

Students jingle rings radio bell

Students in a computer class at Denton High School-Ryan Campus gave a creative twist to the words of "Jingle Bells" and won a Christmas carol contest sponsored by WBAP radio station.

The 17 juniors and seniors in Sharon Murphy's business information processing class recorded "Type Type Type," sung to the tune of "Jingle Bells," and sent it to the radio station.

Ms. Murphy heard about the contest, which asked for listeners to make up new words to their favorite Christmas tunes, on the radio and knew her creative students could have fun with it.

"One student, Joshua Davis, wrote the jingle and all the students sang the song," Ms. Murphy said.

The amateur recording artists called themselves the MicroElves. Steve Leftwich, youth director at First Baptist Church in Denton, played keyboard while the students recorded the song in their classroom.

Their song, voted as having the most original lyrics, was among 164,000 entries the radio station judged. The station also awarded entries for most traditional lyrics and most original lyrics using WBAP staff names.

"WBAP called me Thursday and said to listen at 8:10 a.m. Friday for the announcement," Ms. Murphy said. "They told me we had won and I wasn't supposed to tell anyone but I had a hard time keeping it quiet."

On Friday, the radio station played the students' song. Ms. Murphy said her students could not believe they had won.

On Monday, the students will enjoy their prize: a catered lunch from Colter's Bar-B-Q. Their special guest will be WBAP radio personality Hal Jay.

The students' variation of "Jingle Bells" is as follows:

Red ribbon signal for driving safety

Red ribbons will blanket the roadways in Haskell again this New Year's week as a symbol of sober driving during.

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Deadline near for page, intern posts

Young people interested in serving as a page or intern in Washington have just two weeks to get their applications into Congressman Charles Stenholm's office.

Completed applications must be submitted in person or postmarked by Jan. 15 to be considered for either position.

Pages perform a variety of duties, including delivering packages to offices within the Capitol complex, and answering telephones in the members' cloakrooms. Pages answer directly to the director of page services and they are paid a monthly salary which covers basic living expenses.

They are housed in supervised dormitories and study junior level curriculum at the U.S. Capitol Page School.

Page positions are open to students in the 17th Congressional District who will be juniors in September 1993. They must have a "B" average in four major courses, excluding electives.

Four interns are selected to work in the congressman's office for one-month intervals in June or July. Interns are involved in the daily

operation of the congressman's office and will help research constituent inquiries.

College students from the 17th Congressional District or those attending college inside the district, teachers and administrators are eligible for the internship program. The interns are paid a one-month stipend to cover basic living expenses.

Page and intern applications and information can be obtained by contacting Elaine Talley in Stenholm's Abilene district office at 915-673-7221.

Applications will be forwarded to a selection committee which will notify finalists by Feb. 22. Interviews for all positions will be held in Abilene on March 13 and selections will be made at that time.

Gas company files rate hike

Lone Star Gas Co. has filed for a rate change in Weinert that will raise the average monthly residential bill by \$6.11.

Manager Roy Cox said the rate increase is necessary to continue "the high performance levels our customers are accustomed to receiving." He said it will cover necessary operating expenses, such as maintaining and improving the local pipeline distribution system which is vital to dependable service.

