## Perry switches to Republican party

State Rep. Rick Perry announced last Friday that he had changed his political party affiliation from Democrat to Republican.

His announcement came during a press conference on the steps of the State Capitol in Austin.

It also came amid speculation that the three-term legislator from Haskell will seek a higher political office.

While saying he would file for election to his present seat as a Republican "if the filing deadline were today", Perry admitted that he is weighing other options.

One of those options is running for State Agriculture Commissioner, another is a race for the Railroad Commission and a third is a campaign for the State Senate.

In announcing his party switch, Perry said he felt it was time for a change. "In the last two months I have sat down and truly dissected the political landscape," he said. "I made a conscious decision in the last 30 days that this is what I wanted to do."

"I haven't changed," Perry said. "I'm still the same. If the Democrats who are in control of the Democratic

party in Austin and in the nation were like the Democrats or people who call themselves Democrats that I represent out there in our part of Texas, I would still be a Democrat."

Perry, who has been a delegate to the state Democratic Convention since 1978, was first elected to the House in 1984. He was re-elected in

1986 and again in 1988.

Among those on hand Friday to welcome Perry into the Republican party were U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm and Railroad Commissioner Kent Hance, a couple of former Democrats. Fred Meyer, state Republican chairman, and State Rep. Bob Hunter of Abilene also attended.

### Rainfall total below normal

Haskell rainfall stood more than four inches below normal at the end of the first nine months of the year, Sam Herren, official recorder, reported this week.

Herren said the September total was 3.02 inches, bringing the year's total to 15.33 inches. This compares with a normal 19.55 inches for the January-through-September period.

September saw a record tied for a low temperature when the mercury dipped to 37 degrees on Sept. 24, matching the record set on Sept. 21, 1983. High temperature for the month was 103 degrees on Sept. 1.

### Rule celebrates Saturday

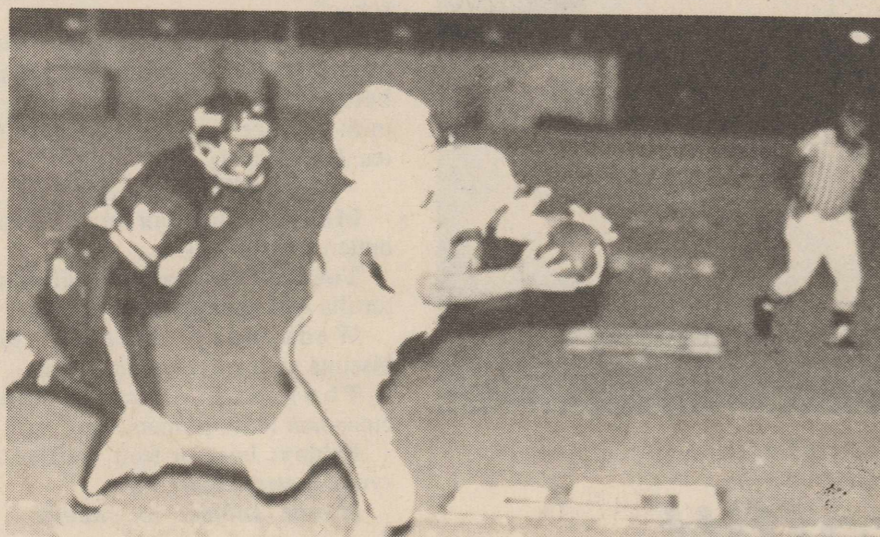
Rule throws its annual Jubilee Saturday and a large crowd is expected in the Haskell County town to take part in the event.

## Indians have date with tough Rotan

Haskell has the opportunity Friday to close out its non-district schedule with a winning record when the Indians travel to Rotan to take on the unbeaten 1A Yellowhammers. Game time is 8 p.m.

The task won't be easy for Coach Nelson Coulter's Indian team which saw its record dip to 2-2 last week with a 28-18 loss at Electra.

In case there is any need for an incentive, the coach might remind his team of last year's Rotan game when the Yellowhammers clobbered the Indians, 20-0, in a game much more one-sided than the score indicated.

Rotan is unbeaten after four games. The Yellowhammers opened the season with a 6-6 tie against O'Donnell in a game played in a driving rainstorm. Since then, they have beaten Cross Plains, 55-0; Spur, 20-7; and last week knocked off defending 7-2A champion Anson, 27-9.

Rotan features one of the area's most prolific running backs in the person of Joe Huitt. The 195-senior

tailback, who won state track championships last spring in both the 100- and 200-meter dashes, had a field day against the Indians last year, rushing 25 times for 158 yards.

