Sixth annual Fly-In to be Saturday

Haskell's sixth annual Fly-In and Pilots' Breakfast will be this Saturday, May 29, from 8 to 10:30 a.m. at the Haskell Airport.

Chairman of the fly-in is Sam Toliver who said parking attendants will direct visitors to the hangar where breakfast will be served.

Members of the Haskell Fire Department will cook the breakfast and the American Legion will be in charge of parking.

Local pilots will serve as co-hosts, along with the sponsors, the City of Haskell and the Haskell Chamber of Commerce.

They will form a shuttle service with golf carts to escort the incoming pilots to the hangar for the breakfast and the ceremonies.

Andy Gannaway, president of the Haskell Chamber of Commerce, will be master of ceremonies for the program, during which awards will be presented to the oldest pilot, youngest pilot and the pilot flying the greatest distance.

Expected to be among the participants are the Warbirds from Breckenridge and the Big Country squadron of the Confederate Air Force.

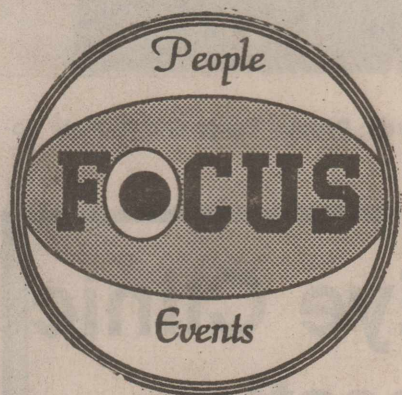
The fly-in traditionally attracts pilots and planes from a wide

area. Ed Huber of Greeley, Colo., for instance, has made four of the five previous fly-ins.

Visiting pilots will be able to purchase aviation fuel for \$1 per gallon, with a limit of 50 gallons per plane.

All residents of Haskell and surrounding area are invited and encouraged to attend the fly-in, view the various aircraft, enjoy breakfast and visit with the incoming pilots.

Admission to the grounds will be \$2 per person, and includes breakfast. Children under 12 will be admitted for \$1 each.

The party begins at 9 p.m. and will continue until 4 a.m. Saturday.

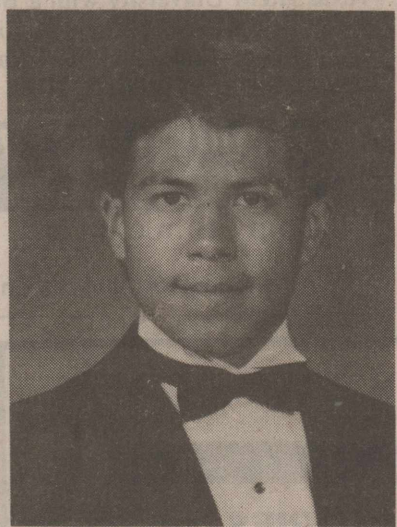

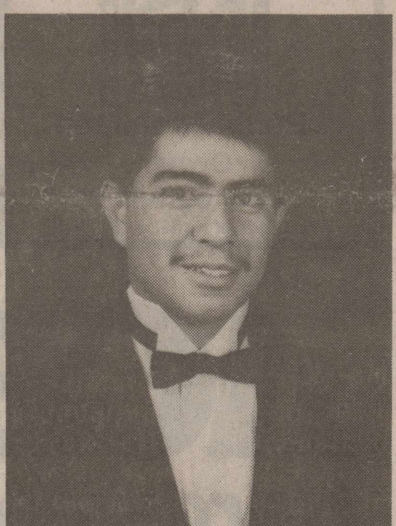

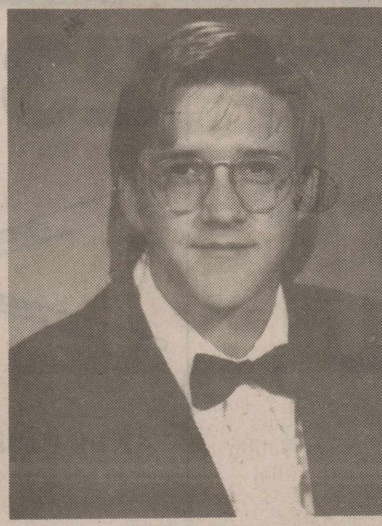

The lifeless body of the 12-year-old great-granddaughter of a Haskell woman was found Tuesday near Blanket.

