Riding high on the heels of las ceek's 14-12 upset of Hamlin the Haskell Indians travel to Stamford Friday night to close out their 1993 Notball season.
Neither team remains in the unning for the playoffs, but there this long-standing rivalry.
The Indians need a victory to assure themselves of a winnin season. After nine games, they stand 4-3-2.
Stamford, which won its first five games before dropping three in week's 54-0 rampage agains Hawley. And the Bulldogs still remember Haskell's $34-27$ win over them last year.
Leading the Bulldogs is Chris Gardner, one of the top backs in the area. As a junior last year, Gardner
rushed for 1,271 yards and scored 15 touchdowns on his way to alldistrict honors.
In nine games, the Bulldogs have scored 257 points, while the defense, the Indians have a big edge yielding just 97 points, compared o Stamford's 131.
Haskell 14, Hamlin 12 Haskell isn't going to forget this Haskell song time. It'll probably be e before Hamlin forgets it. When the final gun sounded at frigid Indian Stadium Friday night, the Indians had wrapped up a $14-12$ verdict over the previously unbeaten
Pied Pipers and had derailed, at least temporarily, Hamlin's rush to the district 7-2A championship.
The victory boosted the Indians record to 4-3-2 (2-3-1 in district) and paved the way for Haskell to post a winning season if it can get this Friday.
Credit this smashing upset to a fired-up defense which kept the Pipers bottled up in their own end of the field during most of the contest, which was played i wind. Alt
Although Hamlin held a wide satistical edge, the statistics don reflect the efforts of the India defense which didn't allow the Pied line until the Indians already held 14-0 lead. Most of Hamlin's offens was gained during two long touchdown drives later in the game. And it was the defense which scored one of the Indian touchdown and the defense which set up th other. Jonathan Tatum's two
intercepted passes led to touchdowns within a 27 -second span in the second quarter. The first came when he stole a Hamlin pass at the Piper 25 a 7 -yard scoring pass to Rober Huff for the game's first score. A

IS IT TIME TO HAVE AN ESTATE PLANNING TALK WITH YOUR CHILDREN?
Personal finances is a topic many people feel more comfortable discussing with paid professionals than with their own family. However, some level of information should be shared with family members if you want to create a successful estate plan.
If you're a typical parent with grown children, you probably own your home and have some other investments. You may also have

The official grazing and haying period opened Nov. 1 for acreage conservation reserve (ACR), or land
designated as conserving use (CU) designated as conserving use (CU)
for payment under the 1993 acreage reduction programs.
"Farm program participants will be authorized to hay or graze their ACR and CU acreage," said Glenn R. Brzozowski of

Farmers are not permitted to graze ACR or CU for payment land during the five-month non-grazing period set by the State ASC committee. The non-grazing period 1 to Oct. 31 . The 1993 farm program enrollment report showed that
almost 100,000 acres of Haskell almost 100,000 acres of Haskell County cropland was diverted from
production to ACR or CU for payment. "This acreage has since been planted to cover corps such as grasses, legumes, small grains or put into approved conservat Now that the prohibited grazing and haying period will be passing,
Brzozowski cautions farmers against overgrazing the acreage so as to maintain sufficient cover to prevent wind and water erosion. The ASCS official said producers must comply with regulations as stipulated in the program contract to maintain farm program benefits. Those who fail to do so will be out of compliance and could lose payments and other program benefits.
