

## **Teacher** appointed to council

Newest member of the Haskell City Council is Jill Druesedow.

Her appointment to the unexpired term of Larry McMillin was made at Tuesday's (April 11) meeting of the City Council. Mayor Greg Melton recommended her appointment and the council approved the recommendation. McMillin had one year left on his two-year term.

Mrs. Druesedow, an English and journalism teacher at Haskell High School, became the second woman ever to serve on the City Council. (Franciene Johnson was a councilwoman, and later mayor).

Married to Gary Druesedow, the 39-year-old educator is the mother of two sons, Harrison, 10, and Dawson,

She is a native of Odessa and holds bachelor and master degrees in education from Midwestern State University. She taught at Wichita Falls High School (1972-76) and Stamford High School (1976-80) before she began her teaching duties at Haskell in 1980.

She was the first television newswoman in a 100-mile radius of Wichita Falls when she was with KFDX-TV in that city. As an English and journalism teacher at Wichita Falls, she was the youngest department chairman in that school system.

She also taught English seven years (1976-83) at the Haskell extension of Western Texas College, and was a correspondent for the Abilene Reporter-News from 1977 to



# Reward offered for apprehension of glass breakers

The City of Haskell Tuesday offered a \$500 cash reward for information leading to the identity and apprehension of the persons responsible for thousands of dollars worth of glass breakage late Sunday night or early Monday morning.

Thirty-one vehicles suffered smashed windshields and/or windows and two businesses sustained broken windows in what was probably the most widespread act of vandalism in the city's history.

Most certainly, few, if any, incident ever created such an outcry of

Except for a couple of vehicles at one residence south of town whose windows were smashed, the damage was confined within the city of Haskell. There appeared to be no pattern of destruction as damage was reported from all areas of the city.

The glass breakage at the businesses was at M Stystem and Modern Way. WW Motors apparently was the only other business hit, but damage there was to the windshields of cars parked on the used car lot. Most of the other cars damaged were parked at homes.

Haskell County Sheriff Johnny Mills said officers had retrieved a half of a baseball bat at M System and another half of a bat at a residence on North Avenue C. They were sent to Abilene in hopes that fingerprings could be found on them.

Anyone with information on the vandalism spree is urged to contact the sheriff's or police department in Haskell. In announcing the \$500 reward, the City emphasized that the identify of anyone submitting information will be kept confidential.

## City changes insurance

The City Council last Tuesday accepted the low bid of Hartford Insurance Co. to provide health insurance for city employees.

City administrator Robert Baker said the bid of \$97.11 monthly per employee is about \$40 per employee lower than the premium now being paid for city insurance.

At last week's council meeting, the city also approved a request to send policeman Steve Grand to a crime prevention school in Abilene May 22-26. Baker said his certification in conducting security and fire checks would enable Haskell homeowners to qualify for insurance discounts.

Baker also told the council that a good water well has been dug at the RV park. The 32-foot well will pump 50 gallons per minute and Ervin Frierson will build a pump house, the administrator said. He also announced to the council that Koch Oil Co has donated pipe for goals at the soccer

# Joy McKeever signs with UTA


Haskell Maiden track sensation Joy McKeever last Wednesday signed a letter of intent to attend the University of Texas at Arlington on an athletic scholarship.

"Whether the service is public, civic or professional, my commitment will be to encourage these services by providing an atmosphere conducive to progress."



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# Study club has program on drugs

The Progressive Study Club met April 13 in the community room. The program, "Crime Prevention---With Designs on Development: Dealing with Drugs," was directed by Nelda Lane. President Reatha Mullins called the meeting to order and asked Jennifer Burgess to introduce the

Mrs. Lane introduced guest speakers, Kimberly Guess Setser and Evelyn Mayfield Ricketts. Both are assigned to the narcotics division. They are cousins and have worked

Mrs. Setser, a Weinert High School graduate, who attended Hardin-Simmons University, is employed by the Richardson Police Department. She has worked in the youth detention division and as a patrolman but has been an undercover narcotics agent since 1987

Her goal is to find drug dealers. Waiters and waitresses are innocent looking dealers, also a pet shop owner. She told how she made an inquiry to purchase drugs at a car wash and a man immediately took her to a place. A delivery case, such as selling to an officer, carries a higher sentence. Some other cases are possession, delivery-possession and buy bust.

