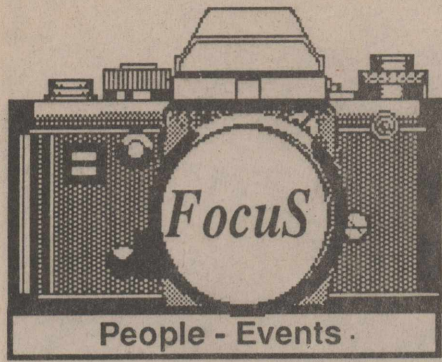

City sales taxes continue climb

Haskell's sales tax rebates from the state continued their upward trend this month when the City received a check for \$21,699.68 from the state comptroller.

That's an 11.72-percent increase over the \$19,423.60 received for the same period last year.

This month's check brought to 1988 rebates to \$107,837.87, a 7.12-percent increase over the rebates of \$100,668.33 for the same period in 1987.

Also receiving rebate checks from the comptroller this month were Rule, \$2,431.51; Rochester, \$954.80; Weinert, \$296.75; and O'Brien, \$177.70.

For the year, Rule shows a 14.12-percent increase, \$17,900.35 this year, compared to \$15,785.64 in 1987. Other county cities show declines for the year to date, Rochester by 30.34 percent, O'Brien by 27.22 percent, and Weinert by 22.39 percent.

So far this year, the combined amount of rebates for the county's five cities comes to \$131,358.00, up 5.83 percent over last year's figure of \$124,118.45 for the same period.

This month's checks represent taxes collected by monthly and quarterly filers in June and reported to the comptroller's office by July 20.

Gannaway named for cotton program

Andy Gannaway, 35-year-old Haskell cotton producer, has been chosen by the National Cotton Council's industry-wide selection committee to participate in the 1988-89 Cotton Leadership Program.

Gannaway, who is also executive vice president and chief agricultural loan officer of the Haskell National Bank, is a graduate of Texas Tech University with a master's degree in agricultural economics. He also attends the Southwestern Graduate School of Banking and is a member of the Haskell County Pest Management Association.

The leadership program class, the sixth since the program began under a Cotton Foundation grant from Du Pont's Agricultural Products Department, will begin training in mid-September during the Council's fall board meeting in Memphis, Tenn.

During 30 days of special activities over the coming year, the group will get a first-hand look at government operations at both state and federal levels, study industry

organizations and their policy-making procedures, observe cotton research and marketing development, be trained in communication techniques, and view cotton production and processing from the Carolinas to California.

Sessions are scheduled in Washington, New York and various locations across the Cotton Belt.

Senate election Saturday

Haskell County voters will join those of other counties of the 30th senatorial district Saturday in voting for a successor of State Sen. Ray Farabee.

Candidates are Steve Carrier, Democrat, and Bobby Albert, Republican.

Winner of the election will serve out the remainder of Farabee's current term which expires in January.

The same two candidates will face each other again in the general election in November for a full term.

Polls in Haskell County will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

County Clerk Woodrow Frazier said his office had received 49 absentee ballots as of mid-afternoon Tuesday, which indicates a better-than-expected interest in the special election. Absentee balloting was to close at 5 p.m. Tuesday.

