"Go Hard, or Go Home."

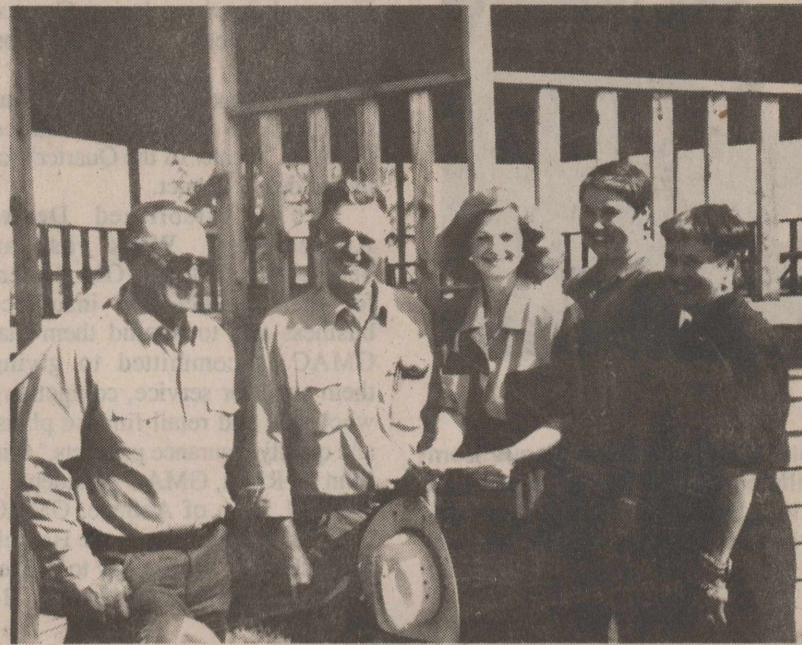
This is the Haskell Maiden's cross country team motto for the 1992-93 season and is written on the backs of their workout shirts.

Sales tax rebate continues upward

The City of Haskell has received a check in the amount of \$14,743.70 as its share of the most recent sales taxes collected by the state.

The check, based on the city's 1.5-percent sales tax rate, represents a 55.10-percent increase over the \$9,505.70 received for the same period last year when the rate was 1 percent.

For the first 10 months of 1992, Haskell has received \$180,256.36 in sales tax rebates. During the first 10 months last year, the amount was \$123,160.49. This is an increase of 46.36 percent. The 1.5-percent rate became effective last October.

Rule received \$1,121.97 this month, compared to \$1,047.37 last

year. (Rule's rate is 1 percent.)

The only other Haskell County town to receive a check this month was Rochester, which received \$706.25.

This month's sale tax payments include taxes collected on August sales and reported to the State Comptroller in September by businesses filing monthly tax returns.

In Stamford, this month's rebate check was in the amount of \$25,940.84, down 10.33 percent from last year's 23,511.80. Stamford, which also has a 1.5-percent rate, has received \$276,369.20 in rebates this year, down 4.25 percent from last year's \$288,650.63 for the first 10 months.

Indians seek third 7-2A win at Rotan

Haskell travels to Rotan Friday night to take on the Yellowhammers in an important district 7-2A contest.

The Indians, coming off a 31-12 victory over Hawley which improved their district mark to 3-2, need a victory to stay in the thick of the district championship race.

Rotan, on the other hand, needs a victory to keep from slipping farther behind. The Yellowhammers are 1-2 in district competition.

Rotan, which moved up to 2A this year after reaching the state semi-finals as a 1A team last year, has an overall record of 1-5.

But that record can easily be misleading. The Yellowhammers lost 30-20 to first-place Hamlin last week but they led the Pied Pipers 8-7 at halftime and trailed only 23-20 late in the game. In other district games, they lost 21-17 to Stamford and defeated Jim Ned 27-22.

Coach Walter Hargrove warned that the Yellowhammers are a very good team with loads of talent in the skilled positions.

Quarterback Eric Smith, an all-stater last year as a junior, is good enough to make any team in any class, Hargrove said. "He's the best I've seen since Munday's Bobby Dockins," said the coach. A talented runner as well as passer, he ran back the opening kickoff for a touchdown against Hamlin.

