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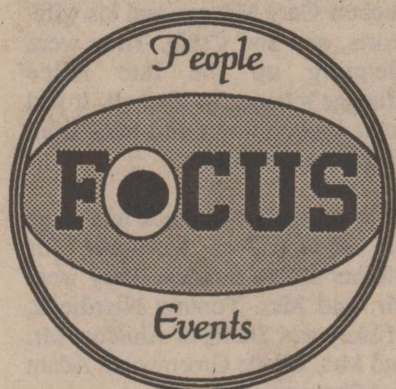

Spraying dates for the pecan nut casebearer in Haskell County have been set as May 23-29.

Eggs usually are deposited on tips of nuts. Examine nutlet clusters for greenish white eggs. Spray nutlet clusters thoroughly when egg hatch is occurring.

If additional treatment is needed, the interval between applications should be about seven days.

Caps, imprinted with "Sagerton, Texas", will be sold.

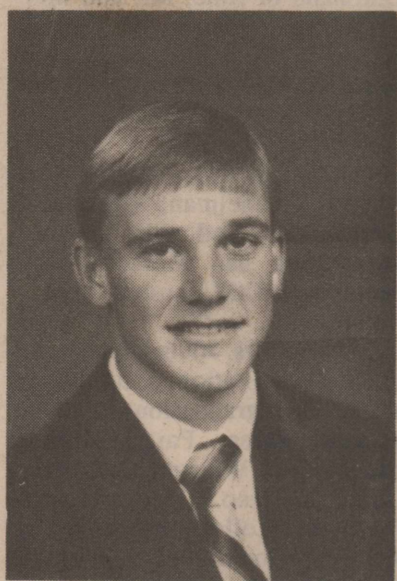
Many pilots expected for annual fly-in breakfast

The fly-in was initiated in 1988 as a means of attracting pilots and



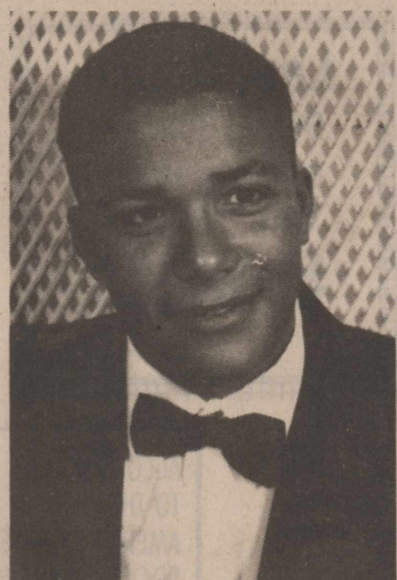

Miss Amy Fry, cousin of the bride from Enid, Okla., attended the registry and greeted the guests upon their arrival at the church. The registry table was draped with a pale pink cotton cloth adorned with hand embroidery and satin stitch. A crystal bud vase filled with roses and a portrait of the couple decorated the table.

The church carillon chimed wedding music to announce the event. Inside the church, pre-wedding music on the pipe organ was played by Nelda Lane.

At the altar, candles were lighted by Becky Sherman of Frederick, Okla., and Russ Fry of Enid, Okla., cousins of the bride.

The groom seated his mother. She wore a black linen suit accented by a pale pink blouse. The mother of the bride was seated by her nephew, Rob Sherman, of Frederick, Okla., cousin of the bride. She wore a pale pink double-breasted coat dress with cutwork collar and lapel. Both mothers wore corsages of ming fern and enchantment lilies. Grandmothers wore white cymbidium orchids. attired in black onyx tuxedos with subtle stripes, one-button single-breasted styling, satin notch lapels and self-top collars. The old house didn't look as big as I remembered it. And the white paint had been done over with a yellow coating. The wooden floor of the curved front porch had been replaced by concrete.

But it still stands. And there's still a touch of eloquence about it. And memories.

I drove by it three times before I got up the nerve to stop. A kid was in the yard. I asked who lived there now. He told me, but I can't remember the name of the family.

