## **FmHA** taking applications

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by extreme fire hazards are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office in Haskell.

County FmHA supervisor Larry McDaniel said Haskell County is one of 149 counties in Texas recently named by by Secretary of Agriculture Mike Espy as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from the extreme fire hazards.

McDaniel said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business, or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

"As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30-percent less of production to eligible for an FmHA emergency loan," McDaniel said. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

"Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until May 10, 1994, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season," McDaniel said.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or poperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest.

The FmHA office in Haskell is open from 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Monday through Friday.



## Indians travel to Jim Ned

It doesn't get any easier for the Haskell Indians.

They will be in Tuscola Friday night to meet the Jim Ned Indians in the first of three consecutive games against the district's top-rated teams.

Both teams will be trying to get back on the victory trail after disappointments last week. While Haskell was losing, 20-8, to Rotan, Jim Ned was suffering its first district loss, a 28-8 defeat at the hands of Hamlin. Its only other loss was to fourth-ranked Wall.

Jim Ned played unbeaten Hamlin on pretty even terms. Hamlin scored on a trick play on its first play, recovered a fumble to score another touchdown and ran back an intercepted pass to the 10-yard line to set up still another score, as the Pied Pipers bolted to an early 28-0 lead, which they held at halftime. The week before, Jim Ned had handed Stamford its first loss of the

Jim Ned has a number of talented performers. Jade Lamb, 155-pound junior quarterback, is the man who makes the offense go. Tailback in the one-back offense is Larry Trevino, 187-pound junior. Slot back is Jake Pemberton, who also is a linebacker on defense. The line, on both offense and defense, is anchored by Jason Shea, 217-pound junior, who Coach Walter Hargrove describes as "an outstanding player.'

Hargrove said his Indians played a pretty good game against Rotan. "They were able to make some big plays against us, especially on defense," said the coach, in obvious reference to four quarterback sacks which cost the Indians 58 yards in

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
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## Rotan spoils homecoming

The incentive was there: The Indians needed this victory to stay in the thick of the 7-2A title race.

The support was there: Hundreds of visiting alumni joined the local faithful to cheer the team.

The tradition was there: The Indians had not lost a home game since 1991.

The revenge factor was there: Rotan had come from behind in the fourth quarter last year to defeat the Indians and ruin their playoff

But the Rotan Yellowhammers refused to cooperate as they took a 20-8 victory over the Haskell in Friday night's homecoming feature, all but eliminating the Indians from any chance of making the playoffs.

The Yellowhammers set the tone of things to follow on their second possession when they drove 67 yards in 12 plays for the game's first score. Steve Warren capped the drive when he bolted over from 2 yards out with 4:46 to go in the first quarter.

The Indians answered that drive with a 76-yard drive of their own, climaxed on the first play of the second quarter when Justin Lisle scored on an 8-yard run. The extra point attempt was blocked, leaving the score at 6-6. The drive had been keyed by runs of 10, 9, 13 and 13 yards by Lisle, an 11-yard pass from Mart Guess to Casey Larned and a 26-yard pass from Guess to Jason Torres. An 11-yard loss on a quarterback sack and a 5-yard penalty against the Indians had lengthened the drive.

Rotan took the lead for good when Temple Daniel engineered a 64-yard scoring drive. The Rotan quarterback completed passes of 13, 18 and 10 yards before going over from the 1. Warren kicked the extra point as the Hammers went out front, 13-6.

Matt Perry gave the Indians a good opportunity in the third quarter when he recovered a Rotan fumble on the Yellowhammers' 41. But four plays later the Indians surrendered the ball on downs at the

Five running plays by Rotan moved the ball to the Haskell 43, from where Daniel peeled off his second scoring run. Warren's extra point kick completed the night's

The Indians' only serious scoring threat after their lone touchdown came in the fourth period when they moved from their own 27 to the Rotan 11 where they lost the ball on a fumble. Lisle had runs of 19

and 11 yards in the drive and Guess twice hit Robert Huff with 13-yard completions.

That drive did directly contribute to a safety for the Indians. After Rotan couldn't pick up a first down, Warren ran into and then out of the end zone for an intentional safety.

Lisle, with 192 yards in 31 carries, led the Indian offense. Guess completed six passes for 81 yards, but was sacked four times for 58 yards in losses, which greatly reduced the Indians' net yardage. Only other Indian ball carrier was Chris Silvas who picked up 2 yards on a single carry in the second period. Huff caught three passes for 33 yards, Torres two for 37 yards, and Larned one for 11.

