45 mph to be set on N. 16th

A 45-miles-per-hour speed limit on North 16th Street, from US 277 west to the end of the city limits, will take effect after passage and publication of an ordinance.

The City Council, meeting last Thursday, agreed to a request from the state to decrease the speed limit on the street from its present 55.

City administrator Bob Baker was instructed to prepare an ordinance for adoption at the council's next meeting.

David Davis appeared before the council and requested a clarification of the city's policy on its RV parking spaces as it pertains to wheat harvest crews. He was told that the city encourages custom harvesters to park their trailers at one of the three privately owned trailer parks in the city.

Councilman Jerry Stocks was re-appointed mayor protem and Tom Watson was re-appointed to a two-year term on the board of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. Watson has served on the board since 1965.

Councilmen Claude Payne and Larry McMillin were appointed to the Ambulance Board to represent the city. They replace Kenny Watson and Robert Kramp.

The council discussed the vacancy on the Housing Authority, but came up with no recommendation for the position. The vacancy was created when board member McMillin was elected to the council.

Baker reported the hiring of two students as summer help. They are Brad Bevel and Steven Klose.

The administrator also reported on a recent inspection by the city's insurance carrier. He said it was recommended that several changes be made at Rice Springs Park for the sake of safety: (1) board swing seats be replaced with rubber seats, (2) the heavy metal torpedo swings be removed, and (3) the concrete on the ground around the swings and merry-go-round be removed and replaced with sand.

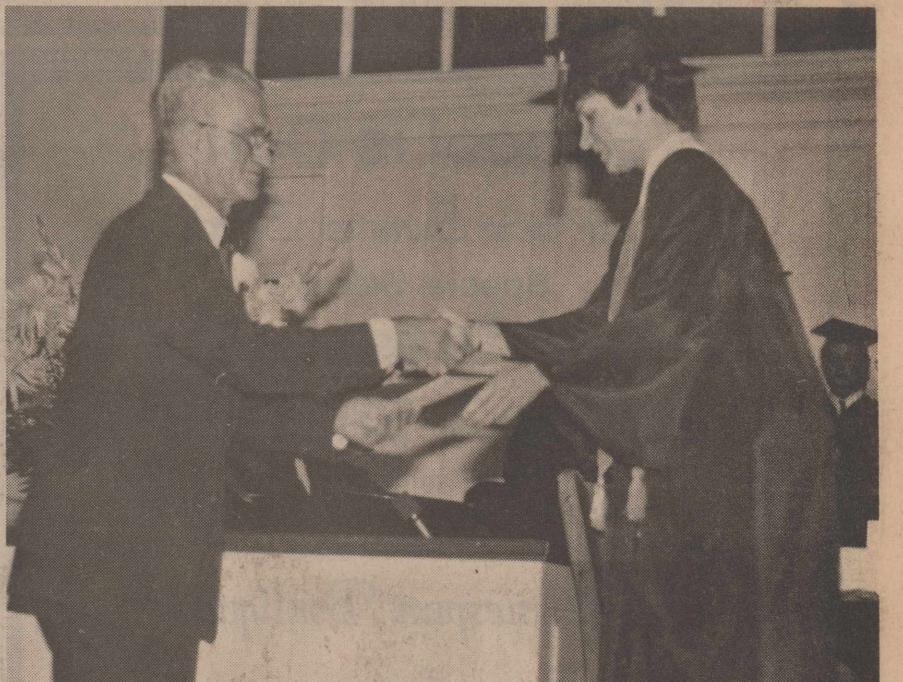
Sheree Dumas read the poem "Senior" and the class sang the school song. Following the benediction by Vance Roberts, the class marched out to the recessional.

