



Randy McLelland He does armadillo right

Kids gobble up Arma Dillo chili

for Bible study at the First Baptist Church on Wednesday nights never know what to expect from Randy McLelland.

The youth director is always doing something different and

A while back, he turned loose a live armadillo.

Last Wednesday, he served them chili. Not ordinary chili, mind you. It was armadillo chili.

Randy didn't tell them what they were eating. He merely posted a sign reading: "Randy's No Alarm Arma Dillo Chili Pie." Some of them questioned the sign. But not those who know Randy best.

He spent the afternoon preparing the course, using two large armadillos he caught during the Christmas holidays while visiting his in-laws in Mills County.

Each of the animals weighed about 11 or 12 pounds. Together, they dressed out at 5 pounds.

"It's real tasty meat," said McLelland as he stirred his concoction while peeping at the recipe from a copy of The New Complete Arma Dillo Handbook he bought at an Austin bookstore 10 or 12 years ago.

He's an old hand at cooking armadillos. He says he usually barbecues them, but decided to try the chili recipe this time.

McLelland said armadillo meat tastes a lot like pork roast, although one recent recipient of his barbecue swore he was eating

Derby Saturday

Pinewood Stock Show Annual event starts today


The 1990 Haskell County 4-H and FFA Livestock Show gets underway today (Thursday) and will continue through Saturday.

Republicans plan primary election

was a Republican primary election in Haskell County. Someone said it was during Reconstruction. Someone else said there was one "20 or 25 years ago."

Everyone agrees on one point: It's been a long time.

But there will be a Republican primary this year. Republicans and would-be Republicans met in the commissioners' court room Monday to draw ballot positions for Republican primary candidates.

There are no Republican candidates for local offices.

Jack Rains drew the top spot among the gubernatorial candidates. Rick Perry of Haskell, a candidate for state Commissioner of Agriculture, drew the No. 3 spot among the three candidates for that

position. The Republican primary will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. March 13, the same date as the Democratic primary. Absentee voting opens

No one's sure just when there Feb. 21 and closes March 9. All county residents voting in the Republican primary on election day will cast their ballots at the First National Bank Community Room in Haskell.

Anita Perry, who is serving as county Republican party chairman, emphasized that all registered voters are eligible to vote in the Republican primary. They cannot, however, vote in both the Democratic and Republican

Furthermore, anyone voting in the runoff elections April 10 may vote only in the runoff of the party for which they voted in the first primary. For instance, a person cannot vote Democratic in the March 13 primary and then vote Republican in the April 10 runoff.

The Haskell County Republican Party will have its precinct convention at 7:30 p.m. March 13, immediately after the primary.

Latch-key children to be program topic

American may still be a country of baseball, apple pie, and Mom. But fewer and fewer children are finding Mom or apple pie waiting when they arrive home from school. Children's school hours are not always the same as parents' working hours and so the child may leave for school after the parent goes to work and return home prior to the parents' return. With the increase in single-parent families

and working mothers, this situation is becoming more and more common.

Children who come home to an empty house and care for themselves are in what is commonly called "self-care". Selfcare may be suitable and safe or it may be inappropriate and dangerous. Therefore, self-care for "latch-key (schoolage children) may be safe or sorry, depending upon a number of factors.

To find out what these factors are as well as some useful information to help you provide responsible self-care for your latchkey child, make plans to attend a public educational program entitled, "Responsible Self Care for Latch Key Children." The program will be on Monday night, Feb. 5 beginning at 7 in the First National Bank's Community Room in Haskell. There will be a charge of

The speaker for the evening will be Sarah L. Anderson, Ed.D., C.H.E., family sciences specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The program is being cosponsored by the Haskell County Extension Program Council's Executive Board and the Haskell County Home Economics Committee.

Propane price probe asked

The president of Texas Farmers Union has called on Congress to investigate what he claims are "very questionable increases" in the price of heating oil and propane during the nation's recent cold wave, which he says point to the need for a national energy policy.

TFU President Joe Rankin said the price increases "amounted to more than just supply-and-demand forces." He pointed to propane prices in Texas which jumped from 48 cents per gallon on Thanksgiving Day to \$1 on New Year's Day. "When the price of heating oil increases over 200 percent in a month, we need to find out why," he said.