Back in 1906, my great-aunt, my grandmother's sister, had come to Oklahoma from Kentucky as a new bride and this was her first, and only, home. Years later after my mother died, Aunt Minnie, by then a widow, took in my dad and his seven kids. This was our home from 1933 until the last sibling went off to college in 1950. And it was still "home" to go back to until my aunt died in 1962. We sold the house to the president of the bank, who later sold it to someone else.

The teenager asked me if I would like to take a peek inside. I opted to look in the South Room. (All our bedrooms had names: South Room, East Room, Little Room and Back Room.)

The South Room was something special. It occupied the space inside a horseshoe-shaped front porch, necessitating its six sides. I don't know the dimensions, but it was massive. The room had two outside doors, but there was no door connecting it to any part of the rest of the house. A person sleeping there was totally isolated from anyone in the main part of the house.

The family didn't use the South Room. It was our guest room. And we "loaned" it out to neighbors when they had more company than they could handle.

It fulfilled another need when my two brothers and I reached high school age. Dozens of boys slept there. That was in the days when most kids lived in the country. Often after a ball game or some other school function, a boy, or two or three boys, would be stranded in town. They always knew they could sleep there if they didn't have a way to get home. The doors were never locked.

It was interesting. We never knew who we'd have as breakfast guests.

My aunt loved it. She used to say that when she died, she wanted her pallbearers to come from the boys who had slept in that room. That wish was fulfilled.

But like the outside of the house, the South Room had changed. A door had been cut into the north wall, connecting the room to the East Room. The uniqueness had been destroyed.

The accomodating "tour guide" invited me to see more. I declined his invitation. I had seen enough.

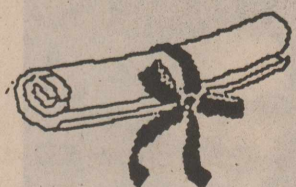


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Patriotism is topic of program

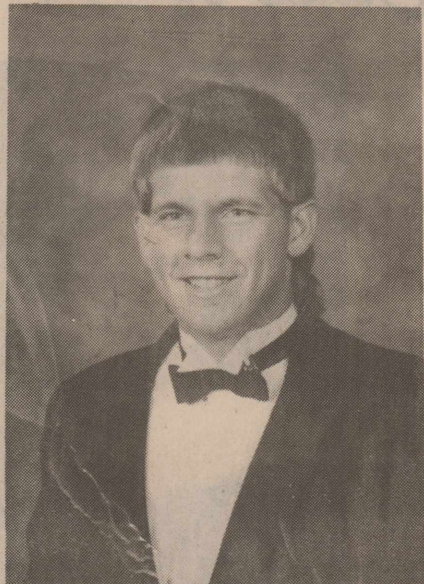
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Student accepted for Tech program

Haskell senior Chris McGhee will join the photography staff at Texas Tech University as a participant in the 1991-92 apprenticeship program.

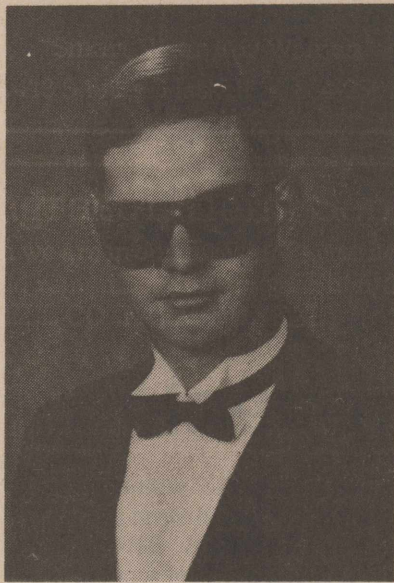
He was selected for one of two photography apprenticeships offered by the university's publications department.

Driving course scheduled

55 Alive/Mature Driving, an innovative, classroom driver retraining program designed to help older persons improve their driving skills, is offering an additional class in Haskell. A definite date has not been set, but it probably will be in early June.

Developed by the American Association of Retired Persons (AARP), 55 Alive/Mature Driving is the first comprehensive driver retraining course geared to the specific needs of older motorists.