Rotan boasts still another all-stater in tailback Tyrone Daniel who made last year's all-state team as a kicker. Fullback Steven Warren is another offensive threat. On defense, the Hammers are led by linebacker Louis Ray.

The Yellowhammers got off to a slow start. They lost to Seagraves (18-35), Coahoma (12-34) and Olney (13-21) in the pre-district. But Smith was hobbled in the early games due to a pre-season injury, and their fortunes have turned

around since he became healthy again.

Haskell is 4-2 for the season with victories over Munday and Knox City and a loss to Seymour in the pre-district, and district wins over Anson and Hawley and a loss to Winters.

The Haskell offense is led by the running of Justin Lisle who has carried 109 times for 543 yards, and

the passing of Mart Guess who has connected on 28 of 90 attempts for 494 yards. Jonathan Tatum has caught 10 passes for 196 yards, Tommie Isbell has 10 catches for 145 yards and Joseph Rodriguez has hauled in five for 115 yards.

The Haskell defense has yielded only 55 points, 29 of them to Winters.

Williams retires as CEO at HNB

Royce L. Williams retired Sept. 30 as chief executive officer of Haskell National Bank. He had been with the bank since January 1, 1971.

He will be succeeded by Robert Howard of Abilene, a director of the bank since 1985. (See separate story.)

Williams came to Haskell National as vice president in charge of agriculture loans. He was elected to the board of directors in May 1971, later becoming executive vice president and then chief executive officer in 1986. He will remain a director of the bank and will serve on various bank committees.

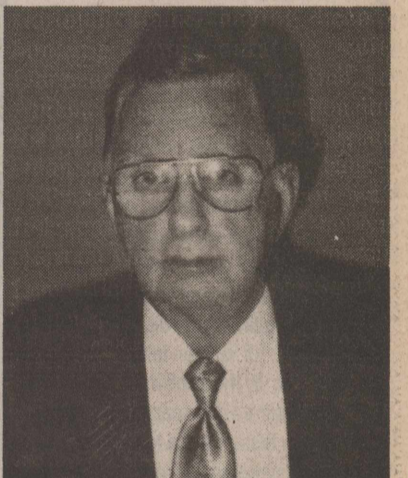
Before joining the Haskell bank, Williams was president of Central Texas Production Credit Association in Georgetown.

A native of Tuxedo, near Stamford, Williams graduated from high school in Stamford. After a tour of duty with the U.S. Army, he was with Rolling Plains Production Credit Association for 22 years, including 13 years (1955-68) as manager of the Haskell branch. After the Haskell branch merged with the one in Stamford, Williams accepted the presidency of Austin Production Credit in Austin, which later changed its name to Central Texas Production Credit and moved its offices to Georgetown.

In addition to his banking duties, Williams has been active in numerous civic endeavors. He is a member of the board of the North Central Texas Municipal Water Authority. He served as mayor of Haskell from 1978 and 1982 and is a past president of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce. He has been active in the American Cancer Society and had an active role in the construction of the Haskell County Country Club.

Williams said he has no specific plans for retirement. "I hope to play a little golf and travel a little," he said. He added that he will be looking after his farming interests, as well as those of his mother.

Williams said it was a pleasure to be associated with a progressive bank during the past 22 years. He expressed his appreciation to the board, officers, employees and customers of the bank for their

cooperation which afforded him the opportunity to be a part of the bank's success.

Mrs. Williams (Bobbie) is a registered nurse and is retired from the State Health Department. They have one son, Paul Williams, a pharmacist with HEB in Austin.

Stenholm, who is seeking reelection, invites everyone to meet him at one of these stops in the county.