Stephanie Flanary, a sixth-grader in the Brownwood schools, had been the object of a three-day hunt involving the Department of Public Safety, helicopters from Fort Hood and dogs brought in by Search One of Dallas. She was the great-granddaughter of Isabell Flanary of Haskell.

The child's stepfather, Ricky Nolen McGinn, 36, was arrested Monday and charged with murder. Officers said they had physical evidence leading them to believe the child was dead before the body was found.

McGinn reported the girl missing at 9:30 p.m. Saturday. He told officers she had left home about 5:30 to take a walk.

Mary Kaigler: From the Inside Out

"Flowers are God's thoughts in action."

Looking at the three blossoms floating above the three big leaves in the bowl I was intrigued with the question of what He was thinking in that particular moment when they were brought into being on Creation's drawing board.

Like no flower I've seen before, they remind me of a whimsical Dr. Seuss story illustration, or maybe a Picasso surrealist rendition. Each one is a symmetrical, yet incongruous assemblage of shapes and color, as if drawn layer on layer during some heavenly designer-doodling at the end of a busy botanical third day of creation--- done perhaps while coasting down and contemplating the next day's phenomenal undertaking.

About three inches in diameter, the outer ring of eleven silvery green petals is layered over with a circle of hair-like petals which begin black at the base, then a touch of white, ending with an inch of brilliant, deep blue, giving the effect of a series of concentric circles around a center of tiny, short black "eyelash" petals.

Rising up about one inch above this center is a green match-stick size spike, ending with five green spokes jutting out around the tip, each spoke itself then being tipped by a cross-bar "pontoon". The underneath of each of the five pontoons is covered in bright yellow pollen.

In a grand finale three black antenna-like stigma extend upward from the tip of the spike, each one ending in a black, match-head size node. On the short stem below the blossom tiny green tendrils curl down like paper gift-wrap ties onto the large, deep green five-fingered leaves. (The overall effect of this is a resemblance to a twirly-bird gyroscope atop a small boy's beanie, ready to whirl in any breeze.)

I found that these eclectic-looking flowers are called "Passion Flowers" (*Passiflora caerulea*) and are rich in symbolism in the religious sense of passion, referring to the deep sufferings of Jesus before and during the crucifixion.

The early missionaries to the New World used the passion flower as a teaching aid. The eleven outer petals were said to represent the faithful Apostles, the three stigma the nails, the inner corona a crown of thorns, the curling tendrils the whips and the five-parted leaves the clutching hands of the soldiers. Fanciful interpretations, to be sure, yet Nature does have much to teach us through our "inner eye."

Martin Luther once wrote that, "God writes the Gospel not in the Bible alone, but on trees and flowers and clouds and stars." Considering that idea, I have to think that perhaps on the day in creation when God made the passion flower His thoughts were already on that darker day ahead and He wrote the story of it into this flower that grows so profusely in Haskell on Ken and Nelda Lane's north fence.

Two \$100 gift certificates, plus a Nolan Ryan baseball shirt, will be given away.

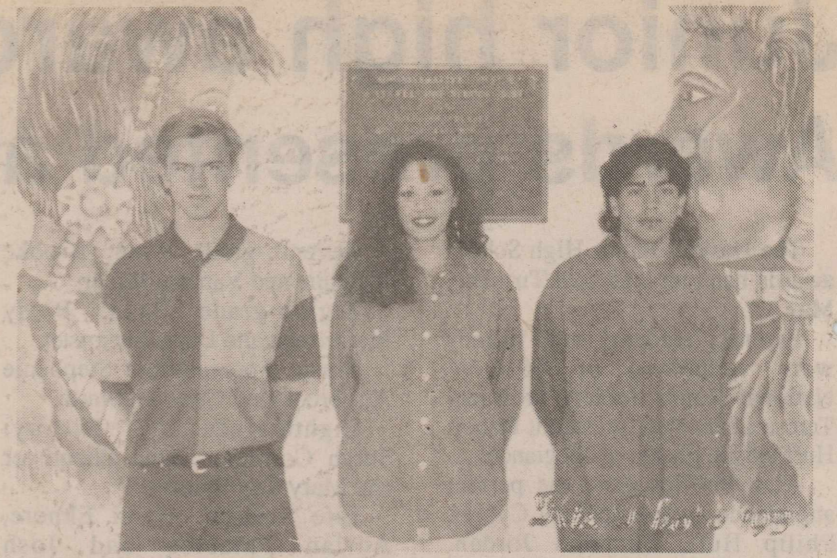

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Children in poverty increase in number

Over the last decade, the number of children in poverty in the United States has increased by almost a million. But breaking the cycle of poverty would require solutions for a tangled web of complex conditions.