The course material covers the effects of aging and medications on driving, basic driving rules, license renewal, local traffic hazards, adverse road conditions, energy saving, and accident prevention measures.

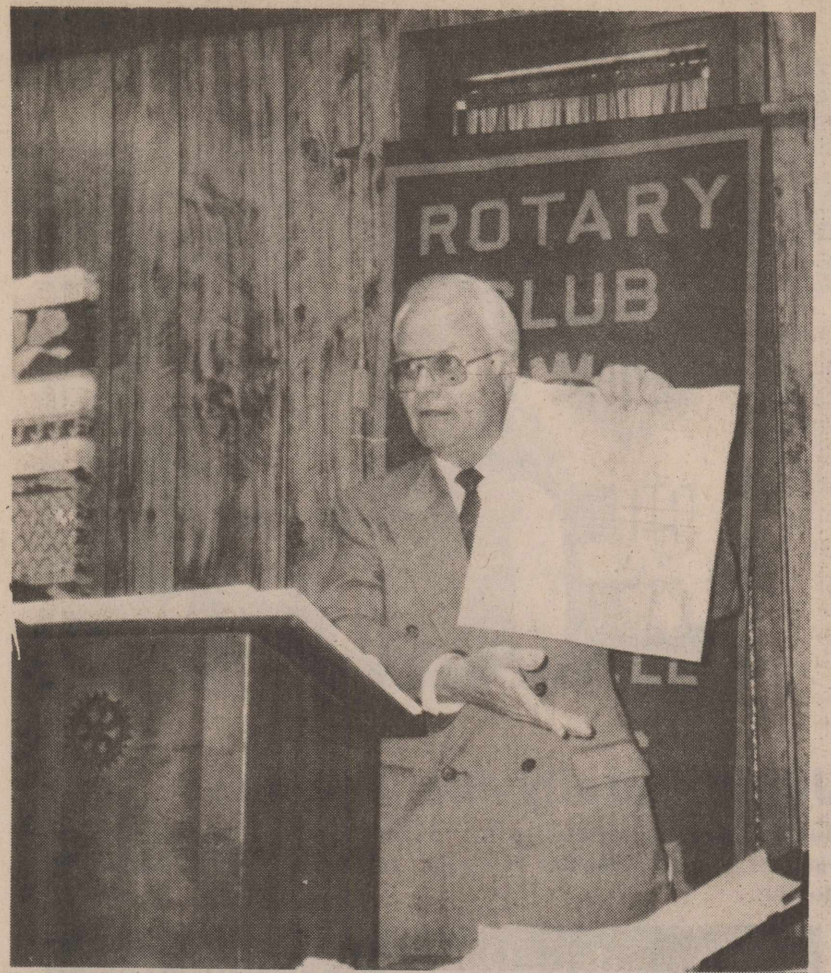
Research shows that older drivers are involved in more accidents than their middle-aged counterparts when the record is based on actual miles driven. The physical changes of aging create difficulties for many older drivers when yielding the right-of-way, backing, turning, changing lanes and entering and leaving expressways.

However, research also indicates that older persons can improve their driving abilities through additional training, attention and practice, enabling them to maintain their driving licenses longer while driving more safely.

Too, with many insurance companies, taking this course qualifies the individual for a 10-percent reduction on the major parts of their insurance policies.

Persons 55 years of age or older are eligible to participate in the program and may even qualify to become instructors. (All instructors and most other personnel in the program are unpaid volunteers who desire to be of service to others.)

TV weatherman talks to Rotary

KTAB-TV weatherman Bill Chaney spoke to the Haskell Rotary Club last Thursday.

Chaney said his television station tries to air all adverse weather conditions in the Big Country in order to warn residents of possible danger.

"We get a lot of complaints from viewers in Abilene for the time we take to warn viewers in other areas of possible weather dangers," said the weatherman.

Chaney said weather reporting has progressed greatly in the 25 years he has been in Abilene. When he first joined KRBC, he said he gave his weather reports primarily from a UPI map and an AP

temperature chart.

