The third quarter schedule of the district Social Security office calls for a representative to be in Haskell twice a month in July, August and September.

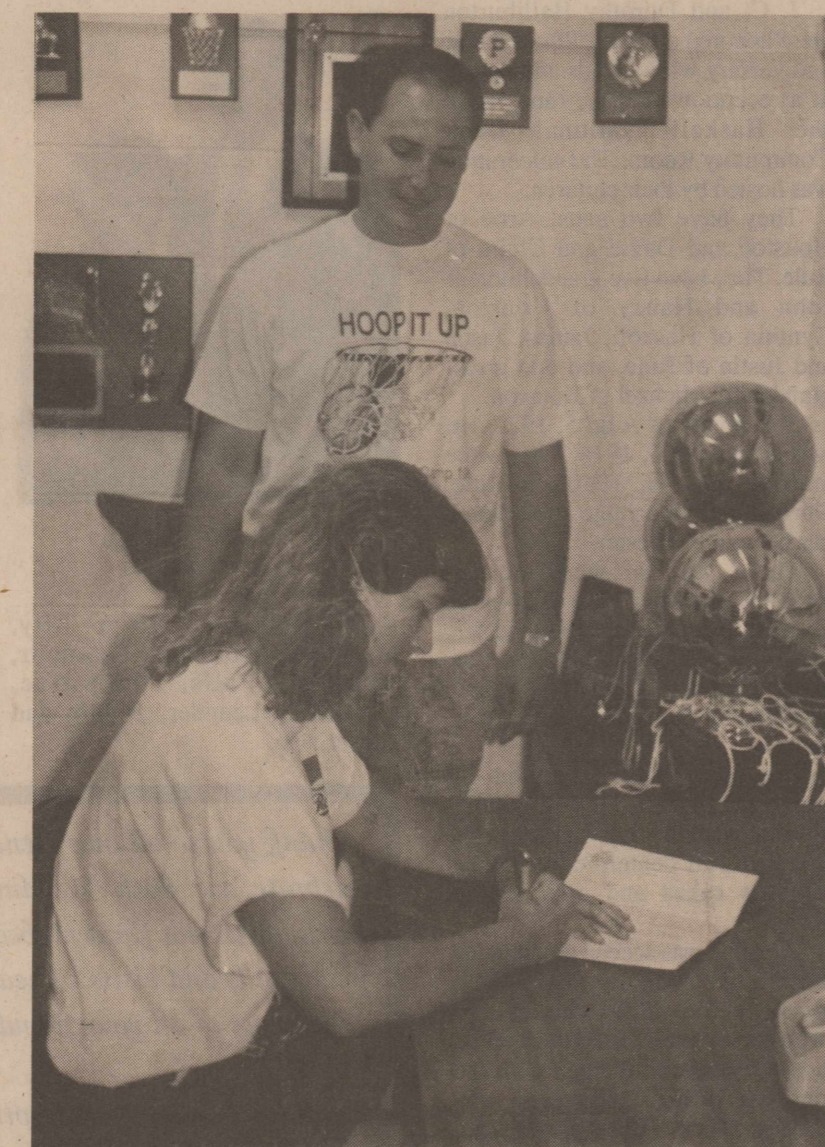
Dates are July 5 and 19, Aug. 2 and 16 and Sept. 6 and 20.

## Sul Ross signs Maidens' Davis

Missy Davis signed a letter of intent last week to play basketball for Sul Ross State University.

## Industrial group revives prison bid

This area jumped back in the race for a state prison last week.

Stamford is one of four area towns and one county which have been invited to re-submit bids for a 2,250-bed maximum security prison and three 1,000-bed minimum security prisons.

The Stamford bid was submitted last year by the Rolling Plains Industrial Foundation, made up of representatives from Stamford, Hamlin, Anson and Haskell. The proposed Stamford site was one of 20 semifinalists which were not awarded prisons.

Texas Department of Criminal Justice spokesman David Nunelec said the 20 communities were contacted to see if their proposals are still valid. The proposals will be re-evaluated and the list will be pared to about eight during the first week of July.