Last year, the Census Bureau announced that the number of poor children in the United States shot up from 13.4 million to 14.3 million between 1980 and 1991.

Dr. Nicholas Zill, a psychologist and expert on the use of surveys and statistics to monitor the education, health and well-being of children and families, said poverty levels of this magnitude have not been seen since the recession of the early 1980s.

"Before that, we have to go back 30 years to 1964 to find the child poverty rate as high as it has been in the last few years," Zill said.

Solving the problem of poverty among children is more complicated

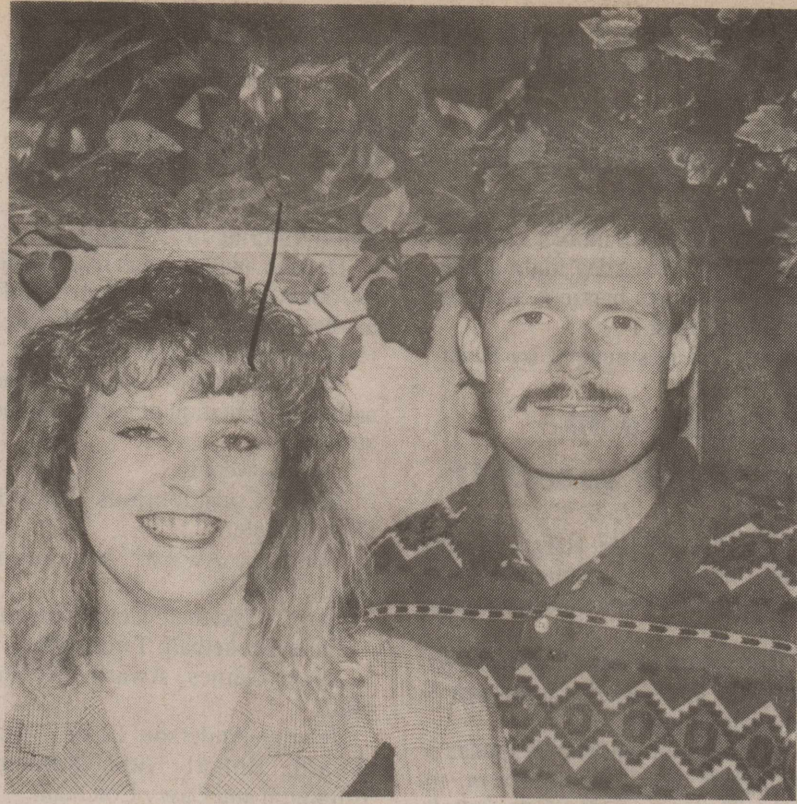
than just feeding the poor, he said. Children who are disadvantaged are more likely to fear for their safety and less likely to do well in school.

"Many children in low-income families are in developmental jeopardy because of conditions that often accompany and foster poverty," Zill added. "Low parent education levels, family disorganization, limited opportunities, rundown housing, bad schools and impossible neighborhood conditions prevent the cycle of poverty from being broken."