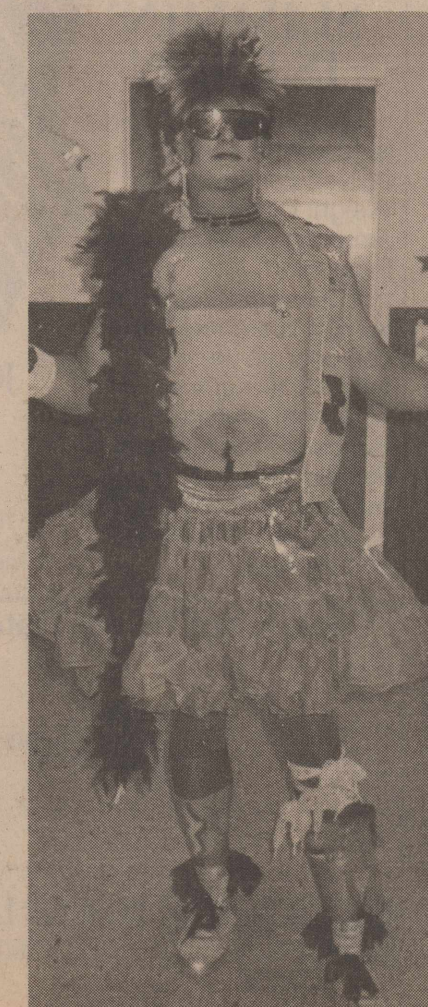
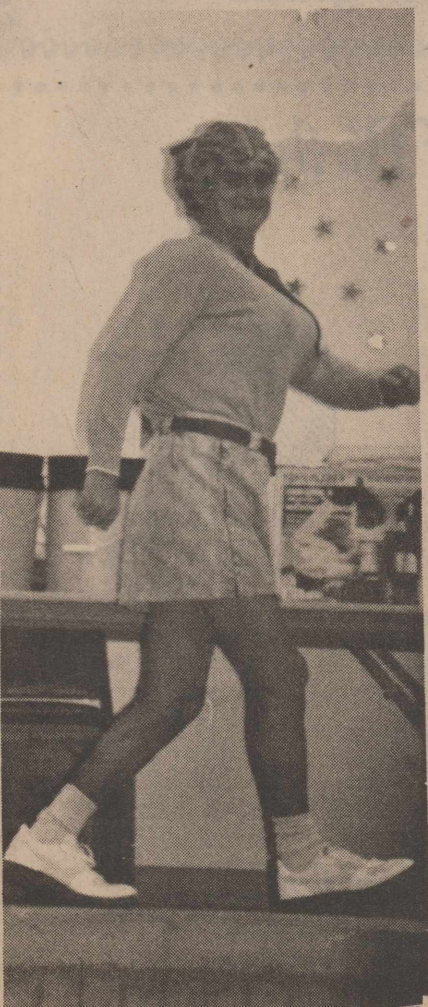

Haskell Chamber of Commerce Fifty-five pilots landed at the Haskell Municipal Airport this past Saturday for the Fly-In Breakfast sponsored by the Haskell Chamber of Commerce.

Bud Lane, project coordinator, reported that the planes came from Palm City, Fla.; Sault St. Marie, Wis.; Allentown, Pa.; Stratford, Ontario, Canada; West Chicago, Ill.; Moore, Okla.; Burlington, Ontario, Canada; Denver, N. C.; Bakersfield, Calif.; Nashua, N.H.; Abilene, Eules, Stamford, Denver City, Clyde, Pampa, Ballinger, Snyder, Colorado City, Breckenridge, Albany, Merkel, Hamlin, Bridgeport, Bedford, Wichita Falls and Sherman.

Numerous aircraft participated in Saturday's activities. Among the Warbirds were an FGID Corsair, two BT-13 Vultees, two T-28s, an L-19, an L-2, an AT-6 Texan, a P-40M Warhawk and five mP-51 Mustangs. Two B-25s also flew by but did not land here.

Civilian airplanes were also well represented. These included several types of Cessnas, Pipers, Beechcrafts and Mooneys, as well as a DeHavilland twin Otter and other aircraft types.

At the brief program with Dusty Garison as master of ceremonies, formal welcomes were made by State Rep. Rick Perry and Haskell Mayor Greg Melton and trophies were awarded to D. C. Davidson for traveling the longest distance from Nashua, N.H., over 1,500 miles away; to Bill Destefanio from Bakersfield, Calif., for the best Warbird, a P-40-M; and to Roy Arledge, 84, of Stamford who was the oldest pilot.

Martial music was played during the breakfast, interspersed by popular tunes from World War II.

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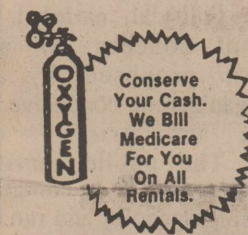

Court ruling shocking to many

AUSTIN—In a decision which shocked many and rocked Attorney General Jim Mattox, the Texas Supreme Court last week ruled 5-4 that Mattox cannot intervene on behalf of state agencies in electric rate cases before the Public Utility Commission.

