City of Haskell gets \$30,376 in tax rebate

Haskell's 1.5-percent sales tax generated \$30,376.94 for the city this week when a check in that amount was received from the state comptroller.

The check represented the city's portion of sales taxes remitted to the comptroller in January from December sales, as well as those from businesses filing quarterly returns for the last quarter of 1992.

This week's rebate represented a 20.3-percent increase over last year's rebate for the same period. It brought receipts for the first two months of 1993 to \$45,618.74, or 17.26 percent more than the \$38,904.91 for the first two months of last year.

Haskell's four other cities, each with a 1-percent local tax rate, also received rebates this month with O'Brien's rebate being up by 31.16 percent and Weinert's by 15.12 percent. Rochester posted a 43.91percent decrease and Rule's rebate was down by 18.34 percent.

Rule's \$2,328.20 rebate compared with \$2,850.94 last year; Rochester's was \$766.37, compared to \$1,366.42 last year; O'Brien got \$598.91, compared to \$456.64 last year; and Weinert's \$473.77 was ahead of last year's \$411.53.

For the first two months of 1993, rebates to O'Brien are up by 31.16 percent, Rule by 15.23 percent and Weinert by 15.12 percent. Rochester is down by 15.39 percent.

Altogether, the five Haskell County communities have received \$52,200.02 in rebates in the first

State to rebuild US 380 near Rule

US 380, from Rule to the Stonewall County line, will be resconstructed, the Texas Department of Transportation has announced.

The department said the 5.9-mile section of the existing 20-foot asphalt roadway with no shoulders will be rehabilitated with new material added to widen the roadway to two 12-foot travel lanes, and two 8-foot shoulders. No new right-ofway will be required.

The state is now making an environmental impact study. No starting or completion dates were announced.

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

Avoid Pinhole Glasses Ruse: Pinhole glasses are advertised as being able to eliminate the need for corrective lenses if they are worn a short time every day. In fact, these glasses simply block peripheral light rays, allowing in only central rays, which are more easily focused by the eye. (The same effect can be achieved with squinting.) There is no evidence that this will have any lasting effecton vision, and vision is dimmed and the field of view is restricted while wearing pinhole glasses.

If you live in El Paso County, your marriage has twice as good a chance to survive as it would if you lived in Dallas, Tarrant or Bexar counties. In 1991, there were 32 percent as

many divorces as there were marriages in El Paso County, by far the lowest ratio of the state's six super counties (500,000 or more population).

By contrast, Dallas County had 68 percent as many divorces as marriages, Tarrant County 65 percent and Bexar County 63 percent. In Harris County, the percentage was 56 and in Travis County 52.

With its 52 percent, Travis County was the only one of the super counties to be below the state average, 54 percent.

While the Texas Department of Health recorded 178,640 marriage licenses in 1991, the state also granted 96,878 divorces. The year before, the numbers were 178,613 and 93,850.

The most numerous age group of both men (48,962) and women (53,115) who married in 1991 was 20-24 years. Divorces were most common among the 25-29 age group for women (20,384) and among the 30-34 age group for men (19,638).

The largest number of divorces concluded marriages of less than five years (32,694). Some marriages lasted less than a year before divorce (4,588).

Among adolescents and teens, 552 girls and 31 boys younger than 15 were married. Among those 65 and older, 1,897 women and 3,551 men were married. Divorces involving those 65 and older included 1,014 women and 1,856

About half (47.6 percent, or 46,088) of the divorces in 1991 involved no children, while 24.5 percent (23,746) involved one child. The number of children involved in divorces was 89,161.






