Fantastic season ends in regional finals

The Haskell Indians will just have to settle on compiling the best record in the school's history. There will be no state championship.

After a thrilling three-overtime victory over Hale Center in the regional tournament in Abilene Friday night, the Indians fell to the Abernathy Antelopes, 78-51, in Saturday afternoon's regional finals.

Maybe it was the grueling effort in the semifinal contest which finally did them in. They battled Abernathy to a 30-30 standoff in the first half, but the roof, and the season, caved in in the final two periods.

Abernathy outscored the Indians, 23-14, in the third period and 25-7 in the final frame. Haskell, which had only two turnovers in the first half, suffered 12 in the second half.

"We played pretty well," said Indian Coach Randy Stone, "but they played extremely well."

The coach said that Friday night's game against Hale Center definitely took something out of the Indian team. "But we have no excuse," he said. "They played Friday night too."

In Friday's thriller against Hale Center, Haskell won its 30th game in what has to be one of the most exciting games ever.

The Owls jumped to a 17-10 first-period lead, but the Indians stormed back to take a 26-25 halftime lead.

The lead changed hands four times in the third period with the Indians holding a 41-39 cushion at the end.

It was more of the same in the fourth period as the lead see-sawed back and forth until Hale Center took a 52-48 lead with about four minutes to go. A couple of 3-pointers by Harper Stewart and a field goal by Stocks put Haskell back ahead, 56-54, with 54 seconds to go, but the Antelopes' Koy Smith put in a shot to knot the score at 56 and send the game into

Rike put Haskell ahead, 58-56, in the first overtime, but Roshea Stephens drove in for a layup as time ran out to force another extra period.

Haskell fell behind by 3 points in the second overtime, but Rike connected on a 3-pointer at the buzzer to knot the score at 64.

Todd Vaughn hit a 3-pointer to get the Indians ahead by 3 at the outset of the third overtime. After a free throw by Smith, Vaughn sank a pair of free throws to give the Indians a 4-point lead at 69-65. A 3-pointer by Smith made it 69-68. Stephens then drove in for a layup, but was called for charging with 5 seconds to go.

Rike's 25 points led the scoring for the Indians. Stewart had 14, Stocks scored 13 and Shane Osborn had 12.

Good turnout expected for election Tuesday

With one contested local race among the Democrats and a local candidate for a statewide Republican office, a good turnout is expected for Tuesday's primary elections in Haskell County.

As of 1 p.m. Monday, 41 Democrats and 21 Republicans had cast absentee ballots. This would indicate an "above normal" interest in the primaries.

Only county race is among a couple of Democratic contenders for the office of county clerk, where incumbent Woodrow Frazier is being opposed by former County Clerk Rhonda Moeller.

Most Republican interest centers around the race for state commissioner of agriculture where State Rep. Rick Perry of Haskell is seeking his party's nomination over two other candidates, Gene L. Duke and Richard McIver. Perry's campaign is largely, if not totally, responsible for a Republican primary in Haskell County for the first time in years.

The Republican winner will face the winner of the Democratic primary in November's general election. In the Democrtic primary, incumbent Jim Hightower is being opposed by Dan A. Krenek, Paul McDaniel, Dan Pustejovsky, Neal Burnett and John Earl Smith.

Another Haskell man is a candidate for State Representative of District 64. Ken Lane of Haskell, John Cook of Breckenridge and Mike Smiddy of Mineral Wells are Democratic candidates for the office being vacated by Perry. Lone Republican candidate for the position is Fred Gough of Graham.

Local candidates unopposed in the Democratic primary are B. O. Roberson, county judge; Carolyn Reynolds, district clerk; Willie Faye Tidrow, county treasurer; Hugh E. Peiser, county surveyor; Roy T. Everett, justice of the peace; Ronnie Chapman, commissioner of precinct 2; and C. A. (Bud) Tidrow, commissioner of precinct 4.

Outside of the races involving

local candidates, chief interest in Tuesday's primaries centers around the race for governor.

Former Gov. Mark White, State Treasurer Ann Richards and Attorney General Jim Maddox head

The Indians made 197 of 485 three-point goals this season, an average of 40.61 percent. From the free throw line they were 64.97 percent---382 of 588.

Coach Randy Stone, in his third year at Haskell, now has a 245-94 record in 12 years as a varsity coach. That averages out to about 20-8 per season.

Abernathy, winner of the regional, didn't even win its district. The state tournament team finished second to Hale Center, losing by 4 and 11 points in their two games with Hale Center.

TAX REMINDERS

Several tax deadlines are fast approaching; don't overlook any of these that apply to you:

• March 15 is the due date for filing 1989 calendar-year corporation income tax returns. It's also the deadline for filing the necessary papers to elect S corporation status if you choose to do so.

