

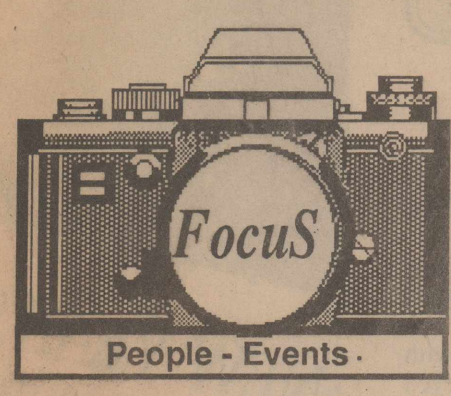

School, careers challenge youth

Research indicates that teenagers want help and guidance in the area of school and career options. Too often adults spend too much time trying to give teenagers advice about substance abuse, sex, friends and other topics that teenagers are faced with and fail to help them in the area they need the most help--planning for the future.

For this reason it is no wonder that school is teenagers' No. 1 problem.

- Teens who move and are accepted very quickly in a new school are more likely to be involved in the drug scene.
- Sixty percent say that they study to pass, not to learn.
- Fifty-five percent say they cheat in school. Of those who cheat, 58 percent say they do not feel guilty.
- Fifty-four percent say teachers do not care about the students.
- The most important criteria for a "good" teacher in the eyes of youth is "fairness."

Pressures from school include:

- Pressure from parents for grades to enter college.
- Pressure from school for career decisions and grades.
- Pressure from teachers to excel and to pass standardized tests.
- Pressure for popularity.
- Rules, overcrowding and time pressure.
- Peer pressure from other students--clothes, behavior, slang, driving, drinking, use of drugs, stealing and sex.

About 32 percent of all high school graduates 18 to 24 are enrolled in college.

Is college for everybody?

"What are you going to do when you graduate?" Of all the students in high schools, more than half will answer by going to college, the vocational or technical school. Still others will go directly to work and receive on-the-job training.

The high school years can provide teens a chance to prepare for the coming transition into the job market. First must come good preparation for whatever career is chosen. Then the teen must establish a general sense of direction into fields that interest him. Third, students should gather information by

Modern Samurai

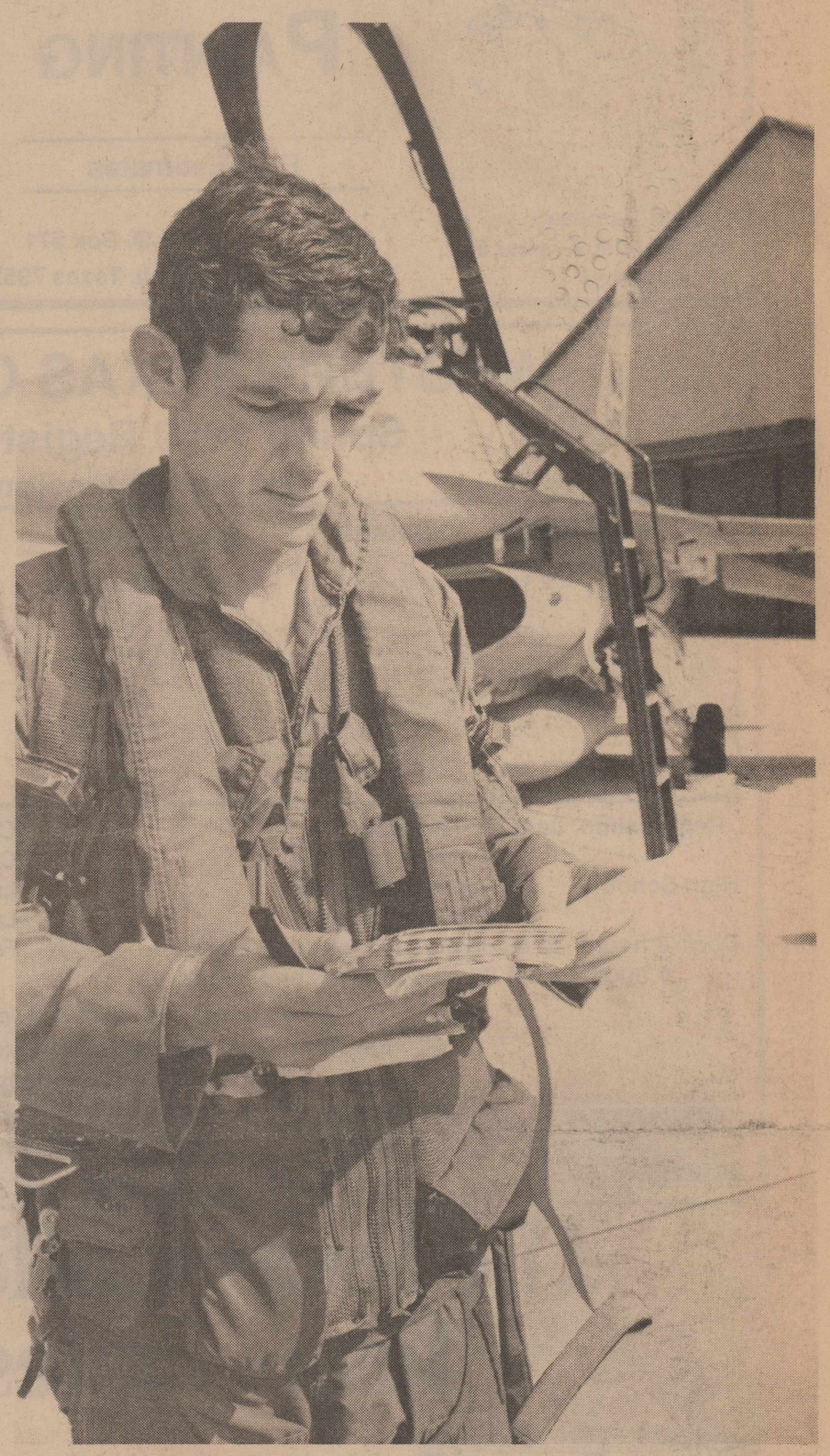
Lt. Col. Moore commands squadron of F-16s in Japan

