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## Finnell seeking re-election to House

State Rep. Charles Finnell, D-Holliday, has announced plans to seek re-election in the enlarged 68th district of the Texas House of Representatives.

The vast 13-county district represented by Finnell will now include Haskell, Cottle, Throckmorton and Young counties, as well as the current district counties of Archer, Baylor, Clay, Foard, Hardeman, Jack, Montague, Wilbarger and rural Wichita county.

The Archer County businessman and legislator said he felt it is important to continue representing the people of the district as dean of the Northwest Texas delegation, rather than to seek any other political post at this time. He currently serves as vice chairman of the Agriculture Committee and is regarded by his colleagues as an experienced leader in the House Government Organization and Redistricting committees.

"I am asking my friends and neighbors of our Northwest Texas region to support our campaign to continue streamlining our state government, which we have only begun during the current legislative session," Finnell said. "Of course, I am proud of the accomplishments we have achieved, yet, now is not the time to sit back and revel in these successes--not when there is so much work left to do."

In his announcement, Finnell outlined several programs among those he plans to pursue during the next term.

"As you may be aware, the so-called 'Henry Lee Lucas Law' that I passed in 1985 to ensure that criminals do not reap rewards from greedy magazine and book publishers and Hollywood producers is in danger of being declared unconstitutional by the U.S. Supreme Court," Finnell stated. "I am working with the Crime Victim's Compensation Division of our Attorney General's office to ensure this law remains protected and criminals do not benefit from preying upon innocent Texans."

Finnell said he also plans to make improvements in health care a major component of his itinerary. "We must improve the state of rural health care. Across Texas, our

health care delivery system has reached the critical stage. We must work with the Center for Rural Health Care Initiatives' HealthFind program to recruit and retain badly needed medical professionals in our communities," he said.

"This is certainly a very aggressive agenda I am proposing for the next session. It is an agenda that will undoubtedly be a challenge. However, I have been a problem solver my entire life. When some see pitfalls, I envision opportunities for improvement."

"I look forward to serving you and your family as your state representative. Together, we can face the challenges that are before us. With the support of the people in our Northwest Texas 68th House District, we will succeed."

Finnell and his wife, the former Kay Fitzpatrick, are members of the Holliday United Methodist Church. He is an independent oil producer in a general partnership with his brother, Leslie. He also is a Texas Commissioner with the Interstate Oil and Gas Compact and a member of the Holliday Chamber of Commerce.

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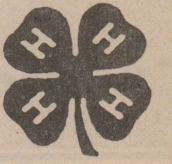

## --Social Security--

Does your child have a Social Security number? If not, you should be aware that federal law now requires that most children have a Social Security number.

One of the provisions of the new law is that 1991 tax returns, to be filed by April 15, 1992, show the Social Security number of any child claimed as a dependent who reaches age 1 by the end of this year. Previously, federal law required a Social Security number for any dependent age 2 or older.

It is easy for a parent to obtain a Social Security number for a child if he or she has not already done so.

All the parent has to do is contact the local Social Security office to request a Form SS-5 (application for a Social Security card). It's a simple, one-page form that can be completed in a few minutes.

A person applying for a number for a child will need to submit evidence of the child's age, identity and U.S. citizenship or lawful alien status. The person also must provide evidence of his or her own identity.

A public birth record may be used as evidence of age and U.S. citizenship for a person born in the United States. Another document to establish identity--such as a medical record or day care record--may be required. If the child was born outside the U.S., a birth certificate or passport and a U.S. immigration document can be used as evidence of age, identity and lawful alien status. The application lists examples of documents that can be used.

Once we have examined the documents, we will give them back to the applicant and issue a Social Security card for the child, usually within two weeks.

officer began pursuit, turned on his red light and then his siren. When Versyp pulled up beside the vehicle, he said Ryan pointed a pistol. Versyp dropped back and radioed the DPS, warning that the driver was armed.

Trooper Shaw, heading south out of Anson, met Ryan and turned around and started chasing him. Two more officers stationed themselves at the US 277-180 intersection in Anson to clear traffic for the coming chase through town. Ryan approached the intersection at an estimated speed of 90 miles per hour, but slowed down enough to somehow manage to negotiate the route around the Jones County courthouse.

Stamford officers blocked off approaches to that town to keep the chase on the highway as it continued through Stamford. Two Haskell County deputy sheriffs, Mark Collins and David Halliburton, attempted to set up a roadblock at the roadside park north of Stamford, but Ryan sped through before they could get the vehicles in place. It was at this point that Mills joined the chase, having been waiting near the park.

