Gannaway named for cotton program

Andy Gannaway, 35-year-old Haskell cotton producer, has been chosen by the National Cotton Council's industry-wide selection committee to participate in the 1988-89 Cotton Leadership Program.

Gannaway, who is also executive vice president and chief agricultural loan officer of the Haskell National Bank, is a graduate of Texas Tech University with a master's degree in agricultural economics. He also attends the Southwestern Graduate School of Banking and is a member of the Haskell County Pest Management Association.

The leadership program class, the sixth since the program began under a Cotton Foundation grant from Du Pont's Agricultural Products Department, will begin training in mid-September during the Council's fall board meeting in Memphis,

During 30 days of special activities over the coming year, the group will get a first-hand look at government operations at both state and federal levels, study industry organizations and their policy-making procedures, observe cotton research and marketing development, be trained in communication techniques, and view cotton production and processing from the Carolinas to

Sessions are scheduled in Washington, New York and various locations across the Cotton Belt.



A salad supper kicked off the participant council meeting Thursday, Aug. 4, at the Expereinced Citizens Center. The ECC has placed its emphasis on program planning for the new budget year beginning Oct.

Plans were made for the annual barbecue, Sunday, Sept. 11, from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. And a food and craft bazaar, Saturday, Nov. 19, beginning at 8:30 a.m. Orders will be taken in bake goods for this sale. Beginning Nov. 1, the center will open, for Christmas shoppers, a gift shop of handwork, paintings, crafts, etc. Items will be sold at the individual's price with 25 percent going to the ECC. The gift shop is open to any individual to sell their crafts. Details will be announced later. Each center in the region is allowed four fund-raisers a year and the ECC's first, a bake sale July 30, brought in \$720.

The planning of new programs and activities are an important part of the center's operation. The ECC is proud of the fact it has, each year, been able to match government contract with local funds dollar for dollar. The two percent (\$2,000) county match in cash is met by the county each year, but the remainder is raised by participant donations and fund-raisers

an average of 52 percent match in FY 1987-88, a little over dollar for dollar this year. The 19-county region of the state, of which Haskell County is a part, has a 51 percent match, but statewide the match is 15 percent best at 25 percent. So the 19-county region and the ECC members are to be highly commended for their

The Regional Advisory Council on Aging met Tuesday, July 26, at the West Central Texas Council of Governments Area Agency on Aging in Abilene. A review of summary of the 2-year plan update for FY 1989 was given by Dr. Lewis Lemmond, director of WCTCOG in Abilene. Dr. Lemmond reported that the budget amendment was in the final stages with delivery very soon to the Texas Department on Aging in Austin, with no anticipating reduction in funding.

Acting on a mandate from the Texas Department on Aging, all contracts for FY 1989 will be on a performance-based. Performance-based funding will be based on how many served and how much will it generate for the program. The ECC will be funded by the government. Performance is not only by participating in meals, but programs and activities in reaching others.

The Volunteer \$500 Club, the strongest program at the center (organized Aug. 2, 1982) will go into its sixth year this month. Volunteers make any center what it is because without volunteers no other center or this program could afford to serve the number of people as the ECC.

The volunteer program is made up of three teams of volunteers. Colors of red, yellow and green are used as team names. Each team has a captain who calls the volunteers their day to work on serving days. This entails many hours of their time. Iva Lee


Quilting, a main project for the ECC, is in its third year. Volunteers donate their time quilting quilts for the center. They quilt on a first-come basis. Since their 1986 Sesquicentennial quilt, the quilters have quilted 46 quilts, generating \$2,900 for the center over a 2 1/2 year period. All proceeds go into the

nutrition fund. Nutritional meals are served three times a week, Monday, Wednesday and Friday. These menus are put together by the Nutrient Standard Method of Menu Planning. They are subject to approval by WCTCOG Aging Department and Texas Department of Aging. Meals are paid by donations to the nutrition fund. On Tuesday and Thursday, art classes are given. ECC nutrition meals are served at noon. Reservation must be made by 9:30 on serving days.





