# Many changes occurred in 1992

There was no tornado or other earth-shaking event in Haskell County in 1992, but the year will go down as one which saw a number of changes in the community.

Voters elected a new mayor, new City Council members, a new county commissioner and a new county attorney. The year also saw a new city administrator, a new high school principal, a new bank president, and a change in the Chamber of Commerce management.

A fire badly damaged the Rule school, the Indian football team beat old rivals Munday and Stamford enroute to a winning season and a new City Hall was constructed after surviving a law suit.

For excitement, there was nothing to match a spine-tingling, threecounty motor chase which ended on the outskirts of Haskell when a fugitive killed himself after going through a road block.

Following is a brief, month-by-month summary of the significant happenings of the year, as reported in The Free Press:

**JANUARY** 

Andrew Gannaway was named president of Haskell National Bank and Randy Hise was promoted to executive vice president, the position formerly held by Gannaway. Longtime bank president Abe Turner will head the pank's business development and public relations department.

City Administrator Robert Baker told the City Council he would submit a letter of resignation Jan. 30.

A spirited race for 39th District Attorney developed with the filing of four candidates for the office. Candidates were John Fouts, Joseph Thigpen, Art Williams and Dwain Gibson.

A hair-raising 55-mile chase through three counties ended when a 33year-old man fatally shot himself after going through a roadblock at the

south outskirts of Haskell. The Haskell Maidens clinched the first-half championship of district 7-

Vergil Smith resigned as chief juvenile and adult probation officer of the 39th Judicial District Court.

A Limousin steer owned by Mindy Ballard of Rochester was crowned

grand champion of the Haskell County Junior Livestock Show.

Twelve persons were arrested in Haskell County as a result of a roundup of alleged drug traffickers.

#### **FEBRUARY**

Mindy Ballard, 17-year-old Rochester senior, showed the reserve grand ampion steer at the Southwestern Exposition and Livestock Show in Fort Worth. Mindy pocketed \$32,000 from the sale of her prize animal.

Paint Creek was one of 82 state schools chosen for the Partnership Schools Initative pilot program.

Three hunters were rescued by game wardens from the frigid waters of flooded California Creek southeast of Haskell.

A petition calling for an injunction to prohibit the City of Haskell from proceeding with plans for a new City Hall was filed in 39th District Court. Jill Druesedow as appointed mayor of Haskell following the resignation

The Haskell Maidens sewed up the championship of district 7-2A with

a 38-28 victory over Stamford.

## MARCH

The Haskell City Council rescinded an agreement to borrow the money to pay for a new city hall and voted to pay for the structure from the city's

Greg Melton was named principal of Haskell secondary school. He will succeed Gerald McCoy who is retiring.

Bill Clinton scored a landslide victory in Haskell County in the primary. He received 1,443 votes. Paul Tsongas received 225 votes in Haskell County, Jerry Brown got 60 and Tom Harkin received 16.

A request for an injunction to prohibit the City of Haskell from proceeding with plans for a new city hall was denied when visiting 42nd District Judge J. Neil Daniel ruled that the City "has followed the law and done nothing

Don Kretschmer was named chief adult and juvenile probation officer for the 39th Judicial District.

#### APRIL

Randy McLelland, youth and recreation director of the First Baptist Church, was named by the Haskell Chamber of Commerce as its' "Most

Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry joined the ranks of former President Gerald Ford, film director Steven Spielberg and Wal-Mart founder Sam Walton when he received the "Distinguished Eagle Scout Award" during ceremonies in Abilene.

The Haskell City Council chose Scott Wall of Austin as new city

The Haskell City Council voted to accept a bid of "not more than \$365,000" for construction of the new City Hall.

John Fouts won a third term as district attorney of the 39th Judicial District with a runoff victory over former DA Joseph Thigpen.

Eddie Gonzales, Daniela Guadalcazar and Heather Hobgood qualified \* for the regional track meet.

Pat Henry was elected mayor over incumbent Jill Druesedow by a margin of 26 votes, 501-475. Kim Nemir and Iva Lee Gipson won seats on the City Council, along with Ruby Turner, the lone incumbent to survive the

Bruce Tibbits of Rochester was inducted into the University of Arlington's Maverick Athletic Hall of Honor in recognition of his brilliant basketball career more than a quarter century ago.

Seven Haskell County businesses signed up with the Texas Comptroller's office to sell state lottery tickets.

Deanna Scheets was valadictorian of the 1992 graduating class at Haskell High School. Kim Gilly was salutatorian and Chris Tanner was highest

Dusty Garison resigned as minister of the First Christian Church to accept a position with Milligan College.

A pair of Haskell men have teamed up to produce a recording which will be released in Nashville. "Dreams About Vanessa" was written by Ron McCandless and recorded by Phil Standefer.

Joseph Pace of Rule received an appointment to the U.S. Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs.

Almost daily rains in recent weeks dangerously delayed cotton planting at the same time the wheat crop deteriorated in the unharvested fields.

To honor the Boneheads, founders of the City Park in 1931, the Haskell Parks and Recreation Department will build a water fountain on the north bank of the creek.

The School Board gave the green light for a new band hall when it accepted a bid for construction of a 4,000-square-foot structure.

The Haskell Indians opened their 1992 campaign with a 7-0 victory over the Moguls of Munday, their first win over the 1A powerhouse since 1983. Shana McKenzie received the county's highest 4-H Club award when she was named winner of the 1992 Gold Star award.