MISAWA, JAPAN---As fog marches in from the Sea of Japan, you can almost see old Samurai warriors moving up to stop the advancing enemy. Today, Japan's modern Samurai is Air Force Lt. Col. William R. Moore.

Moore, son of William R. and Wynette F. Moore Jr. of Munday and son-in-law of Jerrene Couch of Haskell, is the commander of the 13th Tactical Fighter Squadron, and an F-16 fighter pilot at Misawa Air Base in northern Japan, the island nation's 'spearhead' of defense.

"As a pilot, I'm an instructor, teaching other pilots to be combat-ready in case of war. I teach both air-to-air and air-to-ground tactics," said Moore.

"As the commander, I'm responsible for the welfare of 40 fighter pilots, both in the air and on the ground. I lead them every day on simulated combat training missions, and I'm responsible for the 24 F-16s we fly."

Located on the northern coast of Japan, Misawa Air Base is just minutes by air from Vladivostok and Soviet military forces. The Americans and the Japan Air Self-Defense Force are the island's first line of defense.

"Being in Japan is an advantage in terms of my job. We are here because the Soviets are building up their strength in the Far East military district. Being here allows us to train as realistically as possible," said Moore.

Japan, known as the 'Land of the Rising Sun,' is rich in history and tradition. But, it is also one of the fastest growing technical and industrial nations in the world. The two facets of Japan create a contrasting view of the Americans stationed there.

"Living here among the Japanese has allowed me the chance to observe and experience another culture," said Moore. "I have had a chance to see the country and to get to know the Japanese people. We, as Americans, could do and see more if the dollar wasn't so weak against the yen. Currently, everything is very expensive, such as phone calls back to the States to loved ones.

"One of the things I think I dislike the most about Japan is the poor weather conditions in the winter."

Little more than 40 years ago, the United States and Japan were at war. The people of Japan were as mysterious to Americans as the land

they called home. However, today Japanese and Americans live and work side-by-side, developing mutual understanding and cooperation.

"The Japanese people are very friendly and very polite to each other and the Americans," said Moore.

Moore, 40, is a 1966 graduate of Munday High School. He received his

bachelor's degree in 1970 from Texas A&M University.

Moore and his wife, the former Jerre Couch of Haskell, have two daughters, Michelle, 16, and Shannon, 15.

Besides Japan, Moore has had overseas assignments to the Philippines and Korea.

Wylie next foe for Haskell teams

Haskell basketball teams travel to Wylie Friday night to take on the 3A Bulldog teams in their last non-district games of the season.

Next Tuesday, the Indians and Maidens will resume the district 7-2A campaigns at Albany.

Coach Randy Stone's Indians now stand 12-3 for the season, while Coach George Martin's Maidens are

10-5. Both the Indians and Maidens won their last outings against Seymour Dec. 20.

The Maidens who already have played three district games stand 3-0 in 7-2A competition, being the only unbeaten team in the district. The Indians have played only one district foe and stand 1-0.

No. 200 Coach reaches milestone

Last week's 85-47 victory by the Haskell Indians over the Seymour Panthers was win No. 200 for Indian Coach Randy Stone.

Stone, now in his 11th year as a varsity basketball coach, has a record of 200 wins and 91 losses.

He coached one year at Eula and eight years at Paint Creek before taking over the Indian helm at the beginning of last season.

His record with the 2A Indians is 41-9, with seven of those losses coming at the hands of 3A and 4A schools. Only defeats at the hands of 2A schools came last year to district rival Stamford and to eventual state champion Archer City in the semifinals of the state tournament.