Wester and Barrett commandeered two semi-trailer trucks in Haskell and hastily set up a roadblock on US 277 near Strickland Bridge, leaving a passageway between the two vehicles as required by law. Ryan made it through the opening before his tire was shot.

On searching Ryan's car, officers uncovered the apparent suicide weapon, an automatic .32 caliber Llama pistol. A receipt indicated the gun had been purchased Jan. 17, but there was no indication as to where it was bought.

Also uncovered was a 50-count shell box, presumably bought at the time the gun was purchased. Thirty-four shells were still in the box. There was another shell in the chamber, four in the clip in the gun, and eight in another clip. Two empty casings accounted for two more shells, making 49 of the 50 shells accounted for. Mills did not dismiss the possibility that Ryan fired a couple of shots at Versyp near Hawley with one of the spent cartridges going out the window.

Officers were able to contact Ryan's brother Saturday morning. They had found an address book containing the number of a "Ryan" in Georgia. A call to the number Friday was answered with a recording, but they were able to get through the next day.

## Visitors to Texas enjoy photography

Visitors to Texas always rank shopping, historical tours and historical museums as the top three activities while in Texas. And when asked what they enjoyed about Texas, friendliness, followed by scenery were the top answers.

A news release from the Texas Department of Licensing and Regulation says in part: "The newly expanded Architectural Barriers Act promises to greatly improve building and facility access for the over 4 million persons in Texas with hearing, sight, mobility or other disabilities."

If there are 4 million handicapped Texans, that would be about 23 percent of the state's 17.4 million population. That's almost one out of every four.

Over the past 10 years, state spending has more than doubled, going from \$12.1 billion to \$25.6 billion, says the Texas Research League. That's an annual rate of 8.7 percent.

Similar to campaigns released in 1989 and 1990, the campaign continues to emphasize what health officials call the geometric nature of sexual risk. Having sex with one person, officials say, can be like having sex with a chain of sexual partners.

One TV ad uses a series of sequentially lighted candles to illustrate the sexual chain. In another spot, a slowly floating

selection of men's and women's underwear establishes the multiple-partner concept. A third spot features an on-the-street interview in which an off-camera announcer tries to convince a young woman that she's had sex with "that man over there," a man the woman has never met.

"Generally speaking, Texans know how to reduce the risk of AIDS," said Rod Underhill, a spokesman for The Richards Group, the Dallas advertising agency which created the campaign. "They know about condoms. They know about abstinence. But too many at-risk people aren't using precautions because they don't believe the AIDS danger applies to them. We're trying to convince them that it does."

Some 14,546 AIDS cases have been reported in Texas, about 3,000 more than a year ago. TDH officials estimate that 73,000 Texans are infected with HIV, the AIDS-causing virus.

TDH operates a toll-free AIDSLINE, 1-800-299-AIDS for information and referral service.

### Property rights top issue of Farm Bureau

The president of the Texas Farm Bureau labeled private property rights as the No. 1 issue of the 1992 American Farm Bureau convention, which concluded Jan. 16 in Kansas City, Mo.

S. M. True, head of Texas' largest general farm organization, said the American Farm Bureau emerged from the convention unified against the threat to private property rights posed by activists and government regulators.

True said the private property rights battles of the 90s will be fought primarily on two fronts--the regulation of wetlands and the rewrite of the Endangered Species Act later this year.

Many delegates expressed concern that federal regulation of these two issues amounts to taking private property without compensating the owners.

The increase brings the maximum monthly payment to a worker who retired at age 65 to \$1,088.

Higher limits on earnings of Social Security recipients also became effective this year. Those younger than 65 may now earn as much as \$7,440 a year and retirees 65-69 may earn up to \$10,200.

Mrs. Faye Walton returned Sunday night from Houston where she had been visiting her daughter, Nelta Bahnsen, for the past two weeks.

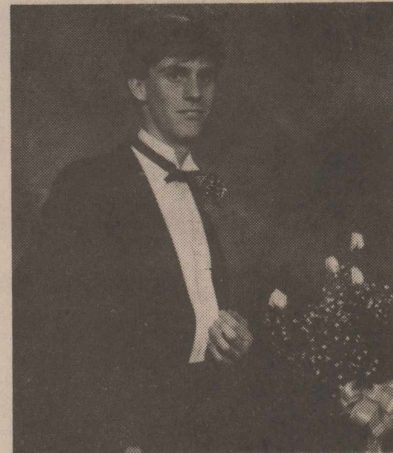

## Second flu surge may be on its way

Flu season came early in much of North America, and a second surge may be on the way.

