Sales tax rebate decreases again

The City of Haskell got a check for \$21,52684 last week from the state comptroller for its share of sales taxes collected in December, but the amount was 13.69 percent below the amount received last year for the same period.

Last year's check was for \$24,940.87.

The year's second allocation of sales taxes brought the city's 1990 total to \$29,957.71. The total for the first two months last year was \$34,651.08.

This month's check reflects taxes collected on December sales and

reported in January by businesses filing monthly tax returns. Also included in this month's payment are sales tax collections reported by quarterly and yearly filers.

Rule received \$3,078.51 this month, up 4.42 percent over last year's check of \$2,948.06 for the same period.

Also receiving checks this month were Weinert for \$620.29 and O'Brien for \$478.53.

Local merchants collect a 7-percent sales tax and submit it to the state. The state keeps its 6-percent share and returns 1 percent to the city.

Annual revival next week

Paul Cheatham, pastor of East Side Baptist Church who is president of the alliance, said the revival is very popular. 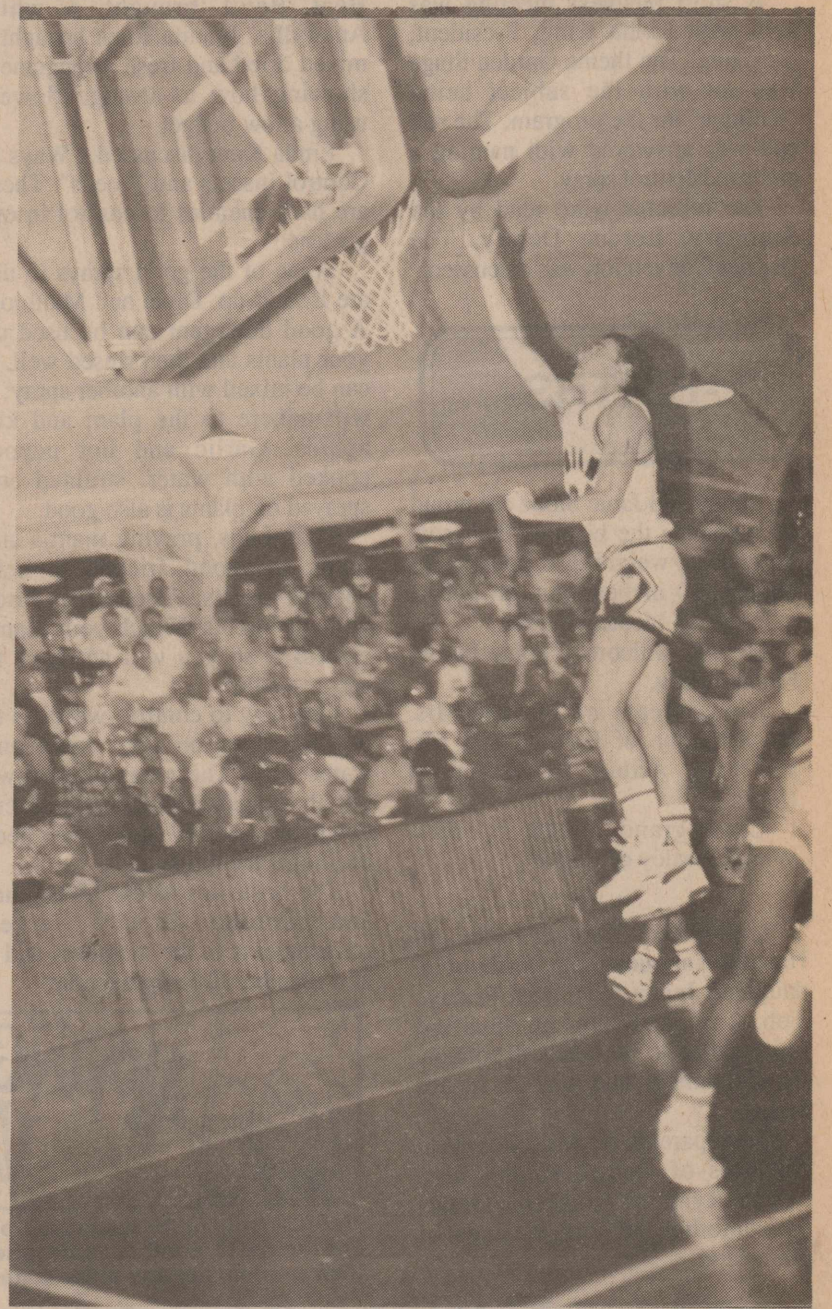

Rural real estate loans available

Long-term loans for the purchase of rural real estate are available from the Federal Land Bank Association of Haskell at a fixed interest rate of 9 7/8 percent for 15 years.

