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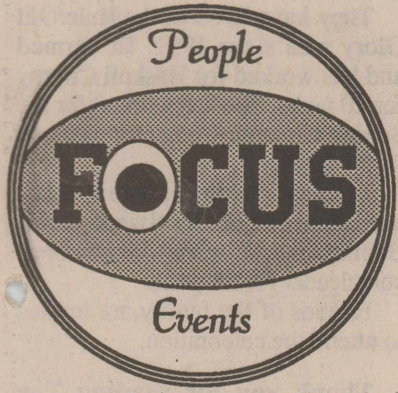

Cemeteries:

Haskell woman records all county graves

Haskell County now has a valuable record of practically everyone who was ever buried in Haskell County.

Ernestine Herren has presented the Haskell County Library with her two-volume "Cemeteries in Haskell County: 1884-1992," the culmination of a year-long project by the local history buff and former rural school teacher.

The two volumes, weighing slightly more than 15 pounds, contain the name, date of birth and date of death of every person buried in each of 19 cemeteries in Haskell County. In addition, one of the volumes lists burials in two cemeteries just across the line in Stonewall County.

Only county cemeteries not included are Highland Cemetery in Stamford and a Negro cemetery near Stamford.

The foreword is by John S. Rike

III, who wrote:

"What a tremendous book Ernestine Cox Herren has put together for us who love Haskell County and its place in history. Many generations in the future will be able to read and reminisce about ancestors and friends who went before them and assisted in laying the groundwork for the heritage we now enjoy.

"As I thumb through these pages, I think of the characters, famous and infamous, who have preceded us. It brings back memories of yesteryear as we remember the farmers, ranchers, cowboys, doctors, school teachers and certainly the servicemen who have had such an impact on our lives."

Volume I contains the listings of the graves in Brushy, Fairview (Sagerton) Capron and Willow cemeteries.

Volume II lists O'Brien, Idella,

Pinkerton, Rochester, Rule, Rockdale, Howard, Irby, Roberts, Pleasant Valley and Weinert, plus the Stonewall cemeteries of Hooker and Old Glory and the Clark and Cobb family cemeteries in this county.

Mrs. Herren is quick to point out that she had much help in compiling the records. Rike provided her with the list of graves in the Cobb Cemetery and assisted with those in O'Brien.

Ola Mae Lisle of Rule supplied the list for Rule, as well as Fairview, Pinkerton, Old Glory and Hooker.

Mr. and Mrs. R. S. Sanders listed the graves for Brushy, Pleasant Valley and Weinert.

Jess Leonard listed the names for Roberts Cemetery, Mrs. Modelle Ballard Barton for Rochester, and the Idella listings were taken from "Rochester History" by Modelle Ballard and Margarite Gaunt. Ben Charlie Chapman provided her with a plat of Willow Cemetery in

Haskell hosting Cub Scout camp

Haskell is playing host this week to a Cub Scout Day Camp of the Chisholm Trail Council of the Boy Scouts of America.

Cubs from Haskell, Rule and O'Brien gathered at Rice Springs Park Tuesday morning to begin three days of instruction and recreation.

Camp sessions were from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. on Tuesday and Wednesday and will be from noon until 8 p.m. today (Thursday).

During the camp, the scouts are enjoying swimming, archery, BB gun shooting, crafts and games.

The Texas Chiefs' Model Airplane Club put on a program

Tuesday and the Haskell Fire Department gave a program on fire safety.

Camp director is Gary Snowden of Sweetwater, district executive for the Double Mountain district of the council. Lisa Shaw is program director.

In past years, local Cub Scouts have attended day camp at Camp Tonkawa, necessitating three 150-mile roundtrips and 12-hour days. But this year, the Chisholm Trail Council scheduled three regional camps to eliminate the need for excessive travel. Other camps are being held during the summer in Sweetwater and Coleman.

School to add baseball

Boys' baseball will be added to the sports curriculum at Haskell High School next spring.

The School Board voted last week to initiate a baseball program in Haskell for the first time in 35 years.

Walter Hargrove, athletic director, said a search is now underway for a head baseball coach.

It is possible that all district 7-2A teams will field baseball teams next spring. Baseball programs already are underway at Jim Ned, Anson and Hawley. Rotan, like Haskell, will begin its program next spring, and Stamford and Hamlin are discussing a program. Hargrove said he does not know about Winters.

Albany, a member of district 7-2A last year, reached the state finals. The Lions will be in another district this coming year.

It will be possible for Haskell athletes to compete in both baseball and track during the spring since baseball games will be on Tuesdays and Fridays, Hargrove said.