Haskell coaches were somewhat disappointed at the Indians' showing at Electra and Coulter indicated early this week that there might well be some changes made in the defensive lineup.

Offensively, the Indians turned in a creditable performance in the second half, but two quick touchdowns by Electra in the first half got them in a hole from which they never emerged.

Haskell's offense is centered around the passing of the quarterback tandem of Shane Osborne and Rusty Stocks, who combined for 19 completions in 27 attempts last week, and the running of fullback Rodney Johnson. Johnson gained 140 yards last week on just 12 carries, one of them being a 68-yard touchdown run.

Next week, the Indians will travel to Hamlin to open their district 7-2A season.

## Sales tax collections drop

Sales tax allocation payments to the City of Haskell this month totaled \$10,023.69.

This was 6.56 percent less than the \$10,727.31 received in September of last year.

For the first nine months of 1989, the City has now received \$119,285.98, up just slightly from last year's figure of \$118,565.18 for the same period.

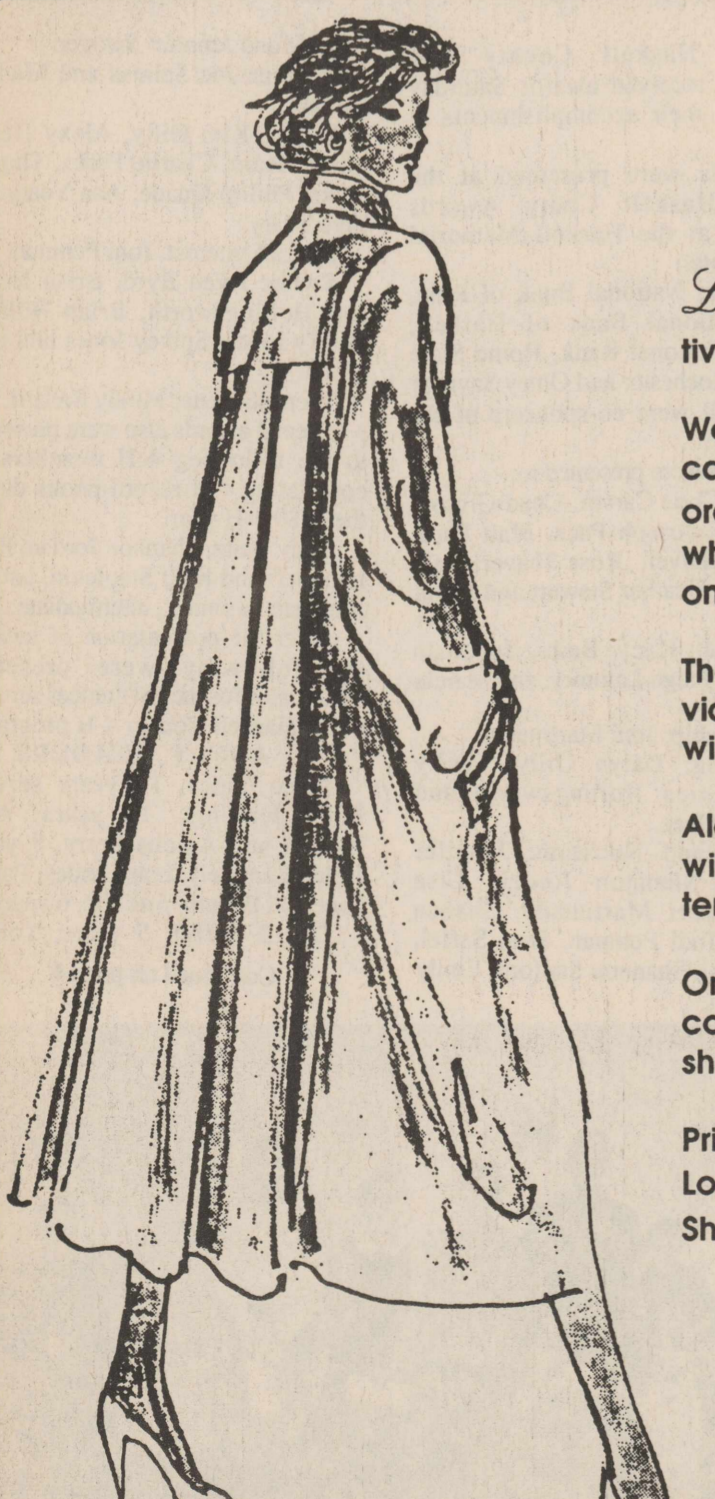

Editor: I am enclosing a copy of an article I wrote to the Abilene Reporter-News early in 1989 when the issue of Congressmen raising their own salaries was a topic of discussion.

It was never printed, even though I wrote two followup letters. No explanation was ever given me.

