## History rides with Clinton

History suggests that Bill Clinton will carry Haskell County in next Tuesday's presidential election.

In 11 presidential elections since World War II, Haskell County has gone for the Republican nominee only twice.

Last Republican candidate to carry the county was Ronald Reagan in 1984 when he outpolled Walter Mondale, 1701-1434 in Haskell County. Reagan was more popular here in 1984 when he ran for re-election than he was in 1980 when he was first elected. In his

first election, Reagan trailed Jimmy Carter, 1951-1447 in this county.

Richard Nixon was the other GOP nominee to win Haskell County. In 1972 when he was re-elected, Nixon received 1749 votes in Haskell County, while George McGovern could muster only 950.

Nixon's 1972 showing in Haskell County represented even more of a turnaround than Reagan's 1984 showing. When he was first elected in 1968, Nixon trailed Hubert Humphrey badly, 1888-610, in Haskell County.

Nixon was no more popular here in 1960 when he made his first presidential bid in a losing race to John F. Kennedy. In Haskell County, the vote favored Kennedy, 2776-866.

Biggest margin here of a presidential candidate in the post war era came in 1948 when a splintered Democratic party pulled one of the biggest upsets ever. Harry Truman was a runaway winner in Haskell County, getting 2745 votes. His Republican foe,

Thomas Dewey got 181. Dixiecrat Strom Thurmond polled 80 votes and Progressive party candidate Henry Wallace got 4.

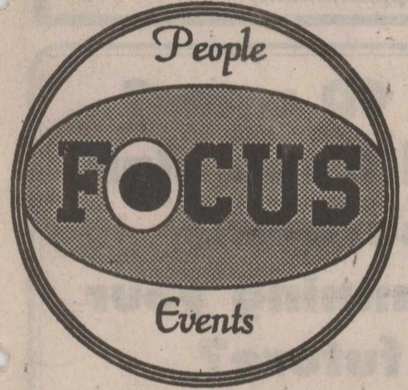
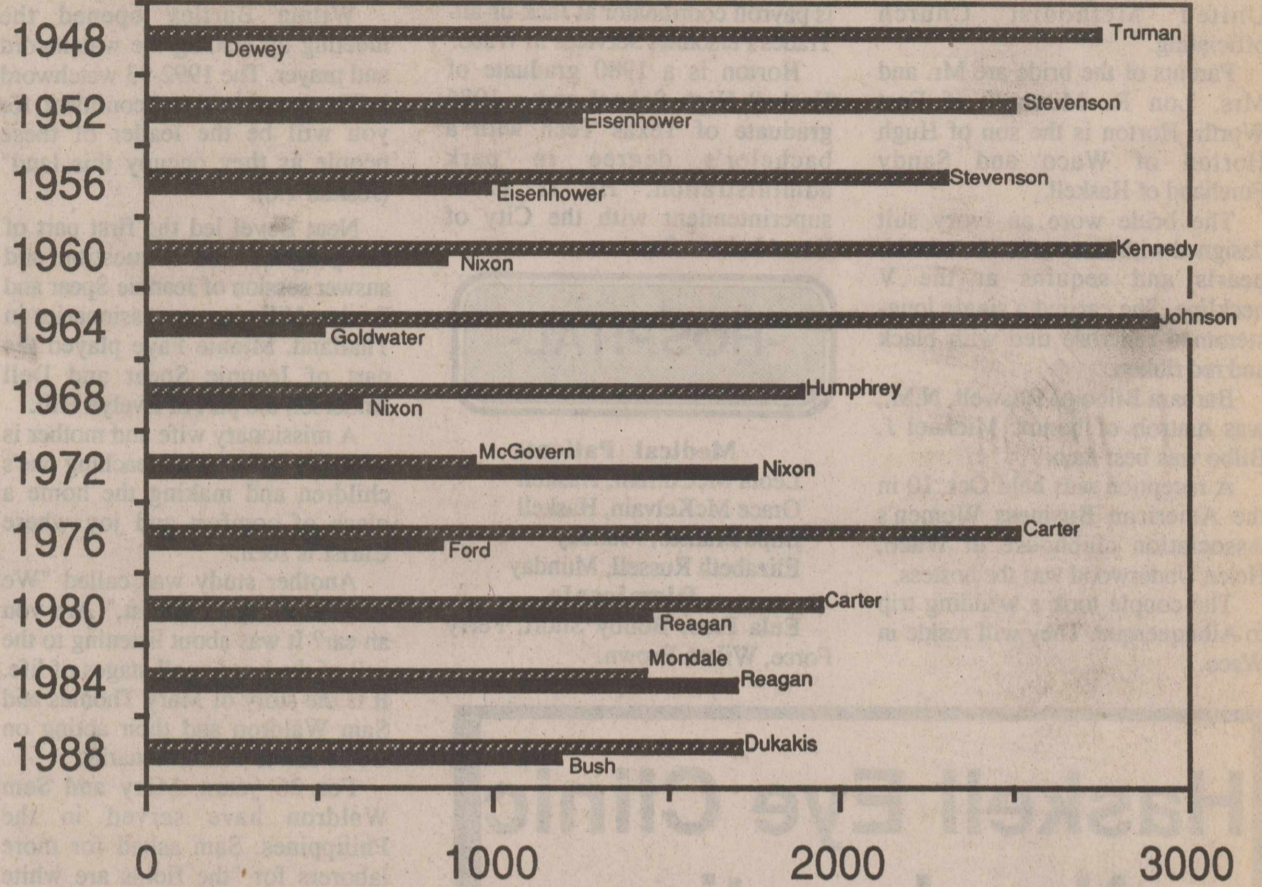
Almost as big, was Lyndon Johnson's margin over Barry Goldwater in 1964. Haskell voters gave their fellow Texan a 2903-512 edge over the Arizona Republican.