The program was announced last week by FLBA president Dale E. Bullinger.

Loans have a fixed interest rate for 15 years and generally may be amortized for longer terms, with no prepayment penalty. At the end of the 15-year fixed-rate period, the interest rate will convert to the Farm Credit Bank of Texas variable rate.

Loans are available to qualified buyers for new purchases only, and are assumable. A one-percent fee will be charged on all loans closed.

The association has approximately \$36 million in long-term loans outstanding to borrowers in Haskell, Jones, Baylor and Knox counties.

second-place team of 7-2A.

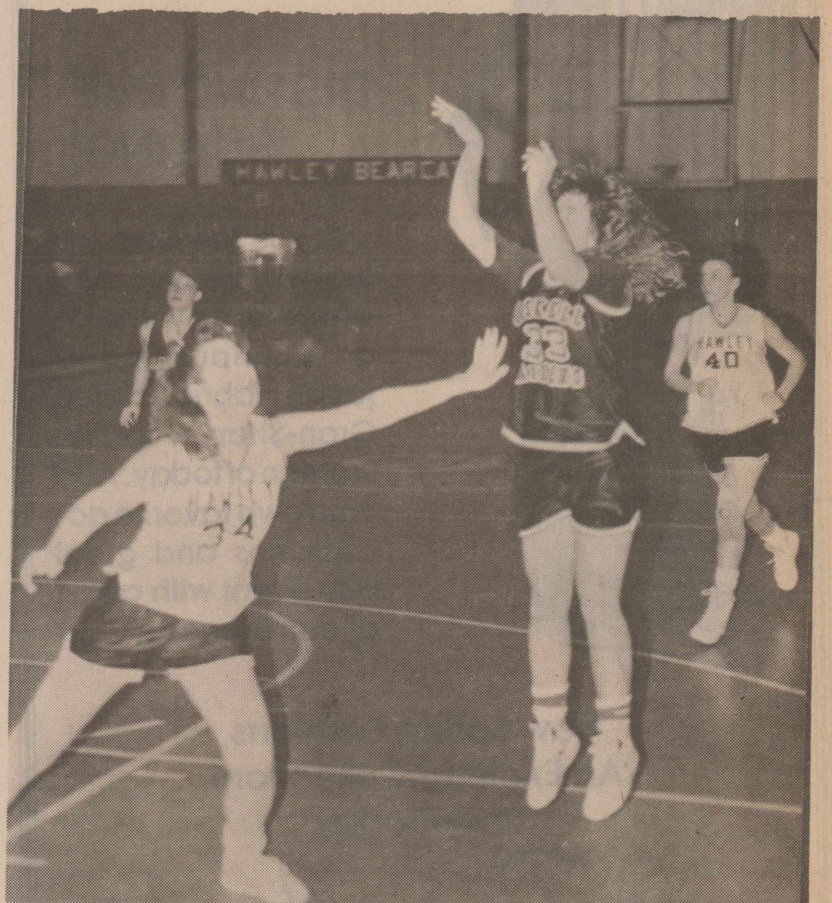
They clinched a tie for the second-half championship with a 62-47 win over Hawley Friday night before beating Albany Monday for the title.

Garden 'villians' topic of program

The Haskell Garden Club met February 8 at the Community Room.

A short business meeting was held with Linda King, President, presiding. The theme Garden Stage was set with the subject being "Villians" for the program. The roll call was answered with naming a preferred control spray.

The minutes were read by the Secretary, Lorene Dewey. The District Convention was discussed.

The horticulture of the day was brought by Dee Sprayberry, who brought a Forsythia branch and Heat Bevil brought a white Amaryllis. Juanita Rhea brought a mixed dried and fresh arrangement showing how to arrange flowers using a low budget.