"People who caught influenza earlier in the season could get it again, especially if a different strain hits," said Dr. W. Paul Glezen of Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "But the people who have been vaccinated are likely to be protected. The two influenza A viruses circulating are similar to those included in the current vaccine."

Flu season generally peaks in late January or early February, but an unusually early round peaked in November.

Those most at risk for potentially fatal flu complications are the elderly and people with heart disease, lung disease, asthma, chronic bronchitis, diabetes, chronic kidney disease, chronic anemia, sickle cell anemia and immune-system disorders.

"It is still not too late for people in the high-risk groups to get flu shots," Glezen said. "Such patients can be protected by taking the prescription drug amantadine during the 14 days it takes for the vaccine to provide full protection."

Most of the influenza this season has been type A, and the symptoms and duration of an influenza A attack can be minimized by amantadine.

Influenza usually strikes

suddenly and brings fever, generalized muscle pain, weakness and a dry, hacking cough.

Flu sufferers should get plenty of rest and drink lots of liquids, Glezen said.

Adults may take aspirin or an aspirin substitute to reduce fever and pain, but people younger than 21 should use only aspirin-free products.

Aspirin has been associated with Reye's syndrome, a flu and chicken pox complication that can cause vomiting, convulsions, brain damage and even death in children, said Glezen.

## Scholarship program at HSU revised

Hardin-Simmons University's new and revised scholarship program for the 1992-93 academic year includes strong academic scholarships for undergraduate students who qualify.

René Maciel, director of admissions, and Jimmy Trammell, director of financial aid, announced the revised program effective June 1.

New freshmen who make a score of 30 or more on the ACT or 1240 or more on the SAT are eligible for \$3,000 per semester tuition only and must maintain a 3.0 grade point average (GPA). Those receiving the academic scholarships must be full time students taking 12 hours or more.

Those who score 25-29 on the ACT or 1030-1230 on the SAT qualify for \$2,000 a semester and must maintain a 3.0 GPA.

New freshmen who score 22-24 on the ACT or 910-1020 on the SAT are eligible for \$1,000 per semester toward their HSU tuition. A 3.0 GPA is required for them to continue receiving the scholarship.

Transfer students with 30 or more transferrable semester hours who have a cumulative transfer GPA of 3.5 are eligible for \$1,000 a semester. They must maintain the 3.5 average to continue receiving the scholarship.

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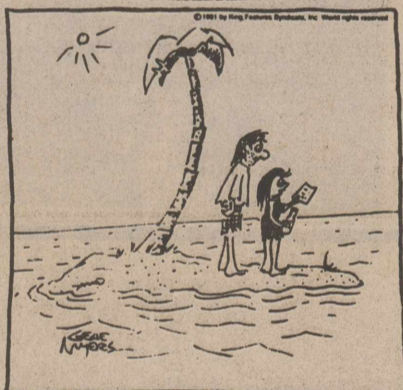

Everyone's favorite time of the year has arrived and your library is well equipped with various tax forms free for the taking. We have the standard forms and hard-to-find forms that the IRS approves for copying.

If you need a form from this group, please give me a day's notice and I will get you a copy for a fee of 25 cents. All other forms and schedules are free. If the schedule you need is not here yet, the IRS says they are in the mail and will arrive soon. (Example: EIC schedules.)

We do not answer tax questions but we do have an 800 number you can call if you are having problems understanding and filling out your tax forms.

The State cut the library budgets for the Library Systems by \$2 million over the next two years; therefore we will not be getting book bags any more. If you have plastic bags with handles you may want to BYOB---Bring Your Own Bag---to carry your books home and keep them out of the weather.

Also, because of the state budget cuts we are now responsible for absorbing the cost of lost or damaged extension and interlibrary loan books. As a precaution we are drawing up a letter for those patrons that use the extension books and order ILL books to sign so there will be no misunderstanding as to the responsibility of the patron for the replacement value of these books if something unforeseen should happen to them while in the patron's possession.

We have a few problems with ILL books not being returned so now we are asking anyone with an ILL book to return it directly to the librarian and not put it in the drop box. If this is an inconvenience to you, please call the library (864-2747) and I will be happy to work out other arrangements with you if possible.

The new extension books are finally arriving from Abilene and book orders for new non-fiction, biography, juvenile action adventure and 1992 Bluebonnets have been placed and should begin to arrive in the next four to six weeks.