Watching Washington



New crops have played a vital role in boosting our nation's agriculture industry. Some 200 years ago, for example, soybeans and wheat were new crops. Now they are staples of the industry.

It's important that we encourage the development of additional new, non-traditional crops and that we remove barriers that might stand in the way of producing them.

One of today's new crops is kenaf, a woody fiber plant and a cousin of cotton. Kenaf stands about 10 to 14 feet tall, looks like bamboo and can easily be grown close to established paper mills with dwindling wood supplies. It offers an affordable alternative to increasingly costly newsprint and other paper products.

Kenaf pulp can be substituted for wood in making high quality newsprint with few if any changes needed to existing manufacturing equipment. It can be grown where cotton is grown and harvested with equipment similar to sugar cane harvesters.

The need for a good domestic source of newsprint is underscored by the fact that foreign manufacturers have moved in to capture almost 60 percent of our newsprint market.

Kenaf is not limited to newsprint, though. Kenaf pulp in Southeast Asia is used in a multitude of products, from facial tissues and computer paper to grocery sacks and file folders.

For years, the U.S. Department of Agriculture knew about the potential for kenaf, but until recent years there was little incentive to develop it. Three years ago, I joined forces with Senator Dennis DeConcini of Ari-

zona to push an amendment through Congress requiring USDA to set up four small-scale demonstration projects, including one near a pulp mill in Southeast Texas, for making newsprint from kenaf. Another kenaf mill is now planned for the Rio Grande Valley. The time is ripe for moving ahead on kenaf-but also for encouraging

farmers to consider planting other new industrial-use crops with names like guayule, a domestic source of rubber; meadowfoam, which produces a high quality oil with numerous applications; and crambe and high erucic rapeseed, annual crops that produce oil used to manufacture nylon, plastics and lubricants.

But there is a stumbling block.

While technology is moving ahead, certain farm programs may be holding us back-many farmers continue to plant their usual, farmprogram crops because it is uneconomical to plant anything else. A corn farmer, for example, would be reluctant to plant crambe, an oil-seed crop, because it would reduce his crop acreage base, used in calculating such federal programs as deficiency payments.

I am cosponsoring legislation that would encourage farmers to plant new crops. It would direct the Secretary of Agriculture to protect farmers' acreage bases if they decide to grow these crops, allowing them to experiment with these crops and—if they don't work out—return without penalty to traditional crops.

This type of approach will encourage farmers to diversify, to keep an eye on future trends without risking the present. And it will ultimately pay dividends to all of us who depend on the U.S. agriculture industry.

different light was shed on the subject. "I can just visualize the hands that

A HELPFUL FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The American Institute of CPAs is requiring a new form of financial statement effective July 15, 1988.

The new statement is titled "Statement of Cash Flows" and is intended to replace the "Statement of Changes in Financial Position."

The primary purpose of this new statement is to provide relevant information about the cash receipts and disbursements of a company. This new statement, along with the other financial statements, should help investors

• Assess the company's ability to generate positive future net cash flows. ·Assess the company's ability to meet its obligations, its ability to pay

dividends, and its needs for external financing. · Assess the reasons for differences between net income and associated cash receipts and payments.

• Assess the effects on a company's financial position of both its cash and noncash investing and financing transactions during a given accounting

The "Statement of Cash Flows," along with the "Reconciliation of Net Income to Net Cash," should be of great assistance to business managers.

The "Statement of Cash Flows" is required to present three distinct areas of cash flows-cash from operations, cash from investing, and cash from financing. The net cash flow from these three areas is then added to or subtracted from the beginning cash and cash equivalents to present a current

The reconciliation of net income to net cash will answer a very common question. If I made a profit, where's the money now? This reconciliation starts with the net income from your profit and loss statement and makes the appropriate noncash income and expense adjustments to arrive at net cash provided by operating activities.





Church has had colorful history

The First Christian Church has enjoyed a rich and colorful history since it was organized in 1888. During January of that year, W. C. Ballard invited a young minister, J. B. Boen, to hold a revival meeting in Haskell, which was then still called "Rice Springs."