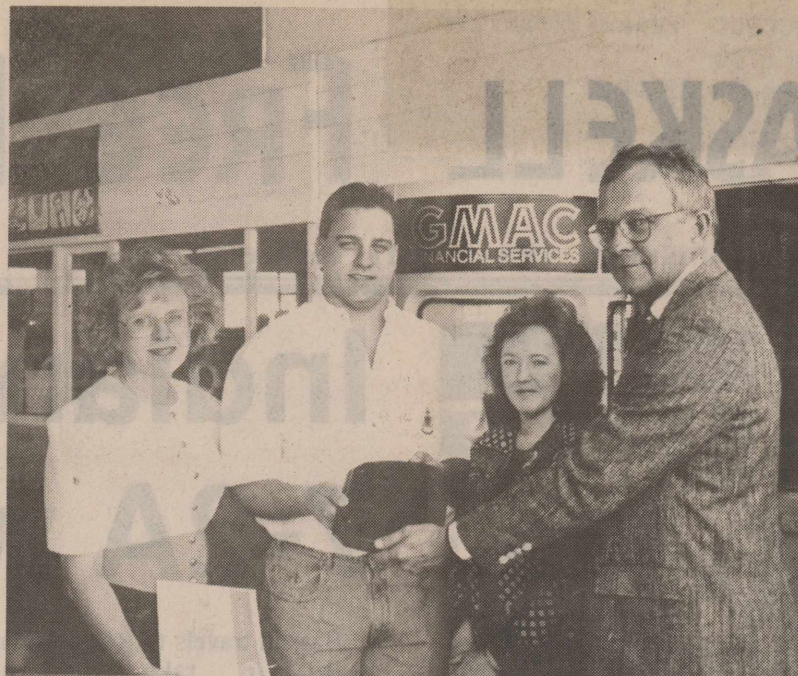
Stenholm will be joined by a group of friends and supporters as

Weighing the Risks of Estrogen: Although estrogen replacement therapy (ERT) is used commonly after menopause, estrogen may increase the risk of breast and uterine cancer, so ERT treatment should be individualized. It is not appropriate for women with a history of breast cancer. Because estrogen appears to protect against heart disease, it may be appropriate for women in that risk group. Those who fit the profile for developing osteoporosis are good candidates for ERT, which can lessen bone loss. Those with only mild symptoms of menopause may not require ERT.

Indians score early and often to dump Hawley, 31-12



Joseph Rodriguez started things off with a bang Friday night when he caught a 47-yard touchdown pass from Mart Guess for the first score in the Indians' 31-12 victory.

Haskell scored three touchdowns in the first period and then pretty well coasted to a 31-12 victory over the Hawley Bobcats in Haskell Friday night.

The victory boosted the Indians' district 7-2A record to 2-1 (4-2 overall).

Quarterback Mart Guess threw a 47-yard touchdown pass to Joseph Rodriguez on the Indians' first possession to stake Haskell to a 6-0 lead in the opening minutes. Shortly thereafter, Justin Lisle ran 13 yards for another Indian touchdown.

Hawley countered with a touchdown when Philip Hewitt

passed 10 yards to Michael Brazee to make it 12-6, but Haskell quickly regained its margin when Guess passed 42 yards to Jonathan Tatum for another score.

The Indians moved out front by 24-6 in the second period when Jason Torres gathered in a Hawley punt and raced 67 yards for a touchdown.

Hawley threatened twice in the third period, but the Indian defense held, stopping the Bobcats once at the 3 and again on the 20.

Lisle's 3-yard touchdown run and Casey Larned's conversion brought the score to 31-6 in the fourth quarter before Hawley's Kevin

Leathers scored from a yard out to complete the night's scoring.