Oddly, there has never been a close presidential race in local voting. Four years ago, Michael Dukakis beat George Bush 1715-1193. In his successful 1976 campaign, Carter bested Gerald Ford 2512-843 in Haskell County.

Not even Dwight Eisenhower could pick up much of a following here. Adlai Stevenson beat Ike 2492-1253 in 1952, and even more decisively, 2306-988, in 1956 when he was re-elected.

## Indians, Pipers in crucial test

Haskell hopes to improve its playoff chances Friday night when the Indians travel to Hamlin to take on the Pied Pipers in another important district 7-A clash.

The Indians and Pipers are locked in a four-way tie with Rotan and Stamford for second place in the district. All boast 3-2 district marks, and are right behind Winters (4-1).

For the season, Haskell is 5-3 and Hamlin stands 4-4.

Hamlin was the pre-season favorite to win district 7-2A. In fact, the Pied Pipers were ranked in the state's top 10 in the early part of the season. They lost to Jim Ned two weeks ago and last week they bowed to Stamford, 35-21.

Haskell is coming off a 20-0 shutout of Jim Ned in one of its better-played games of the season.

Coach Walter Hargrove feels that his team has shown steady

improvement each week. The Indians' strength lies in the ability of team members to play together, the coach said. "There is no individualism," he pointed out.

The Indians have suffered few turnovers and have not been penalized too heavily. At the same time, they have executed their game plans well. On the other hand, they have made many big defensive plays, including fumble recoveries and interceptions.

Hamlin has had several problems which have kept the Pipers from attaining their pre-season expectations. Injuries have hurt the team badly. In addition, the team has had some turmoil which has harmed the team mentally and resulted in some suspensions.

The Pipers' offense is led by talented running back Wayland McGee, a unanimous all-district selection a year ago.

## 4141 in county eligible to vote in Tuesday election

Indications are that most of Haskell County's 4,141 eligible voters will cast ballots in Tuesday's general election.

Polls at Haskell County's 10 voting precincts open at 7 a.m. and will remain open until 7 p.m.

As expected, most local interest in the general election will be in the race for president where Republican incumbent George Bush is being challenged by Arkansas Gov. Bill Clinton, Democrat, and Dallas billionaire Ross Perot, Independent. Also on the ballot is the name of Libertarian party candidate Andre Marrou. Seven others have filed as write-in candidates for the nation's highest office.

Local Democrats are predicting Haskell County will give a healthy margin to Clinton in this heavily Democratic county which has voted for the Republican nominee only twice in recent history. In 1988, Democrat Michael Dukakis bested Bush, 1715-1193, in local voting.

Last time the Republican nominee carried Haskell County was in 1984 when Ronald Reagan, running for re-election, beat Walter Mondale 1701-1434.

Only other Republican candidate to carry Haskell County, at least in recent history, was Richard Nixon who outpolled George McGovern 1749-950 in 1972 when Nixon was re-elected to a second term.

Only other contested races in Tuesday's election will be for the positions of U.S. Representative,

Railroad Commissioner and State Senator, in addition to three justices of the Supreme Court and three Court of Criminal Appeals judges.

In the 17th Congressional contest, Democrat incumbent Charles Stenholm of Stamford is opposed by Jeannie Sadowski, Eastland Republican.