Daniel led the Yellowhammer offense, gaining 75 yards on 13 carries and completing 7 of 11 passes for 82 yards. Trey Brown gained 60 yards in 11 carries.

Martin Limones, with 16 tackles, and Ryan Olson with 15. led the Indian tacklers. Bucky Harvey had 9 and Perry, Silvas, Cody Cypert and Brian Brzozowski each had 8.

Perry and Torres each recovered a fumble, while Brzozowski and Limones were credited with forcing

## Steers maul Rule

Rochester's Mark Brown ran for four touchdowns and passed for two more as the unbeaten Steers defeated Rule, 60-26, before a Rochester homecoming crowd Saturday afternoon.

Brown had touchdown runs of 39 and 49 yards as the Steers shot to a 12-0 first-period lead. They stretched the margin to 40-0 by halftime on a 70-yard touchdown pass from Brown to Matt Cisneros, a 60-yard punt return by Shannon King, a 20-yard run by Brown and a 21-yard run by Brandon Kelly.

Rule scored its first touchdown in the third period on a 1-yard run by Brian Manke, but Rochester answered with a 17-yard touchdown run by Brown.

The Steers added two touchdowns in the fourth period, a 57-yard run by Kyle Hollingsworth and a 56-yard pass from Brown to Cisneros. Rule scored three times in the final period, on 5-yard and 20-yard touchdown passes from Nathan Macias to Chad Teichelman and a 35-yard pass from Macias to Jim Campbell.



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Corporate bonds are rated for risk and generally mature in one to 20 years. Because of their higher risk, they offer a higher yield than government bonds. Convertibles are corporate bonds that can be converted

Municipal bonds are issued by local governments to pay for schools, roads, and other public projects. The interest you receive on municipal bonds is generally exempt from federal income tax (and sometimes state income tax), thus their lower interest rates.

Treasury bonds are issued by the federal government and are considered risk-free. They're highly liquid, exempt from state and local taxes, and offer a lower rate of return than corporate bonds.

Agency bonds are issued by government agencies and include such bonds as Ginnie Maes, Fannie Maes, and Freddie Macs. Their risk and interest rates are marginally higher than the Treasuries.

Zero coupon bonds are sold at a deep discount. The holder pays yearly taxes on the interest, even through the interest isn't payable until

You can purchase most bonds through a broker, and you can also buy newly issued Treasury bonds directly from the Federal Reserve bank.

Another option is to buy bonds through an investment in a mutual fund that invests in bonds. With a bond fund, you get broader diversification and smaller investment minimums. However, your principal isn't guaranteed at maturity as with individual bonds. The funds are constantly buying and selling bonds, and you get the value of the shares you own when you sell.

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# WITH THE BIBLE

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"And the Scripture was fulfilled, which saith, And He was numbered with the transgressors" (Mark 15:28).

The progressive fulfillment of this passage from Isaiah 53 is the amazing story of our Lord's three baptisms.

First, this prophecy must be applied to our Lord's incarnation. Born a babe at Bethlehem, He was baptized into the human race, becoming, not merely one with us, but one of us, a true human being, though still also "very God." This is how He was first "numbered with the transgressors.

Later the Lord was baptized again, this time with water, by John the Baptist. John's baptism was unto "repentance for the remission of sins" and those who responded came to his baptism "confessing their sins" (Mark 1:4,5). Little wonder that John at first refused to baptize this sinless One, saying: "I have need to be baptized of Thee, and comest Thou to me?" But the Lord insisted, saying: 'Thus it becometh us to fulfill all righteousness" (Matt. 3:13-15). Thus our Lord joined repentant sinners in baptism and was, in this practical way, "num-

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bered with the trangres-

But after His baptism into the human race and His subsequent baptism with water, our Lord spoke of a third baptism, saying: "I have a baptism to be baptized with, and how am I straitened [Lit., "What a spot I am in"] till it be ac-

complished!" (Luke 12:50). This third baptism was, of course, His death at Calvary, where He was baptized into God's judgment upon sin in order that He might save us from it. Finally, then, Isaiah

53:28 was fulfilled, for it is in connection with His death at Calvary that Mark 15:27,28 says: "And with Him they crucify two thieves; the one on His right hand, and the other on His left. And the Scripture was fulfilled which saith, and He was numbered with the transgres-

It is a touching thing to realize that our Lord from heaven should deign to identify Himself with us, even to taking our sins upon Himself. Now, as we respond, trust Him as our Savior and accept eternal life as the gift of God (Rom.) 6:23), we become one with Him (I Cor. 12:13,27).
