Farm situation worsens as rains continue

It will take a real quick turn of events to salvage this year's cotton and wheat crops in Haskell County.

Almost daily rains in recent weeks have dangerously delayed cotton planting at the same time the wheat crop deteriorates in the unharvested fields.

Only 20 to 25 percent of the cotton has been planted, but local agricultural officials said little of that is any good.

June 20 is the last recommended date for cotton to be planted. That also is the deadline for cotton to be planted for it to be covered by multi-peril crop insurance without severe penalties.

Glenn Brzozowski of the Haskell County ASCS, said there still is time to get in the 1992 crop, but an immediate change of weather would be necessary. He said cotton can be planted up until early July.

Meanwhile, wheat farmers haven't had a chance to get their crop harvested. Earlier predictions placed this year's wheat harvest at near-record levels, but the much of the crop has been knocked down by rain and wind and much of it is beginning to sprout, seriously affecting the quality of the grain. Brzozowski said the wheat crop has been ready for harvest for at least two weeks, but less than 10

"These students represented themselves, their community and the fine arts program with the highest honors," said Joe Waldrop.



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
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Sanders reunion held in Haskell



The second signup for the Water Quality Incentive Program (WQIP) will be June 15-26. Producers in the Seymour Aquifer are eligible for the program and can sign up at the

Haskell ASCS office.

The WQIP is designed to encourage producers to try new management practices they are currently not using in their farming operations. The WQIP contract is usually for three years under the Long Term Agreement (LTA) program.

Water quality incentive payments will be made for management type practices such as integrated crop management, contour farming, conservation tillage, conservation cropping sequence, crop residue use, irrigation water management, well testing and similar components. Although structural practices such as terraces, waterways and irrigation pipelines may be part of the water quality plan they cannot be cost shared under the WQIP.

The WQIP incentive payment is limited to \$3,500 per year. Payments cannot exceeds \$25 per acre per year.

Eligibility for the WQIP requires a minimum of two-thirds of the land in the tract to be within the Seymour Aquifer Project boundaries and the producer cannot currently be

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implementing the practices the WQIP would call for.

The Seymour Aquifer Project boundaries include land in the northwest part of Haskell County and the southern portion of Knox

Farmers may find out if their farms are located in the project area by contacting the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) or the Soil Conservation Service (SCS).

HIRE YOUR KIDS AND YOUR SPOUSE IN YOUR BUSINESS If you own and operate a trade or business, you may be able to get tax-favored dollars from your company by hiring your spouse or children.

Did you know you can pay up to \$3,600 in wages to your child free of federal income tax? That's because income from wages can be offset by your child's standard deduction which is \$3,600 for 1992. Your business can take a deduction for the wages, thus lowering your individual or corporate tax bill. The net effect is to take \$3,600 out of your business completely tax-free. And, if your child is under age 18, and your business is a sole proprietorship or family partnership, the child's earnings are also exempt from Social Security (FICA) and unemployment tax.

Diabetes Affects Respiratory System: A study of insulin-dependent diabetics conducted in Texas has shown that this disease can reduce respiratory function. Ten patients who were treated with a standard program of no more than two injections of insulin daily had reduced measurements of pulmonary function at a single point after 6 years of treatment. In contrast, eight patients who received coninuous subcutaneous insulin via an insuin pump and had more regular normal glucose levels did not exhibit reduced pulmonary function.


