Haskell school costs compared in state report

Texas Research League AUSTIN---Despite widespread reports last fall of school budget cuts, trustees adopted the largest spending increase in history---\$1.8 billion more. Classroom teachers received one dollar in six of the additional spending.

Spending was \$1.4 billion more than budgeted revenue, and trustees increased school taxes by a billion dollars. However, when the beginning balance of \$42. billion is included, resources far outpaced expenditures.

The figures come from the latest issue of Bench Marks: 1991-92 School District Budgets in Texas, an annual publication of the Texas Research League, an Austin-based, educational corporation engaged in governmental research.

An average of \$3,979 per student for current operations was budgeted last year, plus \$337 for repayment of debt and \$617 per student for capital outlay.

Haskell CISD's budget provided \$4,394.31 per student for current operations, \$25.33 for debt service, and \$667.74 per student for capital outlay based on the 750 students enrolled in October 1991.

The average base salary for classroom teachers paid by Haskell CISD in October 1991 was \$25,737, plus supplements for the career ladder. The average for administrators was \$39,056, and \$25,311 for other professional support employees (librarians, counselors, nurses, supervisors, etc.).

Four dollars in each five were spent for salaries. Statewide payroll expense averaged \$3,236 per student, compared to \$3,375.65 in Haskell CISD. Payroll expense is determined by salary levels and staffing patterns. Taxpayers provided one teacher for 13.4 students in Haskell CISD while the statewide pupil-teacher ratio was 16.3 to one. School districts and county education districts imposed a property tax at the rate of \$1.274 per \$100 of appraised value, which value averaged 98.8 percent of market value (selling price). The "true tax rate" was \$1.259 (\$1.274 times 98.8 percent) statewide. Locally, the Haskell CISD imposed

a rate of \$1.149, including \$.849 by the county. Property was Continued on page 2

City awards street bids to Seymour paving firm

The Council also awarded a twoyear lease on the farm land at the landfill to Claude Payne, who submitted a bid to pay the city \$18.75 per acre. The bid was approved with the stipulation that the new lessee reimburse Ronnie Adams for expenses he has incurred on the land since the last harvest.

The City Council at its regular meeting last Tuesday awarded two street bids to Colthorp Construction Co.

The Seymour firm, which has done street work for the city previously, bid .7545 per square yard for the seal coating of approximately 20 blocks of city streets, which will be designated later. The firm also bid \$3.49 per square yard to pave the street running parallel to the RV area in the park.

Cost of the seal coating will be paid from budgeted funds, continuing an annual practice of seal coating a number of city streets. The cost of the street in the park will be reimbursed to the city by the State Parks and Wildlife Department from funds still available from the grant for park improvements.

In other action, the Council:

•Took no action on a complaint of sheep being kept on residential property on North Avenue L (as reported last week).

•Defeated, by a 3-2 vote, a motion to require Council members to approve each city bill before payment. Iva Lee Gipson and Kim Nemir voted for the motion. Ruby Turner and Kenny Watson said it was the administrator's duty to OK the bills. They, along with Tony Burson, voted against the motion.

•Heard a complaint from Mrs. Turner that Council members had not been asked to approve the mayor's appointments to the Industrial Board, Zoning Board, Training Center Board and Ambulance Board. Councilman

Kenny watson also expressed his objection to the way appointments were made. (Mayor Pat Henry said he did not realize he had not followed the proper procedure and assured the Council members that future appointments would be presented to them for confirmation.)

•Denied a request from West Texas Utilities that the city pass an ordinance for tariffs. City Administrator Scott Wall told the Council the issue pertained to large industrial users and had little, if any, effect on anyone locally.

•Passed a resolution opposing "Retail Wheeling", which would benefit large electricity customers at the expense of smaller ones.

•Discussed the possibility of having minutes of all Council meetings published in the local newspaper.

•Reviewed a draft of the 1992-93 fiscal year budget. Mayor Henry said he would be opposed to any increase in city taxes or rates for city services. Watson said the fire department planned to ask the city for additional funds for equipment.

Football practices to begin Monday

Eighteen lettermen, including 14 starters from last year, are among 51 prospects expected to report Monday for the first football practice at Haskell High School.

First practice will begin at 9 a.m., and will be followed by a second practice session at 4 p.m. The same schedule will be followed on Tuesday, but Coach Walter Hargrove said he is not sure what the practice schedule will be for the rest of the week.