Each finalist will be allowed to make a 15-minute presentation to the board at its July 10 meeting. The board is expected to award the

prisons at that meeting.

Communities will not be allowed to change or enhance their bids.

Tom Isbell, secretary-treasurer of the Rolling Plains Industrial Foundation, said the group is re-submitting its bid for a prison near the Stamford airport.

Stamford made the first cut last year when the state reduced the number of cities seeking prisons from 46 to 26. However, the city was eliminated when the number was reduced to 12. Six of those 12, including Abilene, were awarded prisons.

Members of the foundation met last Thursday in Stamford and made the decision to re-submit the bid. Attending from Haskell were Bob Baker, Ken Lane and Mike Martindale.

Other area locations eligible for reconsideration are Big Spring, Breckenridge, Eastland County and Seymour.

## Fire training center to be established here

The Haskell City Council gave its approval last Thursday to a proposal to establish a regional fire training center at the municipal airport.

The Haskell Volunteer Fire Department plans to construct and erect various facilities at the site to assist it in training its firemen, and to make it available to other area fire departments for training their firemen. It also will enable Haskell to host training schools.

Plans call for the construction of a cinder block house on which firemen can practice fire-fighting skills. There also will be a rappelling tower and the site will be equipped with wrecked cars on which to practice rescue operations; oil field tanks and a pit to demonstrate extinguishing small fires.

Although the exact name for the training center has not been chosen, it will be named for Tom Watson, longtime Haskell fire chief.

Council members discussed the proposal during their regular meeting and gave their endorsement to the fire department.

In other council action: Mayor Greg Melton recognized Leon Wolf for his work with the city. Wolf is retiring as a landfill employee after working eight years for the city.

Conducted the first public

hearing prior to making application for a community development grant from the Texas Department of Commerce. Projects to be considered were discussed. Another public hearing will be June 28.

Appointed Marvin Letz to the Zoning Board and designated Loretta Gray as records clerk.

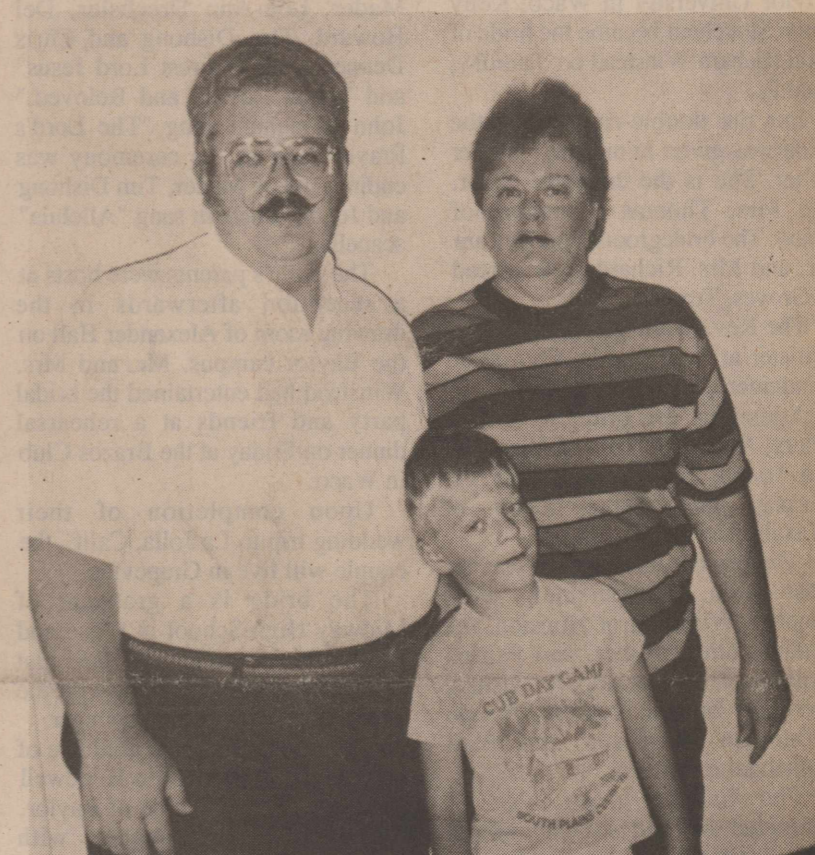
Transferred \$60,000 from reserve to an engineering, testing and surveying fund to cover the expenses of soil testing and designing site development of the landfill. It is hoped that the cost of this state-mandated project will be offset from fees charged to other cities for use of the landfill. As of now, Throckmorton, Stamford, Anson and Weinert, as well as the Lake Stamford area and a portion of Haskell County, are paying the city for use of the landfill. Several other

