Haskell has the opportunity Friday

The task won't be easy for Coach Nelson Coulter's Indian team which with a $28-18$ loss at Electra.
In case there is any need for an incentive, the coach might remind his team of last year's Rotan game when the Yellowhammers clobbered the Idians, $20-0$, in a game much morer
one-sided than the score indicated. Rotan is unbeaten after fou games. The Yellowhammers opened the season with a $6-6$ tie agains O'Donnel in a game played in a driving rainstorm. Since then, they have beaten Cross Plains, 55-0; Spur, defending 7-2A champion Ansed off

Rotan features one of the area's most prolific running backs in the

Congressional pay
Editor: I am enclosing a copy of an article I wrote to the Abilene
Reporter-News early in 1989 when the issue of Congressmen raising their own salaries was a topic of discussion.

Editor: Much has been said of late about Congressmen trying to raise their own salaries 51 percent. The