A once-a-day practice schedule will be followed the next week---the first week of school.

Before opening the 1992 schedule here Sept. 4 against Munday, the Indians will have two scrimmage games. The first will be here Aug. 20 or 21, against

Roscoe. The second will be at Quanah on either Aug. 27 or 28.

Hargrove said he expected the Indians to be considerably better than they were in 1991 when they posted a 1-8-1 record. But the bad news is that everyone else is going to be better, too.

Hamlin's Pied Pipers, district runnersup to state finalist Albany last year, has a preseason ranking in the state's top 10 and is a heavy favorite to take the district 7-2A title. New district member Rotan, which reached the state finals in 1A last year, replaces Albany which has been re-assigned to another district.

RACF is an optional service that is intended for use by residence and business customers. RACF permits a customer who subscribes to the optional service Call Forwarding to activate, deactivate or change the Call Forwarding destination from a location other than the customer's premises. In order for RACF to function, it must be accessed from a push-button telephone.

The proposed monthly rate for RACF for residence customers is \$1.00, and the proposed monthly rate for business customers is \$2.75. These rates are in addition to the rates for basic local exchange service and regular Call Forwarding. (The monthly rates for Call Forwarding are \$2.10 for residence customers and \$2.65 for business customers.)

RACF is expected to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$643,000.

make a valid comparison of tax levels with other schools.

The tax on a house that would sell for \$80,000 in Haskell CISD would have been \$895. If the homeowner were eligible for homestead exemptions, the tax would have been \$705. That compares with statewide average tax bills of \$998 and \$793 respectively for an \$80,000 house.

Last year, Haskell CISD's revenue from the property tax remained the same as the year before, while school districts statewide averaged an increase of 12 percent.

Local property taxes plus state aid totaled \$4,764 per student in Haskell CISD as compared to \$3,969 statewide.

The state and county education districts will fund the total cost of the foundation program, which averaged \$2,784 per student last year and was \$3,726 in Haskell CISD. Local school districts can levy property taxes to enrich the foundation program. Enrichment last year averaged \$831 per pupil to which the state added an average of \$354 per student to guarantee the tax yield in property-poor districts. Enrichment by the Haskell CISD was \$361; the state guarantee added \$677.

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Mortgage guide helpful to buyers

Potential home buyers faced with an array of mortgage loan choices have help with the Residential Mortgage Guide published by the Real Estate Center at Texas A&M University.

"Despite current low mortgage interest rates and affordable home prices, many borrowers still cannot qualify for the standard fixedpayment, 30-year mortgage loan," said research economist Jack C. Harris, author of the report. "But loan alternatives devised for specific borrower situations can help many people qualify for financing."

Insured and guaranteed loans from the Federal Housing Administration and the Veterans Administration, for example, are popular with first-time home buyers with little cash for a down payment. Buyers with money for a substantial down payment can apply for a permanent buy-down mortgage that reduces the interest rate for the entire loan term.

"The adjustable rate mortgage, or ARM, is the most widely available mortgage loan alternative today,"

said Harris. "An ARM's lower initial rate may allow a borrower to qualify for a loan that would be unaffordable under a fixed-rate regime.'

Other alternatives include seller financing, equity sharing, leasepurchase, balloon mortgages and 15-year loans.



Texas economy projection given

"Led by the construction and service sectors, Texas' overall employment outlook over the next 35 years is bright, but many of these new jobs---especially in trade and services---will be in the lower paying occupations," State Comptroller John Sharp said this week.

"Following a trend begun in 1978, real wage growth, after adjusting for inflation, is expected to increase by only about .5 percent annually through 2026. The lack of significant real wage growth will pressure more family members to enter the work force," Sharp said.

The information is contained in the current issue of Fiscal Notes and is based upon preliminary findings of the Forces of Change Project, a year-long study by the comptroller's office of issues shaping the state during the next 35 years. Fiscal Notes is a monthly publication of the Comptroller's Research Division. The report finds that while Texas will continue to grow in "power and worth" in the 35 years ahead, it will do so at more modest rates than in the recent past.

"The long-term economic news for Texas is mixed. On the positive side, the economy should continue to expand at a moderate rate, slightly out-pacing the rest of the United States," Sharp said. "On the other hand, state growth will be below that of the boom periods Texas enjoyed during the 1960s and 1970s."