area cities have indicated interest.

In his reports to the Council, administrator Robert Baker said approximately 60 blocks of paving had been seal-coated in the past few weeks, the weir at South 1st and Avenue G had been completed at a cost of \$3,500, and the recent fly-in at the airport was extremely successful.

Heard a report from GiGi Barnett of Harmon Cable TV regarding the company's service policy and the increased rates to be effective July 1. She said the company would continue to respond to complaints in timely fashion.

## Traffic signals changed

It may take a while for local motorists to get used to the new traffic signals at the intersection of US highways 277 and 380 in Haskell.

But highway officials believe drivers will like the new setup once they understand it.

Electronically controlled by the volume of traffic, the signals are designed to move traffic in the most efficient manner possible.

A vehicle on any of the four approaches to the intersection will pass an electric eye which will trigger the signal apparatus that a single vehicle is approaching. As a result, the motorist will have an 8-second green light. If a second vehicle passes the electric eye, another 8 seconds will be allowed. Maximum duration of a green light will be 20 seconds, unless a large volume of traffic is approaching the intersection.

The new system also is equipped with "walk buttons", one at each of the four pedestrian crossings.

The old system was set to change from a green to a red light every 30 seconds.

Adams was pastor of the Lutheran church in Lockney for three and a half years. He has been in the ministry 11 years, including seven years in North Dakota.

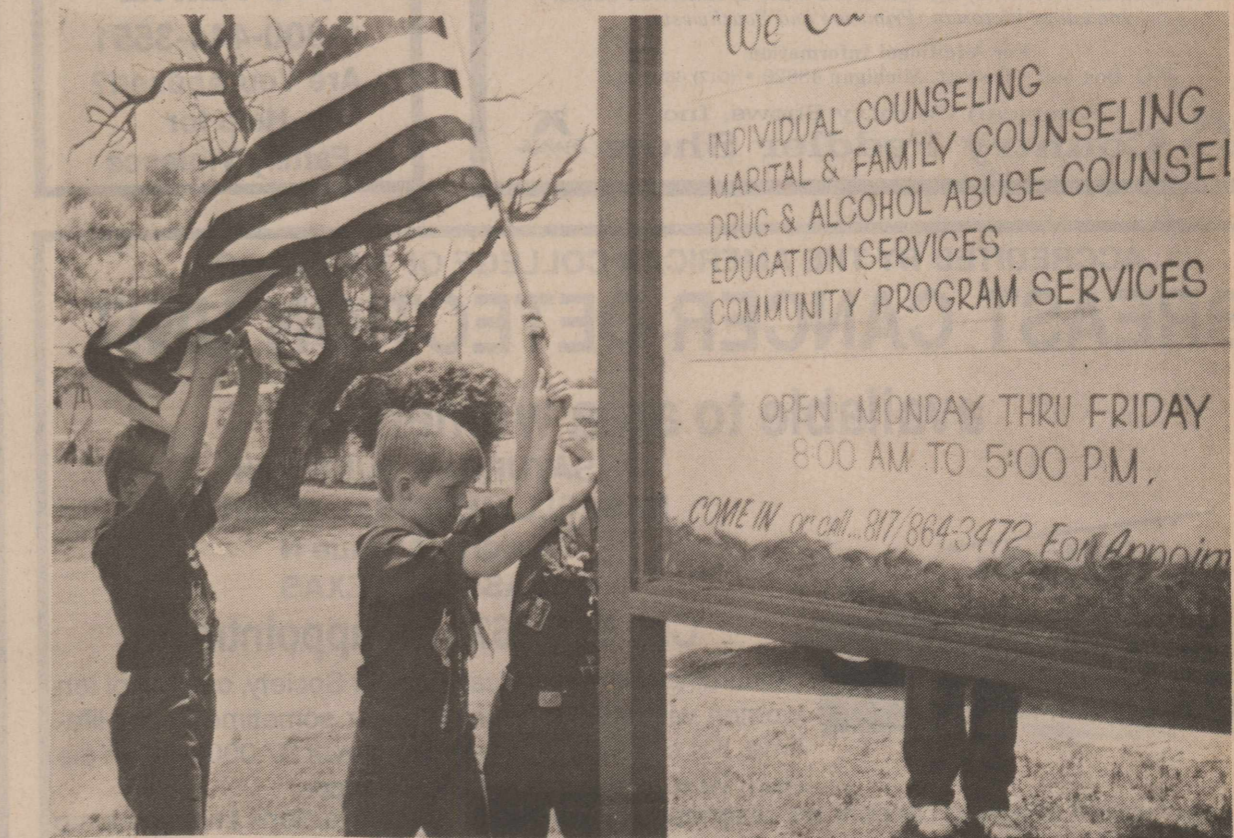
A native of Minneapolis, he grew up in Wisconsin and Southern California. He attended Tarrant County Junior College and received