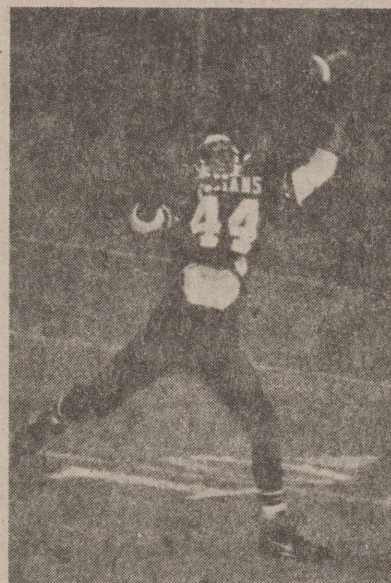
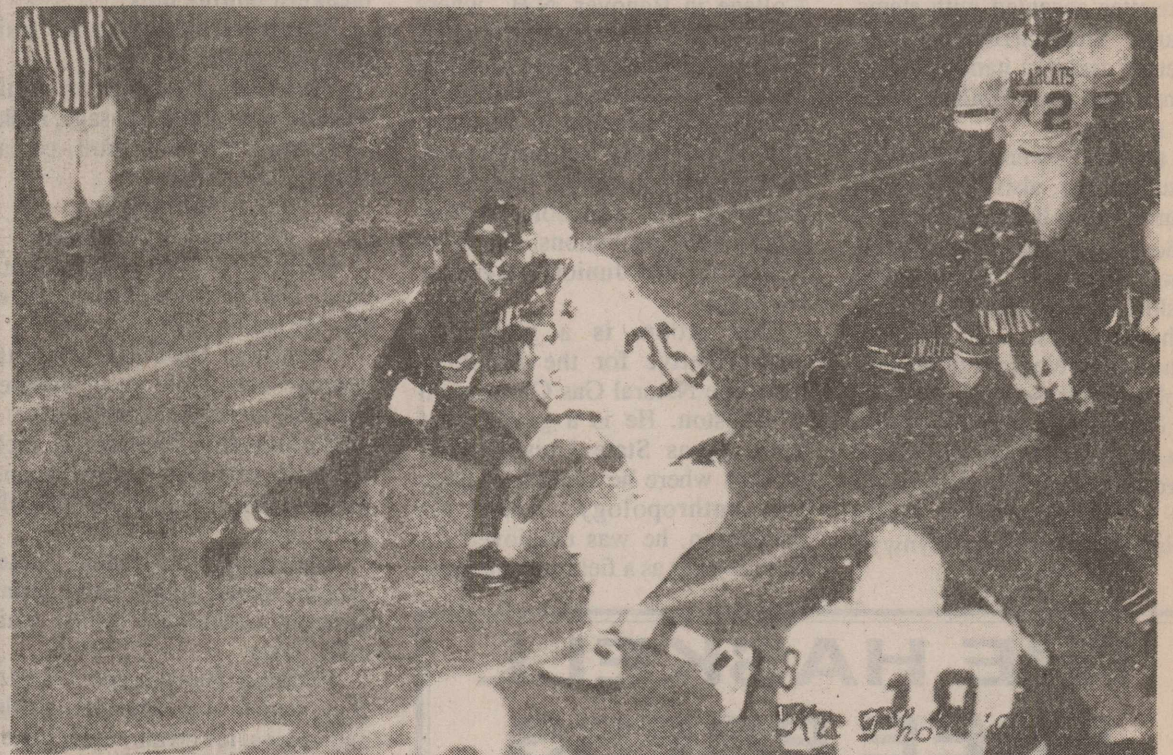
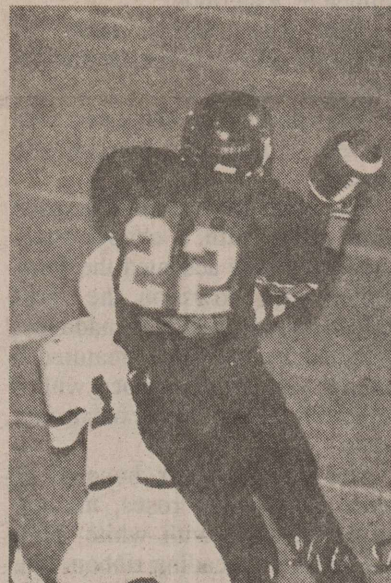
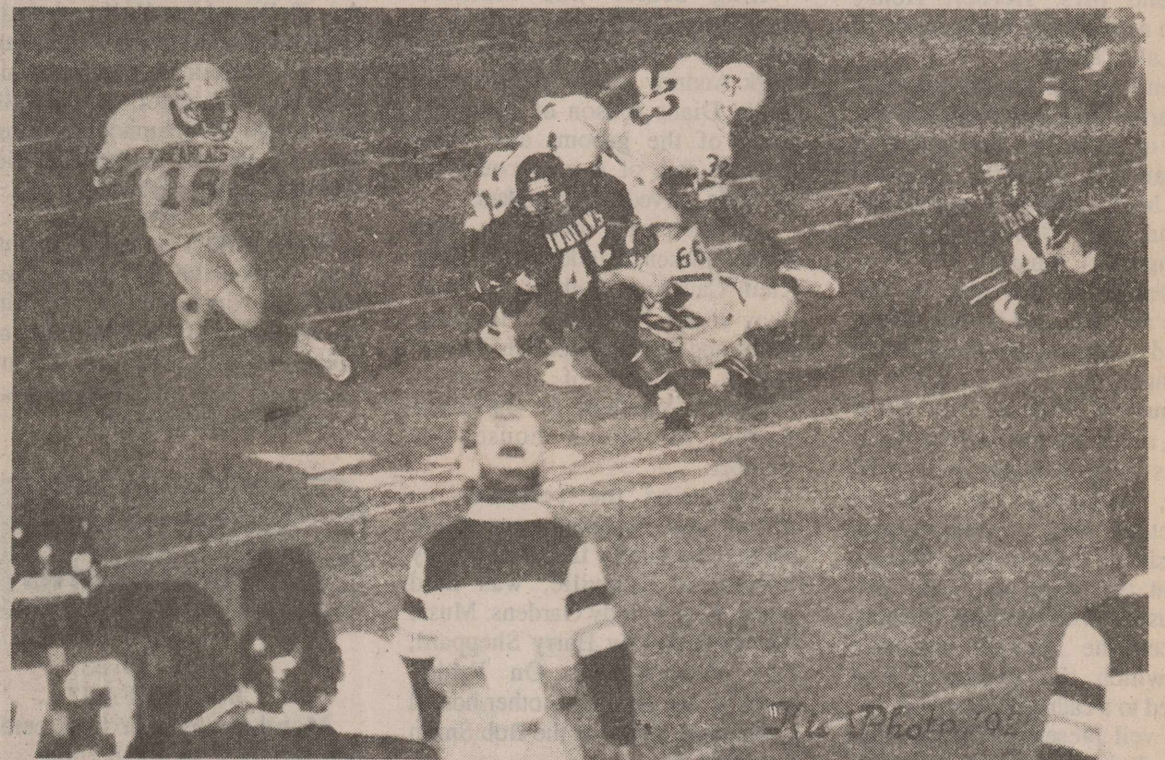
Paced by Lisle's 104 yards on 15 carries and Guess's 164 yards on 7 pass completions in 18 attempts, the Indians amassed 356 yards in total offense, 192 rushing and 164 passing.