"From 1971 to 1991, the state economy grew faster, by about a half percent annually, than the country as a whole, with an average growth rate of 3 percent per year. Almost all this growth was due to an expanding labor force, which increased about 3 percent each year, or 1 percent faster than the national average.

"The picture in the future is much different. The state's economy should continue to out-pace the national average by about a half percent each year, but an expanding workforce will account for only half the gap. About half the state's projected 2.7 percent annual growth rate will result from increased worker output as the labor force matures, becomes more experienced and productive," Sharp said. The report also concludes that economic diversification should continue to restructure the makeup of the state's economy. Energy-related industries are expected to fall from 13 percent of today's economic output to 8 percent by 2026 as oil and gas production continues it long-term decline.

service-producing industries. The number of jobs in various service sectors will soar, the report says, from 1.7 million in 1991 to 4.1 million by 2026. Currently, almost a quarter of all Texas jobs are in services, but by 2026, the figure will rise to more than 30 percent.

"Business, health and other miscellaneous services, such as hotels and professional and legal services, will contribute to the growth of services in the Texas economy. Wholesale and retail trade also will produce a large share of new jobs in the state.


"Surprisingly to some, construction will be the fastestgrowing industry in the Texas economy over the next 35 years," Sharp said≥ "Total cosntruction employment is expected to grow 2.6 percent per year, from 342,000 jobs in 1991 to 843,000 in 2026. Much of this will be recovery from the industry slump in the economic bust of the late 1980s.

"The attraction of Texas as a place to invest and produce should continue to promote manufacturing's role in the economy. Total manufacturing employment is expected to rise by 1.8 percent annually, from 977,000 jobs in 1991 to 1.8 million in 2026. Almost half the new manufacturing jobs will be in industries related to high technology, including computers, industrial machinery and electronics," Sharp said.

The report says Texas will not attract the large numbers of new residents the state received in past years. Nevertheless, the report says, Texas' population should continue to expand during the next 35 years, mainly from births rather than from in-migration.

The baby boom generation, now entering middle age, will approach retirement as the year 2026 approaches. The fastest-growing age group will be Texans over the age of 65. One reason, the report says, is that Texans will be living longer due to improved health care. Along with increased economic clout, the Texas baby boomers can expect to see their political influence grow, with a push for more elderly programs, such as health care, income assistance and financial planning.

The report also notes that the



Senator Lloyd Bentsen Watching Washington

Like the pearls on a precious necklace, the natural treasures of the Big Thicket National Preserve need to be linked together.

The first legislation I introduced when I came to the Senate was a bill to establish 100,000 acres of wilderness in East Texas as the Big Thicket National Preserve. We established the preserve in 1974 but we fell short of the 100,000 acre goal and six of the twelve units of the preserve were not connected.

Like loose pearls, the chains of life that these isolated regions sustain are in danger of being lost unless they are connected by the adjoining lands and feeder streams.

I'm optimistic that this year those pearls will be connected into a continuous necklace. Congress is nearing final approval of legislation I have introduced with Congressman Charlie Wilson to expand the preserve from the current 86,000 acres to 101,000 acres.

The measure calls for the addition of four contiguous units to link the final sections of the preserve together. These 15,000 acres will maintain the vital chain of life and further enrich the diversity and beauty of the preserve.

Although the Big Thicket today is much smaller than its original three and a half million acres, it still supports an incredible array of plants and animal life. Within the preserve there are regions that resemble the deserts of Arizona, the forests of South Carolina, the plains of the Panhandle, the mountains of Pennsylvania and the swamps of Louisiana.

This diversity has earned the Big Thicket the nickname, "America's ark". A visitor exploring the thicket might encounter animals as diverse as otters, foxes, roadrunners, alligators only yards away from each other. The preserve is also a home to ospreys and a stopping point for peregrine falcons and bald eagles.

My legislation would add 15,000 acres to the preserve including the Sabine River Blue Elbow Unit, the largest undisturbed acreage of Cypress-Tupelo blackwater swamp in southeast Texas. It would also incorporate the Canyonlands unit which contains beautiful scenic areas of steep walls, spring-fed creeks, and rare plants.

The addition of the Village Creek Corridor and the Big Sandy Corridor will protect vital pathways to ensure the migration and continuation of animal and plant species.

I'm pleased that the target of a 100,000 acre, continuous preserve will finally be achieved. Thousands of Texans have been working toward this goal for decades. In fact, a Texas Congressman named George Bush once introduced a bill to establish 150,000 acres as the Big Thicket National Preserve that included the areas in my legislation.

