Sales taxes drop

This month's sales tax rebate to the City of Haskell was \$9,166.48, nearly 10 percent less than the \$10,176.69 for the comparable period of last year. But for the year, Haskell stands just about even with 1988 figures. For the first 10 months of the year, the city has received \$128,452.46, less than \$300 short of the \$128,741.87 received during the first 10 months of last year. Rochester's check this month was for \$4,923.78, bringing that city's year-to-date rebates to \$24,507.97. Rule received \$873.03. Neighboring Stamford again saw a dramatic increase in sales tax collections. That city's check this month was for \$14,202.46, or nearly 60 percent more than the check for \$8,905.18 received in October 1988. For the year, Stamford is 21.82 percent ahead of last year.

Voting begins on amendments

Absentee voting opened Wednesday for the Nov. 7 special election. To be decided by state voters in that election are 21 proposed constitutional amendments. On the local level, voters in Haskell and Weicert school districts will vote on whether to consolidate the two districts. Ballots are available at the office of County Clerk Woodrow Frazier. Absentee voting will remain open until Friday, Nov. 3. The last day

that mail ballots will be accepted is Tuesday, Oct. 31. The proposed amendments: No. 1: Would limit the salary of the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house of representatives to not more than one-half of the governor's salary and limit the salary of a member of the legislature to not more than one-fourth of the governor's salary. No. 2: Would authorize the issuance of an additional \$500 million of Texas water development

bonds for water supply, water quality and flood control purposes. No. 3: Would authorize the legislature to provide for the recovery and further development of the state's economy, with goals of increasing job opportunities and other benefits for Texas residents through state financing of the development and production of Texas products and businesses. No. 4: Would authorize the legislature to exempt property of

Rochester wins over Goree, 43-14

The Rochester Steers evened their district record at 1-1 Saturday afternoon when they defeated Goree 43-14 in a homecoming game at Rochester. The Steers are 2-4 for the season.

The two teams swapped first-period touchdowns, Rochester scoring on a 12-yard run by Kevin Conner and Goree countering on a 20-yard pass from Scott Castillo to Jay Hutchins. Neither team was successful on its extra point attempt so the first quarter ended 6-6.

Goree went ahead in the second period on an 8-yard scoring pass from Hutchins to Sergio Numoz, but Rochester came back in the same period to score three times, on a 43-yard run by Conner, a 6-yard run by Michael Brown and a 39-yard run by Conner. The halftime score was 25-14.

The Steers added three more touchdowns in the third period, on a 70-yard interception return by Jeffrey Hollingsworth, a 61-yard punt return by Conner and a 13-yard run by Todd

Landes.

Goree scored twice in the final period, on a 46-yard run by Otis Dixon and a 6-yard run by Hutchins.

Conner was the Steers' top ball carrier, picking up 235 yards on 14 carries. Robby Strickland carried nine times for 61 yards.

Curt Sloan was the leading tackler for the Steers with 12. Brad Bevel and Ross Shaver had 11 each, and Bevel also had an interception.

This week, the Steers will be at home to entertain Patton Springs.

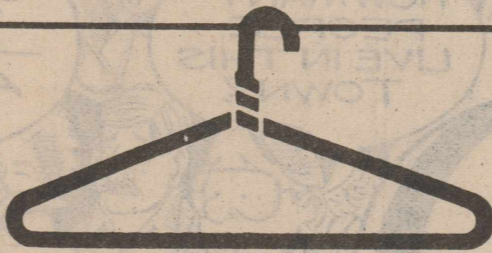

**Mattox
airs his
positions**

AUSTIN—The often-used grudging concession of admiration for a politician with whom one usually disagrees, goes like this: "You may not like his position, but you know where he stands."

Attorney General Jim Mattox, reportedly running a distant third when he announced for governor last week, staked out firm positions on more issues than any candidate of either party.

Obviously aware that a little derring-do is needed to play catch-up, Mattox risked boldness while others rested on caution.

An unabashed, unapologetic liberal, Mattox said he:

- Supports a lottery to fund public school financing, and opposes any form of new taxes;
- Will veto any state income tax bill the Legislature passes;
- Favors the death penalty for heinous crimes and drug dealing; and
- Would use the Texas National Guard to seal off the Rio Grande border to drug smugglers and car thieves.

