from solved and complacency should not replace the concern and anger of the early 1980s that motivated government, the private sector and citizen groups to stop wringing hands over drunk driving and start fighting

We continue to be too tolerant of a dangerous minority who leave parties, bars and restaurants with attitudes like "I driver better when I'm drunk," "I only had a few," and "nobody drives my car but me."

It may be difficult as a host to stick your neck out and actively prevent someone from driving who has been celebrating too much. But isn't it better to call a cab, offer a ride or provide a bed than to allow friends or co-workers to put themselves and everyone else at risk?

The old adage about an ounce of prevention being worth a pound of cure is particularly appropriate when developing strategies to curb drunk drivers. Remember, drunk driving IS preventable and drinking too much and then getting behind the wheel and killing someone is not an accidental event. People know better today, and we should all be held accountable for our actions.

But the concept of accountability is dependent on public awareness. The news media has played a significant role in bringing about a greater awareness of the drunk driving problem. In fairness, an unprecedented amount of news and public service has been devoted to the subject for a far longer period of time than most issues. But as media attention wanes, the public's awareness and heightened sensitivity wane with it. Drunk and Drugged Driving Week is the one special week during the year when we stop and take stock of something that deserves special emphasis.

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
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Paint Creek students use Haskell library

Natonia said she would like to thank the superintendent, principal and her teachers for their cooperation and encouragement.



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

She didn't get to play her second day of golf, however, since she was playing in the state tennis semifinals at the same time everyone else was playing the last 18 holes of golf.

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
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
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Scouts have outing at Copper Breaks

Blood pressure tests to be given June 3

A high blood pressure screening will be conducted June 3 at the Haskell National Bank.

Sponsored by the American Heart Association, the screening will be from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. and will be done by volunteers of Haskell County's medical facilities. All residents are encouraged to have their blood pressure checked.

Each person screened will receive literature about the importance of maintaining a healthy blood pressure. Any person found to have an elevated pressure during the time of the check will be referred to a physician.

Most people with high blood pressure have no symptoms. There are no specific warning signs. Although persistent headaches, dizziness, fatigue, tension and shortness of breath sometimes go with high blood pressure, they may result from a variety of causes.

High blood pressure is the force of blood against the walls of the arteries. This force is created by the heart as it pumps blood to all parts of the body. In some people, blood pressure is nearly always higher than it should

If high blood pressure continues for a long period, the heart and the arteries may not function as well as they should and other body organs may also be affected. There is increased risk of stroke, heart failure,

kidney failure and heart attack. Fifty-four million people have high blood pressure. The American Heart Association estimates that 50 percent of these people do not know it. Statistics show that in 1985, 50.4 percent of the people who died in Haskell County died of cardiovascular

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
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


Haskell tumblers do well in world games
