Perry tells AP he'll run again

The Associated Press quoted Texas Agriculture Commissioner Rick Perry Tuesday as saying he is running for re-election and will not be running for governor---yet.

"There's a lot to do in agriculture yet. And I think that industry certainly deserves the continuity, I think it deserves the real focus, I think it deserves the familiarity that I have with it," Perry told the AP.

Computer camp draws 50 students

Fifty elementary and secondary students as well as a teacher attended the first computer camp in Haskell.

Sessions were taught by Debi Burson, elementary computer teacher and technology specialist, and Pam Thigpen, secondary computer literacy and art teacher. Senior Tréci Burson also assisted.

Students attended half-day sessions for hands-on and projectoriented instructions. Each student produced a computer-generated graphics slide show, complete with copy, music and voice overs. On the fourth day, students took field trips to Bailey Toliver Chevrolet, The Drug Store, Haskell National Bank and First National Bank.

"We wanted the students to see how businesses here in Haskell use computers as a part of their operations," Mrs. Thigpen explained.

On Friday, the students finished their slide shows and viewed each

other's work.

"If civic or service groups would like to have a demonstration of the multi-media use of computers, we'd be happy to schedule a program at the computer lab," Mrs. Burson said.

Earlier teacher workshops were held in the lab.

'The lab has really been busy. Teachers recently completed a threeday desktop publishing workshop here. Before that they came for several one-day workshops using Clarisworks: word processing, databases and spread sheets. Another workshop dealt solely with Macintosh software available to district teachers and students," Mrs. Burson said.

She explained that without community, school board and administration support, this advanced technology would not be available for the continuing education of Haskell students and teachers.

City sales tax rebate still showing gains

The City of Haskell's sales tax rebate continued to run slightly ahead of last year with the receipt this week of a check from the state comptroller in the amount of \$14,256.96.

The check represents Haskell's 1.5-percent sales tax collected on May sales and reported to the comptroller in June by businesses filing monthly tax return.

Amount of the check represents a 7.37-percent increase over the \$13,277.76 received last year for the same period. The increase was consistent with the sate as a whole, where this month's rebates to cities was up by 7.7 percent.

For the year, Haskell's 1.5percent sales tax has produced \$133,313.62. This is an increase of 6.81 percent over the \$124,816.62 received in the first seven months of 1992.

Rule's rebate this month was in the amount of \$1,051.21, up 8.91 percent from the \$965.18 last year for the same period. For the year, Rule's rebate stands at \$12,252.14, or 16.91 percent more than the \$10,480.32 received in the January-July period of last year.

Rochester's rebate this month was 790.29, representing a 52.25percent increase over last July's \$519.07. But for the year to date, Rochester's \$4,710.08 is down 9.42 percent from last year's \$5,199.96 for the first seven months.

O'Brien and Weinert did not receive rebate checks this month.

Together, the five cities of Haskell County have received \$152,741.72 in the first seven months this year, compared to \$143,605.46 for the same period last year, representing a 6.36percent gain.

While Haskell has a 1.5-percent local tax rate, the other county cities have 1 percent.

Nine Boy Scouts attend summer camp


Members of Boy Scout Troop 136 have just returned from a week of summer camp at the Longhorn Council's Sid Richardson Scout Ranch.

Located on Lake Bridgeport and containing over 3,000 acres and 19 miles of shoreline, the scout ranch offers many varied scouting opportunities.


There are many merit badges that can be earned on the lake, as well as



Midsummer is a great time in our gardens, especially here in the South. Vegetables and fruits are in full harvest; and summer flowers should be at their peak.

Our main aim now is to keep things growing well. We must know how to destroy insects and diseases. Also we may need to mulch to conserve moisture, fertilize to maintain growth.

Sevin dust is good for vegetables. If you see nay Japanese beetles, use Sevin dust immediately.

Roses, azaleas, evergreens and summer annuals are on the front line for all sorts of insects. Dry insecticides applied to the ground around these plants do an excellent job of controlling sucking insects such as aphids and lace bugs. Malathion and diazinon will control most other insects.

With my own growing of flowers, I find the baking of the top inch or so of soil into a crust which keeps the summer rains from going deeply into the root zone is a real problem.I put humus on the top inch, and then the surface is open and mellow. Any mulch or some compost will work also.

Often times shallow watering may do more harm than good. A good way to water is to let the sprinkler run in a given area long enough to apply at lest an inch of water.

To gauge the amount of water that falls, place a pound coffee can under the fall of water. If there is one-half or one inch of water in the can, water again in 3 or 4 days.

If your hyhdrangea has greenishblue flowers, and you want to turn them deep pink, just sprinkle a cup or two of ground lime around its roots this summer and water it well. They turn blue in acid soil,

pink in alkaline soil and a little of both in neutral soil.

During extreme dry weather, raise the cutting height of your mower 1/2 to 1 inch. This will reduce moisture loss and keep roots cooler. Water early in the day for best results.

Dig up and divide crowded irises now. Cut off 2 to 4 inch pieces of rhizomes with foliages. Trim the leaves back to 6 or 7 inches in an inverted V shape. Plant about one foot apart. Do this only about every 3 or 4 years for nicer blooms.

Save your old nylon stockings and use them to hang herbs, seeds, rose petals, garlic, onions for drying.

For slow and thorough watering of garden plants such as tomatoes, punch three or four holes in the bottom of an empty 1-gallon plastic milk jug. Bury the jug in the soil next to the plant and fill with water. As the water seeps out, the plant's roots will absorb it.

Barrie Kitto, a biochemist at the University of Texas at Austin, says that everyone who eats a breakfast cereal probably consumes a small quantity of insect fragments each morning.

Beetles, weevils and moths are the three insects most likely to garnish cereals. They're not strangers to bakery products, packaged mixes and other products.

Except for possibly upsetting the sensitivities of the consumer, there is no cause for concern, Kitto says. The bugs may be harmful to the psyche, but not to the stomach.



Finnell backs agri-business proposition

State Rep. Charles Finnell, vice chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, backs a proposed state constitutional amendment which would provide up to \$100 million for Texas agri-business.

That proposition, Finnell noted, will be No. 16, last on the Nov. 2 ballot of proposed constitutional amendments, and may be difficult for some citizens to find on the crowded ballot.

"Farmers and ranchers across our district and Texas support this proposition,:" Finnell asserted. "This is truly a case of the Secretary of State saving one of the best propositions for last.'

If approved, the amendment would authorize up to \$100 million in bonds to finance the Texas Agricultural Fund. These dollars would be allocated to develop, improve, expand production and enhance marketing of Texas agricultural products.

"Agriculture is a keystone of the Texas economy," the legislator said. "Proposition 16 will enable our farmer and ranchers to accelerate the state's already strong presence in national and international markets."





If subject to the Act, you must allow each employee to take up to 12 weeks during any 12-month period for any one of the following reasons: 1) birth or adoption of a child; 2) care for a spouse, child, or parent with a serious health condition; or 3) the employee's own serious health condition.

There are additional restrictions. You must continue the employee's health-care coverage during the leave. After the leave, you must restore the employee to the original position or a comparable one.

The Act also imposes burdens on employees. If the leave is foreseeable (e.g., birth), the employee must give you 30 days' notice. If the leave is for a serious illness, the employee must obtain a doctor's certification.

The Act does leave you some leeway. You can exempt otherwise eligible employees if they are key employees in the top 10% of your company's pay scale and their absence would cause your company grievous economic harm. You can require that employees substitute accrued paid leave for some or all of the 12week period of family leave. And you can require second opinions on doctor's certifications.