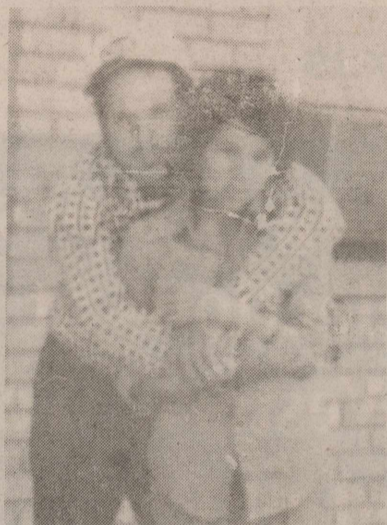

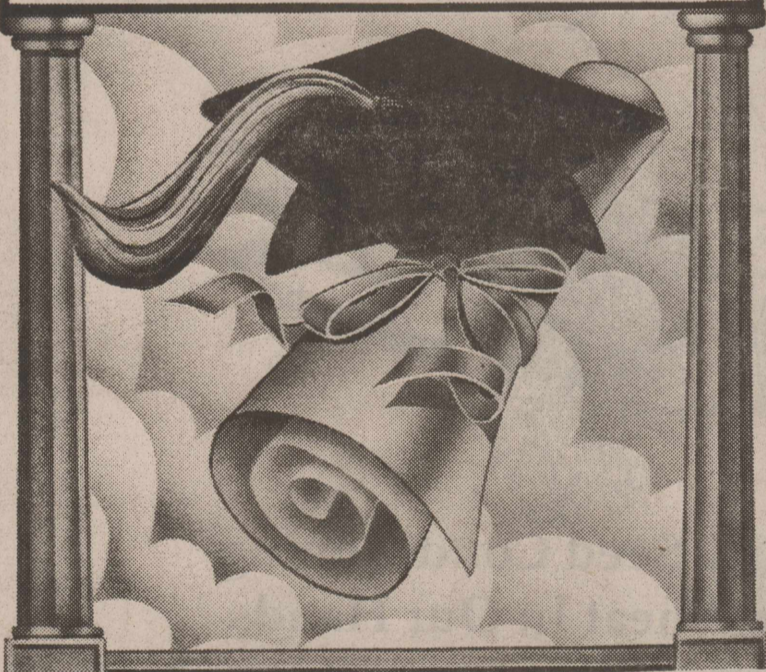

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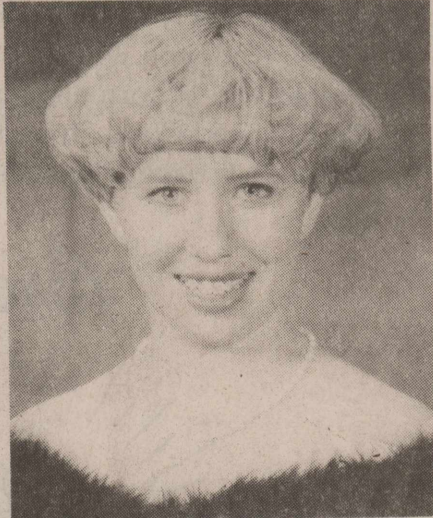

Stroke Warnings: Transient ischemic attacks (TIAs) can be important precursors of stroke and heart attack. TIAs are a result of a temporary blocking of blood to the brain and generally have similar symptoms to stroke: weakness or loss of sensation in an arm, leg, or side of the face; blurred or temporarily lost vision; difficulty speaking; and dizziness. TIAs can be diagnosed with imaging or arteriography in which the path of dye injected into the artery is traced on x-ray.

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Carjacking: a growing threat

You've been working late, and it's almost dark when you leave the office. The parking lot is deserted, except for your car, parked at the far edge, where a row of shrubs offered some shade at lunch time. They look spooky now.

Hurrying a little, you put your key in the driver's side door. Suddenly, there's a glove over your face, an arm across your chest, and something deadly cold against your neck. "Hand over the keys," a voice says, "and your wallet too."

Carjacking is a growing threat in American cities. The Texas Safety Association offers these tips for protecting yourself against this crime:

First, remember that your life is worth more than your money or your car. If confronted by an armed robber, it's best to give him what he wants.

It's even better to avoid placing yourself in risky situations. When you're driving, be alert to danger.

Most carjackers approach on foot. Lock your doors, keep windows rolled up in slow traffic, and don't get too preoccupied with your stereo or cellular phone.

When you stop at a light, leave a space between your car and the vehicle in front. (You should be able to see the other vehicle's rear tires.) This will give you room to maneuver out of the spot, if necessary.

Park in well-lighted areas, avoiding potential hiding places such as trees or dumpsters. When you walk to your car, try to walk with other people, or ask for a security escort. If you see someone loitering near your car, retreat to a place of safety and call for help.

Approach the car with your key in your hand. Check the front and rear seats and glance underneath the car. On some new cars, all doors unlock when you unlock the driver's door. This can be dangerous

if a carjacker is hiding on the passenger side.

Sometimes, a carjacker will drive up in another vehicle, bump the victim's car from behind, then attack when the driver gets out to investigate. If you're rear-ended and don't feel comfortable leaving your car, motion to the other driver to follow you to the nearest police station or the parking lot of a busy store.

