Research Grant For Cancer Prevention Announced

Texas Tech University and Texas Tech University Health Sciences Center, in partnership with United Supermarkets has announced a publicprivate partnership to develop, implement and evaluate a multitiered approach to enhance primary cancer prevention and help cancer survivors reduce their risk for cancer recurrence, within rural communities.