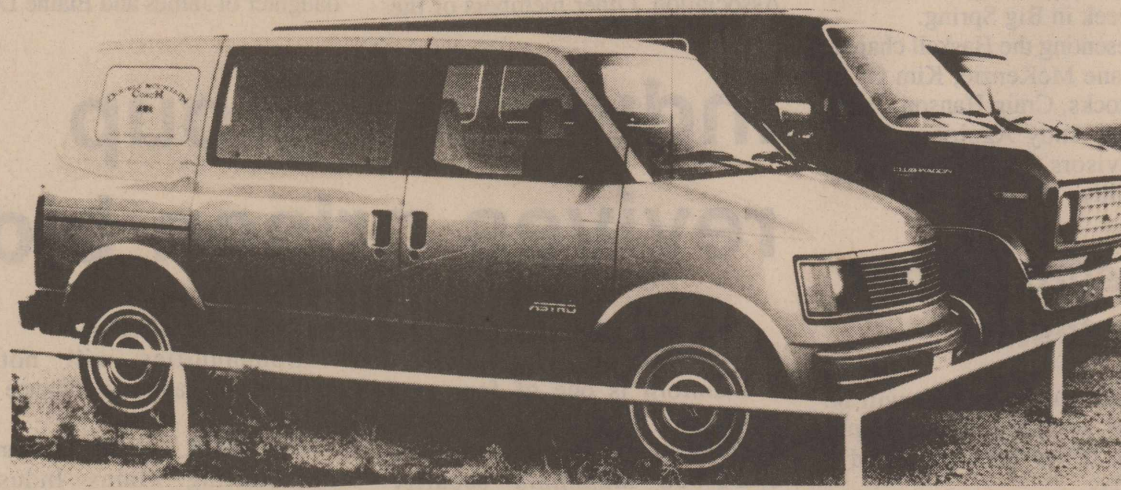

## DOUBLE MOUNTAIN COACH PROVIDES SERVICE TO 6 COUNTIES

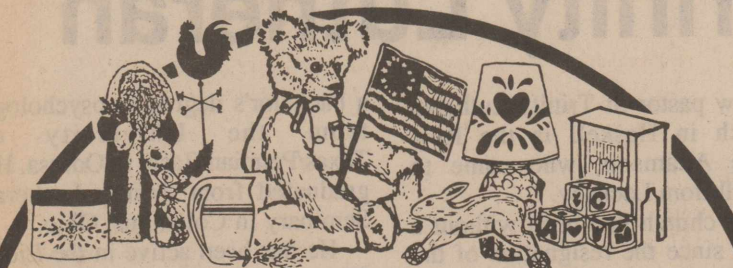


The Double Mountain Coach, located on South Washington in Aspermont Small Business Development Center offices, is a rural public transportation service utilized by the general public of our six (6) county service area. This service is equipped with nine vans that provide transportation to qualifying individuals in Stonewall, Kent, Knox, Jones, Haskell and Throckmorton counties. Four of these vans are stationed in Aspermont, one van is equipped with a wheelchair lift and other features which make travel for medical passengers more comfortable. The other vans are standard vans with many comfort options. The other vans are located in Jayton, Haskell, Hamlin and Throckmorton.

The Double Mountain Coach service employs eleven employees in the entire program. This service has been available for the counties for six years and many residents of our area have derived a great benefit from it. The passengers are picked up at their homes, taken where they need to go and returned back to their homes by the drivers of the vans. Drivers are Vance Morgan, Marshall Conner, Gloria Cork, Melvin Scott and Rick Montez. All drivers have had training in CPR, First-Aid, Passenger Assistance Techniques and Defensive Driving.

Most of our trips, at this time, are medical related; however, other requests are taken as space is available. The Double Mountain Coach Program Director is Dana Myers. The economy and the publicity of the service have contributed to the rise of passengers.

Service is curb-to-curb and all seats are reserved on a first come, first serve basis and a 24-hour advance notice is required. More information may be received by calling 989-2239.

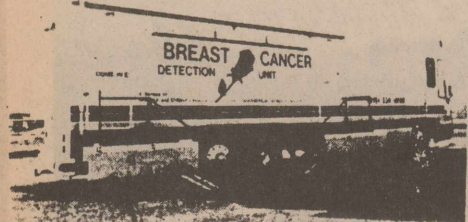

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as a result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate. The cost is only \$60.00. A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Government sales described

Pssst! Do you want to get the inside scoop on buying cars, office furniture, paint, tools, clothing and other surplus goods from Uncle Sam?

You can send \$10 or \$20 to some post office box for information that may or may not be correct, or you can write to Uncle Sam and get the information straight from the source.

