Age groups will be 8 and under novice, 8 and under regular, 9 to 12, 13 to 15, and 16 to 19.

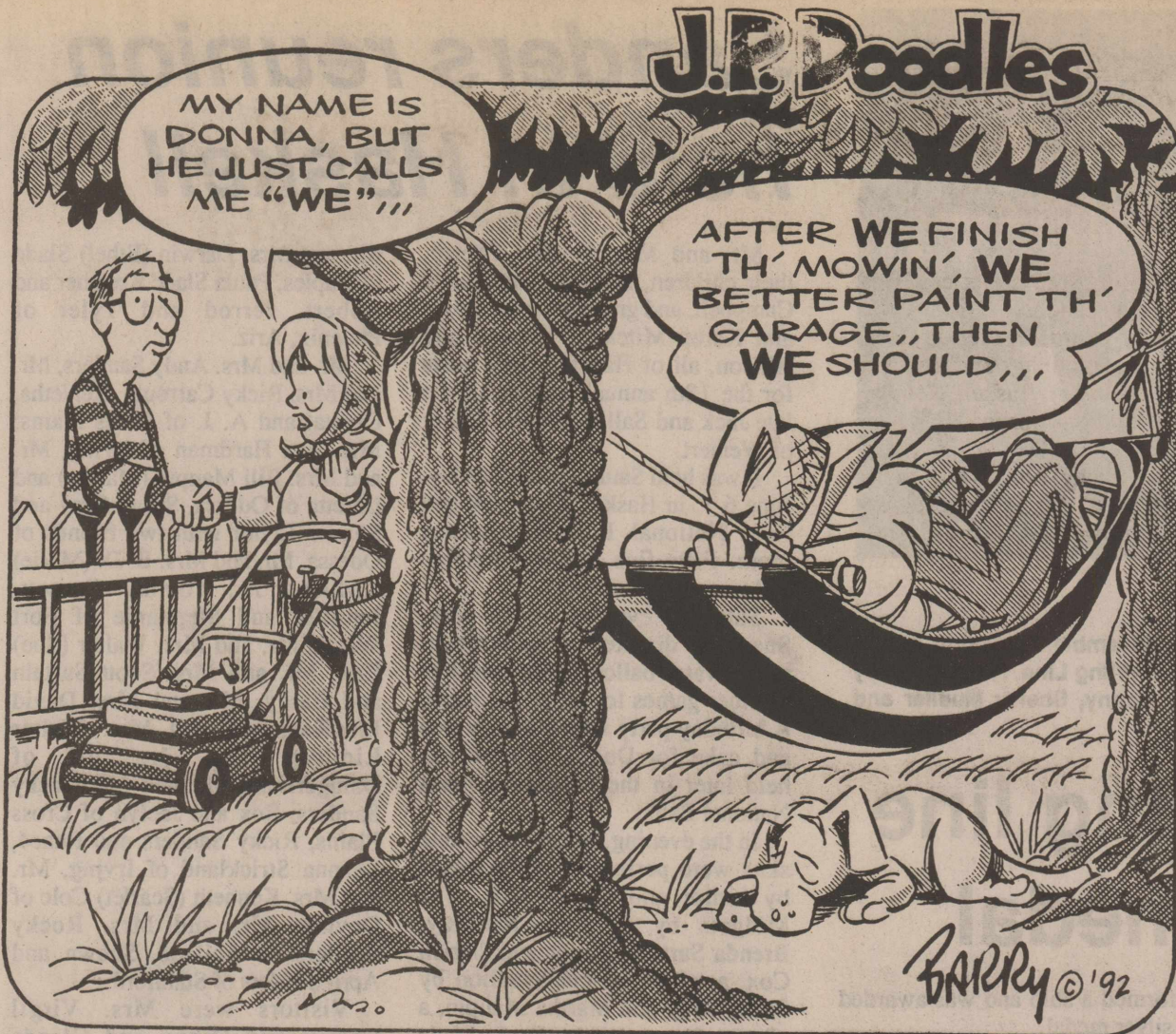

A tip of the sombrero to John Sharp, the state comptroller of public accounts.

Although he voted against the lottery, it fell his duty to administer it. And he's done a bang-up job.

For instance:
•Only 183 lottery division employees are being used to run the lottery. (California employs nearly 1,000 and Florida nearly 800.)

•Only half of the \$12 million appropriated by the legislature as start-up costs was used.

•The Texas Lottery is being called the largest computerized and most secure bar-coded lottery every to start anywhere.

•Virtually all avenues for potential fraud have been eliminated through the computer checking system which immediately detects forged or stolen tickets.

"About the dumbest thing a thief could do is to steal lottery tickets," Sharp said. "As soon as they do, they have 15,000 computers looking for them."

The anonymous caller sounded pretty angry after I picked up the phone last Thursday.

But she had a good point, and I apologized--after I had pleaded guilty by reason of ignorance. But neither the apology nor the plea tamed her down.

Editors have a way of making people angry by what they do, but more often by what they fail to do.

Thank heavens, I didn't suffer the fate of the editor of The Review, a weekly newspaper in the Philadelphia area.

The Associated Press reported that third-graders wrote him messages, such as "I will kill you" and "You smell like a rat" because he had not published a photograph of their teacher.

