

Indians end season with 4-4-2 record

The Haskell Indians closed out their 1993 football campaign in Stamford Friday night, bowing to the host Bulldogs, 14-6.

The loss left the Indians with a 4-4-2 overall record and 2-4-1 in district 7-2A.

Stamford's Chris Gardner clicked of a 38-yard touchdown run in the first period to give the Bulldogs an early lead. Haskell's lone touchdown came just before half when Mart Guess went over from the 1-yard line on a quarterback sneak to cap a 60-yard Indian drive.

Josh Damron threw a 70-yard scoring pass to Wayne March in the fourth quarter to give the Bulldogs their final touchdown.

"Our boys worked hard and played hard this year," said Coach Walter Hargrove. "I know they're disappointed they didn't have a better record, but they played some real good football."

The Indians were competitive in every game they played, Hargrove pointed out.

During the season, sophomore tailback Justin Lisle gained 1003 yards in 227 rushing attempts to

account for most of the Indians' 135 yards and Robert Huff 23 times will not play. for 97 yards.

171 attempts for 798 yards. Jason Torres was the top receiver with 14 receptions for 242 yards. Jonathan Tatum caught 12 passes for 194 yards, Larned 10 for 152 yards and Huff 13 for 103 yards.

Matt Perry recovered 5 enemy fumbles to lead the team in that category. Bucky Harvey recovered 4, while Riley, Martin Limones and Torres had 2 each.

Torres and Huff each had 4 pass interceptions and Larned intercepted

Limones was in on 116 tackles, Brian Olson with 105 and Perry with 103 and Harvey with 81. Larned had 79, including 20 against Stamford, Deon Walker had 78 and Brian Brzozowski had 76.

Paint Creek meets Guthrie in playoff game in Seymour

Paint Creek's Pirates will meet the Guthrie Jaguars at 7:30 p.m. Friday in Seymour in a first-round playoff game.

Paint Creek won its first district championship since 1968 by breezing through district 10 with a 4-0 record.

The Pirates are 7-3 overall, all three losses being narrow defeats at the hands of good teams.

The Pirates opened the season against Rochester, losing 51-37 to the highly ranked Steers, who went on to post a perfect record enroute

to the championship of district 9. They caught another ranked team in their second game, losing to

Aspermont 33-28. They then won over Strawn and Blackwell before losing a 28-26 heartbreaker to Cherokee.

Once district play began, the Pirates defeated Woodson, 24-12; Newcastle, 32-26; and Lueders-Avoca 78-57; Moran, 25-8.

Last week in a non-district contest, the Pirates defeated Megargle, 46-01

•The playing field is 20 yards shorter and 10 yards narrower,

•It takes 15 yards for a first

·A kicked conversion after a touchdown counts 2 points, a conversion on a run or pass counts 1 point.

•The quarterback, or who ever takes the snap from center, cannot carry the ball past the line of scrimmage, unless he hands off first to someone else.



Placing second in district, first in area and fifth at state was the


Junior Farm Skills team of Bobby Ortiz, Neil Holmes and Harrison Druesedow.

Peanut marketing cards due by Dec. 15

Farmers are reminded they should turn in their 1993 peanut marketing cards as soon as possible after marketings are completed for the farm, and no later than Dec. 15.

Glenn R. Brzozowski county executive director of the Haskell County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, said peanut-producing farmers are required to report all marketings from the farm, as well as the amount of peanuts retained for seed or other uses.

"The computerized marketing card should contain all sales transactions at buying points, and any marketings not made through an established buying point should be reported when the card is returned," Brzozowski explained.

Peanut producers receive a printout of all marketings on their card, and are responsible for checking it to be sure all marketings have been properly

Brzozowski said the peanut price support program limits the number of pounds of peanuts that can be marketed by producers for domestic edible uses through poundage

quotas. To avoid marketing penalties, any peanuts not marketed against a poundage quota for a farm must be placed under addition loan, or marketed for export or crush in accordance with a previously approved contract entered into by the peanut producer and the handler, Brzozowski said.