Following the three-week long meeting, 23 additions to the church were baptized. Church records show that they could be baptized only after cutting through 10 inches of ice. These 23, along with Mr. Ballard, Mrs. Shook, Mr. and Mrs. Agnew, Mr. and Mrs. Norris and Mr. and Mrs. Steele, comprised the congregation's charter members.

In 1890, Brother J. C. Stephens moved into Haskell. During his tenure here, the "old frame church" building was begun; the church met in this building for nearly 30 years.

After the turn of the century, a controversy developed concerning the use of instrumental music during the worship service. This conflict could not be resolved and several families withdrew and organized the Church of

The church enjoyed a time of growth for several years. During this time, several ministers served the congregation. Brother Walthall of Indiana was preaching for the church in 1921 when the new church building was constructed. This structure has been renovated several

times over the years and was extensively remodeled following a 1962 tornado. The church continues to use this fine facility, which has one of the largest auditoriums in

Over the years, numerous dedicated and talented servants have labored for the Lord with this church, including skilled ministers and faithful lay leaders. Many of the present day members are the direct descendants of those pioneer families who helped establish the congregation.

The Christian Church has always had a strong emphasis on missions, reflected in its support of many outreach programs. Today, the church's influence continues to be felt in several areas, including contributions to Bible colleges, evangelistic efforts and foreign missionaries.

The present minister of the congregation is Dusty Garison. A native of East Texas, Brother Garison originally came to Haskell in 1980, serving with the church for two years. He and his family moved back to Haskell in 1986. Since the church was without a minister at that time, he began to fill the pulpit for them. He and his wife, Kathy, have two boys, Travis, 7, and Drew, 2.

Many changes have taken place in the world since that cold revival meeting in 1888. As the Christian Church reflects back upon her 100 years of existence, the members can recall all those who labored and sacrificed to establish and maintain this congregation.

As the church looks forward to her second 100 years and on into the next century, may she continue to "contend for the faith once delivered to the saints." The motto of the church continues to be, "No book but the Bible; no creed but Christ. In essentials, unity; in non-essentials, liberty; in all things, charity."





Haskell I.S.D. Lunch Guidelines

Haskell Independent School District has released the guidelines for the school lunch program:

The school district serves nutritious meals every school day. Students may buy lunch for \$1.05 in the elementary school, \$1.30 for high school and 50¢ for breakfast.

Children from families whose income falls within the level shown on the pictured scale are eligible for either free meals or reduced priced meals at 40¢ for lunch and 30¢ for breakfast.

To apply for free or reduced meals, parents should fill out an application as soon as possible, sign it, and return it to the school. Please answer all questions on the form. An application which does not contain the following information cannot be processed by the school: (1) the total household income must be listed by the amount received by each household member receiving income and the type of income it is (such as wages, child support, etc.) or food stamp case number if the household is on food stamps, (2) names of all household members, (3) social security numbers of all household members 21 years of age or older or the word NONE for any household member who does not have a social security number and (4) the signature of an adult household member.

Application forms may be obtained at each public school campus. If you have any questions or need help in filling out the application form, please contact the individual campus principal. You will be notified when the application is approved or denied. All information will be confidential.



TREE TALK: Scientists speculate that some trees may have the ability to communicate with each other. International Wildlife magazine reports that willow trees, and perhaps some others, may warn trees of their own kind that insects are on the attack. When insects start nibbling on one tree, it gives off a scent that may be picked up by other trees nearby. The scent tells the other trees to produce insect repellant chemicals quickly in their leaves.

IN THE PINK: In captivity, flamingos are fed carrot oil to keep their feathers pink. Ranger Rick magazine reports that carrot oil contains carotin, a chemical that gives the flamingo's feathers a pink color. Without this chemical the bird's annual growth of new feathers would be white. In the wild, a flamingo's pink color comes from the carotin in the tiny shrimp-like animals they eat.

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments may be made by calling 864-2621.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Haskell on Friday, August 19th.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for a mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

Radiology. Those guidelines are:
1. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over -An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, VISA, MasterCard and American Express.