Coach Walter Hargrove praised the offensive line in paving the way for the outstanding offensive showing by the Indians.

The coach was well pleased with the defensive play of the team. He pointed to the work of the special teams, noting Leon McBee's three tackles on kickoff returns and Torres' punt return.

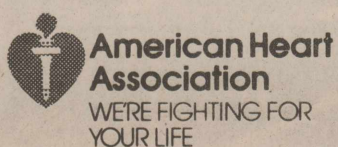

Police chief brings program to club

The Progressive Study Club met Oct. 8 at the community room. President Donna Cole welcomed members and guests, Becky Wall, Hortense Lees, Ada Pope, Bertie Beacham, Mr. and Mrs. Sid Hester and Alan Beard, Rule policeman.

Jill Druessedow, director of the public affairs program, introduced Police Chief Joe Hester of Denver City, who is listed in Who's Who, has a degree in criminal justice and is a graduate of the FBI Academy in Washington, D.C. He is instructor for all police training on the South Plains and serves on the board of South Plains Association of Governments.

Chief Hester began his presentation by passing around a picture of a baby whose mother was addicted to drugs. He uses this picture with school children. With the help of New Mexico policemen, 176,000 pounds of marijuana and \$50,000 worth of drugs were removed from the streets in his area. He is a part of TASK FORCE which is made up of officers in Seminole, Odessa and other towns, which often leads to high speed chases, shootings, wrecked cars and people going to prison.

He gave a number of "nots" on crime prevention. He warned the members about leaving keys in the car, even for a few minutes at the grocery, purses and packages, especially at Christmas.

One good safety rule is to mark a special number and take pictures

and videos of household items and file them in a bank box. Day time is the worst time for break-ins. Neighbors should notice strangers, peddlers, or salesmen and call police or sheriff if they feel something is not right.

Chief Hester told of improved methods of finger printing--even being able to "lift" prints from old papers, beer cans and dead bodies. Protective clothing should be worn due to the chemicals used. DNA and blood samples have proven very effective, but expensive equipment is required. He will deliver such personally for testing since he doesn't want to wait for weeks. He is also an expert in using hypnosis to enhance memory. He can't make a person do something that he wouldn't do naturally. Hypnosis was used effectively on him, so he now uses it.

