Year's rainfall double the norm

Rainfall in May totaled 5.33 inches in Haskell, bringing the moisture total for the first five months of the year to 17.05 inches, nearly twice the normal of 8.82 inches.

Sam Herren, official weather recorder, said the normal for May is 3.75 inches.

May rains have proved damaging to county farmers, delaying wheat harvest and preventing cotton planting. And June started off just where May left off; another .66 of an inch was recorded early Monday, the first day of June.

Temperatures during the month ranged from a balmy 89 degrees on May 16 to a cool 50 degrees on May 30, Herren reported.

Pair teams up for recording

A pair of Haskell men have teamed up to produce a recording which will be released next week in Nashville.

"Dreams About Vanessa" was written by Ron McCandless and recorded by Phil Standefer.

It will be released on the Silver Tree label during Fun Fair in Nashville, June 8-12.

The two were featured in a photo in the April/May issue of C&WVariety, a country music publication with a circulation of more than 1 1/2 million.

Initially, the record will be available only to radio stations. If enough interest is shown, it will be re-pressed and made available to the public.

Standefer, who says he has been "singing and playing for 26 or 27 years."

But for McCandless, it represents the fifth song he has had recorded. McCandless, who is program director for radio station KVRP in Haskell, said he has written dozens of songs, most of which he "threw away."

Standefer has lived in Haskell the past five and a half years, but he said he has lived here "off and on" for the past 20 years. A policeman for 20 years, he was a city policeman here in 1972-73. He now is employed as a bus driver for Sunset Stages in Abilene.

He qualified for the 1991 NJCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships in the discus and javelin, and competed in the discus and hammer throw at this year's national meet. 
Lottery sales brisk

IRS AUDITS

Now that you've filed your tax return, you might be wondering about your chances of being audited. The good news is that, in general, your chances of being audited are under 1%. Naturally, the higher your income level, the higher your chances.

The IRS scores tax returns for audit potential based on such factors as total income, size and types of deductions, and "hot" IRS areas (tax shelters and home office expenses, for example). Returns with scores indicating a high likelihood of understated income or overstated deductions are flagged for further review.

Generally, IRS audits are targeted at one or two specific areas of your return (e.g., capital gains, rental losses, or itemized deductions). The most common type of audit is the mail audit. Usually, this type of audit results when items reported on your return do not match 1099 information forms filed with the IRS (such as interest income, dividends, capital gains, and miscellaneous income). To avoid this type of audit, report items on your return as they are reported to you on the 1099 form, if possible. Don't combine separately reported items or amounts. Office and field audits are more complex, generally addressing such areas as rental properties and businesses.

If you are selected for an audit, give us a call. Our experience in dealing with IRS agents and IRS procedures can make your audit response easier and more effective.

Your best weapon in an audit is adequate documentation supporting items on your return. In fact, while 1991 is still fresh, you might want to review your return. Match 1099 information returns with reported income; tie reported deductions into receipts and canceled checks. Then, file these documents with your copy of the return. If you can support every item on your return, you'll be well-prepared should the IRS call.


Can estrogen strengthen heart?

That might explain why menopausal women taking estrogen have less cardiovascular disease than those not taking the hormone, says lead investigator Dr. Michael C. Snabes at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Researchers at The DeBakey Heart Center of Baylor and The Methodist Hospital are studying how estrogen affects the structure and function of the heart.

Lower Cholesterol Levels After Heart Attack: The importance of keeping cholesterol levels low after a heart attack was underlined in a report from the Framingham Heart Study. Among 374 men and women who were followed an average of 10 years after having a heart attack, those with cholesterol levels of \geq 275 mg had a more than 3 times increased risk of a second heart attack and a 2.5 times increased risk for death from coronary heart disease compared with patients who had cholesterol levels <200 mg.