After an infected tick bites, a rash may appear, but then several days

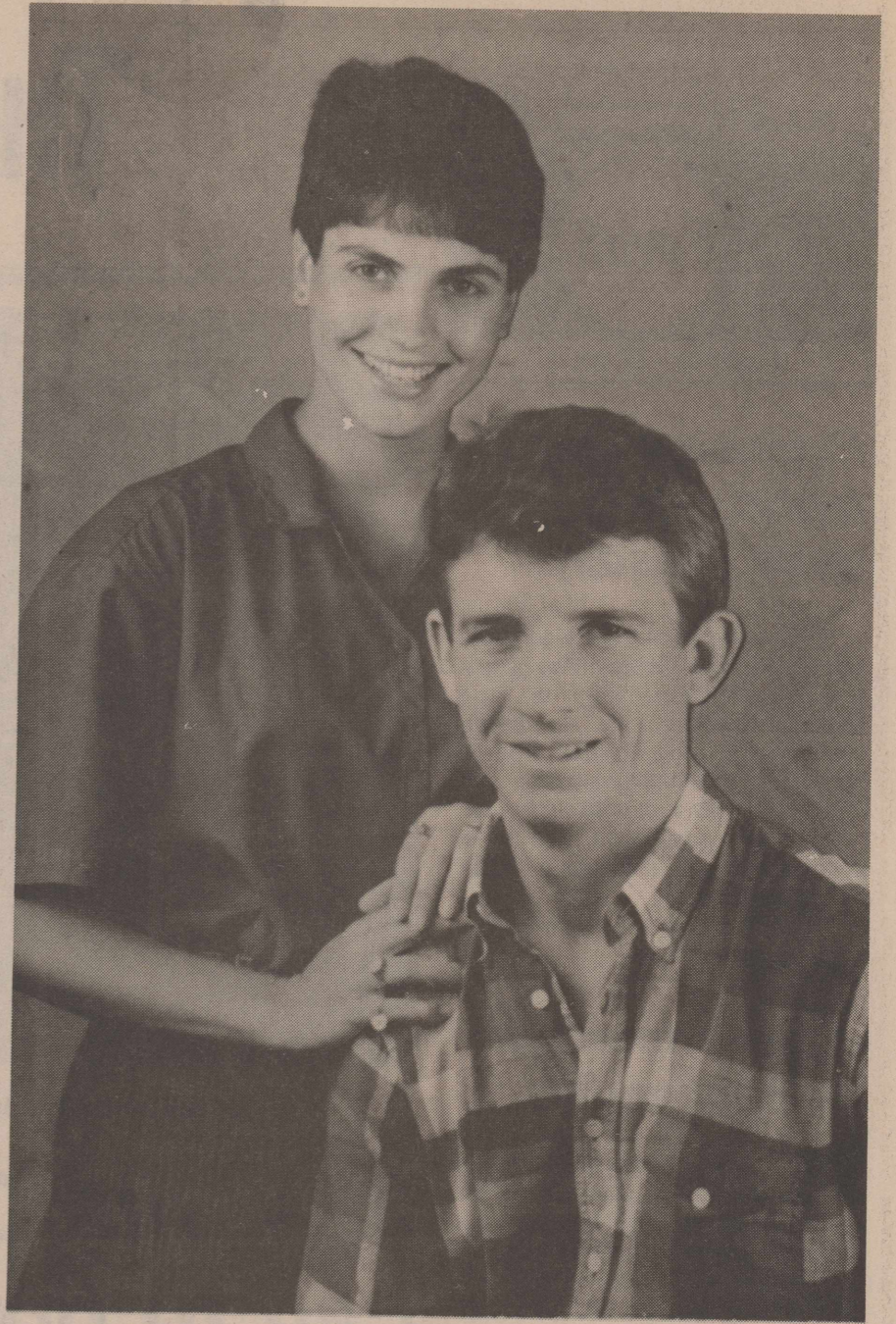
later headaches and high fever are reported. Crippling complications are usually present and those who walk in tick-infested areas must be careful to check themselves and their children for ticks.

A HELPFUL FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The American Institute of CPAs is requiring a new form of financial statement effective July 15, 1988.

The new statement is titled "Statement of Cash Flows" and is intended to replace the "Statement of Changes in Financial Position."

The primary purpose of this new statement is to provide relevant information about the cash receipts and disbursements of a company. This new statement, along with the other financial statements, should help investors and creditors to:

- Assess the company's ability to generate positive future net cash flows.
- Assess the company's ability to meet its obligations, its ability to pay dividends, and its needs for external financing.
- Assess the reasons for differences between net income and associated cash receipts and payments.
- Assess the effects on a company's financial position of both its cash and noncash investing and financing transactions during a given accounting period.

The "Statement of Cash Flows," along with the "Reconciliation of Net Income to Net Cash," should be of great assistance to business managers.

The "Statement of Cash Flows" is required to present three distinct areas of cash flows—cash from operations, cash from investing, and cash from financing. The net cash flow from these three areas is then added to or subtracted from the beginning cash and cash equivalents to present a current figure.

The reconciliation of net income to net cash will answer a very common question. If I made a profit, where's the money now? This reconciliation starts with the net income from your profit and loss statement and makes the appropriate noncash income and expense adjustments to arrive at net cash provided by operating activities.

