The game is scheduled to begin at 7:30 at Hardin-Simmons

University in Abilene. Should the Indians win, they will play the winner of the Van Horn-Ozona bi-district game Tuesday night at 7:30 for the area championship. If Van Horn is the foe, the area game will be at Midland Greenwood. If it is Ozona, the area game will be in Big

The area winner will advance to the regional tournament, scheduled for Friday and Saturday, March 2-3, at Moody Colliseum in Abilene.

The regional winner will advance to the state tournament in Austin March 8-10.

But before they get a chance at Van Horn or Ozona, or anyone else, the Indians will have to get by a tough Bangs team Friday. Bangs, runnerup to San Saba in district 8-2A, has a 19-10 record. The Indians are 27-2.

Haskell warmed up for the playoffs by splitting a couple of practice games after the end of the regular season. Last Friday, the Indians defeated Frost, 75-50, but on Monday night they lost to Comanche, 52-45, suffering only their second loss of the season and their first since Dec. 1.

The Indians suffered a blow this week with the illness of Rusty Stocks, the team's third leading scorer. He did not play against Comanche and his status for the Bangs game is undetermined. Stocks is averaging 10.5 points per game. Adam Coleman started in place of Stocks against Comanche.

Top scorer for the Indians is senior James Rike who is averaging 28 points. Harper Stewart's average is 15, and Shane Osborne is averaging 7.5.

INDIAN NOTES

Haskell is assured of its best won-lost record ever. At 27-2, the Indians cannot lose more than one more game.

The Indians suffered their coldest night of the season against 3A Comanche in Clyde Monday night. They were 11 of 53 from the field, hitting only 2 of 22 in the first half. They trailed, 22-15 at halftime and then were outscored 22-11 in the third period. They finally found the range in the final quarter, outscoring Comanche, 19-8, but the deficit was too much to overcome.

Haskell's has a history of not doing well in practice games. Of 14 losses over the past three years, five have been in practice games. For the third straight year, the Indians enter the bi-district off a practice

Both Haskell losses this season have been at the hands of 3A schools. In addition to Comanche, the Indians lost to Merkel on Dec.

The Indians are now four victories away from their second trip to the state tournament in three years. Two years ago, they lost in the state semifinals to eventual champion Archer City. Last year, they got to within one victory of returning to Austin, losing to Farwell in the regional finals.





Parents must decide the behavior and changes they want to occur and through their positive attitude, consistent discipline and reasonable view of their child, they can effect