Billy Wayne Hester of Rochester was sworn in as commissioner of Haskell County Precinct 1 to succeed John L. (Bud) Grand who died Sept.

Haskell County voters followed the national trend in giving Bill Clinton the nod for president of the United States. The Arkansas governor received 50 percent of the Haskell County vote. George Bush got 20 percent and Ross Perot received 20 percent.

Haskell city officials and employees paid tribute to long-time Chief of Police Tom Paul (Bull) Barnett by presenting him with a plaque for his years of service to the city.

The Haskell Indians put the icing on their first winning season in five years by outlasting the Stamford Bulldogs, 34-27. The victory brought the Indian record to 6-4 for the season.

# Indians take close one over Winters

Ask any coach to name the keys to a successful season and surely at the top of the list would be to win on the road in hostile environments.

Coach Mark Coffman and his troops took that key and unlocked the door to success as they escaped with a dramatic 52-51 win over the state-ranked Winters Blizzards on their nemesis' home floor.

With the win, the Tribe got off on the right foot in district play in which they wear the banner as "the

The game was knotted tight the whole way through and saw the Indians take a point lead into the locker room with them. The front court play of 6'-4" Tommie Isbell and 6'-3" Brian Brzozowski dominated over the inferior Blizzards, accounting for 16 of the 24 first-half points.

As the second half opened, the Blizzards raced out to a 9-point lead half way through the third quarter, but as the front court did in the first half, the Indian backcourt ruled the second half.

The 3-point shooting of Mart

Guess and the defensive play of Jonathan Tatum led the charge which catapulted the Indians to a 52-51 lead with 20 seconds left.

Winters controlled the ball and left it in the hands of their star, Vernie Reyes. Reyes, who had found nothing but the bottom of the net all night, learned that there is iron around the hoop as both his shots were just a hair off the mark. Brzozowski was able to corral the rebound to preserve the 1-point nipping.

Brzozowski led the Indian scoring attack with 14 points. Guess and Isbell each countered with 11. Tatum threw in 10 points

"I think what makes us so dangerous is that we're so balanced that if Tommie (Isbell) and Brian (Brzozowski) are not on, we can have a different star each game. Tonight it was Pick (Guess), other nights it's been Eddy (Gonzales), Cody (Josselet) and Robert (Huff)," commented Coffman after the

# Bus service here to be discontinued

Skylark Bus Line will discontinue service through Haskell as of Jan. 1.

The company, which has operated bus service from Abilene to Wichita Falls for the past four years, announced this week that business does not justify continuing the service.

Also losing service will be Stamford, Rule, Rochester, Knox City, Munday and Seymour.

Skylark has had bus service from Wichita Falls to Abilene in the morning and from Abilene to Wichita Falls in the afternoon.

Sue Patterson, local agent, said the lack of bus service will be a blow to Haskell. In addition to passengers the bus carried, it provided valuable freight service to a number of local businesses, Mrs. Patterson said.

Mrs. Patterson explained that Skylark has been required to pay a steep terminal fee to Greyhound Bus Lines for use of the Abilene terminal. She requested that local citizens write to Greyhound to request that the terminal fee be eliminated or decreased in the hope that Skylark will resume service.



According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast can-

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, before it can be felt.

**Guidelines For** Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

1. 35-40 years of age -One baseline mammogram.

II. 40-50 years of age -A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

III. 50 years of age and over -An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.

IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental xrays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.



Things must have gotten tough lately in Loving County, the state's most sparsely populated county.

My 1992-93 Texas Almanac lists the unemployment rate of the 107-population county as 0.0 percent, lowest in the state.

But a release from the Texas Employment Commission this week says the unemployment rate in November was 21.6 percent, third highest among the 254

TEC says there is a work force of 88 in Loving County, of which 69 are employed and 19 looking for

Something doesn't quite add up. There's another thing that still bugs me about Texas Almanac's demographics on Loving County. TA says there are 112 registered voters. That's 1.0467289 voters for every man, woman and child.

When the 103rd Congress convenes Jan. 5, 14 of Texas' 30 congressmen will be Methodists.

Other church affiliations of Texas congressmen include five Roman Catholics, four Baptists, two Episcopalians, two Presbyterians, one Christian Scientist, one Lutheran (Charles Stenholm) and one Jew.

That's quite a record for the Methodists, whose 800,000 total membership ranks third in the state, far below that of Roman Catholics (3.5 million) and Baptists (2.6 million).

It's nothing new. Methodists have filled the most seats in the House delegation from Texas for at least a decade.

The 14 Texas Methodists in the 103rd Congress is two more than in 102nd Congress. Reapportionment which added three seats to the Texas House delegation brought one new Methodist to the group. A special election in 1991 added another.

Eleven of the 21 Democrats and three of the nine Republicans are Methodists.

Nationwide, of all 535 members of the 103rd Congress (435 congressmen and 100 senators), Roman Catholics are by far the most numerous with 141 members of that faith. Then come Methodists (70), Baptists (62), Presbyterians 54), Episcopalians (50), Jews (42), Lutherans (21), Church of Christ (14) and Mormons (12).

Another 30 members belong to 10 other denominations, 29 are listed merely as Protestants with no particular denomination and 10 have no religious affiliation.


