Continued from A1 restrictions, the judge said her meeting with center officials hadn't provided a solution to the problem.
She explained that the senior center had decided it would need more than $\$ 5$ per meal, with the additional requirement that all donations toward Meals on Wheels be turned over to the center. "It's a no brainer," the judge told the commissioners, referring to the senior rer
explained that the SPAG funding provides $\$ 1.18$ for each meal, and that the Meals on Wheels donations pay the remaining cost. Handing over the the SPAG funding th judge said, would still require the county to fund more than $\$ 3.82$ per meal.

The outcome of the legal action probably won't be known until after the first of the year, so we have to be ready to comply by January," Hill said. "Today's fuel cost filing is part of that plan. If the EPA rule changes and the resulting higher fuel costs don't materialize, we will not implement the planned increase.