Linda King discussed, "Ways to Control Insects and Weeds". These are hard enemies to control in our gardens.

Some of the good sprays to use are Round-up, Dipel and Malthion. A good detergent can be used on your plants and then rinsed well. It can be mixed with another spray; it will adhere to the plant and kill aphids. Garlic and hot pepper cooked with water, strained and sprayed on plants is also good.

Lady bugs, praying mantis and toads are good friends to help destroy insects. Also martin birds will eat insects. Watch your plants carefully; so you will not have to use pesticides.

One way to control weeds is to use fertilizer on your lawn and water well. The grass will crowd out the weeds. Bark mulches cut down on weeds in your flower beds and holds the moisture.

An estimated 88,000 public school pupils will opt to quit school this year for a multitude of reasons that run the gamut of socio-economic reasons.

Policeman brings program to Progressive Study Club

The Progressive Study Club met Feb. 18. President Mary L. Kaigler called the meeting to order and welcomed new members, Robbie Harris and Faye Stiewert.

Mary Martin introduced Steve Grand who has been a Haskell policeman for seven years. He attended the West Central Texas Council of Governments Police Academy in Abilene and recently attended a crime prevention school.

He broadened club members' horizons, the theme for the year, with a number of awareness alertness suggestions. He presented a series of slides with audio tape.

There are three sides to a crime: a victim, a criminal and an opportunity. When walking, a person should not choose an isolated area but walk in a well-lighted place, move with assurance and purpose, keep eyes up, hold bag close to body and not carry large amounts of money.

It is good to have a walking companion and not follow the same route every day and at the same time. When driving, one should not invite or allow a stranger to ride. One should travel main roads and keep doors locked and windows up. If there is car trouble, one should stay in the vehicle with locked doors after a white flag has been tied to the door handle or antenna or raise the car hood.

Grand warned about a person being careless because we are in a small town. He told about an elderly Haskell lady who was knocked down and relieved of her purse a half block from the square

during the day. Some other suggestions pertained to home safety. Keep a home well lighted. A good practice is to have lights that come on if something moves across the yard and also have guard lights. Wooden fences are the worst kind; chain fences are better. Shrubbery should be below window level and at least 24 inches from the walls. Doors should be heavy wood or metal and have dead bolts which use a key to lock and unlock. If a burglar gets in through a window, it would be a simple matter to twist the usual lock so that large items such as a television could be removed easily and quickly.

An alarm system should be installed if a person has a collection, such as guns or coins. If a small safe is used, it should be set in concrete in a lighted floor place. It is wise to have the driver's license number engraved on television and other articles. The city has an engraver which can be borrowed. It was also suggested that pictures of each room be taken and placed in a bank vault. These would be invaluable in case of a fire.

Grand also discussed the Neighborhood Watch program. His department would be glad to present

it to a group of four or more families meeting together. The homes would have identifications. He said all should know the neighbors' phone numbers and the type and number of cars at each home.

There was good audience participation, and many members thought it would be valuable to have a list of local crimes published in the local paper.

The social period followed. Hostesses, Anita Herren, Mattie English, Oleta Cornelius and Frances Lane, carried out the Valentine theme in table decorations and served cherry tarts, cream cheese with sauce, crackers, toasted nuts, candy hearts and red-hot spiced punch and coffee.

During the business session, Kay Croft was elected to active membership. In the absence of the treasurer the president gave the financial report and announced that a donation had been received and that the Young Homemakers had requested a \$250 donation to aid in repairing the county library. The request was tabled.

Yearly dues should be paid at the March 8 meeting.