Lawmakers fear the consequences of a Texas judge emulating the federal judges whose court-ordered reforms have forced the Legislature to spend millions in the prison and mental health systems.

However, one member pointed out, the difference between Texas judges and federal judges is that state judges are elected, not appointed for life.

If state court orders hit voters too hard in the pocketbook, then voters at least can get a shot back at the ballot box.

Mattox Seeks Charges

Mattox thinks a grand jury should consider whether a central figure in the SMU football scandal has committed theft and misapplication of fiduciary responsibility.

His formal complaint suggesting criminal acts was turned over to the Dallas district attorney who can subpoena criminal witnesses.

Sources reported the complaint points to possible stolen funds used by the SMU Mustang Club of sports boosters.

Clements, Hubbard Feud

Clements and Texas labor leader Harry Hubbard let loose with their differences of opinion on the maquiladora program, on use of Mexican labor in U.S.-built assembly plants in Mexico.

Clements, endorsing this week's Dallas trade show on the program, said 34,000 new jobs could be created if Texas captures 25 percent of the maquiladora market.

Hubbard said organized labor was "violently opposed," due to the continuous loss of Texas jobs on the Rio Grande border.

Firing Protested

Faculty, students and San Marcos residents last week began organizing protests of the Hardesty firing.

Meanwhile, Gov. Clements dismissed assertions that he played a role in the ouster.

Asked about criticism of the firing by top state officials, Clements said: "These people apparently are big buddies of Mr. Hardesty. I am not. I don't know Mr. Hardesty."

"As far as the school is concerned, it's getting along fine. And if the regents deemed it necessary to replace the president, that's what they're there for."

Drought Aid Sought

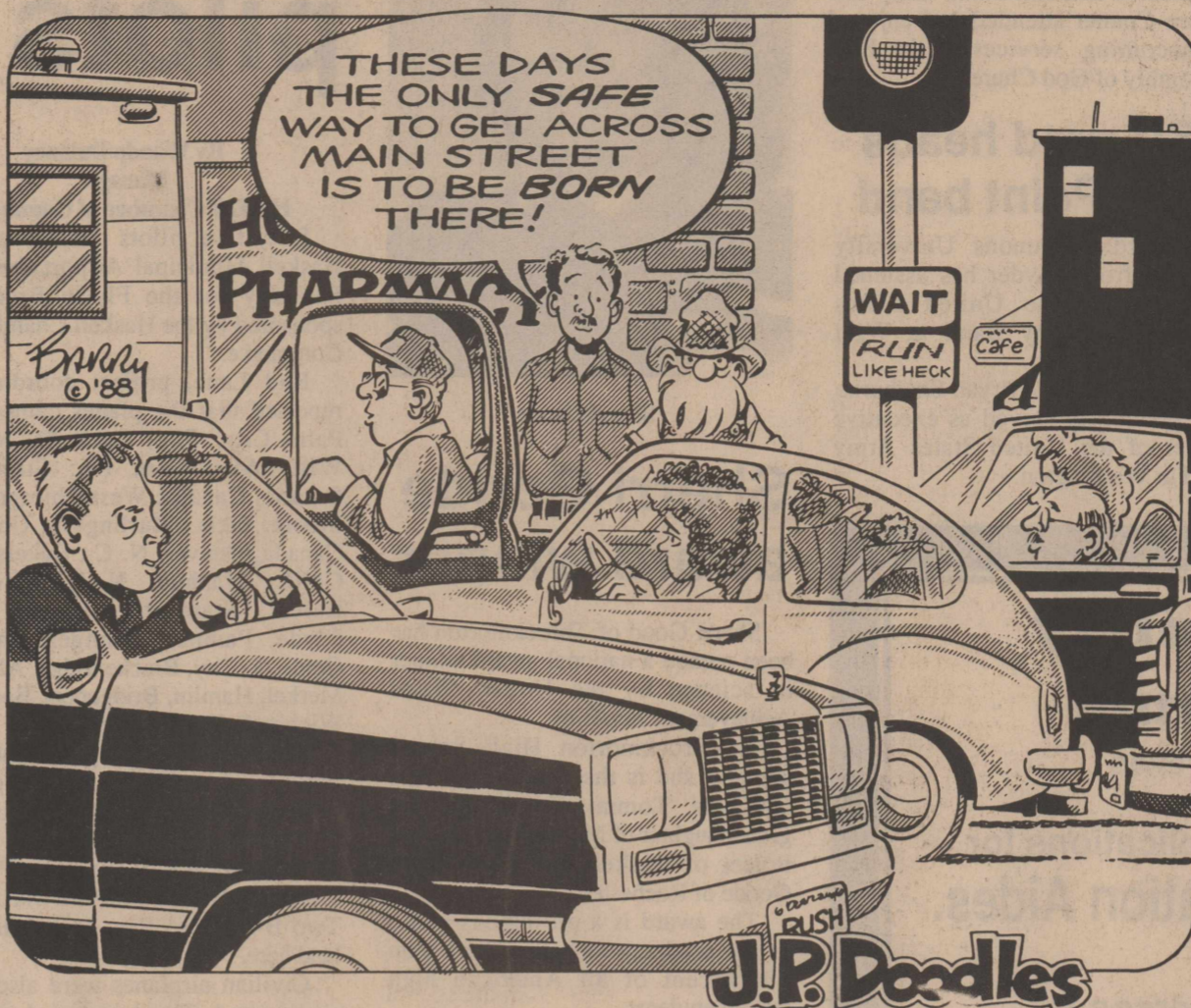
The governor and agriculture commissioner called on the U.S. Secretary of Agriculture to authorize emergency aid for 103 drought-stricken counties in the western third of Texas.