New equipment and great advances in weather forecasting have enabled today's reports to be much more informative and more accurate.

Chaney explained that tornados are rated F0 to F5 on a Fujita scale, with the most severe being an F5 rating when winds are 261 to 318 miles per hour and damage is incredible. He estimated the April 24 tornado in Haskell as an F3 (winds between 158 and 206 miles per hour with severe damage).

The veteran weatherman told of many more advances in weather reporting and predicted even greater advancements for the future.

Richard Bailey

Richard Wilson Bailey died Tuesday, May 14, in Haskell Memorial Hospital. He was 89.

Funeral services were last Thursday afternoon at the Church of Christ with Dale Huff officiating. Burial was in Willow Cemetery, directed by Holden-McCauley Funeral Home.

Pallbearers were Glen Merchant, H. V. Woodard, Burl Medford, Ted Jennings, Lyndell Lockett and Alton Lockett.

Mr. Bailey, a retired farmer and trucker, was born Feb. 23, 1902, in Cook County. He married Oleta Merle Wells in Mineral Wells on July 2, 1957. He moved to Haskell from Mineral Wells in 1965. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

He is survived by his wife and two sisters, Lillian Bridgers of Walters, Okla., and Geneva Lockett of Granbury. He was preceded in death by a brother, John Bailey.

Omar Burleson

Former Congressman Omar Burleson, who represented the 17th Congressional District for an

unprecedented 32 years died Tuesday (May 14) in an Abilene hospital. He was 85.

Funeral services were Friday afternoon at the Anson Church of Christ. Burial was in Mount Hope Cemetery near Anson, directed by Lawrence Funeral Home of Anson.

Burleson represented the 17th District from Jan. 3, 1947, until his retirement on Jan. 3, 1979.

Born in Anson on March 19, 1906, Burleson attended public schools in Anson, Abilene Christian College and Hardin-Simmons University and obtained a law degree from Cumberland University in Tennessee.

He started his career as a lawyer in Gorman in 1929. He served as county attorney and judge of Jones County for eight years before becoming a special agent for the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He entered the Navy in World War II and served three and a half years with duty in the North Atlantic and South Pacific. He was discharged as a lieutenant commander.

Burleson was elected to the 80th Congress as a Democrat and re-elected to 15 succeeding Congresses. His career in the House of Representatives saw him unanimously elected to the Ways and Means Committee in July

1969.

He served as chairman of the House Administration; a member of the Budget Committee; a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee; chairman of the National Security and Scientific Developments Affecting Foreign Policy Subcommittee; chairman of the Joint Senate-House Committee on the Library of Congress; vice chairman of the Joint Senate-House Committee on Printing; a member of the House Foreign Affairs Committee; and a member of the Library of Congress Trust Fund Board. He held a 98-percent attendance record at roll call votes and was known as a progressive-conservative.

In 1970, he was named outstanding alumnus of the year at Abilene Christian College. He also was awarded honorary doctorate degrees from Hardin-Simmons University and Abilene Christian University.

After his retirement, his papers and desk were donated to ACU's library. In 1978, the post office and Federal building in Abilene was named in honor of him.

He was preceded in death by his wife, the former Ruth DeWeese of Anson.



Stewart receives recognition

Bobby C. Stewart of Euless received the "Outstanding Cost Effectiveness Accomplishments" award at the Dallas-Fort Worth Federal Executive Board (FEB) Interagency Awards Program.

Stewart, a traffic management specialist with the General Services Administration (GSA) in Fort Worth, saved an estimated \$17.7 million in fiscal year 1990 by negotiation of favorable motor freight rates.

"Stewart helped initiate the Standard Tender of Service (STOS) in 1989, then used it to negotiate rates with individual carriers which were among the lowest in the nation," said FEB Chairman Paul F. Larson. "His agency's zone led the nation in savings with an average cost reduction of 46.5 percent."

