

It doesn't take much of a Texas expert to recognize that those are the state's six largest cities, although the order is a little off.

But do our out-of-state visitors really like to visit the cities?

According to questionnaires filled out by the tourists, 22.6 percent of them listed "big cities" as what they enjoyed about Texas.

But 30 percent of them said they enjoyed the "small towns."

If you like statistics, you'll love the annual survey, produced by the State Department of Highways and Public Transportion.

The rest of the space in this column is yielded to Jim Hudson of *The Perryton Herald*, without endorsing his philosophy:

Even during a session of the Texas Legislature like this one that has proposed some monumentally bad ideas---'Robin Hood' school financing plan, state income tax, expansion of the state bureaucracy, etc.---a good idea finds its way to the surface of the Austin quagmire. Rep. Larry Evans, D-Houston, has introduced a bill that would give convicted capital murderers the choice of execution sites.

Under the provisions of the bill, an inmate on death row would be able to decide if his execution were to be carried out inside the Walls Unit death chamber or on the steps of the courthouse in the county in which the crime was committed. Another part of the legislation would change the time of execution to high noon. Currently, most death warrants stipulate that the execution must be carried out before dawn on the day determined by the trial court judge. As a result, most executions are done shortly after midnight on the appointed day in the privacy of the Huntsville prison. The Evans bill, though it has very little chance of passage, improves the way executions are handled in Texas in two ways. A change in the timing of carrying out the sentence of death would bring executions in line with other functions of government. No other part of state government performs their main functions under cover of night. Execution of convicted criminals is a legitimate and necessary part of governmental function and should be carried out in the light of day. By conducting their function at midnight, the prison officials convey that there is something wrong with executing a convicted criminal. The second part of the Evans bill, public execution on the courthouse steps, is another needed change. The death penalty, to be an effective deterrent to crime, should be widely publicized. Nothing would stick in a young person's mind like the sight of a convicted criminal meeting his end on the steps of the local courthouse. It would be a very graphic representation that crime truly does not pay. By having the execution in the county where the crime was committed, the citizens of that county would gain a renewed faith in the criminal justice system. Seeing their sentence imposed before their collective eyes would affirm the place that local juries have in the legal system. Rep. Evans is to be commended for trying to bring the public and the light of day back to the final disposition of crimes. How many other legislators will agree with Evans and vote for these beneficial changes?

Spices like cinnamon and cloves may increase the effect of insulin in the body and may lower heart disease risk, new research from the USDA in Beltsville Maryland, suggests. In a test tube, foods with these spices seem to triple the hormone's ability to metabolize glucose.

Even infants may have migraine headaches, say researchers at the Arkansas Children's Hospital in Little Rock. Those with parents and siblings with migraine are most likely to get them. The most severe symptoms seem to respond to antidepressants and antihistamines.

Researchers in high-tech companies in Silicone Valley are designing new "delivery" systems for retinoic acid, the vitamin A derivative said to smooth away wrinkles. Microsponge version slows down the dose to minimize dryness, stinging and red ness. ***

Dental procedures should be accompanied routinely by antibiotic coverage for people with abnormal heart valves or artificial joints, the American Journal of Medicine reports. ***

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Notes From The Rolling Plains

Note: The following is one of a series of stories by noted wildlife photographer Nyman Meinzer offered by Haskell Save-A-\$ for your enjoyment.)

From the sandstone corridors of Los Lingos narrows I stepped into the light of morning, embracing the new sounds that greeted me. Water, only a few yards away, bubbled from the canyon floor as erosion severed a vein from the Ogalla aquifer, releasing its cool, fresh liquid to the delight of countless creatures which call Los Lingos their home. Continuing my walk I catch the faint rattle of rocks and see a large raccoon trekking along a crystal pool of fresh water. Maintaining a steady pace I am soon standing by a small water fall coming from a side canyon into Los Lingos. The water rushing over a rock embankment, mingling with that of The Tongue, and meandering on through the canyon. Dwarfed by the columns of sandstone above me, I round the bend in Los Lingos and stop momentarily. It is true. I hear the splash of water ahead, the sound of Los Lingos falls as it ascends its 12 foot drop into the crystaline pool below. No doubt these falls have known the faces of many people during the past two centuries and before. Stepping to the rocky edge I watch as the cold water, born from the depths of the earth, spills over the sandstone ledge, falling in a glittering spray in the light of morning. Tracks in the sand tell of night creatures who come to this canyon pool, drinking and perhaps capturing the minnows that dart about. I sit under a great overhang and listen to the flowing waters, wondering how many men and women in the past have sat in this exact spot, pondering their future, however bright or bleak it may have been. With photos taken and the morning sun climbing higher in the sky, I gather my gear and head west leaving behind the falls of The Tongue, but taking with me this experience of spiritual solitude.