Everyone's seen those ads for non-profit organizations which have appeared for years in The Free Press and other publications.

Most of them are produced free by The Advertising Council, and the space is donated by the publications. They usually have an agate line at the bottom reading "Published as a public service by The Advertising Council and this newspaper."

One editor describes The Ad Council as the "Town crier for the nation." The messages have been brought to millions for more than 40 years.

Remember the expression "Loose Lips Sink Ships"? It was coined during World War II by Ad Council volunteers to impress upon Americans the importance of the security of war information.

And how about: "Just Say No", "A Mind Is a Terrible Thing to Waste",

"Only You Can Prevent Forest Fires",

"The Peace Corps: The Toughest Job You'll Ever Love", and "Take a Bite Out of Crime".

All those popular slogans were coined by The Ad Council.

The Council was formed in 1942 by a group of leaders in advertising, industry and media. Since then, Ad Council symbols and slogans have become part of the American vernacular to move people to action to solve our nation's problems.

Each year the Council receives more than 400 requests for public service advertising campaign support. Members of the board of directors study each request to determine if it is: non-commercial, non-denominational, non-political, national in scope yet of concern to all communities, proposed by an accredited organization, conducive to advertising, and priority of importance. The public service campaigns are created by volunteers from advertising agencies and run in free space and time volunteered by the media.

Here are some of the most significant campaigns of recent years:

AIDS Education: The objective of this campaign is to use education to effect a change in current behavior and to instruct individuals about means of prevention.

Aid to Higher Education: The theme, "Invest in the future of America, give to the college of your choice", produced profound results. Contributions rose to a record \$7.4 billion in the first year of the campaign.

Forest Fire Prevention: The reduction in forest fires over the past four decades since the campaign began has saved taxpayers more than \$21 billion.

Crime Prevention: Thanks to Crime Dog McGruff, over 19 million Americans participate in block watch groups in 100,000 neighborhoods.

American Red Cross: For 42 years, Red Cross campaigns have helped to increase the number of blood donors, health and safety course participants and volunteers.

Buckle Your Safety Belt: This campaign has been instrumental in increasing safety belt usage 85 percent.

Child Abuse Prevention: "Take time out. Don't take it out on your kid." This public advertising campaign has helped bring public awareness of child abuse up to more than 90 percent.

Drunk Driving Prevention: "Drinking and Driving Can Kill a Friendship." Since the beginning of this campaign, alcohol-related crashes involving young Americans under 19, the target audience, decreased by 25 percent from 1980 to 1986.

Seniors Dan Benton, Gina Calk and Rhonda Coleman were named Mr. and Miss Pirate for 1987-88.