Another fact was concerning child and elderly abuse. One could tell by Chief Hester's expressions and remarks what he thinks about these crimes. He now has a grandfather and three dads in prison. One man said he was lured by a four-year-child. Two ladies work in his office to help children.

The law now makes it possible for cars, homes, etc., which have been purchased with drug money to be sold and the money goes to the law enforcement department. The last part of the presentation showed how ordinary things are used to conceal drugs. Drug addicts will go to any lengths--even ripping off family members--to get a "fix."

Blood donating myths dispelled

The Red Cross bloodmobile will be in Haskell Oct. 27. It will be located at the First Baptist Church's Family Life Center from 3 to 6:30 p.m.

"Area residents are invited to put the 'do' back in 'donate'," said Brian Burgess, Red Cross volunteer blood service chairman.

For information on giving blood, call Burgess at 864-3250.

The public's fear of AIDS, hepatitis and other blood-borne diseases grows with each new case that makes the daily news. What does this growing fear mean to hospital patients? In some communities, blood shortages occur on a regular basis.

Although the nation's blood supply has never been safer, potential volunteer blood donors continue to mistrust the actual donation process.

High on the donation myth list is the belief that you can get AIDS or other diseases from giving blood. "There is no way that an individual can contract AIDS by donating blood," said Brian Burgess, local chairman of the Southwest Region Red Cross Blood Services. "A disposable, sterile, prepackaged blood pack and needle is used for each donor. All used needles are then destroyed."

A second myth is that giving blood frequently isn't necessary or that it may sap one's strength.

"First of all, a volunteer blood donor who donates regularly is one who is helping to keep the community blood supply at a safe level," said Burgess. "A healthy donor can give whole blood once every eight weeks."

Other myths persist concerning the screening and acceptance of blood donors.

"Only volunteers are used as blood donors; no one is paid for their effort," Burgess explained. "Not all volunteers can donate. However, those who are in good health, weigh at least 110 pounds and have a satisfactory medical history, pass a screening interview and meet the age requirements find a

great self satisfaction from giving the gift of life."

The American Red Cross estimates that nearly 4 million Americans will need blood or blood components this year. The demand for blood has grown steadily since 1980, yet only four to six percent of the U.S. population donates blood each year.

THE BIG SIX-OH

As birthdays start rolling around faster and faster, many people dread the round number syndrome. The big four-o, five-o, six-o, and even the big seven-o is a time most people do not look forward to. They sort of equate it with the end of an era.

You could buy a new car for \$400, but who could afford one, because gas was 10¢ a gallon.

Way back then, cigarette smoking was fashionable, grass was mowed not smoked; Coke was a cold drink not a drug and pot was something you cooked Sunday dinner in. Rock music was Grandma's lullaby and AIDS were helpers in the school principals office.

IRS UPDATE

Here's an update on recent IRS activities:

- Every three years, the IRS randomly selects about 50,000 taxpayers for audit under its Taxpayer Compliance Measurement Program (TCMP). The IRS uses these audits to collect statistical data for its general audit program.

- TCMP audits were scheduled to take place this year for 1991 tax returns. However, the IRS has decided to postpone these grueling line-by-line audits while it completes a reevaluation of the program.

- The IRS has announced the depreciation limits for luxury business automobiles placed into service in 1992. The limits are \$2,760 in the first-year, \$4,400 in the second year, and \$2,650 in the third-year. Each succeeding year is limited to \$1,575. The IRS adjusts these depreciation limits annually for inflation.

- Recently the IRS issued clarification on the deductibility of FHA and VA loan origination fees. Previously, such fees were deemed nondeductible as payments for lender services rather than deductible as mortgage points. Now the IRS states these fees may be deducted as home mortgage points when paid by the buyer.

- The IRS has reversed a 1991 ruling on the deductibility of business-related tax preparation expenses for sole proprietors, farmers, and taxpayers with rental real estate. The 1991 ruling said such taxpayers could only deduct tax preparation expenses as part of their total miscellaneous itemized deductions on Schedule A (subject to the 2% of adjusted gross income limit).

- The 1992 ruling allows these taxpayers to deduct the business portion of tax fees on their business schedules - generally, Schedules C, F, or E. Allowing a business deduction gives the taxpayer a full deduction for the expense instead of subjecting it to the 2% limitation.