Under Texas law, you must exchange names, addresses, vehicle registration numbers and driver's license numbers with any driver involved in a collision with you. In a minor collision, the law permits moving to a safer place to exchange this information.

If your car breaks down, pull as far as possible away from moving traffic, tie a white handkerchief around the antenna, close the windows and lock the doors. If someone offers assistance, open the window a crack and ask the person to call the police or a towing service. If the person is wearing a uniform, ask for identification.

Above all, trust your instincts. After a crime occurs, police often hear statements like, "I had a feeling something wasn't right, but..." Stay alert, and stay safe.

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Oil Mixture cuts weeds, costs

Mixing herbicides with an oil instead of water could improve farmers' profits and the environment by reducing the amount of herbicide needed, U.S. Department of Agriculture scientists say.

"Herbicides are commonly mixed with water and some type of oil to boost their weed-killing ability," said Chester G. McWhorter, plant physiologist with the Pesticide Application Technology Research Unit of USDA's Agricultural Research Service. "We've found that it is possible to totally eliminate the water and still have effective weed control."

In four years of field tests at Stoneville, Miss., McWhorter and James Hanks, an agricultural engineer, found barnyardgrass and johnsongrass could be controlled with less herbicide when the herbicide was mixed with paraffinic oil rather than water.

They applied the herbicide and

oil at a combined total volume of as little as one quart of liquid per acre, compared with the usual 20-gallon-per-acre mixture of herbicide and water. The lower total volume would require fewer trips with spray equipment to treat an entire field for weeds.

Paraffinic oil is similar to mineral oil. McWhorter said the paraffinic oil-herbicide mixture provided better weed control than herbicide mixed with soybean oil, cottonseed oil, No. 2 diesel fuel, kerosene or jet A fuel.

Agriculture engineers at the ARS Jamie Whitten Delta States Research Center at Stoneville have already developed an ultra-low-volume (ULV) herbicide sprayer system that would allow farmers to apply herbicides at volumes of less than one gallon per acre.

There may be several reasons for the increased weed control observed when using low-volume, 1-to-3-

gallons per acre and ultra low-volume applications with oil alone as the carrier, McWhorter said.

"The ULV sprayer applies smaller, more concentrated droplets that are more toxic to the weeds," he said. "Also, oil spreads much better than water on leaf surfaces."

Reduced herbicide application rates are not specifically approved by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, but growers can legally apply herbicide rates lower than those recommended on the product label, McWhorter said. Farmers would be able to easily construct their own ULV spray system for both low-volume and ultra-low-volume use.

A report on the research project appears in the February issue of Agricultural Research magazine, the monthly publication of the Agricultural Research Service.

Friday night lights will probably take on a different meaning come next September.

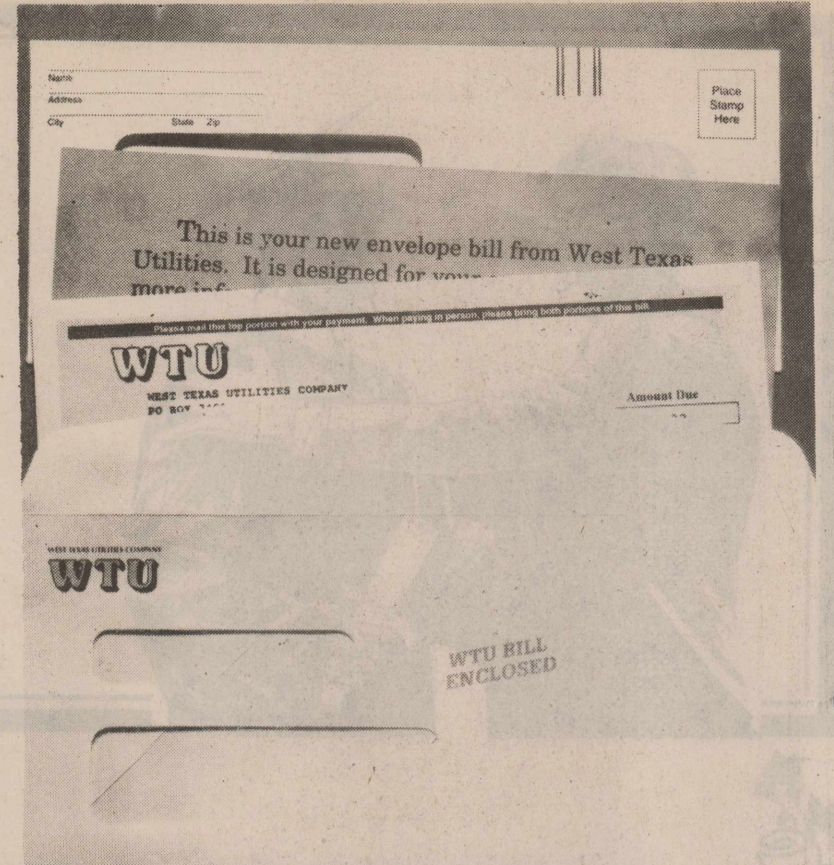
By a 9-3 vote, the State Board of Education voted to amend a University Interscholastic League rule and allow girls to play high school football beginning this fall.