Final approval of my bill will link the region and ensure that the pearls of East Texas will be tied together.

Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced price meals.

Application forms are being sent to all homes with a letter to parents or guardians. To apply for free or reduced price meals, households should fill out the application and return it to the school. Additional copies are available at the Principal's office in each school. The information provided on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and may be verified at any time during the school year by school or other program officials.

For school officials to determine eligibility, households receiving food stamps or AFDC must list the child's name, their food stamp or AFDC case number and the signature and name of an adult household member. Households not receiving food stamps or AFDC must list: names of all household members; Social Security numbers of all adult household members or a statement that the household member does not possess one; total household income and the amount and source of the income received by each household member; and the signature of an adult household member certifying that the information provided is correct.

Applications may be submitted at any time during the year.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced price policy Haskell CISD will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the determining official on the informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal may make a request either orally or in writing to Haskell CISD, P. O. Box 937, Haskell, Texas, 79521 or telephone at 817-864-2602 for a hearing on the decision.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits are required to report increases in household income of over \$50.00 per month or \$600.00 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below levels shown above.

In certain cases foster children are also eligible for school meal benefits. If a household wishes to apply for benefits for foster children living with them, the household should contact the school for more information.

The information provided by the household is confidential and will be used only for purposes of determining eligibility and verifying data.

In the operation of child feeding program administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.







TEACHING YOUR KIDS ABOUT MONEY

Studies reveal that most children know much less about money than they should. To improve your children's financial savvy, teach them as they grow.

Start with the meaning of money. Take younger children to the grocery store and give them fifty cents to spend on whatever they like. Give them the experience of trading money for a product. At the baseball game, give them the money to pay the vendor for the hot dogs.

Allowances for doing chores teach children that money comes from work. Allowances should be increased slightly every year; many parents start with about \$1 per week for threeto four-year-olds and finish with about \$20 per week for high school seniors. Don't link the allowance to specific chores and don't withhold the allowance as punishment for bad behavior. If you do either, the child may learn that bad behavior is negotiable.


Teach saving. Savings accounts can be started by very young children, but easily by the time they're ten years old. Some banks can be unfriendly to children, so shop around.

Teach budgeting. Instead of controlling the purse strings on shopping trips, allow your child a budgeted amount for this year's school clothes and let the child control how to spend it. Try not to supplement it if the child runs out early or spends the money unwisely. Better to learn money control now than later.

Finally, encourage older children to get a part-time job. Age fourteen is early enough. Checking accounts should be okay by this time, too. Include older children in family financial discussions.

Together with serious discussions abut how college will be funded, these lessons should ease your child's financial transition into college and beyond.

In many families, both the husband and wife now hold full time jobs. Many of these families are hiring household workers to help them care for pre-school children, or to keep up with daily household chores.

What these increasingly typical American families may not know is that when they hire household help, they are probably required to pay Social Security taxes for the person they employ.

Family "employers" may not even realize they are employers. And even those who are aware of that fact may not know that their household workers are sacrificing valuable Social Security protection when Social Security taxes aren't paid and when the employee's wages aren't reported to Social Security. These workers could lose their eligibility for survivors, disability, retirement and Medicare benefits---the entire Social Security coverage package.

How does a family who hires household help know if they are considered an "employer" under the law?

Generally, if an employer pays a household worker \$50 or more during a three-month period, that



employer must also deduct Social Security taxes and report the wages to both Social Security and the Internal Revenue Service.

Why is the issue of coverage so important for domestic workers?

All Social Security benefits are based on a combination of how long an individual works and the amount of wages reported for him or her by each employer. Even parttime, seasonal, or temporary work can increase the future benefit amount for workers and their families. It also may provide current insurance against loss of income if the family breadwinner is disabled or dies before retiring.

Household workers should make sure that they are getting proper credit for work and that Social Security taxes are paid on their behalf. They can check their wage records regularly by asking the Social Security Administration to provide a free Personal Earnings and Benefit Estimate Statement that shows year-by-year figures on the actual wages reported to the agency by employers since 1951.

This statement also projects what an employee's retirement benefits may be and estimates what Social Security benefits may be payable to his or her family in the event of a disabling injury or death.



Social Security benefits are perhaps even more important to domestic workers than to other workers because they are so much less likely to have a private pension program or other financial resources to draw on.


