




Byerly completes banking school

You might say they've done it on their own personal family plan.

In ceremonies at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls earlier this month. Tim received a

bachelor's degree in manufacturing engineering technology, and Laurie received a bachelor's degree in interdisciplinary studies.

Getting a college education had always been a priority for Tim and Laurie. It was just something they felt they wanted to do and could accomplish with the right planning. The two had married in June 1982. She had just graduated from Haskell High School, and Tim, a 1979 graduate of Stamford High School, had attended Texas Tech for a year and was working for West Texas Utilities.

After they married, the couple enrolled in Western Texas College in Snyder. There Tim received a business associates degree before the couple moved to Vernon in 1985. They also had a son, Matthew, born in 1984.

After moving to Vernon, Laurie entered Vernon Regional Junior College. She gave birth to the couple's daughter, Leslie, in December 1986, and in 1990, she received her degree from VRJC. Tim, mcanwhile, began classes at Midwestern State University.

The couple says it was the fall of 1990 that they decided it was time to really get serious about earning their degrees. Although working a full time job at WTU, Tim took on the task of 16 college hours at MSU while Laurie undertook 19 hours the first semester and 20 the next. Laurie was also keeping children in her home.

"It was kind of hectic," the couple admits. "For the next two and a half years we had about two meals a week at home as a family.

The rest of the time Tim was eating hamburgers on the road to Wichita Falls and Laurie was packing a sack lunch.

Haskell County voters return to the polls Saturday to help Texas elect a United States Senator.

Voting will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. in all 10 of the county's voting precincts.

Voters will decide between Bob Krueger, Democrat, and Kay Bailey Hutchison, Republican. They were the top vote-getters in the May 1 election to determine the successor to Llovd Bentsen, who resigned from the Senate to become Secretary of Treasurer. Krueger has been serving by appointment.

In the May 1 election, Haskell County gave Krueger 599 votes. Hutchison got 361 votes in Haskell County. There were 22 other candidates.

Saturday's winner will be elected only to the unexpired term of Bentsen, which runs until January 1994.

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George A. Raines



What about plans for future degrees?


'We'll have to wait and see on that," Tim says. "Right now, we're just glad to relax."

Haskell balloon found at Vernon

The Vernon Daily Record What at first looked like a pile of wind-blown trash to a Vernon resident turned out to be a symbol of achievement by a Haskell elementary school student.

Local businessman and farmer Wendell Mints was in a field Saturday, May 1, when he came across several deflated balloons that had been tied together. An attached card asked that the finder contact Mindy Howard, a sixth grader at Haskell Elementary School.

As it turns out, Haskell Elementary sixth graders the day before had released several such groups of card-carrying, heliumfilled balloons as the finale of their Eight Annual Balloon Lift-Off reading project, said science teacher Debbie Earles. Each of the 58 sixth graders earned a balloon for each 300 pages they read, and at the end of the project would launch the balloons with a card asking whoever found the balloons to notify the school.

And Mints, who is also vice president of the Vernon Independent School District Board of Trustees, did just that, penning a letter to Mindy, the 12-year-old daughter of Bobby and Kim Howard of Haskell. "I congratulated her on her accomplishment and told her to keep up the good work," Mints said.

For the record, Mindy earned 15 balloons, which translates into 4,500 pages read. She said she reads just about anything, but she especially likes fiction. Among school subjects, she says, math is her favorite.

Mindy said she was "proud" that her balloons made it as far as they did in such a short amount of time. Strong southerly winds last Friday carried the balloons the approximately 75 miles from Haskell to Vernon.

Earles said the students this year have learned that their balloons have been located in Grandfield, Okla., and in Truscott, Texas. In previous years, they have been found as far away as Fort Worth.

The Balloon Lift-Off was not held last year due to student concern about the environmental hazards the balloons might pose, Earles said. This year, however, the event was brought back, with the students using balloons made of biodegradable material and tied with cotton strings.

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



KEY AGES FOR TAX RULES

Tax rules change as you and your dependents grow older, so it's important to know the ages that make a difference on your tax return.

- Here are a few of the tax ages you should be aware of: **Tax Rule** Age
- A social security number must be obtained for dependents one year or older.
- 13 You can no longer claim a child care credit on children age 13 or older.
- Excess unearned income of children age 14 or older 14 is no longer taxed at the parents' highest tax rate.
- 18 You must begin to pay social security tax on the wages of your children who work in your unincorporated business.
- 19 The deduction for your dependent children expires if their income exceeds \$2,350, unless they are fulltime students.
- The deduction for your dependent children expires if 24 their income exceeds \$2,350, even if they are fulltime students.
- You're allowed a once-in-a-lifetime exclusion of up 55 to \$125,000 of gain on the sale of your home.
- The penalty for early withdrawal of retirement funds 59 1/2 expires.
- 65 You become eligible for a larger standard deduction. Also, you can earn more without losing some of your social security benefits.
- 70 There is no longer a limit on earnings which affect your social security benefits.
- 70 1/2 You must begin making withdrawals from your IRA or other retirement plan.