• April 15 is the traditional deadline for filing your individual income tax return. However, this year April 15 falls on a Sunday, so Monday, April 16, is the due date for 1989 individual income tax returns unless you file for an automatic extension. The extension does not give you additional time to pay any 1989 taxes that you still owe, however. Your tax must be estimated and any balance due paid when you file for

• April 16 is the due date for 1989 partnership information returns for calendar-year partnerships. 1989 annual gift tax returns are also due. It's the last day to make your 1989 IRA contribution, even if you get an extension to file your tax return. April 16 is the last day to make a 1989 Keogh plan contribution, but this contribution deadline may be extended if you file for a tax return extension. April 16 is also the last day to file an amended return for 1986, unless you had a filing extension on your 1986 tax return. April 16 is an important deadline if you are required to make estimated tax payments; your first installment for 1990 is due that day.

If you have a sizable balance due or a large refund when you file your 1989 tax return, you should review and possibly adjust your W-4. That's the form you filed with your employer, which is used to calculate your income tax withholding. If you are having too little withheld, you may be subject to penalities, and if you are having too much withheld, you are giving the IRS the interest-free use of money which you could be using or investing yourself.

Sam Edwards is one of many farmers in Haskell County who operate land classified as "highly erodible land" for purposes of the current govrnment farm program.

Like the others, Sam developed a conservation plan with the Soil Conservation Service that recommended specific conservation treatment for highly erodible land. He obtained the consevation plan in order to remain eligible for participation in the farm program.

Sam is relatively new to Haskell County. In 1986, he took over a farming operation owned, by his father-in-law, Leland Woodward of Graham, which is located 10 miles east of Haskell. He grows cotton, wheat and haygrazer on 1,265 acres conservation plan.



Sacrifice

Hunt family gave much

Little did Robert Taylor and Amanda Florence Hunt realize in 1941 the exent of sacrifice they were making when they encouraged their sons to answer the call to their country's colors during its time of dire need.

First, there was Carl Thomas who volunteered, then Roy Taylor, followed by Earl Edwin, James Robert next, later Lloyd Marcus followed his brothers. Carl and James were not to return.

The Hunts were a large family, closely knit. There were David, John, Arthur, Fannie, Roy, Vera, Myrtle, Flora, Carl, Jerene, Earl, James and Marcus. The family maintained its unity during the hardships of the depression, relying on each other and their faith. The children attended local schools. All were raised on the farm and were to become farmers.

Mr. Hunt passed away on June

2, 1952, followed in death by Mrs. Hunt on Feb. 13, 1966. They carried the death of their children to their graves with them, the losses never having been dulled by the burdens of life. They are survived by Vera, Myrtle, Jerene and Earl.

The family gave more than their share to the cause of our country. The service of five sons, two of them suffering the ultimate sacrifice. It is difficult to understand why we have to suffer wars, and, less understandable why man's inhumanity to man demands these sacrifices. But we can understand that this family stands for everything our country is and will

The freedoms they so willingly served and gave for cannot be taken lightly nor for granted. We owe these folk the obligation to

continue the freedoms for which they offered themselves.

We, you and I, should be continually reminded of the heritage provided by them, and, pass the heritage down to our children that they may be prepared to meet future obligations involved in the preservation of our country.

And let us pray that we will never again be called upon as the Robert Taylor Hunt family was.

The Rule Community Memorial Monument being planned is as much for this family as it is for their two sons who were lost to them, and their sons who served their country so well. The pride displayed by the citizens of Rule in erecting the momument extends especially to the Hunt family.

The insects and bugs are multiplying in this nice weather, especially the army cutworms, and the farmers have asked, and received, permission from Ag commissioner, Jim Hightower to apply the pesticide, Asana, to prevent the destruction of the wheat

Haskell and Knox are two of about fourteen counties in the emergency use of the pesticide, and will be allowed the use for 15 days.

A CENTURY of VISION

By 1908 the burgeoning population had reached 2,436 in Haskell and 16,249 in the County and the second jail was erected while Joe Irby was County Judge.

This was preceded by the famous "Road to Ruin" saloon. Two early Haskell businessmen with a sense of humor bought the idea and the sign from a traveling sign painter.

Frank Draper and Jack Baldwin, co-owners, ran the saloon from 1884 to 1895, when they sold out to John Keister and Jumbo Hazelwood.

The latter two continued to operate the "R to R" until 1904 when Haskell County voted dry.

According to historians, the saloon also was used for church services - not uncommon in those days.



The first church building was the Methodist in late 1889, with the Baptist, Presbyterian, First Christian and Church of Christ not far behind. The stones for future growth, and a new flair for living, were carefully being added to the foundation already in place.