The library has literally run out of book shelf space so we are now

in the process of taking donations for new shelves and the shop boys under Mr. Bevel's guidance will build them for us. These shelves are very expensive and if you would like to help your library grow and better serve you please feel free to come by and make a donation.

### Geilhausen named to dean's list

## Public Notice

On October 4, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) that proposes a new optional service called DigiLine<sup>SM</sup> Service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10655.

The monthly recurring charges for DigiLine Service consist of three major rate elements: Basic Interface Facility (\$19.00); Basic Interface Equipment (\$12.00); and, an Integrated Services Network Component for each B Channel (rate varies from \$1.90 to \$7.25 per B Channel depending on the customer's class of service and location.) Other charges may also be applicable depending on the options requested by the customer.

DigiLine Service operates only with compatibly-equipped FCC Part 68 registered equipment. The service will be offered initially in the following exchanges and within the following serving offices:

DigiLine Service may be furnished in other serving offices in any of the above exchanges in combination with foreign serving office charges. In addition, DigiLine Service may be available in other exchanges upon a customer's bona fide request. A bona fide request is a written request for service. Upon receipt of the bona fide request, Southwestern Bell will conduct an economic analysis to determine the financial viability of offering the requested service.

Southwestern Bell expects DigiLine Service to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$236,000.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in this docketed proceeding should notify the Commission as soon as possible, but not later than by February 10, 1992. 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# Missy Davis leads Lady Lobos



## Stars at Sul Ross

Sul Ross guard Missy Davis, one of the outstanding three-point shooters in the Texas Intercollegiate Athletic Association, drives to the basket for two points against Eastern New Mexico University in a Jan. 13 game. Davis, a sophomore from Haskell, is the team's leading scorer.

Sophomore Missy Davis led the Sul Ross State University Lady Lobos to two wins in three outings, scoring 81 total points.

Davis, a guard out of Haskell, put 26 points on the board in the Ladies' 79-73 win over Concordia Lutheran College Jan. 8; dumped 37 points through the hoop in an 82-80 exhibition game win over Ft. Bliss Jan. 11; and hit 18 points in a 76-56 loss to Eastern New Mexico University Jan. 13.

In the CLC contest, Davis hit five of six two-pointers, three of four three-pointers and seven of eight free throws.

Against Ft. Bliss, she set a school record from the three-point range, hitting 11 of 16. Davis was a perfect two of two from two-point territory.

The Eastern defense held Davis to only three of seven two-pointers and two of nine three-pointers. She was six of nine from the line.

Davis stepped on the floor last year as a freshman, and it was not long before she had taken over the starting point guard job.

"I had not intended for Missy to

be in the point guard position last season," said Coach Chet Sample, "but we had some personnel problems and Missy took over the team."

Sample went on to say, "She handled the pressure last year like a veteran instead of like a freshman. She was instrumental in the team's success."

This season, Davis was replaced at point guard by another freshman because Sample wanted to take advantage of her shooting skills.

"We had a couple of quick point guards come in this season, and I put Missy in the shooting guard position for her scoring potential."

Sample's decision has paid off for the Lady Lobos. Davis is pacing the Ladies in the scoring column, hitting an average of 17.7 points each contest. She is 32 of 80 from three-point territory for a 40-percent rate. She has hit 37 of 43 free throws for an 86-percent mark.

Sample said the only defense to hold Davis in check was the Eastern defense. "Eastern New Mexico has a solid team and should take the title in the Lone Star Conference, he said.

## Medicare costs rise as of Jan. 1

The out-of-pocket costs that Medicare beneficiaries pay for Medicare coverage increased as of Jan. 1.

The basic medical insurance premium--sometimes called "Part B"--increased by \$1.90--from \$29.90 to \$31.80. However, the \$100 medical insurance deductible remains unchanged.

The amount the patient pays for the Medicare hospital insurance--sometimes called "Part A"--deductible and co-insurance amounts increased as follows:

--from \$628 to \$652 a day for the first 60 days of inpatient care in a benefit period,

--from \$157 to \$163 a day for the 61st through the 90th day of inpatient care,

--from \$314 to \$326 a day for the 60 hospital reserve days,

--from \$78.50 to \$81.50 for the 21st through the 100th day of care in a skilled nursing facility.

The monthly Medicare hospital insurance premium for people who are not insured under the Social Security or the Railroad Retirement Act increases from \$177 to \$192.

