A child must be five years of age on or before Sept. 1, 1992 to be eligible for Kindergarten for the 1992-93 school year.

Students with last names beginning with letters A through F will register at 9 a.m. Those with last names beginning with letters G through L will register at 10 a.m., letters M through R will register at 1 p.m. and letters S through Z will register at 2 p.m.

Each child must have a birth certificate, immunization record and social security card to register. Each child need immunizations for at least 3 polio and 3 diphteria, tetanus and pertussis (DPT), the last booster being received on or after the 4th birthday. Also needed are 2 immunizations for measles, mumps and rubella (MMR).





'Cooling-off' rule protects purchasers

Better Business Bureaus are reporting that many consumers misunderstand their rights in regard to cancelling purchases under the three-day "cooling-off" rule.

Here is a reminder of where and when this rule applies.

Under the Federal Trade Commission's "cooling-off" rule, you have three business days to cancel any purchase of \$25 or more that you have made in your home or somewhere other than the seller's usual place of business, such as a rented hotel room. The rule also provides protection for consumers who purchase items at a prdouct party given in a private home.

However, as with every rule there are exceptions. The rule does

Diabetes hits **Hispanics** earlier

Adult-onset diabetes is attacking Hispanics at an earlier age and more often than other ethnic groups.

Adult-onset diabetes typically strikes people age 30-60, but among Hispanics the disorder appears more frequently starting in their 30s, said Dr. Carlos Valbona of Baylor College of Medicine n Houston.

Diabetes occurs in adult Hispanics two to three times more often than in whites. Much of the diabetes in Hispanics is undiagnosed, Vallbona said.

He suggests that Hispanics older than 35 be tested for diabetes. Complications---including premature death---can be prevented through early detection.

not apply to: sales made at the sellers' usual place of business; sales made totally by mail or by phone; sales for real estate, insurance or securities; and sales for emergency home repairs. The rule also does not apply to sales that begin as retail transactions at a business establishment and are completed with the signing of a contract in your home. (For instance, ordering carpet at a store and then signing the contract when someone comes to your home to measure the floor space.)

In cases when the rule does apply, the seller must give you the proper cancellation forms along with any contract or receipt pertaining to the sale. The date of the sale should be noted on the cancellation form, which must read in part, "You may cancel this transaction without any penalty or obligation, within three business days from the above date."

If you decide to cancel the sale, sign and date the cancellation forms. Mail or deliver a coy to the address given for cancellation any time before midnight of the third business day after the date of the contract. Also keep a copy for your personal records.

Since proof of the date you mailed the cancellation form to the company is important, send it from the post office via certified mail with a return receipt requested. You do not need to give a reason for cancellation.

To avoid having to cancel a purchase, be sure to completely read and understand the contract before you sign on the dotted line.


