Haskell faces new landfill regulations

The new regulations concerning sanitary landfills were discussed at the regular Thursday night council meeting.

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and the Texas Department of Health are making preparations to enforce new rules at all landfills. Most of these requirements will have a direct effect on the City of Haskell's landfill.

The following is a list of the regulations as currently submitted:
-Daily cover of all trash

-Daily cover of -Gas control

-Gas control
-Open burning prohibited

-24-hour access control
-Extensive drainage control to

control run-off
-No discharge of water from site

-No liquids allowed -Prevention of hazardous wastes

-Post-closure will be for 30 years -Financial assurances

-Some landfills will require liners

to control groundwater contamination

-Monitoring of groundwater
These rules will be strictly
enforced at all landfills. The last
State legislature passed a bill that

charges an additional 50 cents a ton fee to be used for enforcement of these regulations. This fee will cost the City of Haskell an additional \$2,000 annually.

The bill also mandates a solid waste management plan and encourages cooperative efforts between local governments in siting and disposal of solid wastes. The Regional Council of Governments has been charged to coordinate these management plans. The emphasis seems to be regional landfills.

Several local communities have indicated they will close their landfills prior to the Sept. 1, 1989. Their trash will be hauled to Abilene or another regional landfill. The City of Haskell has no plans to close its landfill. The City has been using this site since 1984 and very little land has been used.

The solid waste disposal is not just a local problem. The EPA is coordinating the national efforts. Some of the proposed programs will be incentives to recycle; new requirements regarding packaging of merchandise; waste to energy sites; and composting of yard waste.

Texas Cowboy Reunion celebration opens Friday

The Texas Cowboy Reunion, considered the world's largest amateur rodeo, will mark its 59th annual celebration June 30, July 1, 3 and 4 with nightly rodeos, dances and other colorful traditions.

Since there has never been a Sunday show, nightly performances will be Friday, Saturday, Monday and Tuesday in order to follow tradition with a Fourth of July celebration.

The Rocking K Championship Rodeo Company from Lawton, Okla., provided a competitive show last year with their rodeo stock and will be at the TCR again this year.

TCR contestants are mostly working cowboys from the large and small spreads in Texas, New Mexico and Oklahoma.

Several changes incorporated last year, including steer riding for the youngsters, should be a big hit again.

The world famous Hardin-Simmons Cowboy Band will continue in tradition by providing the musical entertainment at the rodeo performances that begin with the colorful grand entry at 8 p.m. each night

Bill and Nancy McEnaney of Rossville, Tenn., having performed at nearly every major rodeo throughout the United States, have been contracted to entertain the crowds with trick riding, roping and comedy for additional excitement, surprise and

The downtown parade will kick off events for the 59th annual TCR on Friday, June 30, at 3 p.m. The theme for the parade is "CLOWNS-enthusiasm, energy, entertainment".

Jody Nix with the "The Texas Cowboys" will be the official parade marshall. Nix is the son of West Texas legend, Hoyle Nix, and took over his band after the senior Nix's death in 1985.

The Texas State Society selected Nix to ride and play country music on the TEXAS float in the inaugural parade and was selected to play for President and Mrs. Bush at the inaugural ball.

Over 35 of the country's top Western Artists will have their work displayed in the 16th annual Stamford Art Foundation Exhibit and Sale.

The Gallery is open until 9 p.m. each evening of the rodeo for selling and viewing with benefits going to the West Texas Rehabilitation Centers in Abilene and San Angelo.

The Oldtimers Association has scheduled for the first time an Arts and Crafts Show in conjunction with the TCR July 1-4 in the Roundup Hall and Bunkhouse.

The Cowboy Country Museum, on the square in Stamford, contains many items of the area's heritage and offers a glimpse of yesterday. Hours are 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. Monday through Friday with special hours for rodeo visitors.

Following the rodeo each night, Jody Nix and "The Texas Cowboys" will provide music for listening and dancing pleasure on the slab at the TCR grounds.

The pilot experiencing the worst crash of the day will receive a prize. A prize also will be given to the pilot who traveled the fartherest distance to attend the fly-in.


A raffle will be held for a radio control set and kit and drawings will be held all day for other merchandise.

The bride is a graduated of Paint Creek High School and is employed by Winns.






Eighty-three children strong, they presented "Invasion of the Quarter Snatchers", Time and Place: May