Does this platform sound liberal to you? Mattox, the arch-liberal, embraced several issues dear to conservative hearts. While other Democrats quietly discuss moving the party back to center, Mattox publicly put his leadership on the line.

Thus far, only Republican Clayton Williams is as open and firm on any issue. His is the war on drugs.

Lottery Response

In response to the Mattox challenge, Gov. Bill Clements asked both political parties to put the lottery issue on the primary ballot.

The other major candidates declined to follow Mattox' strong lead on the lottery issue, and only Republican Kent Hance expressed opposition to one.

More Law Officers

Congressman John Bryant of Dallas, a candidate for attorney general, said Texas cities should hire 10,000 more police officers during the next four years to reduce their soaring crime rates.

Citing FBI statistics, Bryant said, "Texas has today become one of the most dangerous states in America in which to live."

Bryant said he would support city councils that raise taxes to bolster their police forces. But he said, "I don't expect any mayors to advocate this."

He also proposed that the state authorize the Department of Public Safety to hire 40 additional narcotics officers.

Insurance Lawsuit

Mattox said two insurance firms, Travelers Insurance Co. and St.

Paul's Fire and Marine Insurance Co., have agreed to pay \$500,000 and testify in an anti-trust lawsuit continuing against other insurance companies.

The two firms denied any wrongdoing, and the payments are not fines or penalties, but for investigative and legal costs.

Past Deeds Surface

Two state legislators and a former House member, all running to replace the late Houston Congressman Mickey Leland, blamed each other for checkered reports of their pasts.

State Rep. Ron Wilson was chided years back for possible misuse of \$16,000 in state funds, of which he paid back \$2,000; Houston city councilman Anthony Hall was criticized for allegedly steering city business to a client/contributor; and state Sen. Craig Washington apologized for his assault on a woman friend six years ago.

Other Campaigns

• In the 17th state senatorial district, Bryan state Rep. Richard Smith announced for the Republican slate, and Ron DeLord, head of the state's largest police labor union, entered as a Democrat.

Meanwhile, former state Rep. Dan Kubiak, in Europe on a trade mission when incumbent Sen. Kent Caperton announced his retirement, is reportedly eyeing the race.

• State Rep. Keith Valigura, R-Conroe, will not seek re-election, opting to devote more time to family and business. He endorsed Dr. Bob Rabuck as his successor.

• Bob Munson, a veteran of Louisiana political battles, will take over state Sen. Chet Edwards' underdog campaign for lieutenant governor.