Mrs. Setser told how lax the court system is at times. A 10-year sentence may not be more than six months in jail, where even the business may go on. A dealer is hurt more when home, car and/or property is taken. Richardson has a population of 85,000 but only 140 policemen. Twelve are females. They are allowed to work in Grand Prairie, Mesquite and other nearby cities.

Mrs. Ricketts, also a Weinert graduate who attended HSU, is employed by the Dallas Police Department which has 60 narcotics agents, a small number when compared to the amount of drug traffic. She told of the Drug Abuse Resistant Education (DARE) program to inform children what inhalants such as spray paint and glue will do

She presented slides which showed how drugs are manufactured, their characteristics, how they can be detected and how they can be passed in the most innocent-looking ways, such as the bottom of a Pringle can. Dogs also are used to detect drugs. Drug paraphernalia also were on display. Mrs. Ricketts assured her superiors that it was safe for her to share information and displays to club members and guests.






## Clements opposes cigarette tax boost

AUSTIN-Donning bright plaid coats, lawmakers last week feted Gov. Bill Clements' 72nd birthday, but nothing was louder than his threat to veto a proposed cigarette tax.

Meanwhile, after House liberals stymied a bill to limit the political ambitions of future attorneys



general, Clements blasted Attorney General Jim Mattox for touring the grisly Matamoros, Mexico murders scene, implying that it was a ploy for front-page cover-

Clements, now the oldest governor to serve Texas, said the sevencent cigarette tax wasn't needed and vowed to veto it.

House Speaker Gib Lewis and Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby supported the new tax, but the governor's stance probably kills the issue.

Sponsors wanted the tax to get \$400 million more in matching federal aid for Medicaid, and the Senate had just passed its \$46.7 billion budget, which for the first time in anyone's memory, is smaller than the House version.

Clements' veto threat also forced the Senate to reconsider its approval of a \$330 million bond program to build new prisons and possibly add \$140 million for renovation of the State Capitol.

One month ago, lawmakers were begging the comptroller to release extra money for what they said were needed programs.

Elaborate Renovation

The money was found. Now they're on the verge of spending \$140 million to totally renovate the

The new prison construction is mandated by a rederal court order. while the massive renovation of the Capitol is not. Observers contend talk of the elaborate renovation on the heels of begging for bare bones jeopardizes the credibility of this

The Senate is expected to pass a bond package to fund both projects. The House has been inclined to avoid new bonds and use general revenues. Differences remain to be worked out.

House debate on a proposed \$46.9 billion budget should begin next week.

### Clements Jabs Mattox

Shortly after Mattox appeared on front pages and prime time news spots, Clements indicated Mattox elbowed his way into a Brownsville press conference about the Matamoros ritual murders for political purposes.

Mattox is an unannounced candidate for governor in 1990.

When asked why Mattox was in Brownsville, the governor replied: "I don't know. I don't have any idea. Maybe he's going to go

as far as I know, he has no authority whatsoever. He has no jurisdiction. He has no purpose in being down there-except perhaps to get in front of a television

Mattox' office responded he was invited by the Cameron County sheriff days before the murder scene was discovered.

"It's just one more thing Bill Clements doesn't understand...surprise, surprise," jibed Mattox' press secretary.

Another press staffer said, "Mattox was trying to do this quietly. He wasn't trying to get press out of it." No one, absolutely no one, believed that.

Ironically, Mattox' visit to Matamoros occurred at the same time his allies in the House stalled a bill they labeled "anti-Mattox."