The STOS established a uniform method for motor carriers to provide services to civilian government offices and provided a method of submitting rates and charges. This simplified process made it easier for the government to evaluate offers and make cost comparisons.

Larson said Stewart played a significant role in the development of the national STOS program, which has proven to be one of the most significant cost savings initiatives in recent GSA history.

Stewart was honored as one of the "best and the brightest" of some 42,000 federal employees in the Dallas-Fort Worth area during Public Service Recognition Week May 6-12.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. I. Stewart of Benbrook, formerly of Weinert and O'Brien. He is a nephew of Earnest Stewart of Haskell and Eunice Sonnemaker.

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

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




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

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Meeks all-district in track at MSU

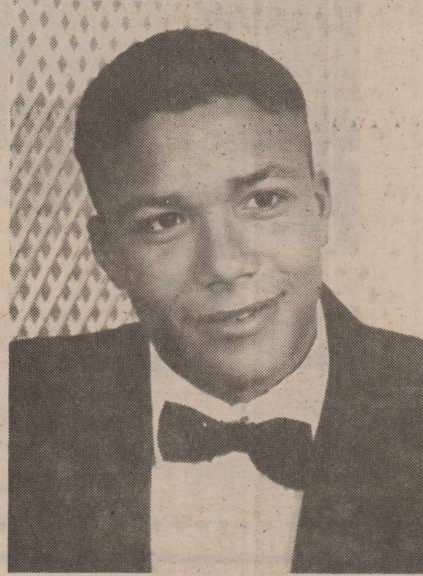

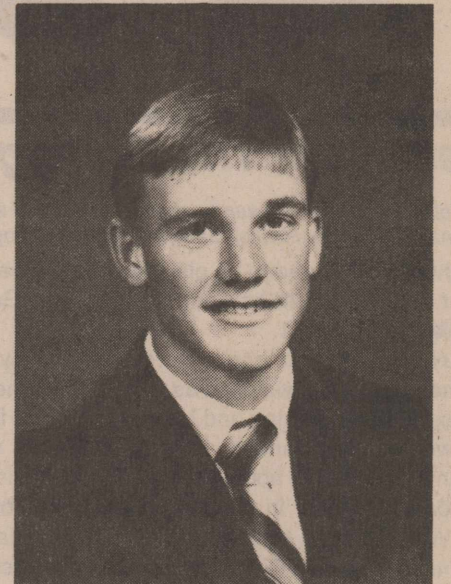

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Notes From The Rolling Plains

(Note: The following is one of a series of stories by noted wildlife photographer Wyman Meinzer offered by Haskell Save-A-\$ for your enjoyment.)

"The Lightning appeared to be playing about in the chasm far below us, Bring out, in Wild relief, its bold and craggy sides." George W. Kendall-explorer Tule Canyon 1841.

Can you imagine what those explorers felt as they stood on brink of the awesome canyon and watched as nature unleashed its wrath on the plains of Texas? Ray Penman and I can attest to the feeling of insignificance as we too experienced some of the very weather that the frontiersman in 1841 wrote about during his first sighting of Tule Canyon over 1 1/2 centuries ago. In shooting photos for a book on the water courses of West Texas, I had planned a trip to this fascinating canyon because of its being a Red River tributary with both historic and geologic significance. Ray and I had established a camp where Tule creek exited the very gorge that George Kendall described during his thunderstorm interlude. Although the weather forecast was "iffy", we decided to take the chance and hope the forecasted deluge bypassed us during our two day and two night stay. The first night was unforgettable as the stars shown millions strong in the vast skies above. Coyotes howled their songs of old as the morning light revealed a light mist hanging low over the vertical sandstone cliffs. The day was eventful as we hiked up and down the picturesque gorge, skirting an irrate rattler and various other less trying reptiles that inhabited the landscape. As nightfall settled in for our second sleep under the stars, an ominous rumble could be heard far to the northwest. Our camping gear packed, with the exception of our tents and sleeping bags, we were ready for a quick escape up to high ground in case of a flash flood. The dancing reflection of our campfire was not unlike the flash of lightning that glowed in the glowering thunderheads to the north. By midnight we had decided that the storm had mercifully passed us by, allowing us an escape to the summit by the light of day. But before the storm had abated, we were treated to nature's drumrolls unlike one will hear on the plains above. Bombarded by the echoes from the towering cliffs, the thunder seemed to shake the very cliffs that stood guard over this high plains masterpiece. Standing in the glow of the juniper fueled firelight, we too felt the impotence with which nature displays its might during the clash of the weather systems high in the night skies over Texas.