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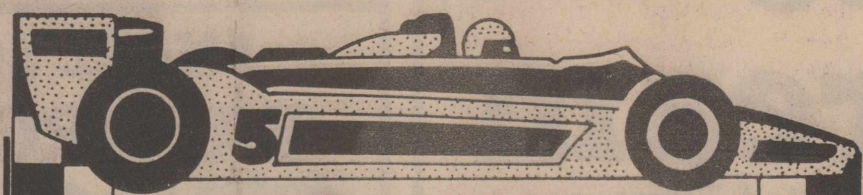

Haskell grant one of largest

Haskell's recent grant from the Texas Community Development Fund was one of the largest given.

Only seven of the 148 grants were greater than the \$300,000 received by Haskell, while 10 others were for \$300,000.

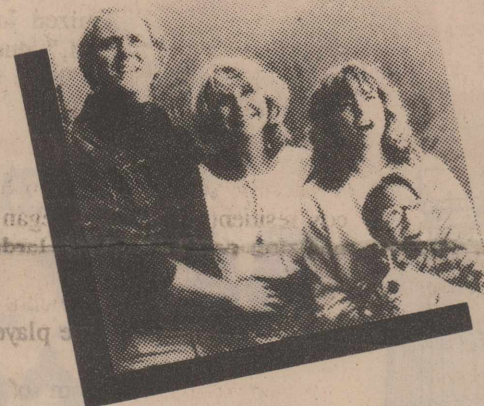

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If you think retirement is a long way off, ask someone who is sixty-five just how fast the time goes. Then think about this: only five percent of the people who retire are financially independent. If you start investing now, you could be part of that five percent.

It's important to start now regardless of your age. Investing requires discipline. If you haven't yet started saving for your retirement, you have a bad habit which requires changing. Forcing yourself to start doing something that doesn't come naturally takes a concerted effort. Don't put off starting your investment program until your next pay raise. If you do, you are likely to put it off even longer.

Most of us could live on five, ten, or maybe fifteen percent less than we are now consuming. How much current spending you must give up is determined by your needs at retirement.

Most of us will need about 60 to 70 percent of our current income during retirement years. Our houses will probably be paid for, our children will be grown, and our business and social obligations may be reduced.

With proper allowance for inflation, it's possible to estimate your annual cash needs at your anticipated retirement age. Another factor worth considering is the increase in life spans. Many of us will have more retirement years to fund than our parents did, and certainly than our grandparents did.

Once you have estimated your total cash needs at retirement, you can subtract your social security and company pension benefits and arrive at the portion which you must independently fund.

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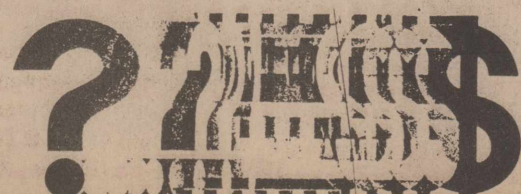

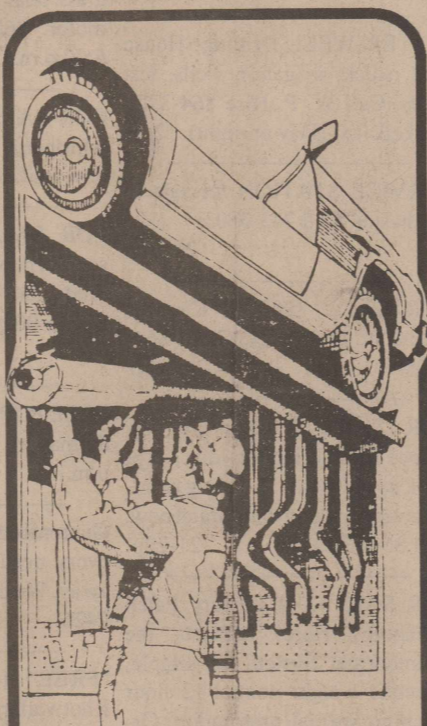
Shane Hadaway has been named a national collegiate award winner in business by the United States Achievement Academy.

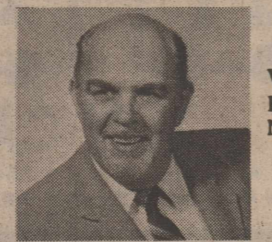

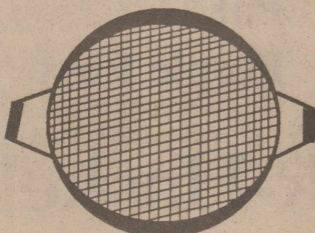