Now that the issue is again a "household word," I'm requesting that it be printed in your newspaper.

Editor: Much has been said of late about Congressmen trying to raise their own salaries 51 percent. The attempt failed, and I commend our own Congressman, Charles Stenholm, and Rick Perry for opposing the issue.

This would be a controversial

matter, but up to this time I haven't found anyone that agrees with me, except, perhaps the Congressmen who favored the raise.

To explain my views on the matter:

If the Congressmen should not raise their salaries, then the doctors should not charge a larger fee for his services that they did in the past. The lawyer, likewise, should hold to the fee he charged in the past years. The handyman, or the teenager who mows your lawn in the summer should not charge \$20 instead of \$3 or \$4 that was adequate in the past.

In 1974 I was talking to one of the trustees of the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock. He said, and I quote: "We are trying our best to hold the hospital cost to \$35 per day per room." I was in Hendrick Medical Center in Abilene for surgery from Dec. 2-15, 1987. The bill for room and board only was well over \$500 per day. That did not include the extra attention such as shots, blood samples, etc., just room and board only. That is 1500 percent more in 15 years or less.

Sometime during the Kennedy administration, the steel workers won a strike and were given a raise. The steel manufacturers intended to raise the price of steel accordingly, but President Kennedy just plain talked them out of it. It was just one step to curb the vicious cycle which has almost ruined our economy.

So, Congressman, why not get a raise?

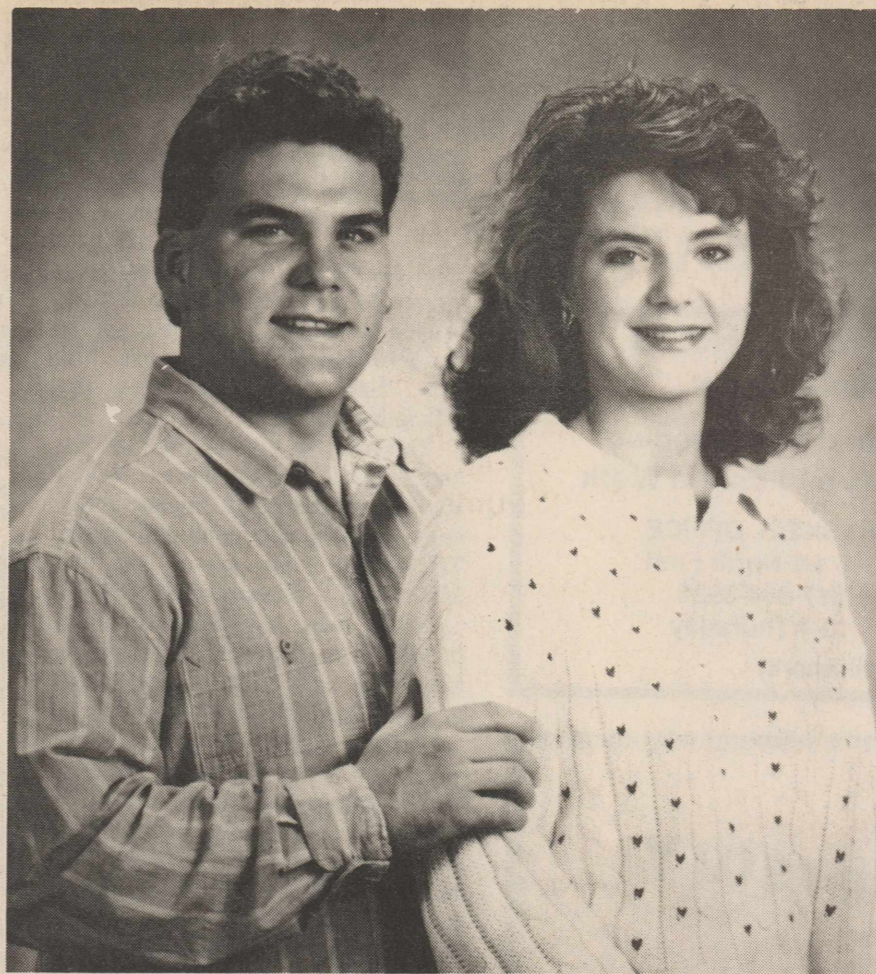
**New FFA officers preside at meeting**

# Indians fall to Electra, 28-18

Electra is still unbeaten. But the Tigers are no longer untested or unscored on. Haskell's Indians battled the highly favored Tigers on pretty even terms Friday night, before finally falling by a respectable 28-18 score.

The Tigers scored the first two times they had the ball to build up a 14-0 advantage, but otherwise, the Indians played their best game of the year. The three touchdowns they scored represent the only points given up this season by Electra.

