According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.
- A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

Our teacher and schools did not have a choice when this test was to be given to our children. The teachers I have spoken to did not like this schedule any more than I as a parent did.

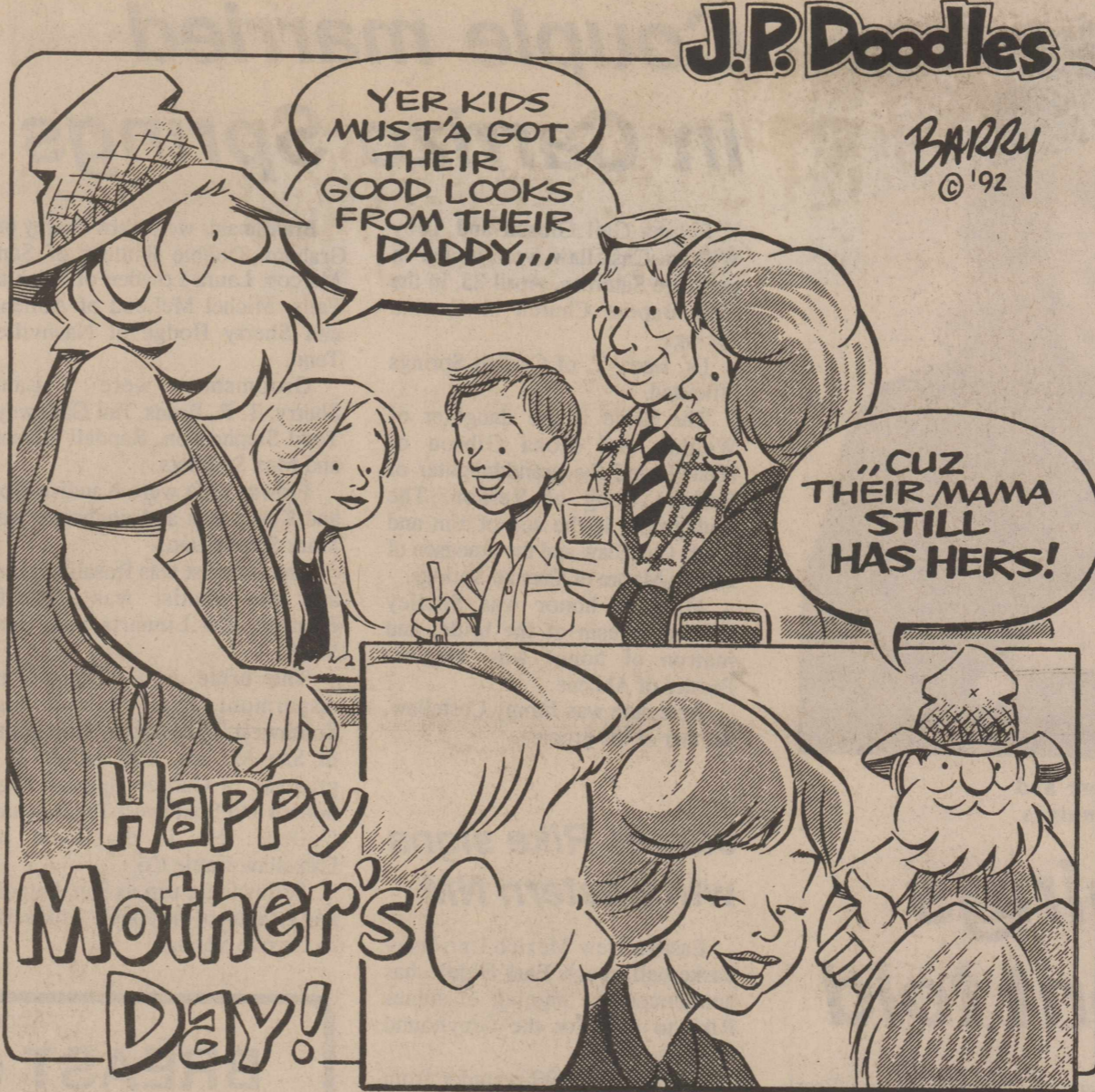

ASCS staff receives certificate

The Texas State ASCS Committee has presented the Haskell County ASCS office a certificate of appreciation for its "demonstration of exceptional ability, dedicated commitment and the performance of outstanding service to ASCS and the farmers and ranchers in the administration of the 1990-91 Disaster Program."