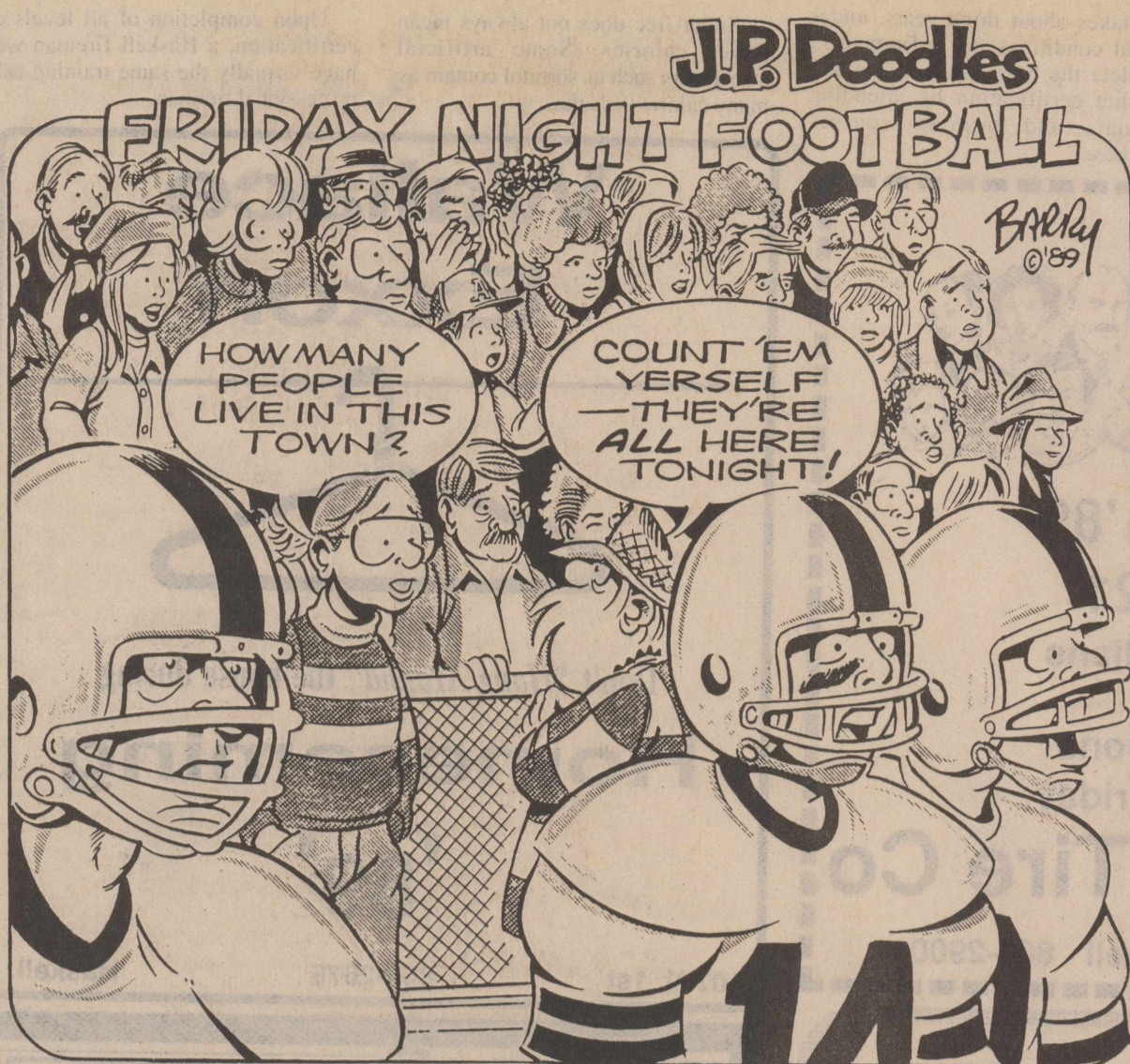

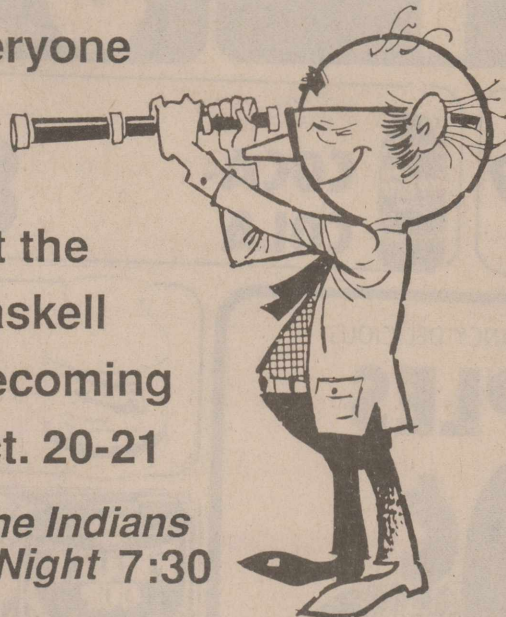

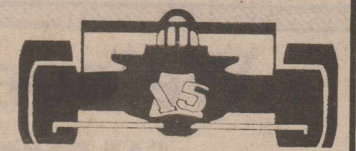

The Nineteens were organized Sept. 15, 1958, as a high school choral organization. The group met in regular supervised sessions on Mondays and Thursdays for one hour. The group consisted of nine girls and a pianist. For 14 years, as each group

graduated, a new group would be installed to take its place.

The directors were Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Bell, Haskell public school educators in music and science. The purpose and chief function of the organization was two-fold:

1) To develop the art of choral singing and appreciation for good music, and

2) To render service to their school and community by providing wholesome vocal entertainment when called upon.

The rules and by-laws adopted by the organization were:

1) A member is qualified by her

ability to read and interpret moderately difficult scores in choral music, such qualifications being approved by the directors.

2) A member must pledge to be regular in attendance and performance unless her absence is approved by the directors.