The bill would limit the AG to a single six year term and bar him from holding another political office until two years after quitting

The bill's sponsor, Rep. Stan Schlueter, D-Killeen, denied the bill targets Mattox, who will be long gone by the time it ever becomes law, but said the AG's office has become the most powerful in the state, a political monster which daily faces conflicts of interest. He vowed to come up with the 20 votes needed for passage.

Wildlife Overhaul

The embattled Texas Parks & Wildlife Department, reeling from stories of favoritism and illegalities in providing fish and wildlife stock to private citizens, is going to overhaul that program.

The nine-member board will hold public hearings to dispel any impressions that one must be a legislator to qualify for stocking.

The agency has been rocked in recent weeks by a series of revelations of privileges for public officials, including the agency's chairman and House Speaker Lewis, apparently at taxpayers' expense.

50 Percent Funding

Comptroller Bob Bullock said the state should get back to the "50 percent level" of funding local school districts, and that new money for schools should go to poor districts.

Bullock said he does not favor taking from rich districts to give to the poor, the so-called "Robin Hood approach," but he does oppose state increases to rich districts.

"People say this is an ethnic problem, an Hispanic problem. But there are more poor school districts in East Texas and the Dallas-Fort Worth Metroplex than along the border," he said.

### Ask VA

Q: Are veterans with a serviceconnected disability seeking Veterans Administration medical care exempt from the VA's Means Test?

A: All veterans with serviceconnected illnesses or disabilities are provided non-cost care regardless of income. Did you know that Paducah really

is the "Crossroads of America"? I've seen that slogan but never understood what it meant until I saw this piece in Patty Adams' column in the Paducah Post the other day:

"One of only two places in the United States where three U.S. highways (coast to coast and border to border) intersect is right here in Paducah. Highway 83 runs from north to south from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico at Brownsville. Highway 70 runs east and west from the Atlantic in North Carolina to the Pacific at San Francisco. Highway 62 winds from New York to El Paso/Juarez.'

"Finished this day---and I hope to God it's good.'

That's how John Steinbeck ended his day's work on Oct. 26, 1938. Just five months earlier, he had begun what would be his masterpiece, The Grapes of Wrath.

Steinbeck wrote not from an outline, but from a passionate conviction to put into words the story of the Joad family's epic journey from the Oklahoma dust bowl to the "promised land" of California during the height of the Great Depression.

When it was published in April 1939, The Grapes of Wrath was both widely praised and damned for its blunt naturalism and its depiction of the courage, nobility and enduring strength of the common man. Even after winning a Pulitzer Prize in 1940, the controversy surrounding its radical vision did not abate. Today it is the second most banned American book in schools and libraries (Catcher in the Rye is the first).

Dorothy Parker called The Grapes of Wrath "the greatest American novel I have ever read." And the citation accompanying the Nobel Prize awarded Steinbeck in 1962 described the novel as his "great work ... the epic chronicle."

After all these years, that judgment still stands.

Unfortunately, he now cannot be trusted in this area of politics because of his unwavering support for a waiting period before purchasing guns. Despite receiving opposition and not being able to publish any evidence otherwise, he maintains this is what the 17th district wants. Mr. Stenholm supposed informal polls do not give him the authority to violate the Bill of Rights. No U.S. representative should have the discretion to bargain with the right to keep and bear arms for it is that right upon which all others depend.

I wish more people could see the real depth of the gun control issue and that is one of freedom. Gun control has not been proven to be an effective deterrant of crime. Mr. Stenholm and his colleagues only have to look out their back porches in Washington to see this. Washington, D.C., has some of the country's most strict gun control laws and also can brag of having the country's highest murder rate (151 murders this year to date).

Can Mr. Stenholm guarantee that a gradual infringement of rights imposed on us by a waiting period will stop? In 1913, our income tax rate was three percent. Medicare began in 1965 with an annual \$200 million budget. Food stamps now consume \$12 billion annually. Too bad our Congress doesn't have the courage to put the same amount of energy into reforming wrongs as they do something as useless as a waiting

I hope the voters of the 17th district remember this before the next election.



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
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
