#### Dispelling The Fog

By CHARLES MICHELSON Director of Piblicity, Dermocratic National Committee

The utilities party canidate, like most men suddenly talking ona new executive job, is disposed to do it all himself.

This is probably the explanation of a number of the pelitical errors with which Mr. Wilkie is beginning his campaign. Had he consulted such vetran strategists as Joe Martin, Republican leader in the House of Representatives, or any one of the other seasoned campaigners in his train, he would not, for example, have denied his Tammany membership. This event of the long Democratic peoriod in his career rose to smite him when he began his invectives against what he called the machines among the Democratic organizations. They would have known, for example, that Tammany Hall is merely a pop ular designation of the offical De mocratic organization of the Bor ough of Mathattan and that every member of the district clubs is by virtue of that membersrip a member of Tammany Hall. So when Mr. Willkie enrolled and paid dues to the Grover Cleveland Democratic Club in the silk stocking district in which he resided, he was in Tammany Hall, togather with a large number of other residents of social, political and financial emi nence.

However, Mr. illkie declared that the mention of his affiliation was a "plain and simple falsehood." This statement resluted in the publication in a great num ber of newspapers of a facsimile copy of the report of his election as a Democratic county committman on the ticket commited to retain in office the Tommany eader of the district. Maybe He Fergot That Speech

The Presdential candidate was even more emphatic in his denunciation of the statement by Secretary Ickes that he had extrolled Samuel Insull, that other utility magnate, the collapse of whose empire involved the ruin Willkie, president of the Economic Club of New York, made to that distinguished body and in which he referred to "one force ful, dynamic and attractive figure, Mr. Samuel Insull."