Price support on 1993-crop quota or additional peanuts will be available through warehouse-store and farm-stored loans from harvest time through Jan. 31. Availability of farm-stored loans on quota peanuts will continue through March 31.


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Basketball teams scrimmage Friday



Texas Stadium one Sunday afternoon if Troy Aikman, Emmitt Smith and the rest of the Cowboys strode out of the tunnel in the standard football gear of the 1930s-leather helmets, little or no padding, and stiff, clunky cleats. markets, also saw their job-creation Worse, suppose Jimmy Johnson had decided to use the play book from that era.

No matter how the opponents lined up, he set his strategies based on what worked way back then.

It doesn't take much to figure out the results would be disastrous. What worked yesterday won't cut it today when the rest of the teams are improving and changing strategies.

When the North American Free Trade Agreement goes before Congress in a few short days, our representatives will make a crucial decision on how the United States will compete in a global economy that's changing far more quickly than any football game. If our country is going to succeed, NAFTA needs to be part of the play

NAFTA's 15-year plan to open the borders to free trade between the Unites States, Mexico and Canada will create jobs and position us to compete in a world economy rapidly becoming based on trading alliances. The European Community and Pacific Rim trade blocks already are making an impact on the world's economy by pooling their resources.

If the United States misses its opportunity to lead North America into a similar agreement, our business and industry won't be competing on a level playing field with our counterparts in countries like Japan.

Of course, change is unsettling, and every policy shift has its drawbacks as well as its advantages. But many of the arguments against NAFTA are rooted in fear, not

Some low-skill level jobs may be lost as companies move to take advantage of Mexico's lower wage scales. We are losing these jobs now. But most economists agree that the United States will gain jobs from NAFTA.

Gary Hufbaker and Jeffrey Scott of the Institute for International Economics predict a net gain of 171,000 American jobs over the next five years as we gain expanded opportunities for trade with Canada and Mexico.

And the jobs we gain will be better, higher-paying jobs than the ones we lose. American jobs related to trade with Mexico pay about 17 percent more than the average U.S. job, according to the U.S. Department of Commerce.

But when it comes down to it, estimates and predictions are just our best guesses of what will happen. For concrete evidence of what happens when rich and poor nations join forces in a trade zone, we need a real-life example.

Fortunately, we don't have to go far to find one. In 1986, when the European Community brought Spain and Portugal in to their common market, they were in a similar situation. Just like the opponents of NAFTA are today, Europeans in the richer northern nations feared the flight of jobs to the nations with low wages.

The results were different. Wages Editor: Imagine the reaction at and economic growth exploded in Spain and Portugal, with the per capita gross national product in both countries more than doubling in five years time. And the wealthier nations of the north, in addition to gaining profitable export rates accelerate.

Stamford University professor Anne Krueger, a former chief economist for the World Bank, summed the situation up pretty succinctly: "Ahead of time, people said terrible things would happen. And then, of course, nothing terrible happened."

Every businessman or woman knows that success involves taking risks. But when we weigh the pros and cons, and look at it in a factbased, not fear-based light, NAFTA is clearly a step the United States needs to take. We can't stop the changes in the world economy any more than the Dallas Cowboys could make every team in the NFL run 1930s plays and wear 1930s equipment.

What we can do is learn the new strategies, sign the new players, and do what it takes to win on today's playing field. One thing is certain, our economic future is too important for anyone to sit on the

YEAR-END MOVES TO CUT YOUR TAXES

There are still some year-end moves you can make to cut your 1993 tax bill. Consider these possibilities:

• Do an estimate of your 1993 and 1994 income and corresponding tax liability. If you'll be in different tax brackets for each year, consider shifting income to the lower-bracket year and deductions to the higherbracket year.



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
