No. 3: Would authorize the legislature to provide for the recovery and further development of the state's economy, with goals of increasing job opportunities and other benefits for Texas residents through state financing of the development and production of Texas products and

Mattox airs his positions

AUSTIN-The often-used grudging concession of admiration for a politician with whom one usually disagrees, goes like this: "You may not like his position, but you know where he stands."

Attorney General Jim Mattox, reportedly running a distant third when he announced for governor last week, staked out firm positions on more issues than any candidate of either party.

Obviously aware that a little derring-do is needed to play catchup, Mattox risked boldness while others rested on caution.

An unabashed, unapologetic liberal, Mattox said he: Supports a lottery to fund pub-

lic school financing, and opposes any form of new taxes;

■ Will veto any state income tax bill the Legislature passes;

• Favors the death penalty for heinous crimes and drug dealing;

 Would use the Texas National Guard to seal off the Rio Grande border to drug smugglers and car thieves.

Does this platform sound liberal to you? Mattox, the arch-liberal, embraced several issues dear to conservative hearts. While other Democrats quietly discuss moving the party back to center, Mattox publicly put his leadership on the

Thus far, only Republican Clayton Williams is as open and firm on any issue. His is the war on drugs

Lottery Response

In response to the Mattox challenge, Gov. Bill Clements asked both political parties to put the lottery issue on the primary

The other major candidates declined to follow Mattox' strong lead on the lottery issue, and only Republican Kent Hance expressed

opposition to one. More Law Officers

Congressman John Bryant of Dallas, a candidate for attorney general, said Texas cities should hire 10,000 more police officers during the next four years to reduce their soaring crime rates.

Citing FBI statistics, Bryant said, "Texas has today become one of the most dangerous states in America in which to live.

Bryant said he would support city councils that raise taxes to bolster their police forces. But he said, "I don't expect any mayors to advocate this.

He also proposed that the state authorize the Department of Public Safety to hire 40 additional narcotics officers.

Insurance Lawsuit

Mattox said two insurance firms, Travelers Insurance Co. and St.

Paul's Fire and Marine Insurance Co., have agreed to pay \$500,000 and testify in an anti-trust lawsuit continuing against other insurance companies.

The two firms denied any wrongdoing, and the payments are not fines or penalties, but for investigative and legal costs.

Past Deeds Surface

Two state legislators and a former House member, all running to replace the late Houston Congressman Mickey Leland, blamed each other for checkered reports of their



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

nonprofit veterans organizations from ad valorem taxation.

No. 5: Would promote economic growth, job creation and fair tax treatment for Texans who export goods to other states and nations by restoring and allowing, on a local option basis, an ad valorem tax exemption for certain personal property that is in Texas only temporarily for the purpose of assembling, storing, manufacturing, processing or fabricating.

No. 6: Would authorize members of a hospital district governing board to serve four-year terms.

No. 7: Would require that a member of the legislature, the secretary of state and an elected or appointed officer, before assuming office, sign a written oath stating that he/she did not engage in bribery to obtain the office.

No. 8: Would authorize the issuance of general obligation bonds for projects relating to facilities of corrections institutions, youth corrections institutions and mental health and mental retardation institutions and for the expansion of statewide law enforcement facilities.

No. 9. Would authorize the legislature to organize and combine various state agencies that perform criminal justice functions.

No. 10: Would authorize the legislature to require or permit courts to inform juries about the effect of good conduct time and eligibility for parole or mandatory supervision on the period of incarceration served by a defendant convicted of a criminal

No. 11: Would set the amount of per diem received by a member of the legislature at the amount allowed for federal income tax purposes as a deduction for living expenses incurred by a state legislator in connection with official business.

No. 12: Would provide for using the permanent school fund and its income to guarantee bonds issued by the state for the purpose of aiding school districts.

No. 13: Would provide a bill of rights for crime victims.

No. 14: Would require a district attorney serving in Fort Bend County to be elected and serve a term in the manner provided by the general law for criminal district attorneys.

No. 15: Would authorize the legislature to permit and regulate raffles conducted by certain nonprofit

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organizations for charitable purposes. No. 16: Would grant to the people the right to decide whether to create and maintain hospital districts to protect the public well-being in a

manner independent of the legislature. No. 17: Would authorize the state to provide scholarships, grants, loans and other financial assistance to local fire departments and other public firefighting units to aid in providing necessary equipment and facilities to comply with fedeal and state law, and to educate and train their members.

No. 18: Would eliminate certain time limitations relating to the issuance of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds.

No. 19: Would authorize local governments to invest their funds as provided by law.
