

Four contested races develop for primary

officials up for re-election will face opposition in the March 8 Democratic primary election.

Contested races for County Judge, two County Commissioner positions and Justice of the Peace were assured at the close of the filing period Monday evening.

Latest to announce as candidates were Giles M. Kemp, candidate for County Judge; E. L. (Elmer) Adams for County Commissioner Precinct 2; and Don Hisey for County Commissioner Precinct 4.

Kemp joins a field composed of incumbent B. O. Roberson, James M. (Stick) Raughton and Jerrell Elbert (Judo) Johnson for the County Judge position.

Adams opposes incumbent Ronnie Chapman and James R. (Jimmy) Hannsz for County Commissioner of Precinct 2. Hisey filed against incumbent C.

A. (Bud) Turnbow for County Commissioner of Precinct 4. Incumbent Justice of Peace Gina

Brown is being opposed by Don Flippin.

Four other incumbent county officers did not draw opposition: County Clerk Rhonda Moeller, District Clerk Carolyn Reynolds

Four incumbent Haskell County and County Treasurer Willie Faye

No Republican filed for any of the county offices, meaning that winning the Democratic primary is tantamount to election.

Also assured of re-election by virtue of no opposition are District Judge Charles Chapman and State Representative Charles Finnell.

State Senator Steve Carriker did not draw a primary opponent, although two Republicans filed for that office. Doyle High of Haskell and Tom Haywood of Wichita Falls will face each other in the Republican primary and the winner will contest Carriker in next fall's general election.

Also getting a free ride in the primary is incumbent Democratic U.S. Congressman Charles Stenholm. But three Republicans filed as candidates for the position. Phil Boone of Abilene, Roy Falls of Granbury and Don Schmidt of Stephenville are candidates in the Republican primary to choose a general election opponent to Stenholm.

The primary runoff election is scheduled for April 12 and the general election on Nov. 8.

The Maidens lost to Holliday, 67-37, and Jacksboro, 50-39, before defeating Crowell, 71-34, for seventh place.


The Indians lost to Electra, 87-78, and Nocona, 66-60, and then beat Crowell, 82-56, for seventh