Lena Guerrero, Democrat, and Barry Williamson, Republican, are seeking a term as Railroad Commissioner, as is Libertarian Richard N. Draheim Jr. Mrs. Guerrero is a former Railroad Commissioner who resigned the office a few weeks ago amid controversy over the falsification of her educational background.

In the district 30 State Senate race, Democrat incumbent Steve Carriger of Roby is opposed by Republican candidate Tom Haywood of Wichita Falls.

Other contested races include: Supreme Court Justice, Place 1: Oscar H. Mauzy, Democrat; Craig

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## Haskell students score well on national achievement tests

Students at all grade levels in Haskell CISD scored above the national average on the achievement tests given last spring.

Haskell students also scored above the state average at all grade levels except one.

Of particular note, were fourth- and seventh-grade students, who scored 21 and 16 points respectively, above the state average.

This NAPT, given in Texas for the first time last year, allows school districts to compare their students' progress with students both nationwide and statewide. Because it is a norm-referenced test, results are in percentiles rather than on mastery or non-mastery, which is how the TAAS results are reported.

These results will become a part of the Texas Academic Indicator System, along with each school's TAAS results, drop rate, attendance rate, college entrance scores, number of students graduating with advanced diplomas, and TASP results.

For the 1991-92 school year, the Haskell academic indicators showed gains in some areas and need for improvement in others.

On the TAAS test, 74 percent of Haskell third-graders passed all three tests. Forty percent of fifth, 48 percent of seventh, 50 percent of ninth and 46 percent of 11th graders passed all three tests.

Of special concern was the poor performance by many of the sub-population students such as the economically disadvantaged, at-risk and minorities. Haskell schools will be making extensive efforts to

increase these students' achievement levels. The state standard is that within five years, 90 percent of all students pass all three tests.

Other academic indicators showed Haskell's dropout rate was 1.8 percent and the attendance rate was 97.4 percent. The average ACT score for Haskell was 18.2 and the average SAT score was 1,028.

Eighty-four percent of Haskell juniors and seniors took a college

entrance exam. While 40.5 percent of Haskell graduates received the advance seal on their transcript, the graduation rate fell from 100 percent in 1990-91 to 92.5 percent in 1991-92.

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# Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District 1992 Annual Report

The Haskell Soil and Water Conservation District was formed to help and serve producers and landowners with technical assistance. The current directors are: Burnell Gilleland, Haskell; M.W. Phemister, Weinert; F.A. Ulmer, Sagerton; Dan Wadzeck, Rochester; and Steve Alsabrook, Haskell. The Board of Directors meet monthly on the third Friday of each month at 9:00 a.m. in the Soil Conservation Service Office at 1203A South Avenue E in Haskell. All regular meetings are open to the public in accordance with the Texas State open meeting law.

12 regular board meetings were held during the year: 7 meetings were attended by 5 members, 5 meetings were attended by 4 members. 2 members attended the Rolling Plains Association of SWCD's meeting; 2 members attended the State Association Meeting; 1 member attended the New Director Workshop; 4 members attended the Plant Material Center Field Day; 1 member served on the Brazos River Authority Upper Brazos Sub-committee; 4 members attended the local awards program; 2 members attended the Area V Awards Program; 2 members attended the Clear Fork Range Camp. All programs administered by the District are on a voluntary basis and are provided without regard to race, color, sex, or national origin, or disability.

## Director Election

## Clear Fork Range Camp

The Haskell, California Creek, Lower Clear Fork, and Andrew Kent SWCDs co-sponsored the 3rd Annual Range Camp on July 28-30. The camp was held at the Kroked River Ranch. 29 students between the ages 11 and 16 attended.

During the 3-day camp the students learn plant identification, study the uses of rangeland, collected, mounted, developed individual plant collections, and toured the Knox City Plant Material Center. At the end of the camp each were tested on range knowledge and skills.

The group was divided into four teams and competed in outdoor activities such as relays and other games.