If you've lost or misplaced your card, contact Social Security for a replacement. You'll need to show some identification, but the process is really very simple. You can contact your Social Security office to obtain the form or call toll free 1-800-772-1213 on business days between 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

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Capt. Donohoo: Confederate officer profiled

"Am still going about collecting names of Haskell County Confederate veterans and trying to put together biographical sketches on them," writes Rule native Jack E. Westbrook of Tulsa, Okla., in a letter to The Free Press.

"One is enclosed and I am in hopes you will consider printing it as a matter for the county to take pride in, and in furthering my quest for names and information on Confederate veterans," he added.

Westbrook said he wished there could be a Haskell County camp for the Sons of Confederate Veterans. "There just has to be some interest there that parallels those of the organization," he said.

His biographical sketch on Capt. Henry Donohoo follows:

Henry Donohoo was born in Monroe County, Tenn., on Jan. 1, 1828. His parents were Charles and Margaret Wear Donohoo.

He married Martha Glenn on Feb. 15, 1843. They had nine children.

He was serving as postmaster at Ball Play, Tenn., when the War for Southern Independence broke out. He volunteered on Oct. 8, 1862, enlisting in Company "H", 80th Tennessee Infantry Regiment under Capt. Calvin Gurley; Col. John A. Rowan, regimental commander; and was in Brig. Gen. John C. Vaughn's brigade.

He served as quartermaster. The unit was mustered in on Nov. 11, 1862, and was sent to Vicksburg, Miss., where they remained until surrender July 4, 1863.

His unit was under siege from Dec. 28, 1862, until surrender, being involved in the Battles of Chickasaw Bayou and Chickasaw Bluffs in Mississippi. They were in camp at Mint Springs, near Vicksburg, on Feb. 25, 1863, Company "H" was in an

engagement at Big Black River on May 17, 1863, after which they fell back into Vicksburg, suffering the siege in the trenches, until surrender. By this time, Henry Donohoo had been elected captain of his company.

The company satisfied the terms of surrender, then going to eastern Tennessee and western Virginia where they served as Company "H", 62nd Tennessee Infantry Regiment. At one point in its history, the unit was identified as the 62nd Tennessee Mounted Infantry Regiment. They were reported to be at Jonesboro, Ga., in a camp for paroled prisoners in the spring of 1864.

The 62nd was in several skirmishes in those areas. It was with Gen. Longstreet during the Knoxville campaign, being caught between two Federal armies, they had to fall back into Virginia. The 62nd was at Saltville, Va., when the Federals destroyed the salt works; and, was with Gen. John C. Breckenridge when the

Confederate Army forced the Federals back into Kentucky. The unit was in a skirmish at Greenville, Ga., on Oct. 12, 1864.

Capt. Donohoo's company was on its way to reinforce General Lee at Appomattox Court House in Virginia when they received the message of surrender. The next morning, the 62nd began the move, across the mountains, to join General Johnston's forces in North Carolina. Word of Gen. Johnston's surrender reached them, causing them to end up in Morganton, N.C., where they were ordered to Charlotte, N.C. There they met President Jefferson Davis to serve as his escort to Washington, Ga., where he was captured, and they surrendered.

During the first part of the war, Capt. Donohoo received word that

The volunteer's commitment to training through time and energy, which could be spent with his wife his wife was very ill. He obtained a furlough to go home, getting there just as she died. He remained at home for 10 days, placing his children in the care of their Grandmother Glenn, then returning to his unit.

Near the end of the war, he married Jerushia Clark of Tennessee. After the war, the family moved to Cleburne, Texas, where they made their home. His second wife died March 27, 1914, in Haskell, Haskell County, Texas, where she is interred.

In 1917, Capt. Donohoo was living with his daughter in Denton, Texas, hale and hearty, at the age of 92. It was said that, even at that age, "he had his own teeth, never wore glasses, was in excellent health, and was reading all the newspapers in keeping up with World War I."

During his lifetime, he was an anti-prohibitionist, dying on July 1, 1919, the day prohibition became effective. Capt. Henry Donohoo is interred, alongside his wife, in Willow Cemetery in Haskell.

His son, Charles Donohoo was a longtime citizen of Haskell.

He is the great-great-grandfather of Edward H. Brown, #3 Meadowbrook, Palestine, TX 75801. Mr. Brown takes great pride in the Confederate service of Capt. Henry Donohoo.





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

Each of the contestants qualified by surviving tough competition at one of the 10 THSRA regional rodeos.