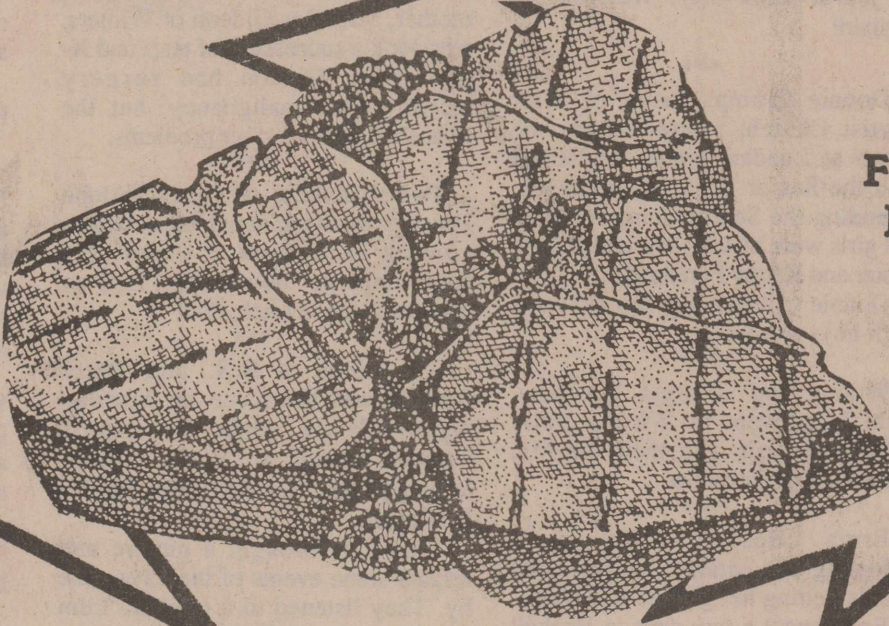
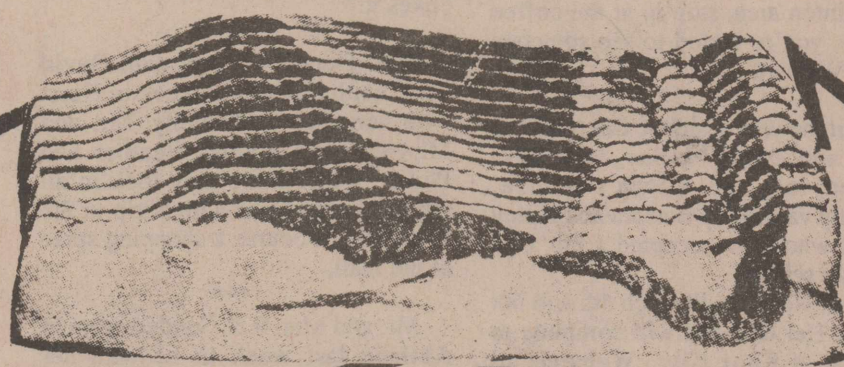

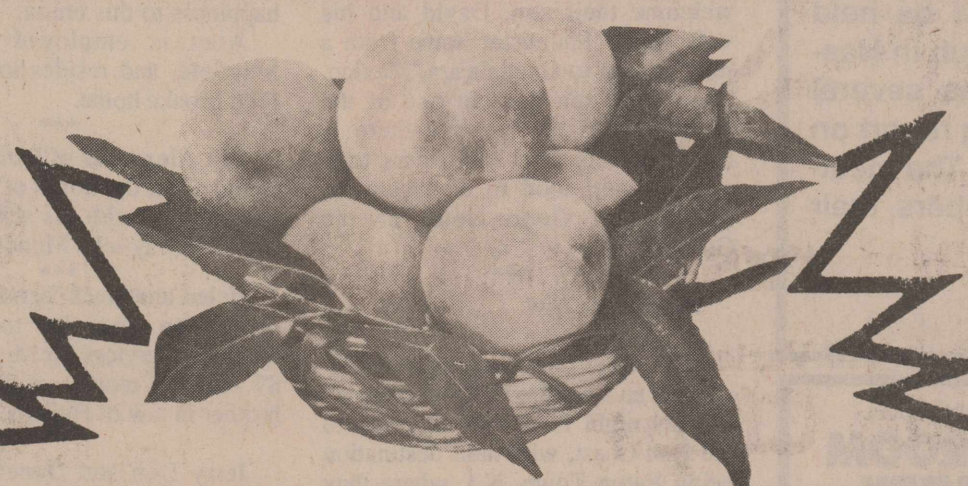

Church has had colorful history

The First Christian Church has enjoyed a rich and colorful history since it was organized in 1888. During January of that year, W. C. Ballard invited a young minister, J. B. Boen, to hold a revival meeting in Haskell, which was then still called "Rice Springs."