Texas education officials say the matter boils down to legal rights.


"The student rights issue has been taken to court in numerous other states and the female students have prevailed in obtaining the right to try out and, if selected, participate in football.

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
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Swoopes re-does scoring records

Brownfield News

In the clutch moments of the two biggest games of her career, Sheryl Swoopes came through in big way.

In mid-March, she almost single-handedly beat Texas in the finals of the Southwest Conference Postseason Classic by scoring a record 53 points, and on Sunday she almost did the same to Ohio State with a record-setting 47 points in the finals of the NCAA Women's Final Four.

The 53 points scored against UT propelled Texas Tech into the NCAA Tournament; the 47 points scored against the Lady Buckeyes led the Lady Raiders to their first-ever national championship.

Swoopes, the Division I Women's Player of the Year, set 10 new records in the national event and tied two others.

*She scored 177 points in four

games, breaking the old mark of 234 scored by Bridgette Gordon of Tennessee in 1989.

*She connected on 56 field goals, breaking Gordon's old record of 53.

*She score 57 points from the free-throw line, breaking Auburn's Carolyn Jones' 41 set in 1990.

*Her 47-point performance was the second-best in tourney history. Only Drake's Lorri Bauman's 50-point game against Maryland in the 1982 West Regional semifinals was better. Swoopes' 35.4 points per game was second to Bauman's 36.7 in three games in 1982.

Swoopes' Final Four records include:

*Most points scored (78), breaking Texas' Clarissa Davis' record of 56 points in 1986.

*Field goals in one game (27), breaking Gordon's record of 22.

*Most field goal attempts (48),

surpassing the 42 put up by Gordon.

*Most free throws (19), tying Jones' mark.

Swoopes' championship game records include:

*Most points in a game (47), breaking the old record of 28 set by Dena Head of Tennessee and Dawn Staley of Virginia in 1989.

*Most points scored in a men's or women's championship game (48), breaking the old record of 44 set by Bill Walton of UCLA in 1973.

*Most points in a half (24). Three others are tied at 18.

* Most field goals made (16), breaking the old record of 12 set by Louisiana Tech's Erica Westbrook in 1988.

*Free-throw percentage (100 percent), tied with two others.

The championship game marked the end of a brilliant career for the former Brownfield High School Lady Cub.

Here are Swoopes' final career stats at Tech:

*Started in 65 of 66 games and played a total of 2,180 minutes for an average of 33 minutes per game.

*Connected on 631 of 1,179

field goals for an average of 53.5 percent.

*Hit 57 of 139 3-pointers for an average of 41 percent.

*Made 346 of 409 free throws, for an average of 84.6 percent.

*Pulled down 587 rebounds (9.0 per game).

*Dished out 291 assists (4.4 per game).

*Created 227 turnovers (3.4 per game).