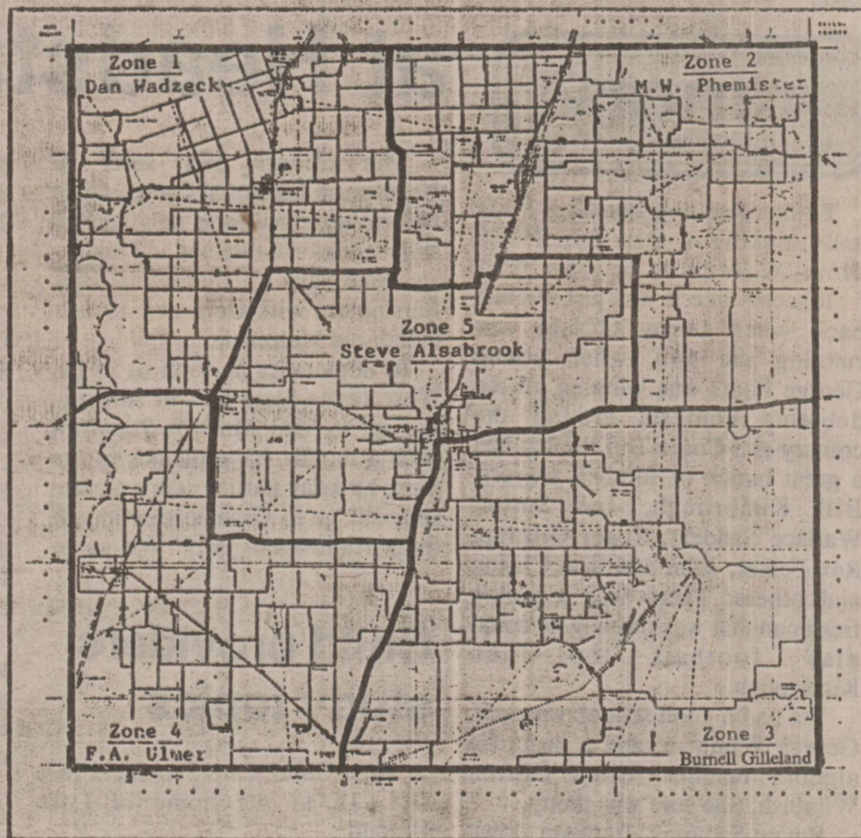
The main objective of the camp is to help young people understand and appreciate rangeland and related natural resources.

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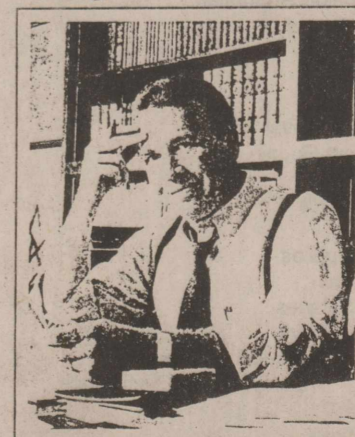

# Indians shut out Jim Ned, 20-0

Haskell's Indians launched a 72-yard scoring drive the first time they had the ball, came back with another 71-yard scoring drive in the second quarter and then added an insurance touchdown in the fourth period to earn a 20-0 victory over the Indians of Jim Ned here Friday night.

The victory improved their 7-2A record to 3-2 (5-3 overall) and moved them into a four-way tie for second place in the district.

While the offense was performing with precision, the Indian defense came in for its share of glory. Although Jim Ned moved the ball on the ground fairly well, the visiting Indians never came close to scoring. Their deepest penetration was to the Indian 22-yard line.

Jim Ned took the opening kickoff and moved to the Haskell 28 where the drive bogged down and they had to surrender the ball to the Indians.

Twelve plays later, the Indians scored when Mart Guess passed 21 yards to Jonathan Tatum, after which Jason Torres booted the extra point to put Haskell out front 7-0 with 4:21 to go in the opening period. Biggest plays in the 72-yard drive were a pair of 10-yard runs by Justin Lisle, 7-yard gainers by Lisle and Guess and a 5-yard pass from Guess to Tatum.

The Indians made it 13-0

midway through the second quarter when Tatum passed 14 yards to Joseph Rodriguez to cap a 71-yard drive. Guess engineered that drive, passing 26 yards to Tatum and 20 yards to Tommie Isbell to put the ball in scoring position.

Isbell scored the Indians third touchdown at the 3:17 mark of the fourth period when he scooped up a fumble and raced 25 yards for a touchdown. Torres broke through to hit Jim Ned quarterback Jade Lamb behind the line of scrimmage. Lamb fumbled the ball and Isbell picked it off the ground.

Isbell's performance earned him designation as the Abilene Reporter-News' defensive player of the week. The Indians' defensive end was in on 12 tackles, six of them unassisted. Three of the tackles were behind the line of scrimmage. He also batted down a pass and partially blocked a punt, in addition to his fumble recovery and touchdown run.