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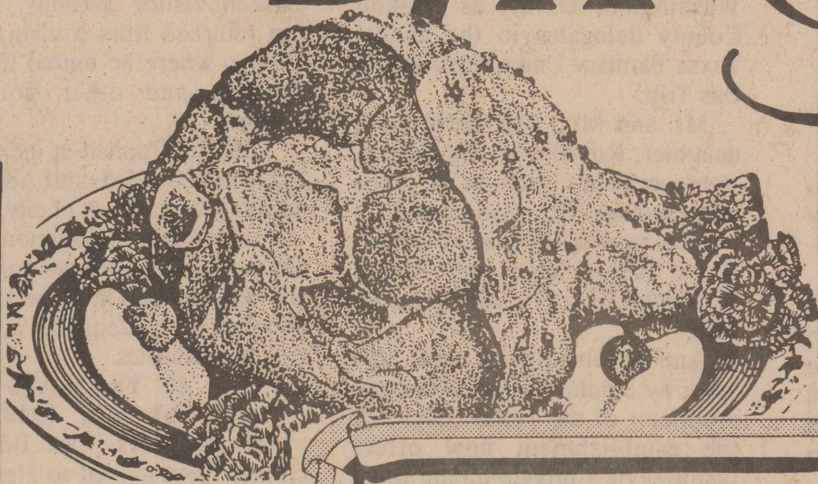

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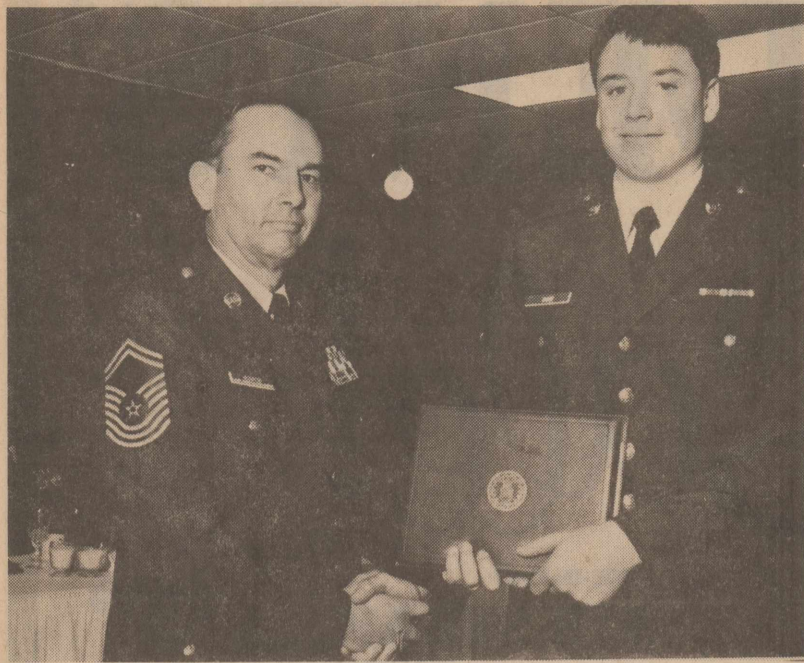
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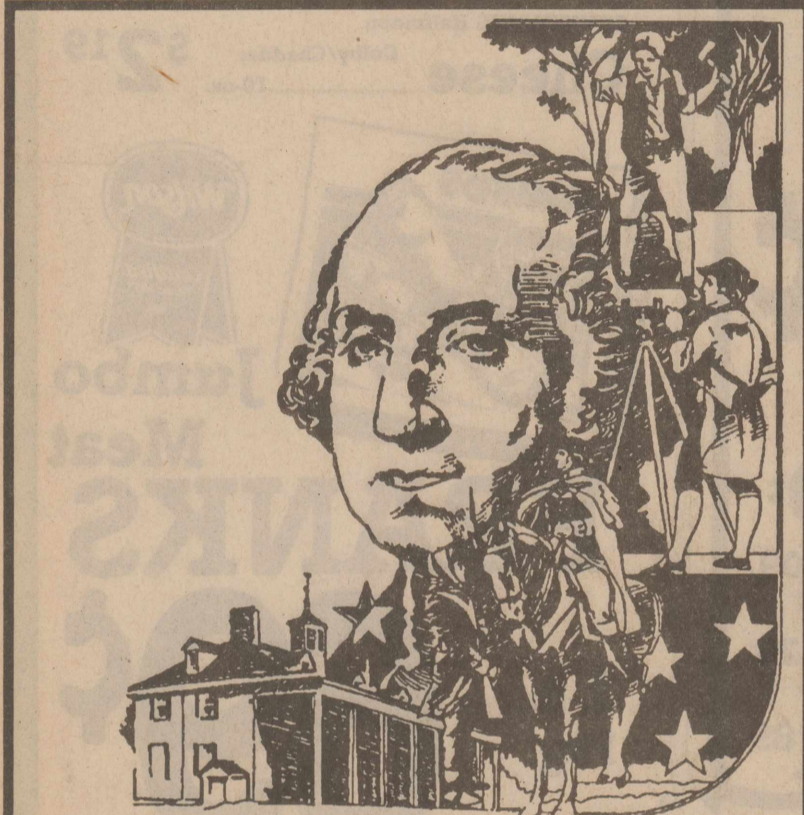