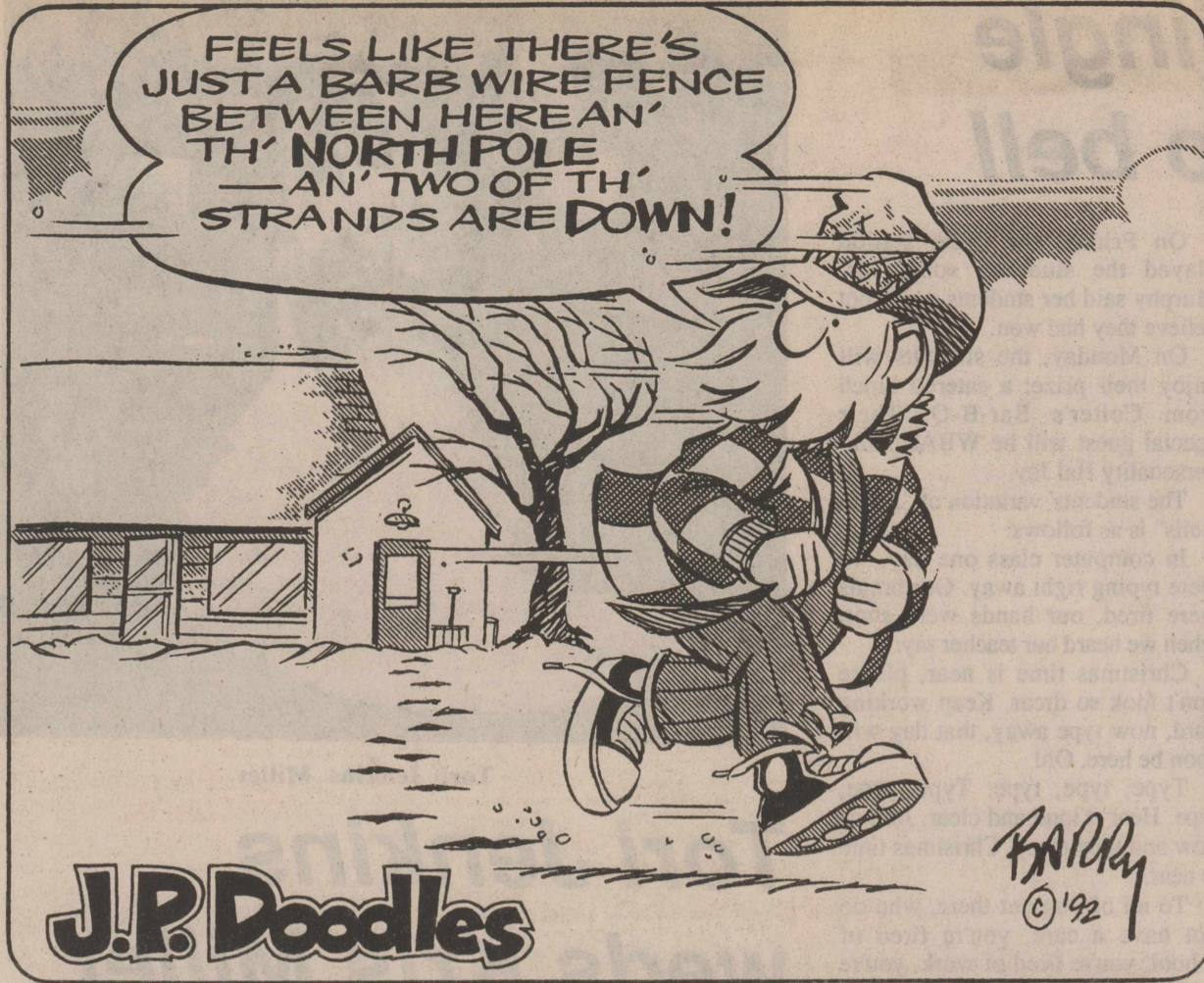
Cox said the last rate change in Weinert was in September 1983.

"Lone Star will continue to work for reductions in the cost of the gas purchased by our customers, and any savings achieved are passed

on to customers each month through the gas cost adjustment," said Cox. "General increases in the cost of doing business make this request necessary."

Based on Lone Star's application, a residential customer using an average of 6,000 cubic feet of gas a month will see a change in the monthly bill from \$34.60 to \$40.71.

"No one likes raising prices, but any business must earn enough money to cover its cost of service," said Cox. "That said, we will always strive to provide the best possible service to our customers at the lowest possible cost."

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Army needs enlistments

Army recruiters continue to put young men and women in the Army, even as the Army goes through the process of decreasing in size, according to Lt. Col. Brad M. Beasley, commander of Army recruiting in New Mexico and West Texas.