Haskell's other defensive end, Cody Josselet also turned in an outstanding performance. Brant Breeden was in on 16 tackles. Torres, Brandon McFadden and Robert Huff intercepted passes. Torres and Casey Larned each recovered a Jim Ned fumble.

On offense, Guess completed 7 of 19 passes for 114 yards. Tatum caught 3 passes for 53 yards and threw once for 14. Lisle rushed 25

"Well, I'd vote for him, but he doesn't have a chance of winning." This statement has been used nation-wide by thousands of concerned persons as the chief reason for withholding their votes from Ross Perot. But before you write him off, consider another point of view.

If you understand the differences between the policies of the candidates, you should then vote for a candidate, and those policies out of a sense of conviction, conscience, and courage. The act of voting should never be based on a cynical evaluation as to who can or cannot win. When you vote your conscience, YOU and millions of others are already "winners". Your vote, under such conditions, is never "wasted".

And if all Americans who feel instinctively drawn to Ross Perot's call for action and reform actually ignored the polls, the parties, and the pundits and voted their consciences, then those same Americans could reclaim their power. And there is one last thing to consider.

If there had been an inter-colonial/international poll available in 1776, this country of ours would still be part of British North America. No poll ever told the American rebels that they had "no chance" against overwhelming British power. Fortunately for all of us, our forbears stuck to their principles, and they changed their world forever. Give your conscience a chance to fundamentally change this country's direction. Give Ross Perot his chance to serve us. Let's give American a chance....for a change.

## Noah assisted 18 in September

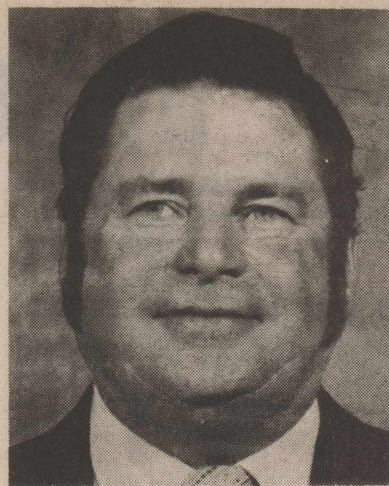
Eighteen women and five children were assisted during the month of September by Noah Project-North.

# Paint Creek girls get \$2,500 for new athletic equipment

The Paint Creek girls' teams will have new equipment for basketball and track, thanks to a program sponsored by L'eggs and the Women's Sports Foundation.

The school received more than \$2,500 for entering a "team dream", a 150-word essay that told what a girls' sports team would do if it won a \$5,000 prize.

Eight teams nationwide won the \$5,000 prizes. All 395 schools that entered, including Paint Creek, shared equally in a \$1 million fund raised through sales of L'eggs hosiery.

The Paint Creek girls' dream was to get some money to enhance their program. They wanted some

equipment they didn't have. When the check came in for over \$2,500 they were very excited and surprised.

Coach Halliburton and the girls sat down and made a wish list. It was like Christmas in October. They expressed their thanks to all the women and girls who donated to the program by purchasing L'eggs hosiery, even though most of them didn't know about the 2-cent donation to the Women's Sports Foundation for every pair purchased.

Studies show that girls who participate in high school sports are more likely to perform better academically and have a good self image. every \$10 given to athletic programs overall, even though almost four out of every 10 high school athletes are girls.

In response to this need, L'eggs and the Women's Sports Foundation developed the L'eggs Team Dream program. High schools all over the country were invited to submit their girls' sports teams' dreams.

A panel of celebrity athletes judged the essays. The panel included figure skater Debi Thomas, cycling champion Connie Paraskevin-Young and track Olympian Benita Fitzgerald, plus high school girls' sports experts. They selected two high schools from each of four regions to receive the \$5,000 bonus.

L'eggs is the only corporate sponsor to give \$1 million for girls' high school sports. L'eggs' history of support for women's

athletic events includes the L'eggs Mini Marathon and the L'eggs World Series of Tennis. As a division of the Sara Lee Corporation, L'eggs is involved with Sara Lee's unprecedented three-year commitment to support women's collegiate athletics through the NCAA. The Team Dream program continues this tradition.

Teams winning \$5,000 awards included various girls' athletic teams from Fayette, Ala., Fayetteville, Ark., Roseburg, Ore., Hillsville, Va., Chicago, Burlingame, Calif., Rogersville, Tenn., and Shelby, Mich.

The Women's Sports Foundation is a non-profit educational organization that promotes and enhances the sports experience for all girls and women in sports. The foundation's programs include education, advocacy and recognition in addition to grant programs such as the L'eggs Team Dream.