3) A member must pledge loyal support to the organization and its purpose.

4) To remain in good standing with the organization a member must maintain a high level of moral conduct and a passing grade in her academic work.

Through the 14 years in existence, 52 girls (including the talented pianists) sang under their rainbow of songs as they adopted their theme song, "Somewhere Over the Rainbow." They were in high demand to perform for numerous events each week all over the state and succeeded in delighting audiences such as the International Rotary convention and 1,000-member audiences in the Abilene area. They performed with celebrities such as the Sons of the Pioneers and shared the same platform with Olympic star Bobby Morrow.

Their success is attributed to several factors:

1) The format of music they used, which satisfied many types of audiences.

2) Persistence and devotion to their

work and to the organization itself.

3) Excellent directorship and leadership.

4) Parental support.

The Nineteens ceased as an organization in 1972 when Mr. and Mrs. Bell retired from the public schools. As each group graduated, each decided to always remember the love they shared and the happiness generated within the walls of that studio on Mondays and Thursdays--especially when they would see a rainbow in their future.

Although the Nineteens are not a group any more, some still sing individually throughout their walks of life and all still strongly feel a "pull" of unity from somewhere out there.

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Indians drop district opener

The Indians didn't fool around on this one.

They lost it early. It mattered not that they matched the Hamlin Pied Pipers point-for-point after the first 14 minutes of play. The damage already had been done.

Thanks to 28 quick points, the Pipers pasted a 54-26 defeat on Haskell Friday night as the two teams opened the district 7-2A race at Hamlin.

Converting a fumble into a touchdown and returning an intercepted pass for another, Hamlin went out front by four touchdowns before the Indians could get their offense--and defense--cranked up. Once they did, their performance was respectable, but it was too late to overcome the huge deficit.

The tone of the game was set on the first play from scrimmage when the Indians fumbled and the Pipers recovered at the Indian 24. Five plays later, with only 1:48 of the game

gone, Hamlin's Jeff Bell crashed over the goal line from a yard out and Tony Minonno kicked the extra point to start the Pipers on their rampage.

Just over two minutes later, Bell passed 50 yards to Billy Villanueva for another Piper touchdown and the score rose to 13-0. Before the first period ended, Hamlin got its third touchdown, going 38 yards in two plays, a 32-yard pass from Bell to Ryan Jeffrey and a 6-yard run by John Norman. Norman ran over the extra points and the score went to 21-0.

Before the third period was a minute and a half old, Villanueva picked off a Shane Osborne pass on the 35 and returned it for a touchdown.

Haskell finally got going when Harper Stewart intercepted a Bell pass on the Indian 14. The Indians then marched 86 yards in 15 plays to get their first touchdown. The score came on a 22-yard pass from Osborne to Stewart. Rusty Stocks then passed to Jonathan Dever for a 2-point

conversion and the Haskell had narrowed the margin to 28-8 at the 2:02 mark.

Hamlin made it 35-8 in the opening minutes of the third quarter after taking the second-half kickoff and marching 53 yards for a touchdown, scored when Jeffrey went over from 4 yards out.

The Indians answered quickly this time. After Rodney Johnson returned the kickoff to the 35, Osborne passed 29 yards to Stewart to the Piper 36. Stocks passed to Stewart for a 6-yard gain and then Johnson ran 30 yards for the score.

But the Pipers came right back. It took them just four plays to go 65 yards after the Haskell kickoff. Tommy Hunter ran 11 yards and then 7. Jeffrey ran 33 yards and then