The committee presented certificates of appreciation to every county ASCS office in Texas.

Jerry D. Harris, chairman of the Texas State ASCS Committee, said, "We would like to take this time to let you know how proud we are of our county office employees and their dedicated service to the farmers and ranchers of Texas."

In addition, Harris stated, "As you know, the county offices just finished the signup period for the 1990-91 Disaster Program. What you may not know is what commitment and hard work it took for the counties to meet the deadlines imposed by Congress."

"Texas county offices were required to make a report of participation and projected payments not later than April 11. However, computer software sent to the counties to transmit the data was faulty. A fix to the problem was not received until late Friday night, April 10, and had to be hand-delivered to many offices. Determined county office employees worked long hours Friday and into Saturday night traveling from county to county to ensure information was timely and accurately transmitted to Washington."

"As a result of county office efforts, the disaster information was successfully transmitted to the secretary of agriculture who announced a payment factor of 50.04 percent and authorized disaster payments of more than \$144 million for Texas producers."

Working couples are especially at risk of losing quality time together due to job and family demands, says Dr. Linda Walsh, a family counselor at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"If couples are going to fall in love again, they need to find time to be together," Walsh said.

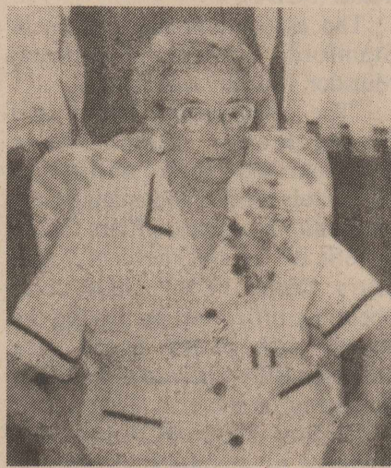

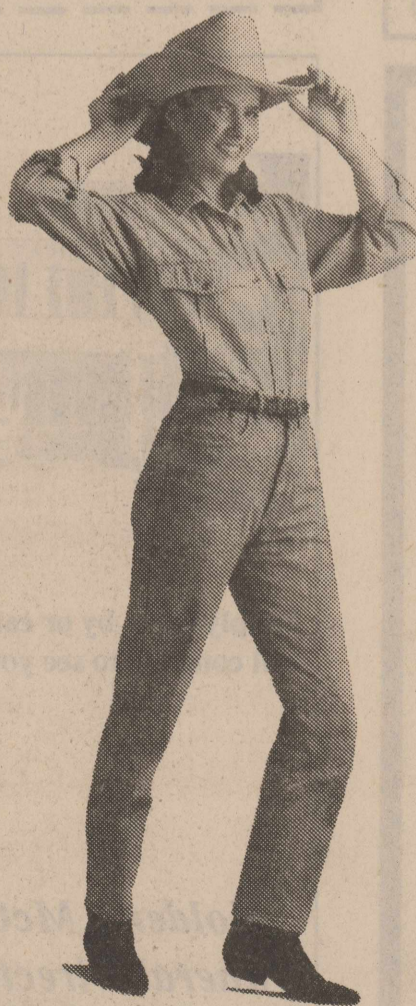

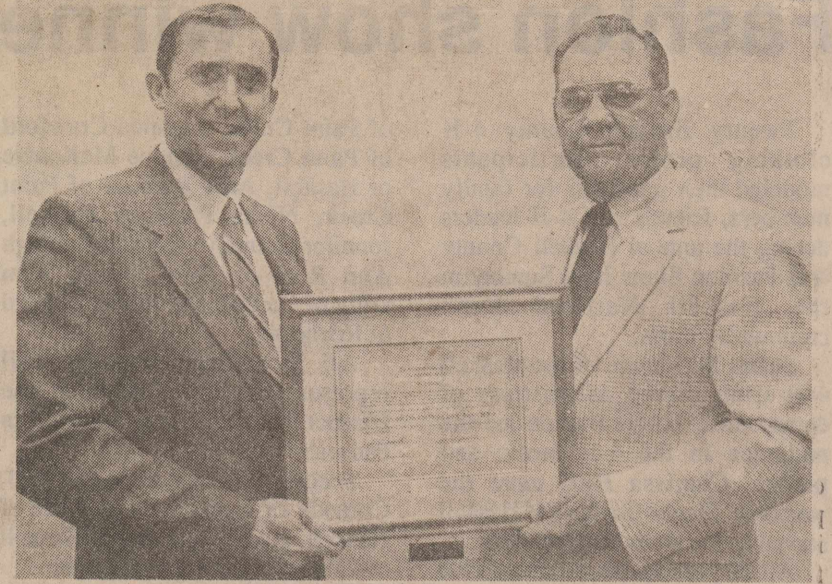

Daniela Guadalucazar to compete in state

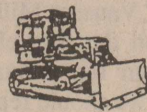
Daniela Guadalucazar won first place in discus in last week's regional meet to earn a place in next weekend's state track and field meet.

Balloon lift-off moved indoors

The Haskell Elementary School sixth-graders' balloon lift-off is planned for Tuesday.

However, the environmentally concerned young citizens have changed tradition.

After discussing ideas from "Fifty Simple Things Kids Can Do to Save the Earth," students have reconsidered the lift-off. The book states:

"Even if the sea is hundreds of miles away, balloons can still land there. The salt water in the ocean washes off a balloon's color, making it look clear. Sometimes sea creatures think balloons are food and eat them. Sea turtles, for example, eat jellyfish--which look and wiggle just like clear balloons. The balloon can block its stomach, and it can starve to death."

Students also expressed concerns about the litter caused by more than 500 balloons that students will be launching, plus the strings and tags attached to them.

Many students have looked forward to this day and have watched the lift-off every year with much anticipation. They have worked hard this year reading so as to earn the balloons. Students receive one balloon for every 300 pages they read. Yet, they are willing to forego the lift-off for the sake of the environment.

Here are some of their comments:

"I like the idea of launching the balloons in the cafeteria and when they deflate, we can dispose of them properly." Jason Briles.

"We can protect our world by launching inside." Vanessa Miller.

"I am going on the side of the environment. If our fun is hurting other things, then we should replace it." Nisha Patel.

"Sea turtles are already low in number and don't need any more 'predators.'" Beau Klose.

"I care for our environment and I don't want to do anything to harm

it." Brooke McGuire.

"Even though I hate breaking tradition, I think not only sea animals would die, but also birds and farm animals would die." Shannon Jordan.

"Sure, it would be fun to launch balloons but we can't just think of our fun times. We have to think of the future for other people." Andrea Callaway.

This was a difficult decision for the students to reach, and it was not a unanimous one. However, the majority agreed an outdoor launch simply would not be best for the environment.

This year will be the seventh annual balloon lift-off at Haskell Elementary. Perhaps it should be re-named the "Balloon Lift-In."

Sixth-graders will launch their colorful helium-filled balloons in the school cafeteria for all the other students to enjoy for days. (Won't the cafeteria have a colorful ceiling?)

Parents, grandparents, friends and neighbors are invited to come to the cafeteria at 2 p.m. Tuesday to watch the first indoor balloon lift-off.

MUTUAL FUND INVESTING

Declining interest rates have sparked increased interest in mutual funds. Mutual funds are professionally managed portfolios of stocks, bonds, or money market securities purchased by the pooling of funds from thousands of investors. Shares in these funds are easily bought or sold, making them convenient investment vehicles for small investors. There are mutual funds for every investment objective, from safety to aggressive growth.

Before you invest, ask yourself: 1) How much risk do I want to assume? Generally, the greater the risk, the greater the potential reward. 2) When will I need the funds? The more distant the need, the more risk you may want to assume. Once you have decided on your investment objective, call for a prospectus for each fund that you're considering. While a prospectus is not the most entertaining reading, it's imperative that you review it for four major items.

First, read the statement of objectives. This section describes the fund's goals and the types of securities the fund buys. Make sure the fund's objectives match your investment objectives. **Second**, look at the sales charges. Generally, the lower the charge, the better. **Third**, review the prospectus section on management expenses, again looking for lower annual fees. (Annual fees are generally in the 1-2% range.) **Finally**, determine the minimum investment required for initial purchases as well as subsequent additions.

Many personal finance magazines review mutual funds at least annually and rank them by objective, risk, return, and consistency of performance. While mutual funds are riskier investments than some fixed return investments, they generally provide superior performance over time. They should be considered by every investor.

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