The athletic director said Haskell also will have a junior varsity baseball team. There will not be baseball in junior high, however.

Although Haskell boys have not played baseball in high school, Haskell has had strong Little League and youth baseball programs over the years.

Haskell High School fielded a baseball team for a couple of years in the late 1950s.

Park fountain to pay tribute to 'Boneheads'

To honor the Boneheads, founders of the City Park in 1931, the Haskell Parks and Recreation Department will build a water fountain on the north bank of the creek.

The fountain will be built with money raised through private donations.

"We estimate the cost to be around \$4,000, but if more money is raised, we'll light the fountain and upgrade the memorial plaque," said Jill Druesedow, former park chairman.

In 1978, the Keep Haskell Beautiful Committee, chaired by Franciene Johnson, identified a water fountain as a long-range beautification project for the park.

"When the park committee began researching the history of the park, we found that a group of young men formed a club from 1930-31 and called themselves 'Boneheads,'" Mrs. Druesedow said.

"Park board member Lisa Shaw spent many hours going through the archives at *The Free Press* to piece together the activities of the Boneheads."

These men of vision not only began the park but also undertook street marking and beautiful yard projects.

"So when the park committee

began looking at a project to honor the Boneheads, Mrs. Johnson suggested the water fountain," Mrs. Druesedow explained.

Only after the Haskell National Bank used a picture of the Boneheads in a centennial advertisement did the park committee finally have an almost complete list of names.

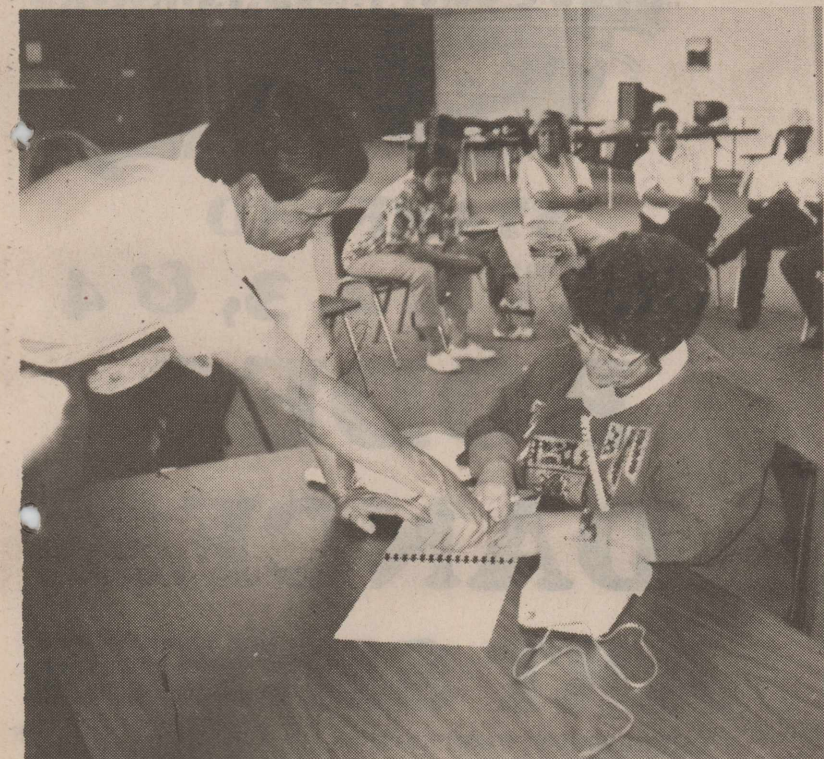
"By then we had begun work on the park grant to include the walking path, lights, soccer field and additional playground equipment, so we waited to begin collecting money for the memorial fountain," Mrs. Druesedow said.

The former City Council approved the project, and Mrs. Druesedow currently is collecting donations for the project.

"We've just begun and already we have over \$1,500 from individuals who want to honor the past by being a part of Haskell's future," Mrs. Druesedow said.

Ruby Turner, park chairman, said the water fountain will be a welcome addition to the park, both as a beautification project and as a memorial to the Boneheads.

Haskell man looking forward to reunion with WWII buddies

The last time James A. (Pete) Nichols saw his Army Air Corps buddies was shortly after the end of World War II in 1945.

But he's going to be re-united with many of them Oct. 16-18 when the veterans of the 422nd Signal Company gather at De Gray Lake near Arkadelphia, Ark., to celebrate the 50th anniversary of the company.

The company was formed at Pinedale, Calif., in September 1942, and the newly drafted Nichols was among the charter members.