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Receives award

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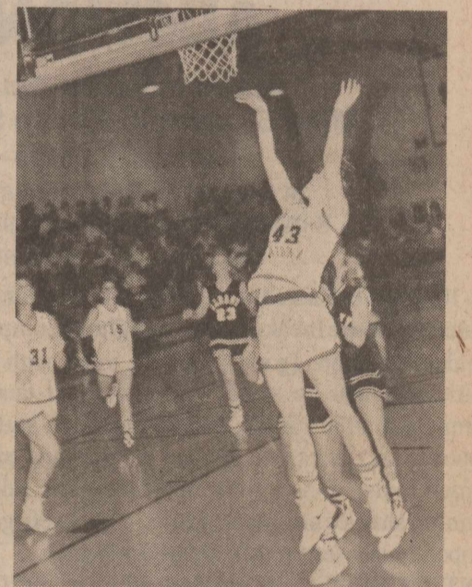

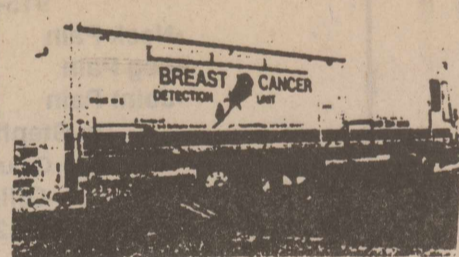
She continued to work for Grissom until she married in 1930.

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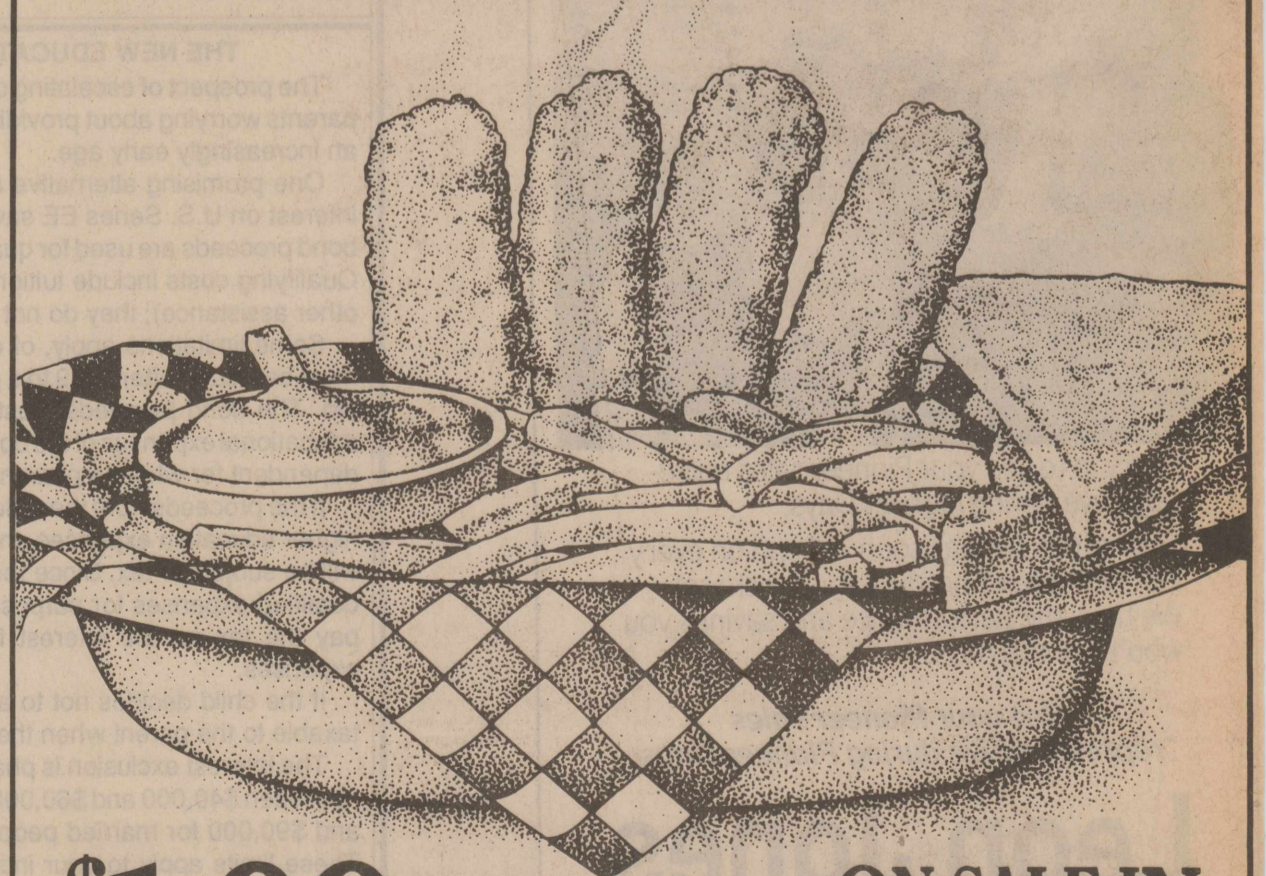