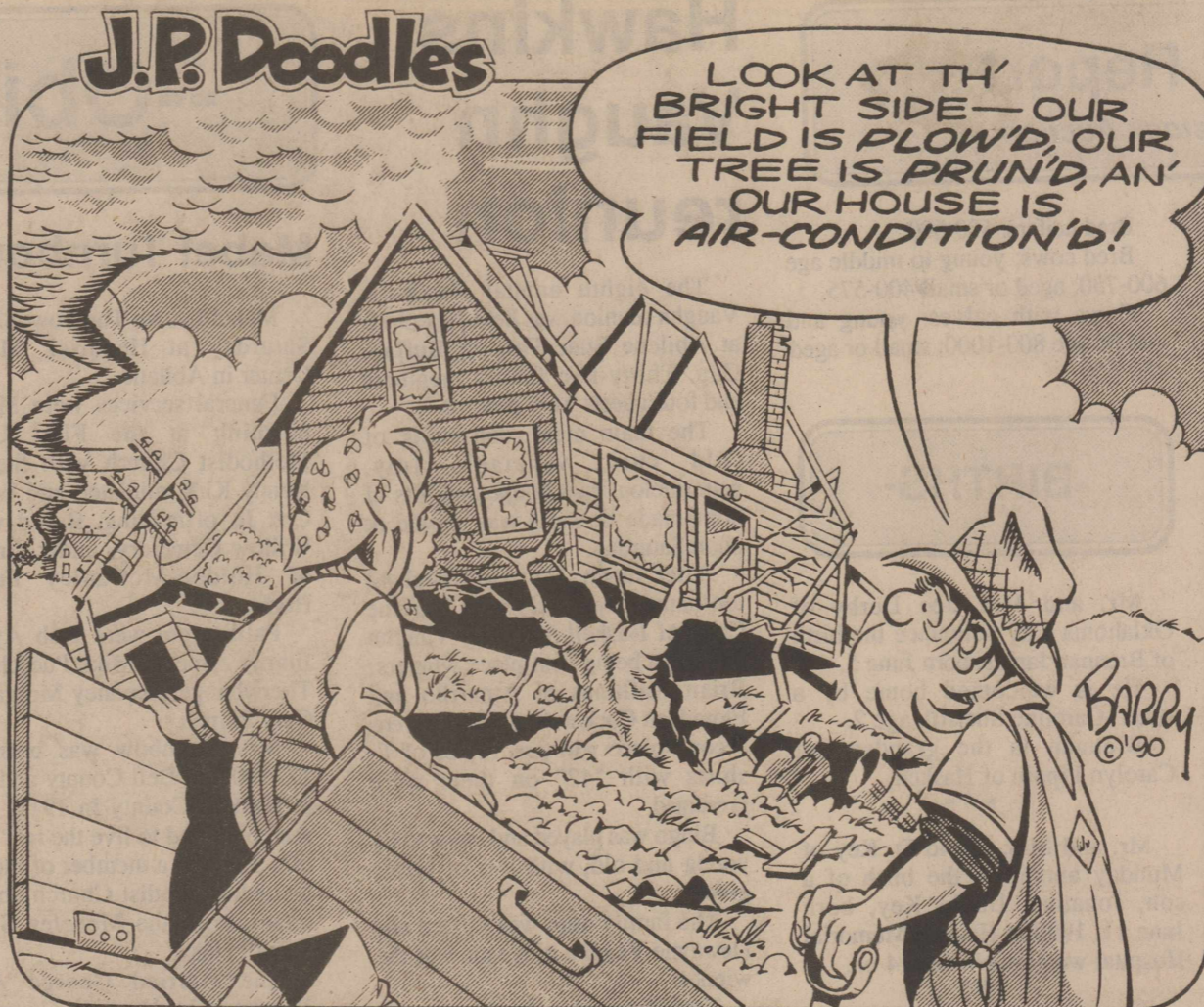
The Consumer Information Center offers a booklet that gives you straight-forward information on buying surplus property from the government. *How to Buy Surplus Personal Property from the Department of Defense* is a 51-page booklet that tells how to find out what personal property is for sale, as well as where and how to bid on it. You can get a copy by sending your name, address and \$1.50 to: Consumer Information Center, Dept. 161W, Pueblo, CO 81009.

Surplus federal property is sold in several different ways, depending on what it is and how much is for sale. Large quantities of goods that have wide commercial application--such as office furniture--are sold nationally by sealed bid, by auction, or by negotiated sale. Large amounts of recyclable goods, such as scrap metals, are also sold this way. Small quantities of items that hold broad interest are sold locally either by auction or spot bid at Defense Reutilization and Marketing offices. These offices are listed in the booklet.

The booklet also contains a surplus property bidder's application which interested customers must send in. The form allows you to designate the sort of property that interests you, whether it be lighting fixtures, power tools or any of the dozens of other categories. The booklet lists them all.

As soon as the Defense Department receives your application, it will start to send you announcements for the sales that interest you and invitations to bid on property.

You'll also get a free copy of the *Consumer Information Catalog*. Published quarterly by the Consumer Information Center of the General Services Administration, the catalog lists about 200 free and low cost consumer publications from the federal government.

20 Years Ago  
June 25, 1970

Thomas McAdams and Wayne Lehrer have been hired as coaches by the Haskell school board.

A 58-year-old O'Brien man has been charged in the fatal shooting of his wife and stepson three miles north of Rochester Saturday.

In addition, Stewart said the state figures on state aid currently received by Haskell ISD differs substantially with the actual figures.

He estimated the increased state aid for Haskell next year will be closer to \$300,000, even if the bill survives challenges which he feels sure are to be lodged.

Carriker's release also listed increases for other county schools: Rule, \$88,719; Rochester, \$34,432; and Paint Creek, \$18,965.
