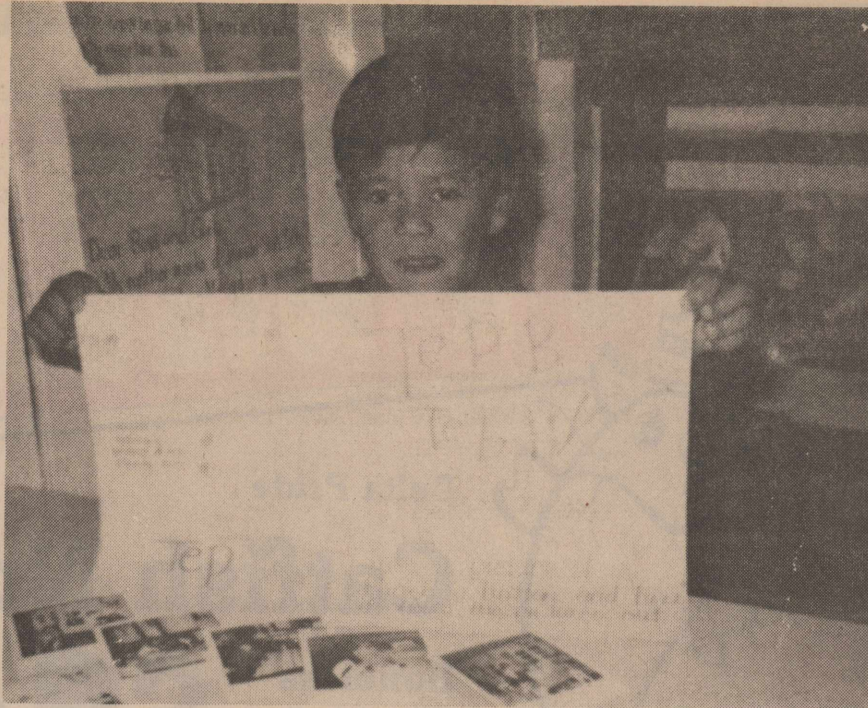

Stenholm opposes cut in target prices

Rep. Charles Stenholm told the National Cotton Council's annual meeting in Dallas last week that he doesn't support cutting target prices in new 1990 farm legislation, but he does advocate some kind of paid land diversion as a way for short term budget requirements to be met.

Stenholm, a member of the House Agriculture Committee, also called for a triple base system as another option for meeting requirements of the Gramm-Rudman budget-cutting

process. Under Stenholm's proposed system, a producer would be required to idle or plant 10 percent of his remaining base without the aid of government income price supports.

"This is one way to meet budget numbers and continue us in a market direction of being competitive in world markets," said the congressman.

In a related development, the Council requested that the secretary of agriculture exercise his discretionary authority to adjust the Adjusted World Price to whatever level necessary to allow U.S. cotton to be priced competitively in domestic and overseas markets.

The Council also called on the Bush administration to support research and promotion legislation in Congress to ensure the future stability and growth of the U.S. cotton industry.

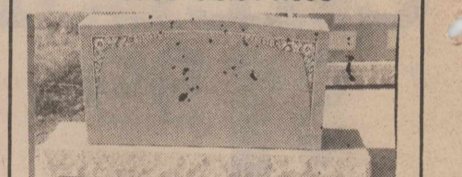

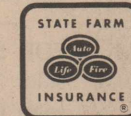