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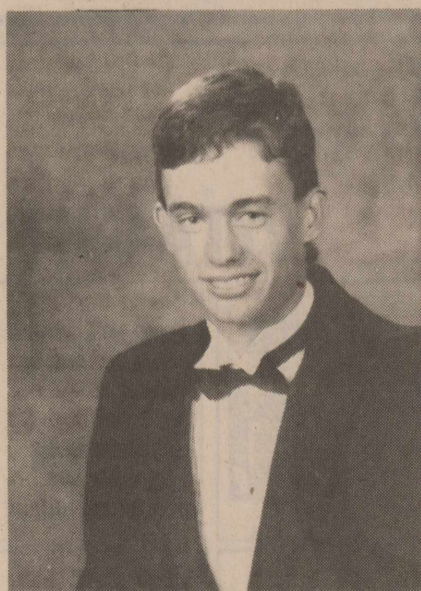


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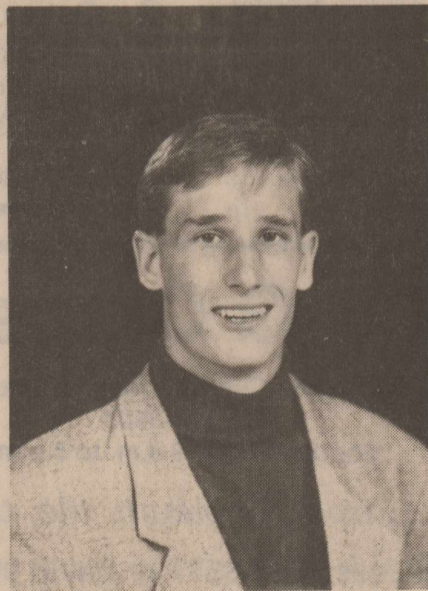


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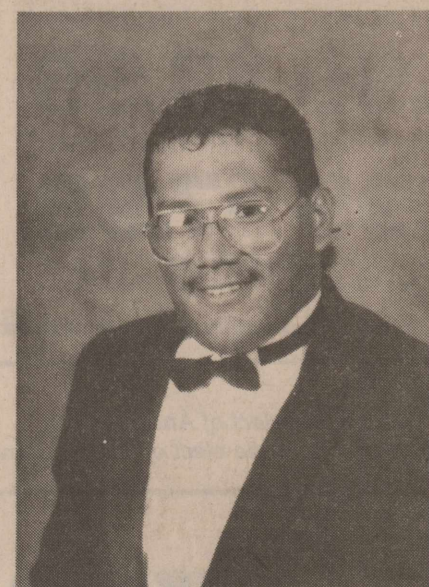
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Winners named in 4-H contests

PHARMACY TOPICS

People at risk for heart disease may also be at risk for diabetes, according to a study at the University of Texas Health Science Center in San Antonio. Researchers suggest they be tested for diabetes to avoid the heart damage that diabetes causes.

Calcium supplements may seem ineffective in "young" postmenopausal women, but those who are 5 years or more past the change do benefit, the New England Journal of Medicine reports.

Dual-drug therapy seems to be effective in preventing recurrence of stage-C colon cancer that is removed by surgery. Research at the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minnesota, combined Levamisole and Fluorouracil, neither successful alone.

People with rheumatoid arthritis rarely develop Alzheimer's, according to a study reported in the British medical journal, Lancet. Some doctors credit the high doses of aspirin that arthritis sufferers have taken over the years.

Folks who have to take a lot of aspirin often choose the coated and buffered products available at