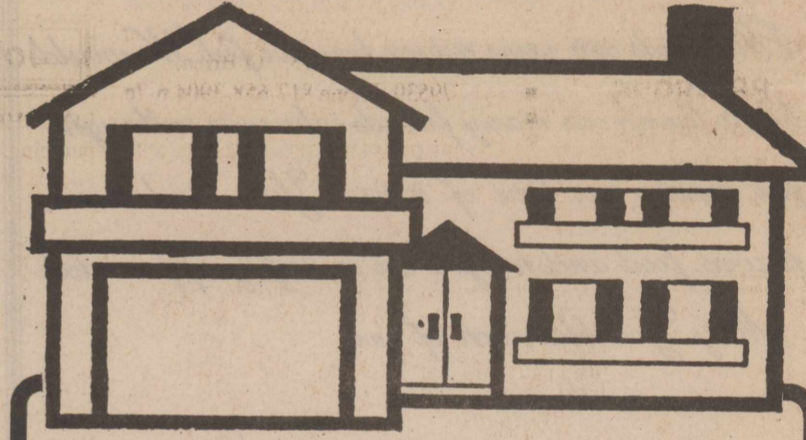

THE NEW EDUCATION SAVINGS BONDS

The prospect of escalating college tuition costs has millions of parents worrying about providing for their children's education at an increasingly early age.

One promising alternative is new legislation that makes the interest on U.S. Series EE savings bonds nontaxable when the bond proceeds are used for qualified higher education expenses. Qualifying costs include tuition and fees (less scholarships and other assistance); they do not include room and board.

Some limitations apply, of course. To be eligible, the bonds must be issued after 1989 to a purchaser who is at least 24 years old. The bond proceeds must be used to pay qualified higher educational expenses of the bondholder, his or her spouse, or any dependent for whom a personal tax exemption is allowed.

If the proceeds from the redeemed bonds exceed the qualified higher education expenses, the interest earnings on the excess will be subject to tax. Since room and board are not considered qualified expenses for purposes of the exclusion parents must pay the tax on the interest from bonds redeemed for these expenses.

If the child decides not to attend college, the interest is fully taxable to the parent when the bond is redeemed.

The interest exclusion is phased out at certain income levels - between \$40,000 and \$60,000 for singles and between \$60,000 and \$90,000 for married people, indexed annually for inflation. These limits apply to your income at the time you redeem the bonds, so if your income exceeds these amounts during the college years, you lose the exclusion.

In summary, Series EE Bonds are the right choice for some and the wrong choice for others. Cautious parents with college-bound kids will need to weigh all the alternatives before committing to college savings bond plan.


1890 - 1990