The outfit has had "about 10" reunions, but this one promises to be the biggest. It will also be the first Nichols has attended. Mrs.

Nichols will accompany him to Arkansas.

Reunion planners expect at least 30 veterans to be there. They have made contact with 65, and believe about 90 of the original 160 are still living. "I'm looking forward to the reunion," said Nichols. "We were a close-knit group and we spent a very important of our lives together."

Nichols, now 83, was living in Throckmorton when he was drafted in September 1942. After its organization, the 422nd trained at Hammer Field, near Fresno, Calif. In November 1943, the men boarded the USS Uruguay at Long Beach, Calif., and set sail for the war zone. (The Uruguay was later

sunk by German planes in the English channel.)

First stop was Hobart, Tasmania, on an island 500 miles south of Australia. After eight hours on shore, the men re-boarded the ship for Perth, Australia, where they spent another eight hours before resuming the 38-day voyage to Bombay, India.

The 422nd later went to Pandaveswar and then to Comilla, in what is now Bangladesh. Later, the company joined the fighting in northern Burma which led to the opening of the Burma Road, before moving into China where it was when the war ended.

Nichols took a long route back Continued on page 3

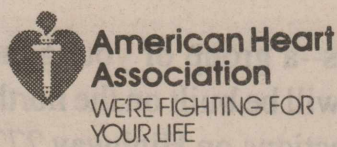

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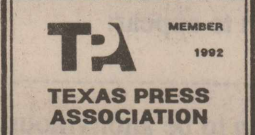
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Gimme caps

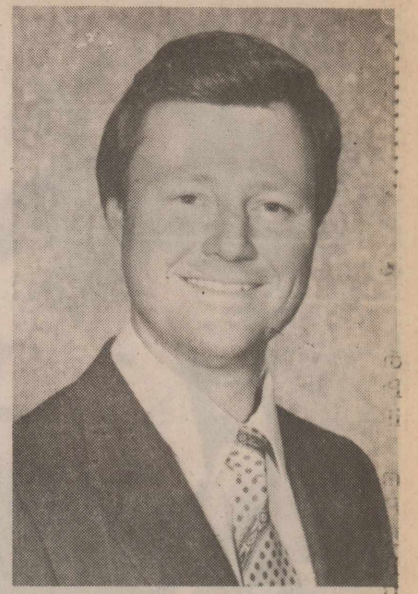

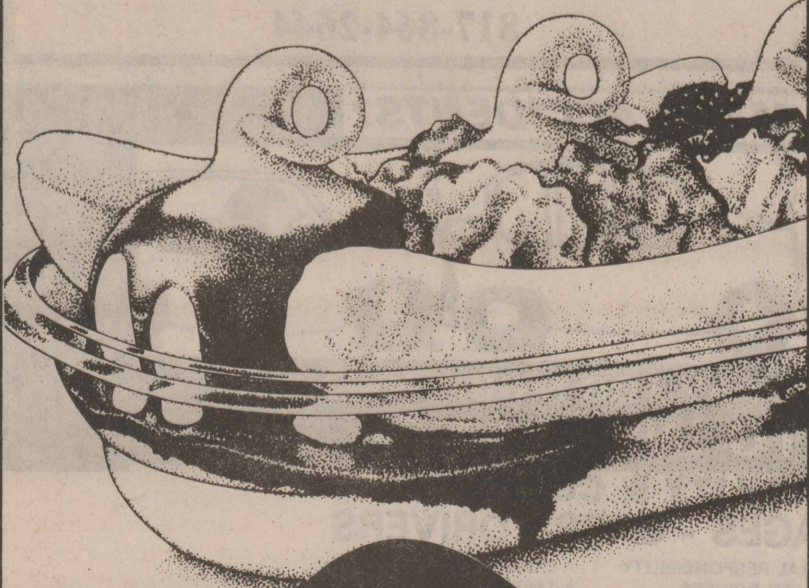
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Piland garden

Local gardener has bumper crop

It may not be much of a year for farmers, but it's a great one for home gardeners.

Or it is for M. C. Piland at 605 S. Ave. F in Haskell.

The retired grocer is harvesting a bumper crop of vegetables from the garden in his back yard.

Piland is proudest of the large tomatoes he has just begun to harvest from the 32 plants he set out in the spring. "I'm going to make a lot of tomatoes," he boasts.

But that's not all--by a long shot. From the garden, Mrs. Piland canned 69 quarts and seven pints of green beans. She also canned 55 quarts and seven pints of beets from five of their seven rows (they gave away the other two rows).

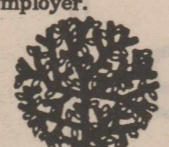