The Indians piled up 353 net yards, 202 of them coming on 19 pass completions, as they averaged 7.5 yards per snap.

Electra wasted no time getting on the scoreboard. The first time the Tigers got the ball, they went 62 yards in four plays with Travis Box getting the touchdown from 8 yards out. Darrell Gee's extra-point kick gave the Tigers a 7-0 lead at the 7:55 mark.

Next time the Tigers got the ball, they marched 84 yards in a time-consuming 16 plays with Box going over for the score less than two minutes deep into the second period. Gee's boot made the score 14-0 and it appeared the Indians might be in for a long evening.

But the Indian offense came to life. Jonathon Dever returned the Electra kickoff to the 23 and the Indians then started moving the ball. A 13-yard pass from Shane Osborne to Dever, a 19-yard strike from Rusty Stocks to Harper Stewart, a 19-yard run by Rodney Johnson and then a 14-yarder

by Johnson powered the Indians to the Electra 6 where they had a first and goal. A fumbled handoff and a quarterback sack moved the Indians back to the 17 and on third down, the Tigers' Tyrone Weaver intercepted Stocks' pass in the end zone and returned it to the 12.

Each team had one more possession in the second period, but neither could score so they went to intermission with Electra leading by the 14-0 score.

The Indians finally lit up their side of the scoreboard at the 3:09 mark of the third quarter when Johnson took a pitchout from Stocks and scooted 15 yards to paydirt. Johnson's touchdown came on the end of an 85-yard drive which had been highlighted by passes of 20 yards (Osborne to Johnson), 16 yards (Stocks to Harper Stewart), 19 yards (Stocks to Craig Hanson) and 13 yards (Osborne to Stewart). Roger Roewe's extra-point kick attempt was blocked by Electra's Timmy Bellah,

but the Indians were on the scoreboard.

Electra came right back. Seven plays after the Indian kickoff, the Tigers' Juan Hernandez scored from 5 yards out on the first play of the final period to cap a 57-yard drive. Gee's extra point made it 21-7.

The two teams then exchanged possessions before Haskell took over again at its own 32 following an Electra punt. On first down from that point, Johnson electrified the crowd by running 68 yards. A 2-point conversion attempt was foiled, but the Indians had narrowed the gap to 21-12 with 7:16 to go.

Electra came back with one of its patented ball-control drives. After Roewe kicked off into the end zone, the Tigers used 11 plays to drive 80 yards for their fourth touchdown. Harroll Willett scored the TD from the 2 and Gee's boot made it 28-12 with 49 seconds left.

But that was plenty of time for the Indians to score again. After the Indians took over on their 26 following the Electra kickoff, Haskell scored in three plays. Osborne ran for 15 yards to the 41, Stocks passed 45 yards to Jeremy Fuentes to the 14,

and then Osborne passed 14 yards for a touchdown to Stewart. Again, the Indians went for the 2-point conversion, but again they were denied.

Only 18 seconds remained after the Indians' final touchdown, just time enough for the kickoff and one more play by Electra.

### DO SOME YEAR-END PLANNING

Only a small percentage of individuals spend more time planning for their financial futures than they spend reading the *T.V. Guide*. Tax dollars saved or deferred are an essential part of financial planning and wealth accumulation. Some time spent on year-end tax planning is likely to provide a good return.

The tax laws have changed dramatically over the past few years. It is important for you to understand which deductions are no longer available to you. If you have children under age fourteen, you need to be aware of the "kiddie tax" which taxes your children's unearned income in excess of \$1,000 at your highest tax rate. You need to know that the new tax laws help make your home and second home among the most important tax shelters remaining.

If you started a new business during 1989, you should look into the possibility of a \$10,000 deduction for equipment purchased to start the business. You should investigate the benefits of paying your children for work they perform for the business.

There may be retirement plans available to you that you are not taking advantage of that would build up tax-free income until you are ready to retire. Charitable contribution deductions have been changed very little, and the contribution of non-cash items is an area that may be worth exploring.

Traditionally, year-end tax advice suggests that you defer part of your income to the following year to avoid paying taxes in the current year; however, there is a possibility that tax rates may increase after this year. This standard strategy must, therefore, be carefully analyzed this year.

Arrange for a tax planning conference at your earliest convenience in order to minimize your 1989 tax bill.

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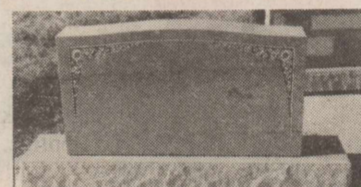

She was married to Jesse James Mickler in Jones County on Dec. 12, 1928.