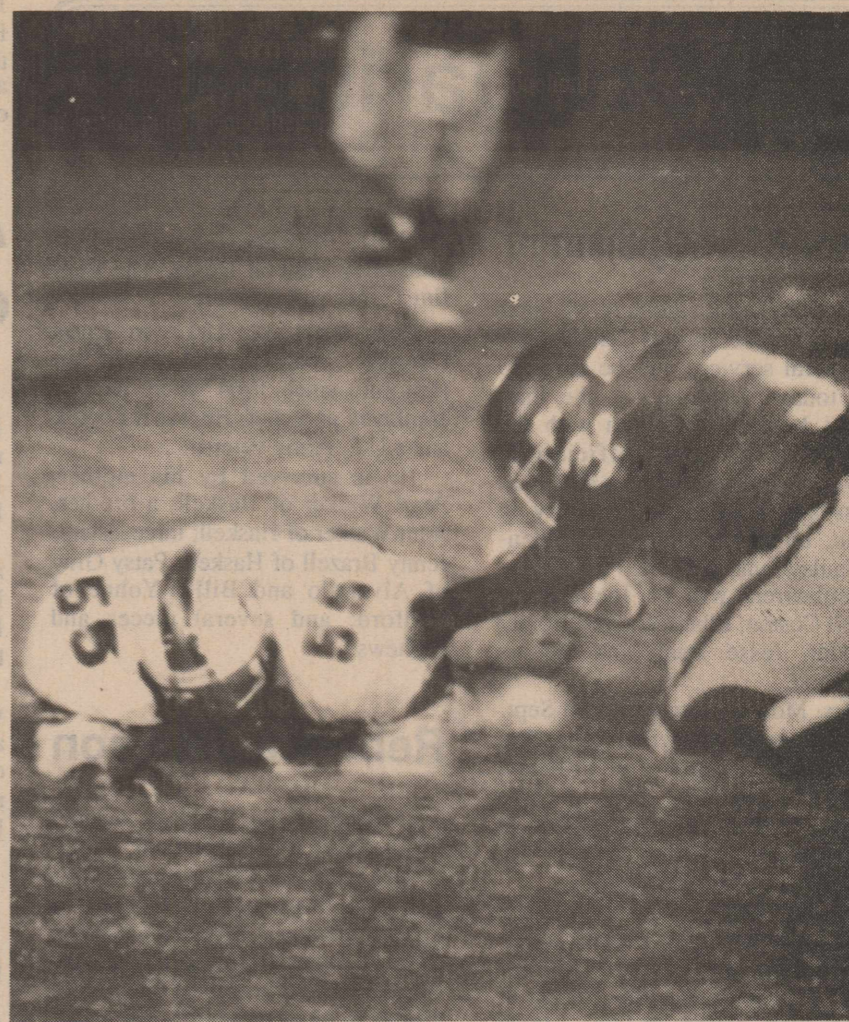
Anthony Hooper ran 25 yards for a touchdown to make the score 42-14.

Hamlin's next touchdown came less than two minutes later when Jeffrey returned a Haskell punt 75 yards to push the score to 48-14.

Late in the third period, Osborne passed 42 yards to Dever to give the Indians a first down at the Hamlin 10. Three plays later, 44 seconds into the final period, Stocks passed 8 yards to Johnson for a touchdown to make it 48-20.

A fumble recovery at the Hamlin 28 set up the final Indian touchdown. Johnson went 15 yards for the touchdown in the short drive which had featured a 7-yard pass from Osborne to Stewart and a 13-yard strike from Stocks to Dever.

HOW TO SPOT PROBLEM ACCOUNTS EARLY

If you extend credit to your customers, some losses are inevitable. So unless you are willing to forego the credit part of your sales, you have to figure out ways to control your bad debt losses.

Once you have extended credit to a customer, you have a stake in continuing the relationship even if you suspect there might be trouble a-brewing. You don't want to crack down on a good customer too hard too soon; yet you don't want to be "taken" by a debtor who has become unable or unwilling to pay. The problem is distinguishing between slow pay (which is bad enough) and no pay.

What you need is an early warning system to detect a credit problem in the making, so you can cease further sales to that customer and begin collection procedures in earnest. Here are some of the telltale signs that point to an account that is turning sour:

- The debtor has begun paying erratically, settling up on smaller invoices while larger ones just get older, at the same time disputing specifications or terms.
- The debtor fails to return your phone calls or shows unusual annoyance at your inquiries.
- Your requests for information, such as updated financial statements, are ignored.
- The debtor places jumbo orders and presses you for a higher credit limit.
- Despite the problems you are having, the debtor tries to coax you into providing a good credit report to another supplier.
- You get word that the debtor's credit rating has been down-graded.

Any one of these hints of trouble can be the handwriting on the wall. Two or more and it's time to crack down. Take a firm stand: turn up the heat on your collection efforts with this debtor, and make no more sales unless they're cash on delivery.