The messages were hand-delivered in a packet to The Review and were addressed to managing editor George Beetham Jr. A cover sheet read, "From the mouths of babes."

"I will kill you if you do not put my teacher's picture in the newspaper. I was very angry not to see it today!" read one of the 14 messages.

"I hate you. You smell like a rat because you did not put my teacher's picture in the newspaper," wrote another student. "I'm going to rip all your hair off, put it in your mouth and take your clothes and put them on your head and beat you up, you rat."

The students said they were angry because Beetham had not run a publicity photo of their teacher volunteering for an exhibition game promoting a city tennis tournament.

WQIP signup dates announced

The second signup for the Water Quality Incentive Program (WQIP) will be June 15-26. Producers in the Seymour Aquifer are eligible for the program and can sign up at the Haskell ASCS office.

The WQIP is designed to encourage producers to try new management practices they are currently not using in their farming operations. The WQIP contract is usually for three years under the Long Term Agreement (LTA) program.

Water quality incentive payments will be made for management type practices such as integrated crop management, contour farming, conservation tillage, conservation cropping sequence, crop residue use, irrigation water management, well testing and similar components. Although structural practices such as terraces, waterways and irrigation pipelines may be part of the water quality plan they cannot be cost shared under the WQIP.

The WQIP incentive payment is limited to \$3,500 per year. Payments cannot exceed \$25 per acre per year.

Eligibility for the WQIP requires a minimum of two-thirds of the land in the tract to be within the Seymour Aquifer Project boundaries and the producer cannot currently be

implementing the practices the WQIP would call for.

The Seymour Aquifer Project boundaries include land in the northwest part of Haskell County and the southern portion of Knox County.

Farmers may find out if their farms are located in the project area by contacting the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) or the Soil Conservation Service (SCS).

HIRE YOUR KIDS AND YOUR SPOUSE IN YOUR BUSINESS

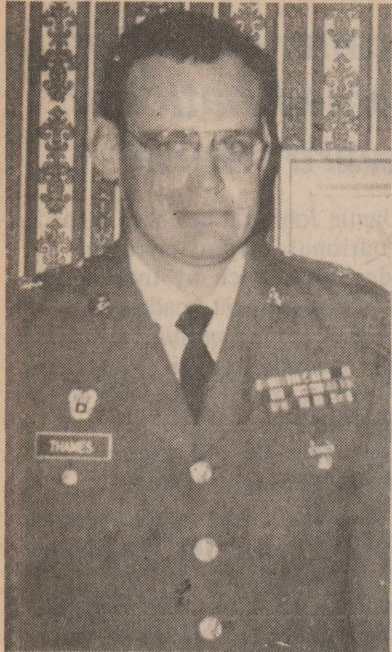

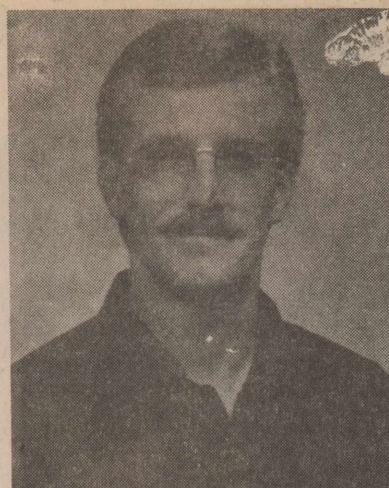
The group will have dinner at Union Station, Pentagon City, attend a pizza party, Rural Youth Day lunch and a patriotic program, "The Spirit of America."

If those households have at least one member who will be 60 or older in 1992 or a member with a medical condition that is aggravated by heat, they may qualify for assistance.

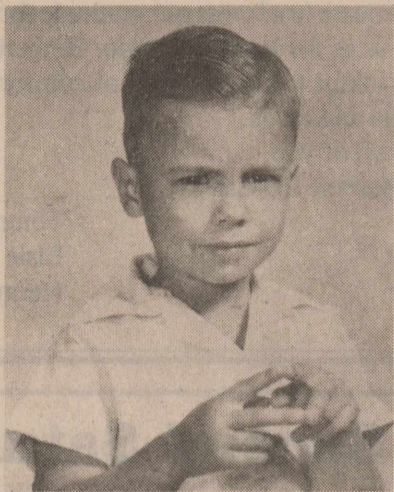

Diabetes Affects Respiratory System:
A study of insulin-dependent diabetics conducted in Texas has shown that this disease can reduce respiratory function. Ten patients who were treated with a standard program of no more than two injections of insulin daily had reduced measurements of pulmonary function at a single point after 6 years of treatment. In contrast, eight patients who received continuous subcutaneous insulin via an insulin pump and had more regular normal glucose levels did not exhibit reduced pulmonary function.

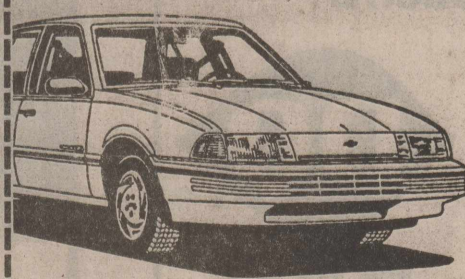
