

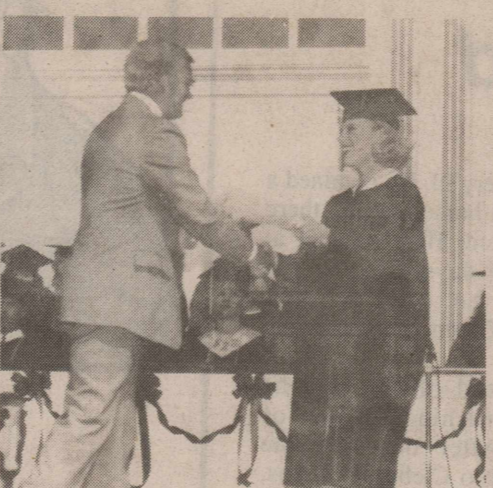

Child Welfare Board

The Haskell County Child Welfare Board met May 18 in the office of the Department of Protective and Regulatory Services.

Linda Haynes, supervisor, met with the members.

Secretary Mary Martin read the minutes of the April 20 meeting and Sue Miller, treasurer, reported that a donation and a reimbursement from a person who had received special treatment had been received.

Also, some funds had been given from jury fees. Some months ago, the Haskell County commissioners voted unanimously to allow jurors on a strictly voluntary basis to help children and their families within Haskell County purchase such items as clothes, diapers, emergency food and formula, doctor visits, medicine, school supplies and Christmas gifts by placing their jury fees in a box located near where they receive their fees.

Last year, 30 investigations of abuse or neglect were completed in Haskell County and 83 families and 203 children were helped. Several children are in foster care, and aid is needed for them. A number of

jurors in Area 4 (44 counties) have been donating fees. Jones, Knox, Scurry, Wichita and Wilbarger have received funds, and most of the others have voted to allow jurors to donate if they wish.

Mrs. Haynes and Mrs. Martin attended the regional meeting in Abilene where they received information about the jury fees and the PAL (Preparation for Adult Living) program and VISTA, volunteers who are willing to help children.

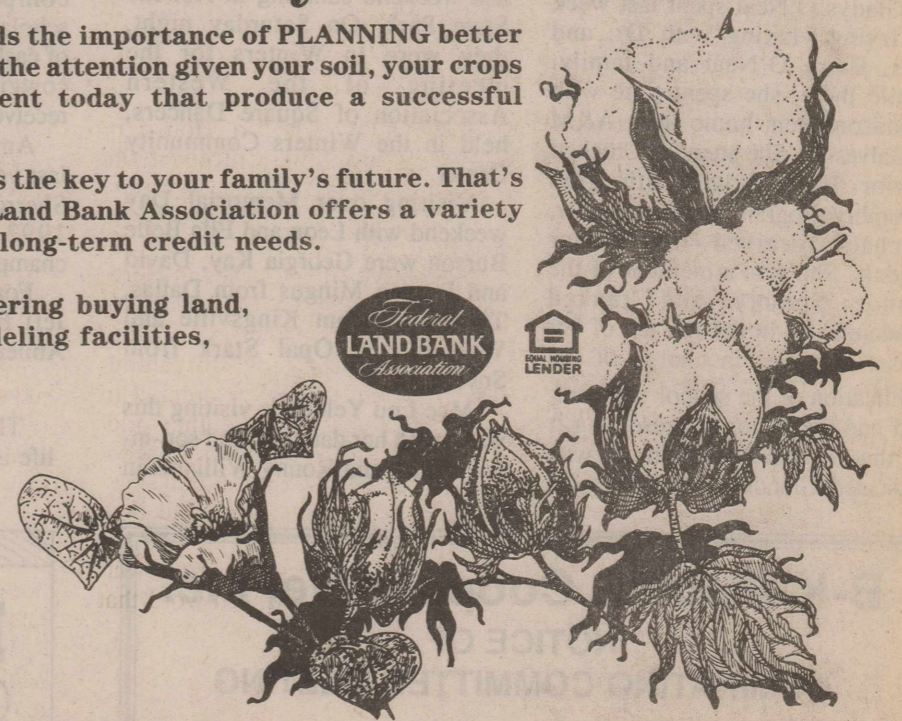

Middleton said the City did a real good job in getting the airport ready for the fly-in.