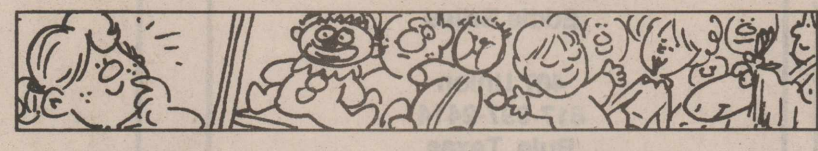
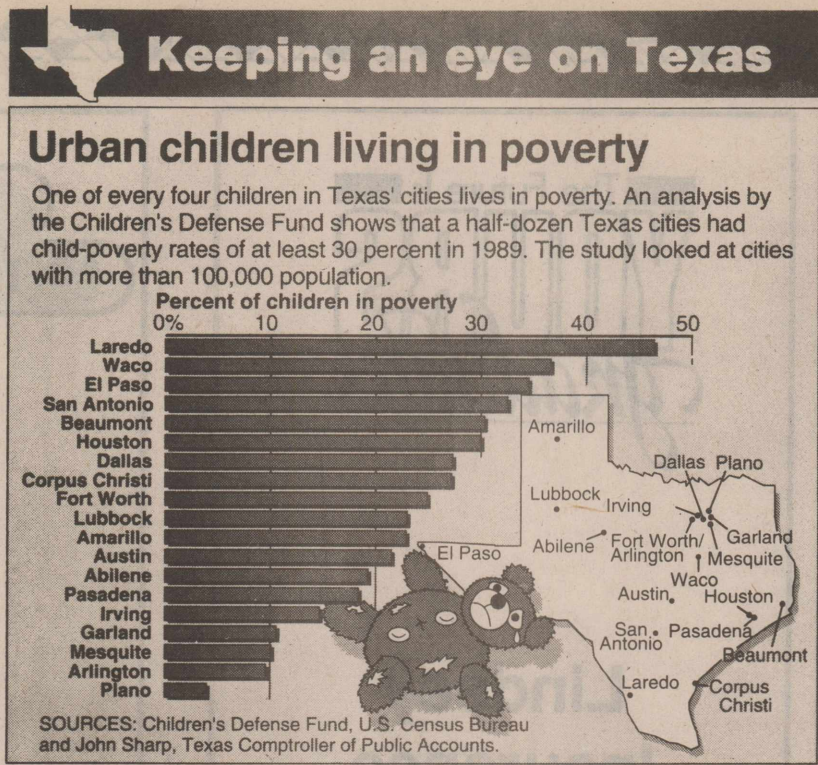
*Had 67 blocked shots (one per game).

*Had 226 steals (3.4 per outing). She scored 1,645 points in two seasons at Tech for an average of 24.9 per game.

Swoopes picked up several prestigious honors and awards during the season.

She was named the National Player of the Year by *USA Today*, *Sports Illustrated*, the Women's Basketball Coaches Association and Champion and received the 1993 Naismith award.

In addition, she was named all-America by Kodak for the second consecutive year and was named the Newspaper Enterprise Association MVP.

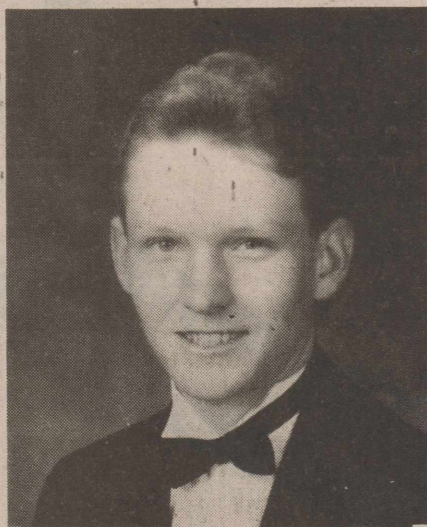

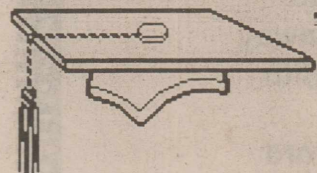

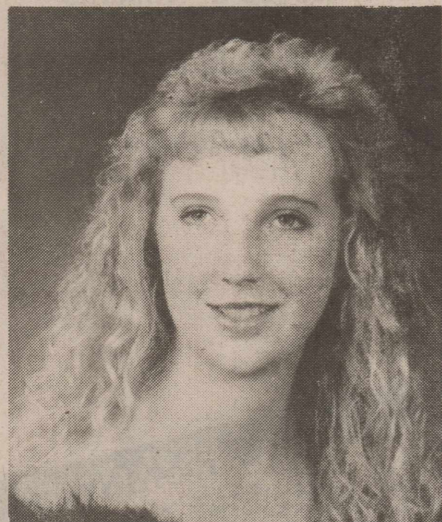
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