Following the three-week long meeting, 23 additions to the church were baptized. Church records show that they could be baptized only after cutting through 10 inches of ice. These 23, along with Mr. Ballard, Mrs. Shook, Mr. and Mrs. Agnew, Mr. and Mrs. Norris and Mr. and Mrs. Steele, comprised the congregation's charter members.

In 1890, Brother J. C. Stephens moved into Haskell. During his tenure here, the "old frame church" building was begun; the church met in this building for nearly 30 years.

After the turn of the century, a controversy developed concerning the use of instrumental music during the worship service. This conflict could not be resolved and several families withdrew and organized the Church of Christ.

The church enjoyed a time of growth for several years. During this time, several ministers served the congregation. Brother Walthall of Indiana was preaching for the church in 1921 when the new church building was constructed. This structure has been renovated several

times over the years and was extensively remodeled following a 1962 tornado. The church continues to use this fine facility, which has one of the largest auditoriums in Haskell.

Over the years, numerous dedicated and talented servants have labored for the Lord with this church, including skilled ministers and faithful lay leaders. Many of the present day members are the direct descendants of those pioneer families who helped establish the congregation.

The Christian Church has always had a strong emphasis on missions, reflected in its support of many outreach programs. Today, the church's influence continues to be felt in several areas, including contributions to Bible colleges, evangelistic efforts and foreign missionaries.

The present minister of the congregation is Dusty Garison. A native of East Texas, Brother Garison originally came to Haskell in 1980, serving with the church for two years. He and his family moved back to Haskell in 1986. Since the church was without a minister at that time, he began to fill the pulpit for them. He and his wife, Kathy, have two boys, Travis, 7, and Drew, 2.

Many changes have taken place in the world since that cold revival meeting in 1888. As the Christian Church reflects back upon her 100 years of existence, the members can recall all those who labored and sacrificed to establish and maintain this congregation.

As the church looks forward to her second 100 years and on into the next century, may she continue to "contend for the faith once delivered to the saints." The motto of the church continues to be, "No book but the Bible; no creed but Christ. In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, liberty; in all things, charity."

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Haskell I.S.D. Lunch Guidelines

Haskell Independent School District has released the guidelines for the school lunch program:

The school district serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for \$1.05 in the elementary school, \$1.30 for high school and 50¢ for breakfast.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the pictured scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced priced meals at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced meals, parents should fill out an application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) or food stamp case number if the household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years of age or older or the word NONE for any household member who does not have a social security number and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

Application forms may be obtained at each public school campus. If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact the individual campus principal. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied. All information will be confidential.

Kindergarten pre-registration deadline Aug. 25

Registration for students in grades K-6 will be Wednesday, Aug. 31, from 9:30 a.m. to noon.

Students who were not attending Haskell Elementary School at the end of the 1987-88 school year will need to register in the cafeteria. They will need to bring a report card from last year and immunization records.

TREE TALK: Scientists speculate that some trees may have the ability to communicate with each other. *International Wildlife* magazine reports that willow trees, and perhaps some others, may warn trees of their own kind that insects are on the attack. When insects start nibbling on one tree, it gives off a scent that may be picked up by other trees nearby. The scent tells the other trees to produce insect repellent chemicals quickly in their leaves.

IN THE PINK: In captivity, flamingos are fed carrot oil to keep their feathers pink. *Ranger Rick* magazine reports that carrot oil contains carotin, a chemical that gives the flamingo's feathers a pink color. Without this chemical the bird's annual growth of new feathers would be white. In the wild, a flamingo's pink color comes from the carotin in the tiny shrimp-like animals they eat.

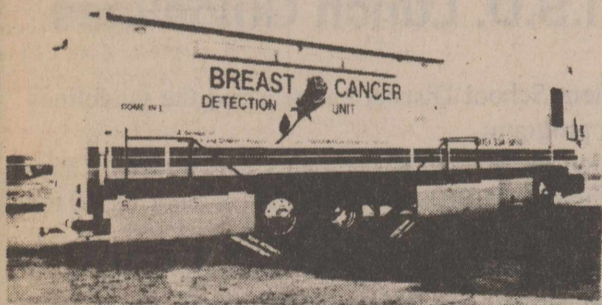

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments may be made by calling 864-2621.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Haskell on Friday, August 19th.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for a mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, VISA, MasterCard and American Express.
