Center in Wichita Falls which provides blood for patients in 41 hospitals in 35 counties in north central Texas and southern Oklahoma. One hundred pints a day are needed to since there is no monetary compensation for blood given at a collected by the Red Cross is the safest blood availabie.
While it still takes only 10 minutes to donate, the time required physical and questions has increased the donor's stay from 20 minutes to an hour. Each pint donated undergoes eight tests, including possible exposure to th