During 1993, Army recruiters expect to enlist 83,000 active soldiers and 44,000 reserve soldiers nationwide. While these numbers are down considerably from the 1980s, there are still many opportunities for young people who want to join the Army in order to learn a skill or gain money for college.

"Most of today's recruits will serve only one term, and then return to civilian life, rather than make it a career," said Beasley. "Keeping the Army strong requires continued recruiting of young soldiers to fill the beginning ranks of the small units that make up the greatest part of the Army's strength."

To maintain high quality, the Army continues to offer young Americans a wide range of benefits, including guaranteed training in one of over 250 skills and the GI Bill plus Army College Fund with educational benefits up to \$25,200.

"Young men and women who stay on course and graduate from high school will have opportunities in the Army," said Beasley.

Orange juice plentiful, cheap

The cold winds of January will blow in bargains on such winter-weather standbys as orange juice, coffee and soups.

"On top of the list will be a winter favorite that many drink by the gallon to help ward off the common cold--orange juice," said Dr. Richard Edwards, food marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension service.

Increased supplies of citrus will help drive orange juice prices below \$2 for half-gallon containers and \$4 for gallon jugs. Frozen concentrate will be on special for 89 to 99 cents per 8-ounce can.

Cisco College sets registration

Registration for the spring semester at Cisco Junior College will be Tuesday, Jan. 12.

Registration will be from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. and from 6 to 8 p.m. Classes will begin Jan. 13 but late registration will continue through Jan. 21.

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Farmers eligible for loans

Low-interest emergency loans are available to eligible farmers and ranchers in eight West Texas counties that were declared disaster areas due to excessive rain and drought from Jan. 12 to Aug. 1 of this year. Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry announced.

U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan declared Jones County as a primary disaster area.

An addition seven counties, including Haskell, Callahan, Fisher, Nolan, Shackelford, Stonewall and Taylor were declared contiguous disaster counties by the secretary.

These declarations allow family-size farm operators in both the primary and contiguous areas to apply for emergency assistance from the Farmers Home Administration.

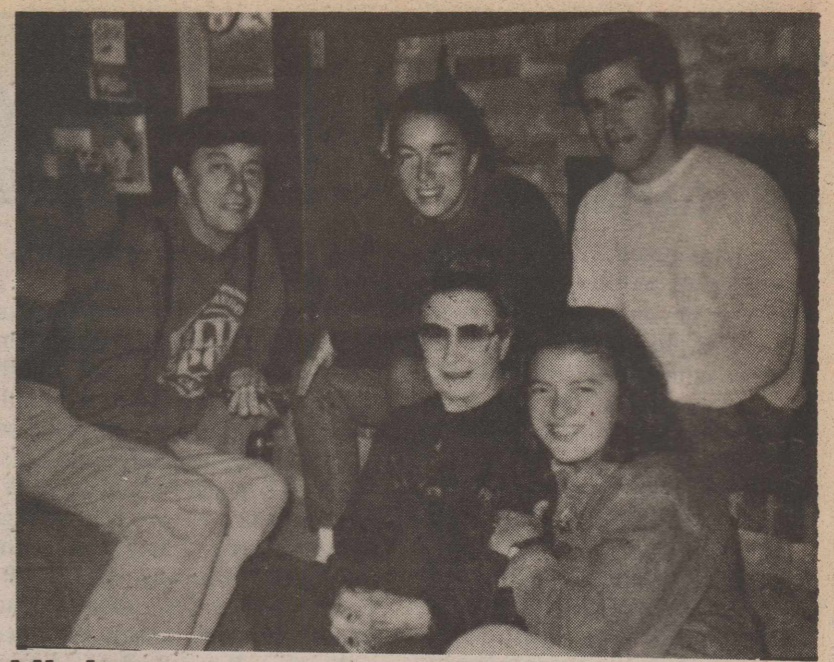