The Indians were 29-6 last season and are 12-3 so far this year.

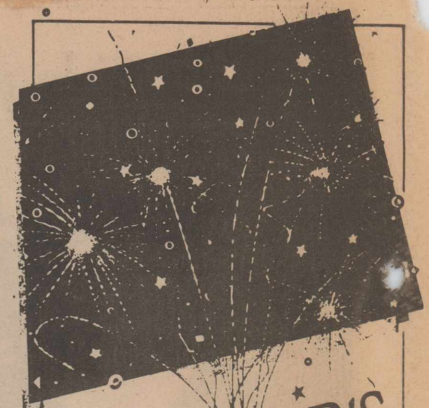

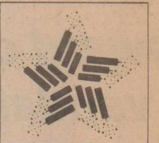

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Appointments may be made by calling 864-2621.

The Mobile Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Haskell on Friday January 6th.

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for a mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of disease). Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are:

- 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with

significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$50.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, VISA, MasterCard and American Express.

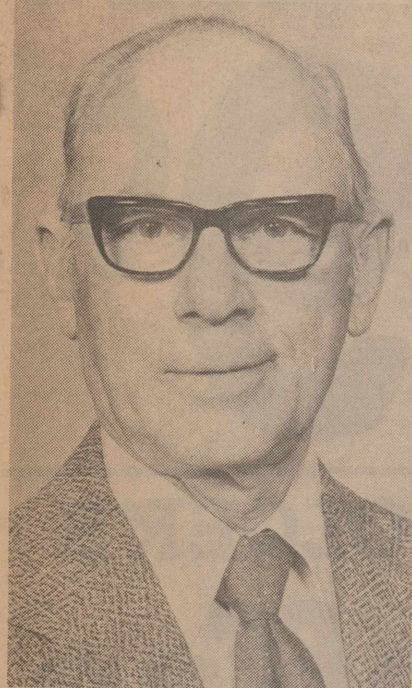

Dr. Temple W. Williams, MD, long-time Haskell physician, died Friday (Dec. 23) in Albany. He was 88 years old.

officiating. Burial was in Willow Cemetery, under direction of Holden-McCauley Funeral Home.

A member of the First United Methodist Church, Dr. Williams was the first president of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce in 1936. He was an honorary member of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. He also was a member of the American Medical Association, the Texas Medical Association and the County Medical Association.

Survivors include his wife, Mozell Williams; two sons, Dr. Temple Williams Jr. of Houston and

Fitzhugh Williams of Allen, Texas; a step-daughter, Marilynne Myers of Albany; a sister, Lou Meadors of McKinney; and four grandchildren.

Wayne Walker helps team win state

Wayne Walker, son of Tommy and Patsy Walker, was a vital part of the Class 3A state football championship team from Southlake Carroll.

Wayne is the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. John Bartley and the late Mr. and Mrs. T. C. Walker. He also has a host of uncles, aunts and cousins in the Haskell area.

The Dragons defeated the Navasota Rattlers in Waco Dec. 17 by a score of 42-8 in their state finals. After losing in the Class 3A state semifinals to McGregor last year, the Dragons were determined to capture the state title in 1988.

Against Navasota, they left no doubt who was the best Class 3A team in the state as they ended the season with a perfect 16-0 record. The defense was spectacular, as they had been all season. Only five touchdowns had been scored on them in the playoffs, and three of those were when the reserves were in.

The offensive unit was absolutely awesome as they scored in every conceivable manner. Quarterback Mike Uldrich passed for 110 yards as

he used five different receivers, including a touchdown pass to Walker. He also ran for one touchdown. Fullback Bret Malney rushed for two touchdowns. Running back David Blanchard rushed for 102 yards and one touchdown while Walker had 130 all-purpose yards. The final score was made by one of the reserves near the end of the game.

The Dragons scored 637 points this season, the third highest ever in Class 3A, and outscored their opponents 240-33 in the playoffs.

Walker's statistics are quite impressive for his senior season. In 16 games he scored 25 touchdowns, nine of them coming in the playoffs. He rushed for 1207 yards on 165 carries for an average of 7.32 yards per carry. He had a total of 400 yards receiving on 23 receptions. He also had 461 yards on kickoff returns and 403 yards on punt returns. His total all-purpose yardage was 2471 yards for the year. He performed equally well as a defensive safety. He had eight interceptions for the year, along with 30 unassisted tackles and 90 assisted tackles.

Walker commented that the state title was a dream come true. The all-district team was listed in Sunday morning's newspaper, along with the many write-ups about the championship game. Walker, along

with Uldrich, Blanchard and Gary Bohnsack (the four captains of the team) had been named to the offensive and the defensive unit's first team. A number of other players made first team one way. Several of the multi-talented players could have a chance to make all-state.

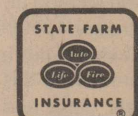
