Official disputes population estimate

Haskell's city administrator has questioned recent estimates that Haskell has lost 517 in population

Robert Baker said the statistical data used by the State Data Center (SDC) in arriving at the figure "does not fit Haskell."

He claimed the estimates, based primarily on births, deaths and school enrollment, do not reflect the makeup of the population of the community.

He said city utility connections (water meter turn-ons) show that the city is more than holding its own. Last year, for instance, the city turned on 195 connections while turning off

The SDC estimate placed the 1987 population of Haskell at 3286, compared to an official 3782 in 1980.

There have been ups and downs in Haskell's population ever since the first federal census was taken here in

Estimated population of the young town was placed at 800 in 1900. But 10 years later, an official census counted 2346, a staggering 193percent increase over the estimate of

Apparently World War I curtailed the flow of settlers since the 1920 population of 2300 represented a

slight decline in the number of Haskell residents.

By 1930, the population had climbed to 2632 and the population of the county had hit an all-time high of 16,669.

In 1940, the federal census gave Haskell a population of 3051, although the population of the county (14,905) had begun a decline which continues to this day.

World War II obviously did not affect the town's growth as WWI had done since Haskell experienced its second greatest decade of growth between 1940 and 1950, the population increasing nearly 800 to

Growth continued at a slower rate, over the next decade but the 1960 census gave Haskell a population of 4016, still a record.

The population dropped to 3655 in the 1970 censues, but climbed back to 3782 in 1980.

The population of Haskell County hit its all-time high in the 1930 census when the federal government recognized 16669 Haskell County citizens. It has declined steadily in every census since.

First head count gave Haskell County a population of 48 in 1880. By 1890, this had increased to 1665. The 1900 census was 2637. The next

Mental health services offered

Services for persons with mental retardation in Haskell County are provided by the Community Services Division of Abilene State School, the designated mental retardation authority for this area. The services provided are designated to assist families in any way possible and are developed to meet individual needs.

Community non-residential services include diagnostic and evaluation services, case management services, vocational training, daily living skills training and family support services.

In Haskell, vocational services are provided through the Haskell Training Center which offers supported employment for mentally retarded persons who are not ready for competitive employment. They earn wages through contract work while also working on functional living

Those in the program are being taught the skill of rag rug weaving. An Orco loom was purchased for this project and used clothing, denim jeans, blankets, sheets, etc. are being used as materials to create the rugs. Hand weaving allows for individuality and creativity as well as pride in accomplishment.

The center would like donations of used clothing or materials (cottons, cotton/polyester, denim). Double knit fabric cannot be used. The location of the center is 300 North 1st St.

Bugs are no problem for wheat

A lot has been written and discussed about wheat problems and pests lately. Several articles have appeared in print about greenbugs. True, it is that time of the year to start "worrying" about potential greenbug problems. However, other than weather effects, I have not seen wheat affected by greenbugs or other insects this year.

Dryland root rot and just plain hotter and dryer than normal conditions have hurt the wheat to this point. Most producers who have treated for greenbugs have also applied fertilizer in some proportion. This is the primary reason for a general "better" appearance than other untreated wheat. Those areas that have had some rain or snow have benefited from this combination.

Droughty wheat will tolerate less insect pressure than normal and should be watched closely during the next two to three months. Greenbugs and Russian wheat aphids are sure to be a problem since weather conditions have been most favorable for them.

A couple of generations ago, I spent 731 days in the U.S. Army. I never once saw a general. Closest I ever came was when I saw a staff car, which supposedly carried the post commander of Fort Sill, a major

I can recall seeing only one bird colonel, but presume I must have seen at least two or three. I saw only a handful of lieutenant colonels and a few majors.

Today's military is full of highranking officers. Of 2,123,411 men and women in the armed forces, there are 14,507 above the rank of colonel in the Army, Air Force and Marines and the corresponding rank of captain in the Navy.

That's almost as many highranking officers as we had in 1945 when 12,123,455 men and women were in the service. Back then there were just 17,057 high-ranking officers. There was one for every 710 soldiers or sailors. Today there's a chief for every 146 Indians.

George Bush, the 40th man to become president, is the 41st president. (Grover Cleveland is counted twice since his two terms were non-consecutive.) And he's only the 34th man to be elected president (Tyler, Fillmore, A. Johnson, Arthur and Ford were not elected).

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by drought conditions are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office in Haskell, said Larry McDaniel, FmHA county supervisor.

Haskell and Trockmorton counties are two of 46 in Texas recently named by the secretary of agriculture as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the drought freeze.

McDaniel said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, which ever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of prodution to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," McDaniel said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until Sept. 11, but farmers should apply as soon as possible," McDaniel said. "Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season.'

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on

decade was the young county's greatest period of growth as the population increased to 16,249 by 1910. There was a decrease in the teen years of World War I as the 1920 count dropped to 14,193, but the 1920s saw the population climb to the record 16669 by the end of the

By 1940, the population of Haskell County had declined to 14.905. It was 13.736 in 1950. 11,174 in 1960, 8,512 in 1970 and 7,725 in 1980.

In 1910, 85 percent of the county's residents resided outside the city of Haskell. By 1930, this percentage had declined only to 84. But by 1980, it had dropped to less than 55 percent. The Texas Department of Commerce's most recent estimate puts the current percentage at 51.







WTU gets OK to increase rates

West Texas Utilities has received permission to recover the cost of a replacement fuel contract at its Rio Pecos power station near McCamey. The station, one of nine operated by the utility, has been burning the higher-priced replacement gas since late December.

"A residential customer using 1000 kilowatt hours of electricity a month will see his average bill go from \$78.42 to \$82.77," said Mike Martindale, WTU's Haskell manager. The actual increase in a customer's bill will vary depending on usage level, the customer group and time of

The company has different summer and winter rates as directed by the Public Utility Commission of Texas. The PUCT regulates utility rates in Texas, and it was this state agency which authorized the latest increase.

Although the average cost of fuel on the company's many fuel contracts has not changed significantly, the replacement costs on this pre-oil embargo gas contract were nine times higher than the old price. The old contract at 22 cents per million BTUs had saved customers \$350 million over its 20-year life, WTU claims.

"We would like to have kept those

prices and not changed any of our fuel costs to customers, but the contract expired," Martindale said. The local manager added that WTU has lowered its fuel factor five times since 1985, and had six refunds totaling almost \$50 million as the result of other contract changes.

Fuel is burned at power stations to produce electricity. It makes up approximately 36 percent of the cost of electricity. The costs are passed through directly to the customer, Martindale said, with the utility making no profit on fuel costs.

WTU customers will see the increase starting on Feburary bills. The company in September initially asked for permission to change the fuel factor portion of the bill. This provided four months for regulatory review before the higher fuel charges were needed.

Haskell is one of 52 West Texas counties served by WTU.


After he graduates in May, Cole plans to continue his education by enterting Angelo State University in San Angelo.