The beneficiary share of the cost of Medicare is figured each year based on the increases in the cost of

the program during the year before. People with limited income may qualify for help with payment of these costs under the "Qualified Medicare Beneficiary" program available from their state welfare or public assistance agencies.

Exercise May Help Prevent  
Diabetes: Physicians have recommended exercise to help control diabetes for years, but a recent 14-year study of more than 5900 men showed that regular physical exercise protected against diabetes. The occurrence of non-insulin-dependent diabetes (type II) dropped by 6% for every increase in exercise of 500 kcal/week, which translates into moderate jogging, bicycling, or swimming for 1 hour. The protection was greatest among the heaviest men.

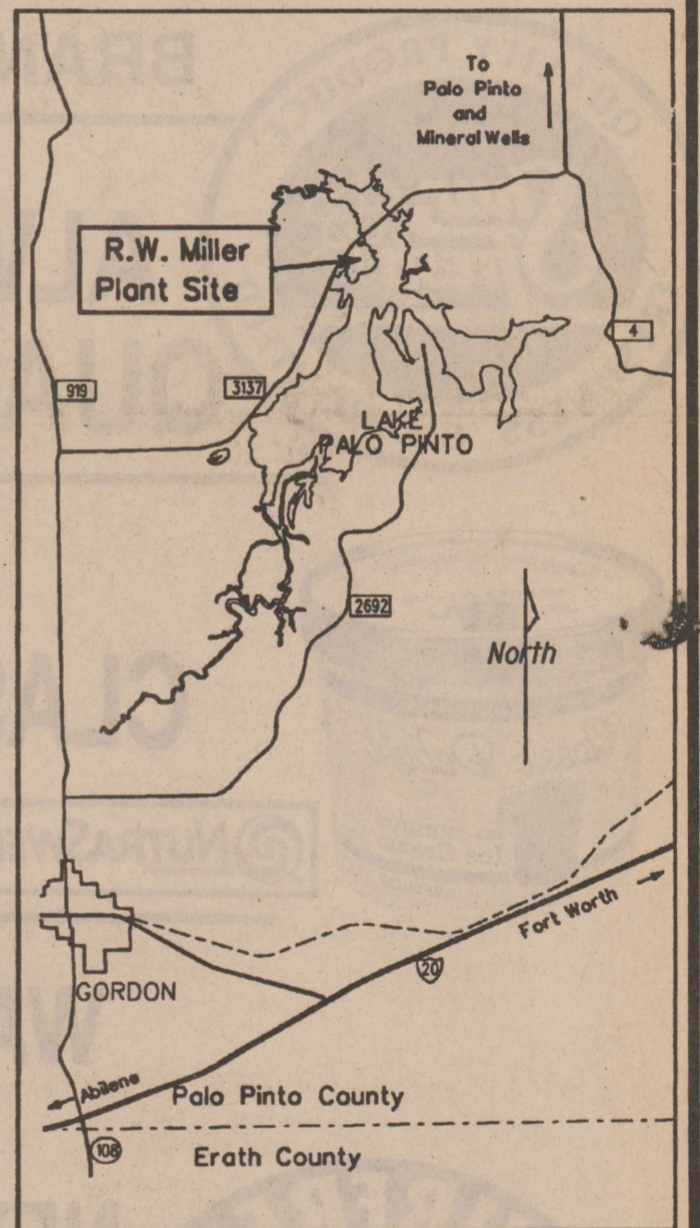

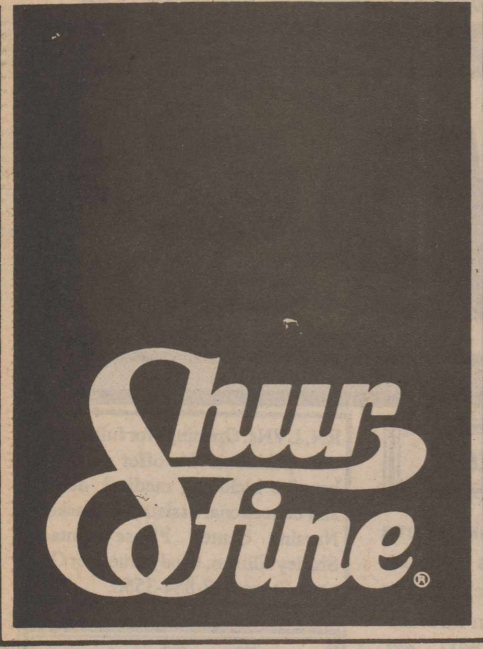
