Latch-key children to be program topic

American may still be a country of baseball, apple pie, and Mom. But fewer and fewer children are finding Mom or apple pie waiting when they arrive home from school. Children's school hours are not always the same as parents' working hours and so the child may leave for school after the parent goes to work and return home prior to the parents' return. With the increase in single-parent families

and working mothers, this situation is becoming more and more common.

Children who come home to an empty house and care for themselves are in what is commonly called "self-care". Self-care may be suitable and safe or it may be inappropriate and dangerous. Therefore, self-care for "latch-key (schoolage children) may be safe or sorry, depending upon a number of factors.

To find out what these factors are as well as some useful information to help you provide responsible self-care for your latch-key child, make plans to attend a public educational program entitled, "Responsible Self Care for Latch Key Children." The program will be on Monday night, Feb. 5 beginning at 7 in the First National Bank's Community Room in Haskell. There will be a charge of \$1.00.

The speaker for the evening will be Sarah L. Anderson, Ed.D., C.H.E., family sciences specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The program is being co-sponsored by the Haskell County Extension Program Council's Executive Board and the Haskell County Home Economics Committee.

The Fort Worth City Council is considering an ordinance which would make it a crime for a gas station operator to allow a customer to fill up before paying.

Propane price probe asked

The president of Texas Farmers Union has called on Congress to investigate what he claims are "very questionable increases" in the price of heating oil and propane during the nation's recent cold wave, which he says point to the need for a national energy policy.

TFU President Joe Rankin said the price increases "amounted to more than just supply-and-demand forces." He pointed to propane prices in Texas which jumped from 48 cents per gallon on Thanksgiving Day to \$1 on New Year's Day. "When the price of heating oil increases over 200 percent in a month, we need to find out why," he said.

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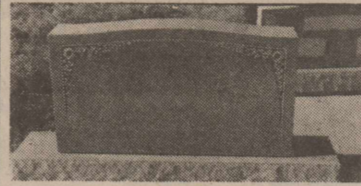

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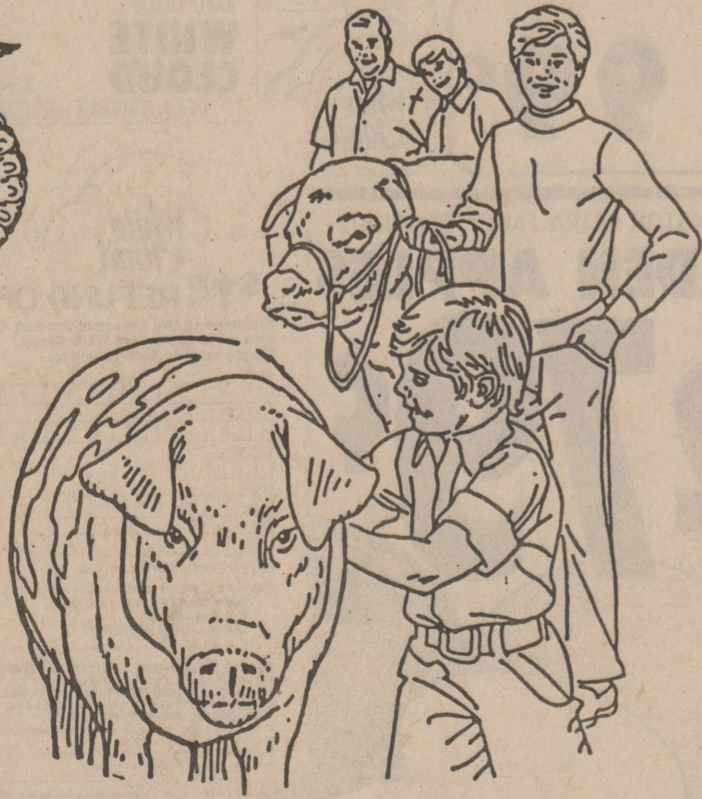

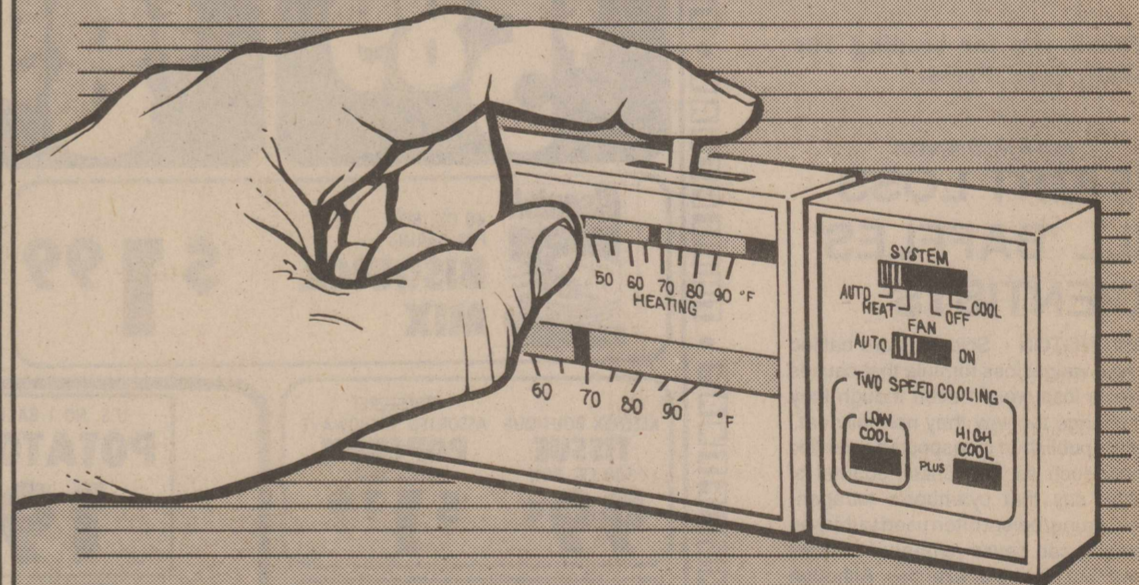
